Foreign Autos Sale Reported Good in Coast

LOS ANGELES, March 12—Nearly one of every 12 buyers of new automobiles in California is switching to a foreign make, thus making the state the hub of foreign car restrictions in the nation.

Prices supplied by the Buick-Holden Corporation show that from a negligible number immediately after World War II sales of imported cars rose in California to \$2,250 in 1957.

"It's easy to see why foreign cars are getting so every day, as popularity," explained Ted Picado, sales manager for an agency in nearby Pasadena.

"The fact that imported cars are easier to drive and park in heavy traffic than their American counterparts also proves to be a highly attractive feature," he noted.

"Picado said the imported market does not depend on automobile cars as opposed to sports cars. Among the top sellers are Volkswagen, Renault, Hillman, Volvo, MG and the English Ford.

"Sports cars are well received in California since the weather favors an open top," he added. "However, they may be considered as more of a luxury than a regular foreign car."

"What effect will the current economic slowdown have on foreign cars?"

"Not much," Picado answered optimistically. "In fact, it even may help. Most motorists may tire of high monthly payments on their American cars and switch to a more economical imported make."

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—A prominent scientist in a congress of learned men in Los Angeles made a bold statement to the effect that the world has had no women geniuses, and even as he was speaking, the Moscow radio called Russian women geniuses they should not wiggle as they walk.

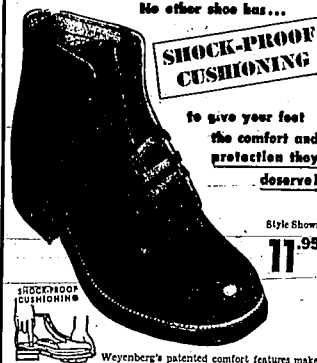

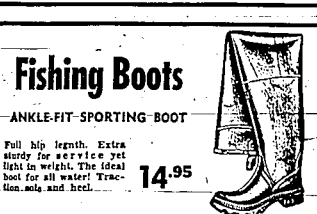

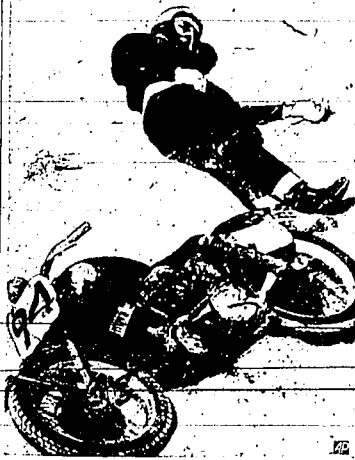

Quick Action Predicted for Penalty Move

WASHINGTON, March 12—Supporters of a bill which would exempt wheat producers from penalties for overplanting the 1958 crops could today expect speedy action on the measure.

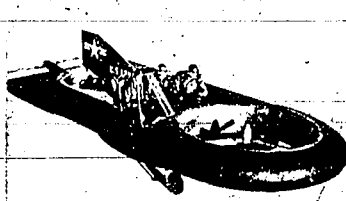
Identical bills were introduced in the Senate last week by Senators Scheppel, R. Kans. and Alcott, R. Colo., and in the House by Representative Albert D. Ochs. A number of congressmen from both parties are cosponsoring the legislation.

Supporters expect that a law signed by President Eisenhower last August, which stipulates that no law may be retroactively applied to wheat producers who have been overplanting their allotments. The objection is that the bill, if introduced, would take away from the fact that most producers already had planted their 1958 crops when the agriculture department promulgated the regulations under the bill.

A St. Louis aide said most wheat producers would not have been accustomed to paying a small cash penalty for overplanting and are under the impression that the same practice could be carried out in 1958.

Not, the aide said, they face loss of base acreage allotments. He said that wheat state congressmen have reported receiving summaries of provisions over "shading rules in the middle of the game."

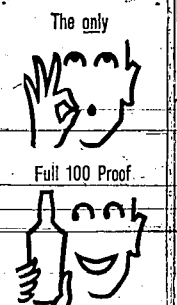

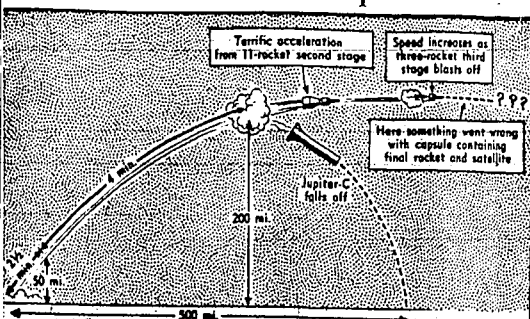

Annual Alaska Ice Guessing Game Starts on River Banks

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, March 12—Alaska's hundred thousand dollar guessing game is about to get under way again on the frozen banks of the Tanana river. For the quiet village of Nenana on Tanana, it's the most exciting time of year. It's the time when residents from Alaska and the Yukon, ranging from sourdoughs and Eskimos to bankers and businessmen, gather to bet on the exact time of the ice breakup. The river now is covered by 32 inches of ice. Last year, the Tanana's ice cracked, heaved, groaned and then moved downstream at 9:30 a. m. on May 5. At that moment, 47 Alaskans became several thousand dollars richer, sharing in a pot of \$113,500. To eliminate disputes as to the time of the breakup, the time is recorded by a clock placed on a tripod in the middle of the river. Alaskans have been betting on Tanana ever since Gundy Beck Jink and his buddies loaded their pokes into a pot and made their fortunes in 1909. The village of Nenana gave the contest official recognition in 1917 under the organization of the Alaska Engineers commission. For several years, only residents of the city could buy tickets, but it didn't last long for the game to spread throughout the territory. Under existing rules, no tickets may be purchased outside of Alaska and the Yukon territory. The "big guess" now has grown to such proportions that many Alaskans bank together to form companies or corporations solely for the purpose of picking the time when spring breaks winter's grip on the Tanana. This year, the experts are looking for an early break. The ice is thinner than last year's and there's less snow. Regardless of who wins, the crowd that gathers in little Nenana will have a big time the night after the ice breaks. They'll gather in the town hall for the annual breakup ball, to close out the "big guess."

More than 250 prisoners, described by officials as "some of the worst" behind bars, made a riot of their cells during the abortive demonstration at Tennessee's Brushy Mountain state prison.

No one was injured during the incident.

Guards were ordered out of the block for fear the inmates would break out of their cells and get to them. Tear gas shells were pumped into the arena and that quieted down the convict temporarily.

This morning, shortly after day-break, approximately 60 guards armed with submachine guns and hand grenades entered the cellblock and marched the prisoners in groups of 40 to breakfast. They were hustled back into their cells.

"The rioters refused to specify any grievance," a prison official said.

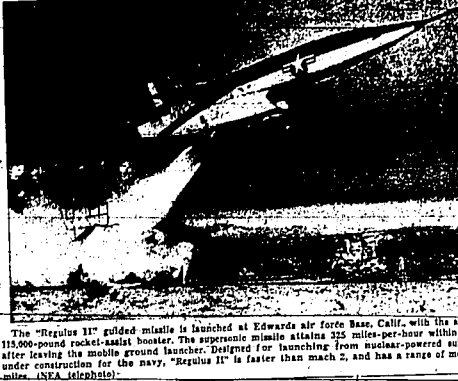

Pheasant Count Shows Big Ratio of Roosters

Magic Valley hunters didn't harvest the rooster-pheasant crop available to them last year according to first phases of total population counts conducted by the Idaho fish and game department, reports Charles Blake, district bird biologist. First step in obtaining pheasant counts shows there are 64 roosters for each 100 hens.

The crowing census will be conducted in April to learn the population trend of birds in the nine counties comprising the fourth district, Blake said.

Sex ratio census conducted in the nine counties by 10 conservation officers resulted in counting of 6,848 pheasants. Of this total, 4,743 were roosters and 2,105 were hens.

The 1935 count revealed a ratio of 57 roosters to 100 hens, pointing out fewer roosters were harvested in last fall's hunting in relation to overall population.

The number of roosters to hens determined by the fish and game department can vary to a great degree. The department usually counts a rooster as 1-1/2 spread is "nothing to worry about," Blake said.

\$3 Duck Stamp Has Approval Of President

The spectacular proposal of fish and wildlife director Dan Jensen with the duck stamp increased to \$3, and the entire revenue earmarked for purchasing of remaining wetlands will be the administration's support, Jensen said.

Word of the decision, which will be implemented through the bureau of fish and game, was made official Monday by C. R. Lynch, natural resources writer for the Milwaukee Journal, who was contacted by Ross Laffler, assistant interior secretary for wildlife.

"I would like to make one concession, that we would seek no congressional approval whatsoever for the purchase of additional lands of the department," Jensen said.

The lands acquired, Laffler said, would be brought to light through a long list of water-logged lands along the aim of waterfowl biologists.

Even if the proposal fails, Jensen said, it would be "at least, 'since it' previously had substantial Democratic support, the gathering of four million acres of wetlands to round out the federal refuge system at 17 million still would be a long job."

With revenue estimated at a \$6.5 million dollar annually, as a matter of fact, it would take nearly 25 years, according to Jensen's estimates before a state subcommittee would have spent the money as much as the 1.8 million proposed for acquisition in the fish and game department's budget for fiscal 1936.
