State Studies Control Plan For Rockets

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—The Idaho department of aeronautics today announced a plan under consideration for control of rockets and space missiles launched by amateurs in the state.

The proposals were submitted yesterday at a meeting here attended by representatives of the bureau of land management, forest service, education department, Catholic association, Wool Growers' association, the national rifle and pistol association, and youngsters from Boise and Postlelle.

Plan Launching Sites
State Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton said it was agreed that three of four launching sites above 10,000 feet in land which has been withdrawn from public use and is being used full time by the military.

He said it was also felt that launches should be held once a week or once a month under proper supervision.

Moulton said final action on the plan probably will be taken at another meeting in about 10 days.

He revealed that he had received a letter from Dr. Werner von Braun, German rocket engineer and one of the leaders in this country's space efforts, commending Moulton's direct and forthright handling of the directive.

Neglected Oldsters Provided With New 'Retirement' Hotel

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13 (AP)—A young hotel man who thinks our older citizens are being "adly neglected" has opened the West's first retirement hotel.

The Continental hotel, located in the heart of San Francisco, is the "night hen, half profit" venture of Carl E. Arnold, Jr., 36, a balding ex-patriot who runs two other metropolitan hostlers.

Nothing that many hotels turn away older persons and women into crowded, cheerless rooming houses, Arnold decided to provide a place where men and women of retirement age could enjoy independence, comfort and city life—all in a place within their reach. A room with a private bath, and including dinner and brunch, ranges from \$75 to \$125 a month. The \$75 rental is for two persons in a room.

The rooms, though small, are painted in soothing pastels and are furnished with light-colored standard furniture. Residents may decorate the rooms themselves, if they wish. The rooms overlook a courtyard which is to be landscaped as a Japanese garden.

The 120-room hotel's oldest resident is a chipper 93-year-old woman who shops, attends movies and church socially just as often as the other guests. Most prefer to spend most of the day outside.

Arnold finds his tenants cheerful and cooperative. "They may be a little set in their ways," he says, "but they are amenable to suggestions and they can be steered."

The residents include a former retail-store operator, a former union official and several retired ministers. The majority of women are widows. Only one married couple is living in the hotel. Some guests work part-time and others help at the hotel in exchange for lower rates.

Arnold hopes to make the hotel a financial success by trimming fancy extras. Guests are expected to keep their own rooms neat. Staff service and limo are provided once a week. Daily service costs extra.

However, such luxuries as a color TV set and game room are available to guests. In addition, the hotel is installing a sun deck, roof garden, lending library and coffee bar.

In the evenings, guests may take part in various activities planned by Assistant Manager Mary Walford, a warm, sprightly woman who has spent many years in group work.

Arnold, a graduate of Cornell college of hotel administration, modeled his establishment after the Berlin "retirement hotels" in East. He feels private industry must take more responsibility in providing for our older citizens who are growing in numbers due to increased longevity and earlier retirement.

"Somebody has to do something about this problem," Arnold says. "The trouble is, many of our hotel

Death Orders Set Aside for Algerian Girl

PARIS, March 13 (AP)—The French government today commuted the death sentence of Djamilia Bouaziz, a pretty 23-year-old Algerian girl who was sentenced to the guillotine for terrorist activities.

The decision was made by the high council of the magistrature, which consists of top French judicial authorities. They conferred with President Rene Coty yesterday and their decision was announced today.

Other Sentences Commuted
Djamilia's death sentence was commuted along with those imposed on two other girls, Djamilia Bouaziz and Jacqueline Netter.

Miss Bouaziz was sentenced to death by an Algerian military tribunal in a milk-bar bombing in Algeria which killed four persons and injured 40 others, including many women and children.

She denied she had taken part in the bombing. But she admitted she belonged to the national liberation front, an anti-French organization running the rebellion against France.

Charges Torture
She also claimed to have been brutally tortured by French police agents shortly after she was captured.

Her case touched off an international uproar, with persons ranging from Arab students and the Soviet Union demanding that her life be spared.

Deviating Tito Stays Orthodox Red When It Comes to Ballot

President Tito of Yugoslavia continues to follow his own line of communism in everything but elections.

—He has refused to run for anything that would put Yugoslavia back under the domination of Soviet Russia.

—He has succeeded in maintaining a balance in his relations between the communist bloc of countries and the United States.

But in his election policy, Tito remains an orthodox communist. Yugoslavia are to elect a new parliament March 23. There will be 200 candidates for the 201 seats in the federal council, the controlling house of the parliament.

All candidates, including those of the free districts in which there will be contests, are officially approved members of the Yugoslav communist party, which is controlled by the Communist party.

—Tito seems to be pretty popular with his own people. He might win in a free election.

—Tito's dictator can afford to take the risk of permitting effective opposition.

In Yugoslavia, Tito is pretty much of the free world above. He is president, premier, head of the socialist alliance.

Pursuit of Pleasure, Comfort Blamed For "Taking It Easy" With Education

Students are being blamed for the same kind of secondary school training. Our minimum standards are too low. We are not demanding enough of our students and that it is provided by personnel as competent in the field of mathematics and science.

Plans are being studied for secondary education which will provide for students of various capacities. Some such programs are to go into effect in the near future. A major problem is providing teachers of sufficient competence. To compete successfully with industry and government for the services of top scientists as teachers, the schools may have to pay double the salary of present teachers. They must also be prepared to give these scientists the freedom to experiment with methods that do not always yield.

Too often high school students are required to take courses in mathematics and science which are not of sufficient quality to give them a real understanding of the subjects. The present program has been two or more decades in developing and improving the quality of secondary education. It is going to take a long time to get better results. Water Rates Will Benefit Jerome User

JEROME, March 13 — Beginning with the June billing, Jerome residents will pay an additional 10 monthly for water for protection during the summer months.

The new rate will entitle users to 20,000 gallons of water monthly and to their average monthly consumption. The average consumption will be based upon the amount of water used during the February, March and April of this year.

The amount of water to be delivered for the above fee is the amount estimated by the city engineer to be used during the summer months. However, there is no limitation placed on the purposes for which the water may be used. It may be used for sprinkling lawns, gardens, and for watering lawns, and for any other purpose for which water is used in the home. Industrial users will not be included in the new rate.

Under the old rates, only 1,200 gallons could be supplied for the fee. A sprinkling rate has been in effect for those who desired, but it was more than twice as expensive as the new rate. The new rate is being instituted by the bond issue.

Adlai Caution Is Sounded in Summit Talks

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP) — Adlai Stevenson warned last night that the United States should take a cautious attitude in approaching a summit meeting with Russia.

The twice-deferred Democratic candidate for president said that the United States should beware of a meeting with the Soviets without first establishing an agenda which had been worked out with careful preliminary meetings at lower diplomatic levels. He also cautioned that too much must not be expected from a meeting between President Eisenhower and Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Stevenson, who spoke over the CBS radio program, "Radio Beat," said that a meeting without adequate preparation could cause trouble with America's allies. He warned that "it would be a very unhappy thing if we let the Soviet Union force us into a meeting where the United States is further split off from its allies."

Stevenson said that a summit meeting would not result in great changes in the cold war.

"There is, however, a reason for hope and optimism that we might accomplish something on a less exalted scale," he said.

Anti-Recession 'Guessing Game' May Rescue or Wreck Nation's Economy

WASHINGTON, March 13 (AP)—The economy may be saved or wrecked by the guessing game now being played on Capitol Hill. It is better to start a federal spending program to avert recession or wait in the hope it will go away.

The anti-recession arguments follow two main methods: a tax cut on big and new federal spending or a big and new federal spending program. This is a good time to take the difference—in principle—between a big government spending program and a big tax cut to over-see the depression. There's no basic difference. There's both cost

the government money. One might work faster than the other.

Both the Eisenhower administration and the Democratic leadership in congress are cautious about a tax cut now. Eisenhower, full of optimism the economy will take a natural upturn. It full of caution in all directions.

He shows no regrets for a big, anti-recession spending program, although he has urged speeding up of projects already approved by congress.

The Democrats in congress talk of a 10-point program to stimulate

business and employment. It includes the kind of thing Eisenhower talks about—a speed-up program already authorized, but also new construction and, if necessary, a modern version of the old WPA of depression days.

Not all members of congress are as hesitant about a tax cut as Eisenhower and the Democratic leadership. For instance, Senator Douglas, D., wants a tax cut now of around \$2,200,000,000.

The Eisenhower administration—despite the dim view the President apparently holds of it—is showing in-stantly pump-priming steps.

creasing signs of thinking of a tax cut. Vice President Nixon this week urged it—unless the economy improves soon.

Yesterday Eisenhower put off an immediate decision on the tax cut idea, but he's going to start discussing it with top Republicans.

And he decided the Democratic "pump-priming schemes." But most of the steps he's urged—in a speed-up of authorized programs, the spending of new money—are essentially pump-priming steps.

In one sense, at least, a tax cut also would amount to public spending.

Government spending programs hand out government dollars. But a tax cut would just as truly be handing out government money by letting people keep their dollars which otherwise would have gone to the government.

A five billion dollar spending program or a five billion dollar tax cut would cost the government exactly the same.

There is this difference in-effect: A tax cut would put money faster into the hands of people to spend on things they want and thus create jobs for people to make the things they want. A big federal spending program wouldn't affect anybody and no doubt would take longer to boost the economy.

Lawyer Avers Girl of Slayer Also Involved

LINCOLN, Neb., March 12—County Attorney Elmer Scheele has scoffed at a claim that lecturer Carl Fugate was guilty of nothing more than juvenile delinquency in accompanying Charles Starkweather on a crime spree which left 11 persons dead.

Scheele argued yesterday that the 14-year-old girl was directly involved in murder when she accompanied her boy friend on a two-state crime wave which ended in their capture at Douglas, Wyo., in January.

Denies Accomplice Charge

Starkweather, 19, has claimed that Carl was his willing accomplice, but she has denied it.

Her attorney, John McArthur, has argued that state law requires the transfer because of the girl's age.

Both Carl and Starkweather are charged with first degree murder in the death of Robert Jensen, Benet, Neb., one of the 11 victims.

Eskimo Eating Habits Facing Study of U. S. Health Agency

WASHINGTON, March 12—A team of food and nutrition experts in Alaska making the first intensive study of Eskimo eating habits, the public health service reported today.

The service said the team will visit 10 native Alaskan villages. About 1,000 Eskimos will participate in physical examinations and biochemical studies designed to show how well the native diet meets nutritional needs.

The study also will involve two Eskimo battalions of the Alaskan national guard.

The study team is under the supervision of the government's interdepartmental committee on nutrition for national defense. The service's Arctic health research center (AIHRC) is taking part in the project.

The public health service said Dr. Christine Heller-of-the-AIHRC has been living among the villagers for the last two years and recording their daily food intakes.

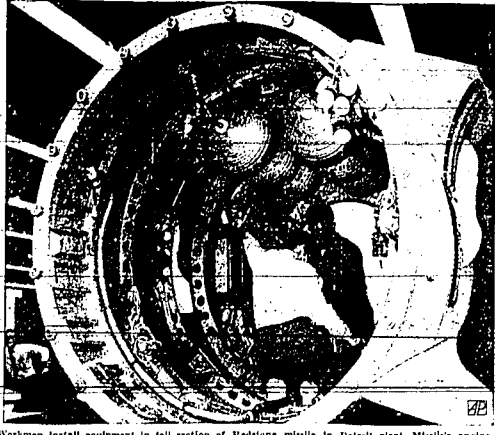

Scout Who Aided Whites in Plains Wars Dies at 98

PAWNEE, Okla., March 13 (AP)—The last of the Pawnee Indian scouts who helped the U. S. army win the West for the white man died.

The 88-year-old one-time warrior of these names is English. It was Bush Roberts. To his tribesmen he was Latahoklakahler or "Fancy Eagle." That was his father's name and he took it only after he proved himself in battle.

Until then he was Ahreksahard, or "Antler," and under that he enlisted to help the soldiers crush hostile plains Indians in the campaign of 1876.

Death came to Roberts Monday

night at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Mario Talaya, where he had been bedfast for months.

He will be buried there today with military honors after services in a Baptist Indian mission of which he was a charter member.

State Jobless Pay Said Aid For Economy

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—More than 5 million dollars in unemployment insurance benefits were cited Wednesday as a "real help" in preventing further downturn in Idaho's economy.

The state employment security agency reported that benefits paid the jobless since last July 1 have amounted to \$2,728,356. That compares with only \$1,516,800 paid in the corresponding period a year earlier.

"About 50 per cent of the money has gone into the 10 northern counties where lumbering and mining are suffering setbacks," said H. P. Garrett, executive director of the agency.

"These payments come at a time when other employment is dropping and they sustain purchasing power in the area and prevent unemployment from feeding itself."

"These payments have been a real help to some communities, particularly where we analyze where they have gone."

The agency reported a continued decline in the rate of new unemployment.

Money Is Just as Easy to Lose As Ever, Hal Told by Expert

BY HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—Money may be harder to get now—but it's still easy to lose.

A survey by the American Express company showed that U. S. citizens reported losing more than one hundred million dollars in cash last year in lost cases through their own carelessness.

This is enough to buy a Harvard education for 10,000 students—or to build a community of 2,000 homes each costing \$20,000 each.

As astonishing as this figure is, Donald S. J. MacNamara, crime consultant for the express company, says it doesn't tell the whole story.

"The reported losses alone come to one hundred million dollars," he pointed out, "but an amazing amount of money is lost inadvertently each year, and not reported, is probably many times that figure."

MacNamara, dean of the New York Institute of Criminology, spent 15 years abroad as an investigator for the armed forces and has concluded, "Americans are by far the most careless people in the world with money."

And the American man, not the American woman, is the major culprit.

"If you ask the average man how much money he has in his pocket, he rarely can tell you," said MacNamara. "A woman usually can."

"The average reported loss is about \$44."

"A man often won't even bother to report a loss if it is less than \$25," said MacNamara. "But if a woman loses a quarter in a restaurant, she'll report it to the manager."

"Don't have any more cash on you or in your home than you absolutely need. Use checks."

"A man should carry his wallet in his inside coat pocket. That is the safest place, because to get it in a pickpocket has to face you, something he doesn't like to do."
