### U. S. Drafting Proposal for Ban on Tests

James R. Killian, Jr., Undersecretary of the national security council, today said the study concerning the impact of test suspension on the United States security.

The Killian office has been conducting studies on the impact of testing on the country. A major question facing it is whether an inspection system to police a test moratorium can be made reliable.

The expected decision by the president to change U. S. policy and bring it closer to Russia's demands for a virtually unconditional ban on nuclear testing, would mean a defeat for crusading scientist Edward Teller.

Teller, a top advisor to AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss, has been waging a campaign to continue tests. His arguments are mainly that Russia would cheat by conducting secret experimental explosions which could not be detected. Moreover, he holds that this country needs tests to develop cleaner and more varied atomic weapons. A "clean" weapon is one free of radioactive fallout.

A decision modifying U. S. policy in important respects would mean a victory for the former disarmament advisor Harold Stassen, who recently resigned to run for governor of Pennsylvania.

In the past the United States has insisted that any agreement to suspend nuclear tests must be part of a general disarmament program to halt the East-West arms race and bring atomic weapons production under control.

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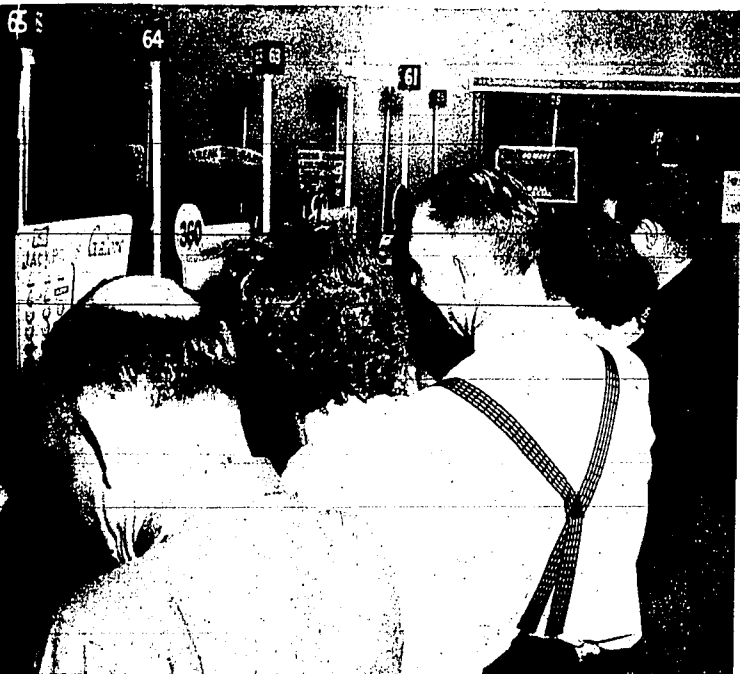

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Slot Machines Draw Thousands of Players to Nevada Fun Spots



Slot machines are the chief attraction at clubs located along U.S. highway 93 south of the Nevada-Idaho border for the benefit of Idahoans. People drive all the way from Tualatin and Boise—and all points between—to visit the four clubs and play the 223 devices which...

are featured in the Horse-Shu club, Cactus Pete's and Club 91. One club reports paying an estimated \$20,000 to slot machine winners in one day. Amusement Spot South Of Border Still Growing

A slot machine business started almost four years ago has mushroomed into a "south of the border" amusement community which promises to expand even more. Nearly 20,000 individual visits to the fun spots are reported each month by the centers of the 100-odd low clubs operating in the area. Over half of the customers at the clubs are from Magic Valley. They drive 45 miles or more to play 223 slot machines, eat quantities of free or inexpensive food and try to win some of the hundreds of dollars in prizes-money-given-away-each-week. The four clubs are situated just over the Idaho border in Nevada where gambling is legal. The first one started in 1954 after Idaho had ruled illegal a few years earlier all forms of gambling, including slot machines. Oldest of the four clubs is the Pair-O-Dice club owned by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert R. Kline. It was built during the summer of 1954 and slot machines until last summer. It also is the smallest of the clubs. "We specialize in private parties and banquets," says Mrs. Kline who does the cooking. Their trick duo, Candy, provides much of the entertainment. The Horse-Shu club, constructed in 1954, is the biggest of the border clubs. The owners, Harry Williams and Ray Fezler, report 112 slot machines. Weight and Fezler bought the club in December, 1957. Besides the slot machines, the club features western dance bands and a full service station and a unit motel. "We give away a lot of free food," Fezler says, "including a free chuck wagon dinner every evening and coffee all the time." Fezler points out that in July, 1957, the Horse-Shu club gave away 36,000 cups of coffee. Owners of the Horse-Shu club plan a \$150,000 expansion program starting this spring. It includes a 40-unit motel, horseshoe shaped swimming pool, steel shooting range and golf driving range, and enlargement of the present facilities including private dining room, cafe and dining room. Across the highway and south from the Horse-Shu club is Cactus Pete's club, opened Oct. 1, 1956. "And it's never been closed since," says Pete Bierman, co-owner of the club with A. L. Gentry and Dale Willman. Cactus Pete's has 85 slot machines, a dining room, dance area and bar. Besides the slot machines, the club features western dance bands and special buffets dinner on weekends. According to Willman, Cactus Pete's club is expected to be completed in 45 to 60 days. They plan to include a swimming pool, a golf course and a tennis court. Next of the clubs is Club 91, opened on Nov. 1, 1957. It has 30 slot machines, a dining room, dance area and bar. It is owned by L. V. Barton, and Art and Fay Dolman. The main income for the clubs, of course, is the slot machines, one of the owners pointed out. Other forms of gambling are not allowed by the Nevada gambling commission because the clubs are too far from any population center to be provided proper police protection. The location of the clubs has a name now, but the owners of the Horse-Shu club have applied to the Nevada state government for an unincorporated town called Horse-Shu, Nev., and have applied for a postoffice. The permanent population of the little desert night spot is 63 persons, the employees of the clubs and an all exception of six children, four of whom attend school in Contact, Nev.—the other two going to school in Twin Falls. The residents live in trailer homes in the few motels and family accommodations provided by the Horse-Shu club or Cactus Pete's. Some employees live in Twin Falls or Hollister. All of the employees do their shopping in Twin Falls, according to Willman. "Since no public utilities are provided for the locality, each club has its own power generators and water well. The generators are operated by diesel engines and supply the power to the huge neon signs on the outside of the clubs, public address systems—which play music almost continually both inside and outside of the clubs, and rings the buzzers... Shoshone's Wood River Convalescent Center Has First Patients After 12 Years of Plans

The 15-bed Wood River Convalescent Center in Shoshone accepted its first patients Wednesday after 12 years of planning by Lincoln county residents. The new type medical facilities are awarded hospital licenses C-1 and C-2 by the state health department. According to Howard Adams, Lincoln county prosecuting attorney, the center has been planned for the center since Lincoln county began planning the hospital in 1946. At an estimated cost of \$120,000 plus \$30,000 of hospital fees, the one-story brick center has six private rooms, eight semi-private rooms and two four-bed rooms. Physical therapy equipment, including electrotherapy and hydrotherapy machines, are installed in special rooms. A modern kitchen, combination dining room and lounge are features of the center. Mrs. Annie Klene, registered nurse who is administrator of the center. Mrs. Klene explains the purpose of the convalescent center: "We expect to have patients who are recovering from chronic diseases such as heart ailments, rheumatism, spinal polio and elderly people needing nursing operations. It is not a nursing home and it is expected that patients will be able to go home for the remainder of their lives, although some may still fall into that category. We will accept patients as young as 12 and as old as 80. Patients who are received and only remain in the center for a few days are charged two private rooms are available, according to Mrs. Klene. People have been applying for admission to the center since August 1957. Construction began on the center July 1957. Finances for the construction came from a bond issue of \$100,000 in Lincoln county, approved by the voters in July, 1946, and a \$100,000 county levy. The money was used in reserve for years and accumulated \$80,000. At that time, about \$60,000 from state contributions was matched through the state government administration through the \$122,000 spent thus far. The center is designed to be self-sufficient. Patients will be required to pay from \$100 to \$300 a month, depending upon the type of room, meals and their treatment, according to Mrs. Klene. All of the rooms are modern and new equipment, including beds, dressers and closets facilities for patients. The private rooms have private bathrooms. The convalescent center is entirely self-sufficient. Patients, according to Adams, but if room is available from out of the county will be welcome. 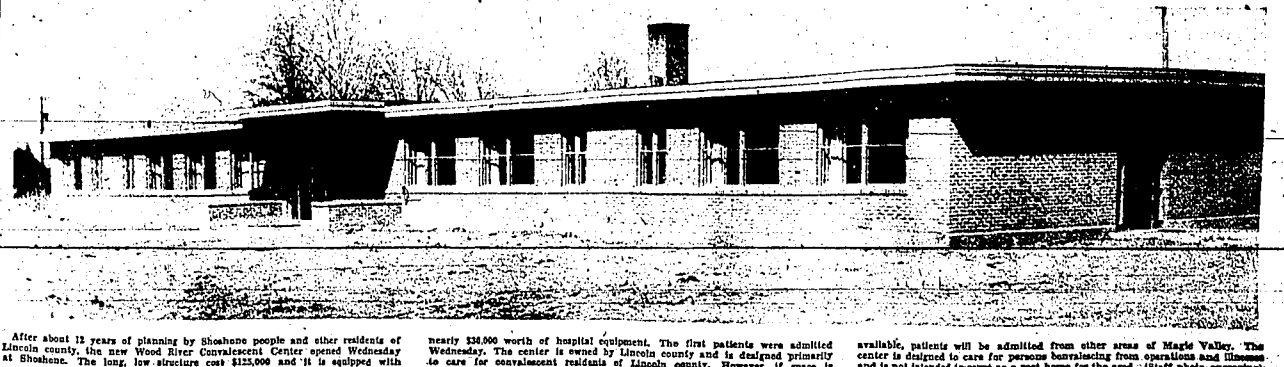

IGY Is Bringing Much Knowledge

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—IGY is leading man out of a kind of ignorance about his own planet, the Earth. IGY means the International Geophysical Year, a great scientific hunt for knowledge. Halfway through, it already is turning up discoveries and challenging ideas. Space appears quite safe for human flights to the moon or beyond, say radiated reports from Russian and U.S. moon probes. "Maybe we've robbed of an entire continent. For IGY scientists find evidence Antarctica could be just a collection of islands and mountains at the bottom of the world, not a huge land mass on a continent as our schoolbooks say. Our world is wetter than we thought, containing more ice than formerly estimated. If all this ice melted, it could drown New York, Los Angeles, London and thousands of miles of seacoast under 40 to 500 more feet of water above present sea-levels. The sun's gas or atmosphere seems to reach out and envelop the Earth and the sun keeps firing X-rays at us. Powerful and mysterious electric currents flow around the equator 50 or more miles over our heads. There are some main findings from nine months of IGY studies—more than 100,000 observations, total recorded time on Earth. IGY is an 18-month "year" which began last July 1. It set 10,000 scientists from 67 nations exploring the Earth. Its sea-air-space program and its all-important warming sun. Some fashioned Sputniks, ex-

plorers and Vanguarda to feel out space. Some scientists are floating on lonely ice floes in the Arctic ocean, or living out a frigid year in the Antarctic. Others man mountain observatories, check tide gauges on Pacific Islands, study the Earth's inside through earthquakes. Others launch thousands of balloons and hundreds of rockets to measure weather and air a dozen to 200 miles overhead; all ocean to probe mysteries of the sea; study the northern lights, or puzzles of Earth's magnetism and gravity. Conceived and directed by scientists, IGY is motivated by a simple and beautiful idea: If scientists everywhere work together in studying the physical forces affecting our planet, we can gain a clearer understanding of weather, the oceans, space, the Earth's inside through earthquakes. The results promise to be revolutionary. IGY indirectly started America into re-examining its educational system. It need for scientists, its attitude toward things intellectual. This block came when Russia succeeded first in putting IGY-made moon into the heavens. Thrilling as they are, the man-made satellites are just part of the IGY adventure to piece together a new, more accurate picture and story of our entire planet. Consider, first, the man-made moon. They're saving space ships look reasonably safe for humans to land on the moon, or to build and live on satellite weather stations peering down upon Earth. (Continued on Page 34, Column 1)

# AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

**"Fulltime Religion"**  
Text: "With part thereof... he read the road, and is satisfied yet he warmeth himself... and the reward thereof he maketh a god."—Is. 46: 16-17.

We cannot read a passage like this and say there is no honor in the Bible. It is the same with giving. How much of our giving is calculated and proportioned? How often is it dependent on what we have left over when the other things have left their full share? It is the same with thinking.

This opens up a difficult question for some of us. The struggle of life is hard. It is not easy to satisfy the needs of the body. Food and shelter are grim necessities and the most of life is taken up with getting these things.

But this way of thinking of religion as a special department of life is all wrong. There was one interesting thing about this savage. 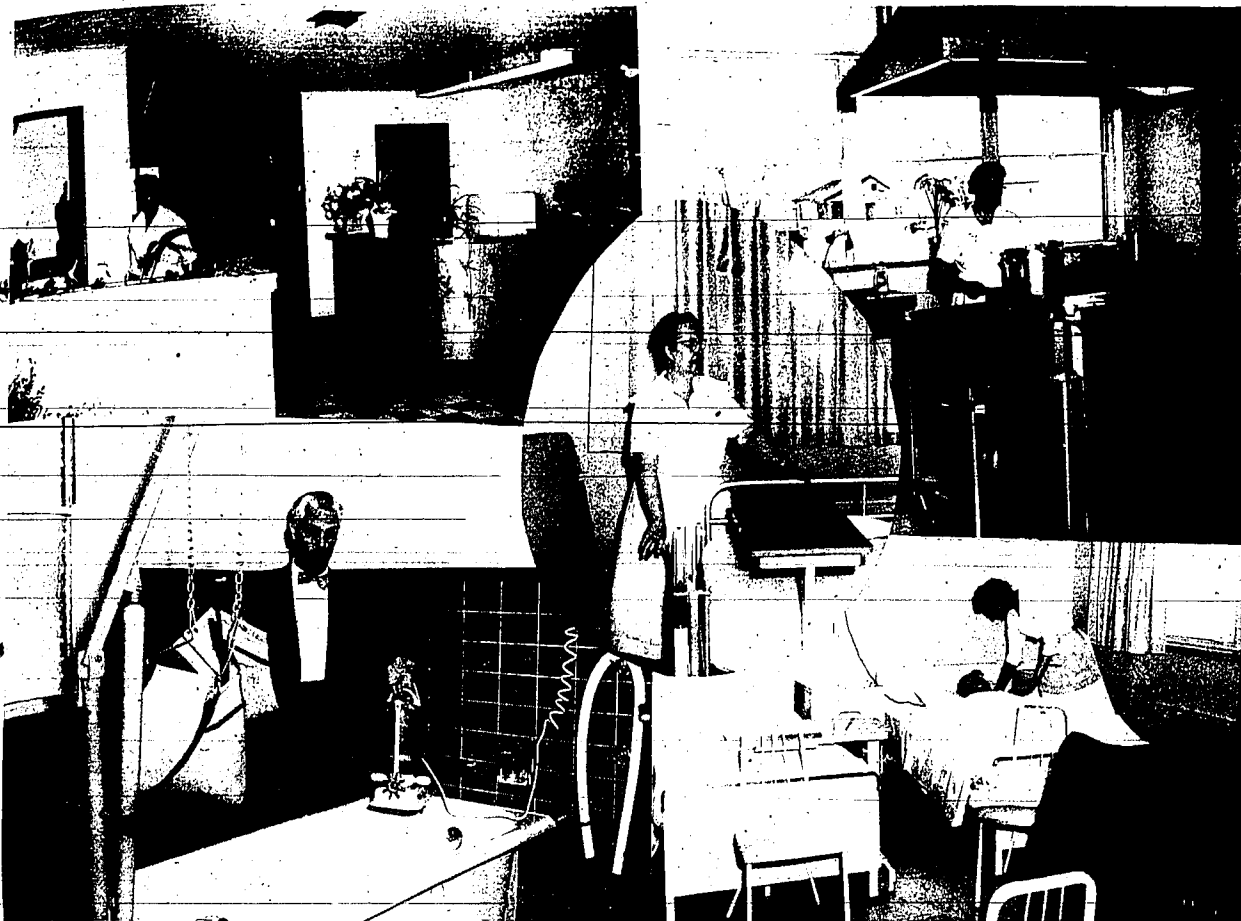

such enough money to build a convalescent center, Adkins says, until the state agreed in 1957 to provide 50 per cent of the money for the center.

The land on which the center is sited was sold to the county for a hospital in 1945 for only \$100, according to Adkins.

Contractors of the center were the J. J. Clawson company, Twin Falls, and the architects were C. A. Sandberg and associates, Idaho Falls.

Mrs. Klitene, as hospital administrator, is well experienced in her work. According to Adkins, she has worked in several upper middle-class hospitals in central Africa, Labrador, China, Washington, D. C., and at her original home in Santa Fe, N. M.

She came to the Wood River convalescent center from Washington.

State health officials who visited the center Tuesday were reported to be pleased. Bill Childs, head of the department of public assistance here, "I hope this will be a challenge to other communities to establish a similar facility."

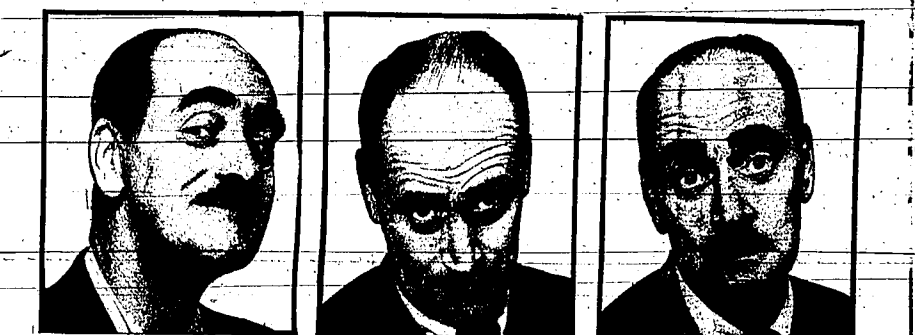

### Free or Inexpensive Food Is One of Big Attractions for Idahoans at Nevada Clubs



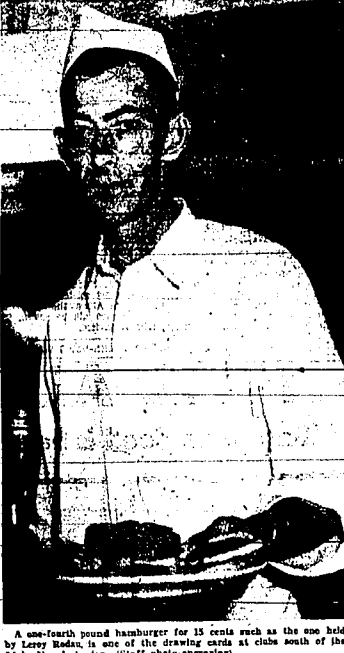
Even the food for which the customer is charged is inexpensive and generally good at the four clubs south of the border along U.S. Highway 21. Customers are being served at the lunch counter in the

One of the drawing cards at the four clubs located south of the Idaho-Nevada border is free or inexpensive food. The clubs spend thousands of dollars for food every month. Typical of the food attraction is the buffet table which offers 14 types of salad, three types of meat and several different vegetables for choice.

### Slot Machine Business Mushrooms Into Fun Spot South of Border, Still Grows

When owners hit jackpot on the slot machines. Owners of the clubs estimate they do a rough business combined so that they purchase nearly \$75,000 worth of supplies each month in Magic Valley. "The Horse-Shu club buys from 30 to 35 thousand dollars worth of supplies each month," says Prester. "Practically all of the money is spent for food to supply the cafes." Prester adds, "We push food instead of booze because we know the customers have to drive home." Food prices at the clubs are inexpensive, the owners point out. The buffet at Cactus Pete's club costs only \$1.00 for all a customer wants to eat. They also sell one-fourth pound hamburgers for 15 cents. The Horse-Shu club specializes in steaks, selling T-bone steaks for \$1 with other steaks at equally low prices. Police protection for the clubs is provided by Jess Carlson, former Twin Falls county sheriff and now deputy sheriff of Wells county. He says, "We have very little trouble here especially with persons who have had too much to drink. They know they can get liquor 95 hours a day so few drink in a hurry and get inebriated. Most of the trouble is from milkmen who can't get it through their head that they are not allowed in the gambling areas of the bars." "The biggest thrill for most visitors, one customer explains, is the big money give-aways. At all the clubs every time a customer wins a jackpot on a slot machine signs a slip which registers him for some prize or a big cash prize. The slips are drawn out of a container to name the winner. Cactus Pete's club has given away eight new automobiles since Feb. 21, 1957, according to Wildman. The club offers prizes up to \$1,500 on a "pot-o-gold."

At the Horse-Shu club the owners have a wheelbarrow full of silver dollars and allow winners of the drawings to take as much money as they can out of the wheelbarrow in a certain length of time. One woman 70 years old pulled \$111 out of the wheelbarrow in two seconds. She told Prester that she used to pick potatoes, thus the fast "pots." Prester says some hunky cowboys have only been able to get \$50 out of the wheelbarrow in two seconds. "At Cactus Pete's a woman from Twin Falls won \$45 in the money give-aways recently," according to Wildman. Generally the give-aways don't get quite so high, the owners say. At Club 52 the owners have prizes in addition to money. They are willing to let them drop at specified intervals. They also give away auction money which is of no value to the amount spent by the customers in the cafe or bar or the amount they win on the slot machines. "According to Barton, the money can't be used to buy appliances in auctions to be held later in the year." Customers at the clubs are a cross section of the country, according to Piersante. Farmers, businessmen, laborers, old people and young people visit the clubs with the same frequency. "The clubs do a much bigger business in the summer than in the winter. Tourists make the difference, according to Wildman. Prester says, "We have signs advertising our establishment over the United States and they draw many customers. Truck drivers here send customers who walk too."

He adds, "We give the truckers so they pass the word around. Many times we have several big trucks in the parking lot and we draw inside stoking up on food." Evidence of the amount of money that flows through the slot machines is given by Pete Piersante. He says a \$25-cent slot machine paid 77-

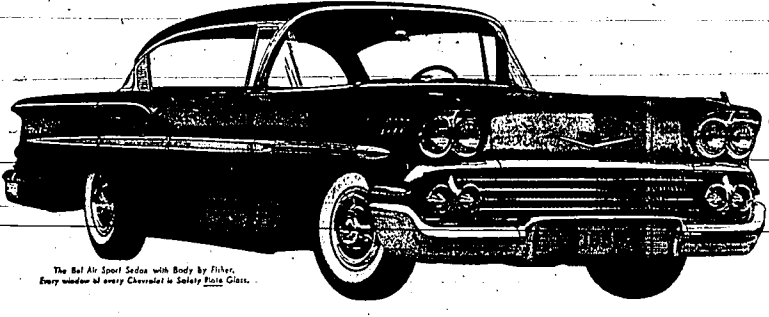

## Twin Falls Library to Participate in Observance of National Library Week

Librarian Arthur DeVolder reports that the Twin Falls library plans to participate in the observance of National Library Week from March 15 to 22. The observance will be marked by displays throughout the library and an open house at the library. City commissioner Chairman J. Ted Davis designated Library Week for Twin Falls as a proclamation. The library week is sponsored by the National Book Committee, a citizens non-profit organization devoted to the wider and wiser use of books. DeVolder reports that in Twin Falls emphasis is placed on observance of library week by employers at the library and the local library committee. DeVolder points out the purpose of National Library Week. "It provides a dramatic focus for continuing community reading services, builds the library week is promoted by the local Book Committee, a citizens

the facilities for themselves." DeVolder adds: "Through the week we are taking a look at the history of books in America, and we are up and read."

The Twin Falls library has 37,000 books and 100,000 records. The library reference, history and non-fiction books, according to DeVolder. Sections of the library are devoted to children's books for children up to 14 years of age, adult, and children's books. The library also has a large collection of children's books of Idaho, a photograph record, religious and new books.

Each week almost 100 popular and religious magazines are delivered to the library. DeVolder says to include almost every popular magazine on the newsstands. The library also subscribes to seven newspapers.

The city library is housed in a brick building constructed in 1932 at a cost of \$50,000. In the basement of the library is a children's room which has books for youngsters up to 14 years old. Also, files of magazines are kept in a room in the basement open to the public.

DeVolder says eventually it is planned to complete the room now holding the machines as a youth room for high school age boys and girls to include a record listening booth.

The remainder of the facilities of the library are found on the main floor. Most of the books are purchased from a jobbing house, independent publisher or agent. DeVolder explains, "About \$200 a month is spent on new books, 45 per cent of that amount for adult books, 35 per cent for children's books and 20 per cent for reference books."

Last year the library bought 1783 new books. DeVolder reports. Children and service clubs donate many books to the library. Only about 100 books are purchased each year.

The city library is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily except Sunday and books can be borrowed for a 28-day period. Phonograph records are charged out at two cents a day.

Any resident within the city limits of Twin Falls may borrow books by filling out an application card. Out-of-town residents can borrow books for \$2.50 a year service charge. Librarians are on duty at all times, DeVolder adds, and can assist persons in finding books in the library or point out the services available.

## Librarian to Be Honored Thursday at Tea After 38 Years of Local Services

For 38 years of service to the Twin Falls public library, Edith Dyerger will be honored Thursday by members of the library board at a tea planned at the home of Mrs. W. A. VanEngelen.

Miss Dyerger has served as assistant librarian in Twin Falls since 1920 when the library was housed in a small one-story, two-room building on Shoshone street. She has worked principally as children's librarian over the years, but is now working only about three hours a day, assisting in the library, as she says. "Wherever and whenever I am needed."

Born and raised near Des Moines, Ia., Miss Dyerger attended Drake University and was graduated with an education degree. In 1914, she moved to Twin Falls with her father, and began teaching first-grade classes in Lincoln and then Washington elementary schools.

After teaching for six years, Miss Dyerger began working full-time at the library and only two and one-half years ago did she begin working part-time.

The tea in her honor will be a friendly gesture to Miss Dyerger, who has been a member of the library board since 1952. The tea will be held at 3:30 p. m. at the home of Mrs. VanEngelen.

Persons who have worked with Miss Dyerger, school teachers, library staff members and those who have assisted her through the years, will attend the tea, scheduled from 3:30 to 5:30 p. m. Mrs. VanEngelen says. Miss Dyerger's fond recollections of her work in the library are highlighted by the "Movie" the library made in 1952 to the present building.

"I expect you'll take this as the gospel truth. All we ask is that you come in soon and try the Chord Organ yourself. Then judge the truth of what we say by the way you can play. Easy pay terms are available."

The library had been housed in the Ellis building for seven years prior to moving to the present building. "The move was a big job," she says. "We had high school boys and Boy Scouts helping us, but still it was a lot of work."

Her work with children has been vitally interesting, she says. "My college education was devoted to learning how to work with children, especially of kindergarten age."

"I've always loved to help the children. Showing them the books and literature available to them has been a big joy."

"I think the children of this generation are more intelligent than in years past, mainly because we have more reading material to give them. They read better, too, for the same reason, in spite of television," Miss Dyerger says.

She attended two library college classes shortly after beginning work in the library, one at Colorado State college, the other a University of Oregon extension class in Portland.

"I learned considerable in those classes," she comments. "But I find the library work over the years has changed. It has progressed considerably and is now more important and recognized as such."

When City Librarian Jessal A. Frazer died in 1952 the library board offered Miss Dyerger the position of librarian. She turned the offer down, Mr. Rucker, ally.

# ICY Yielding New Data and Various Ideas

Two global reports on weather, the birth of storms in their path. The moon found little hazard from tiny meteors, the size of sand-particles or larger, which they say indicate man. If properly projected, could survive the hazards of cosmic particles flung from the sun and distant stars.

At the same time they help answer the question whether dust from these meteors, which we see as shooting stars, helps produce rainfall by providing nuclei for raindrops to form around.

They help tell how clouds are influenced by the Earth's magnetic fields, and hence help clarify the size of the Earth's magnetic field.

The sun spits out bursts of X-rays, these rays flying up to 15 miles high, a mile after a flare or explosion was spotted on the sun by ICY observers.

Will these X-rays sicken or kill astronauts? No, say the experts, if they are too soft. Space ships will be built to keep them out.

But these and other rays from the sun have profound effects on the ionosphere, the electrified layer of air 40 to 200 miles high, on which our radio communication depends.

Scientists detected evidence of a powerful jet of electric current flowing around the equator. High-speed rockets sent into it, found it at least 15 miles thick.

Could this electric river one day be harnessed as a source of energy?

Time can tell. Or tell what its existence means in terms of earthly weather.

ICY explorations hold promise of discoveries which may one day make possible a steady, reliable weather, in ways as yet unpredictable.

Weather forecasting, at least, is bound to improve.

ICY world-at-a-glance studies show that the northern and southern lights—flare up simultaneously over North and South Poles.

The lights are usually caused by particles shot from the sun and pulled in over the poles by magnetic fields.

Atomic adventures floating on an ice-floe discovered an unknown mountain range in the North Pole. Does it channel ocean currents, play a role in affecting the Earth's climatic changes? With cameras, they caught pictures of curious cracks on the Arctic ocean floor.

200 feet down. Experts are still puzzling what form of life could have made them.

Reports from all fields of ICY studies are being sent to centers in this country, Russia and elsewhere, for analysis and interpretation. A task that can take months or years.

The final results can't help but be new understanding of the planet Earth, and boon for its human inhabitants.

# Showdown Battle in Congress Looms Over Wilderness Plans

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(Special)—A showdown battle is shaping up in congress between Westerners and conservationists who aim to place areas of the public domain larger than Idaho in a wilderness status.

Subcommittees of the interior committee of both houses held extensive hearings into the subject last year. Now the conservationists are wheeling up their big guns to place public lands in a wilderness status on their project out of committee.

Westerners, on their side, are just as determined to keep the whole idea bottled up in subcommittee, which they dominate in both the senate and house.

Conservationists desire to take an area of some 85 million acres and shut it off from grazing, water development and mining—unless the President says otherwise.

Most of the land is located in the 11 Western states.

The same powerful clique of conservationists who kept Echo Park dam from being included in the North Pole project, is now pushing a project in operation again at full steam. They include the National Wildlife federation, Wilderness society, Isaac Walton league, National Parks association, American Nature association and Sierra club.

Forces arrayed against them include the upper Colorado river commission.

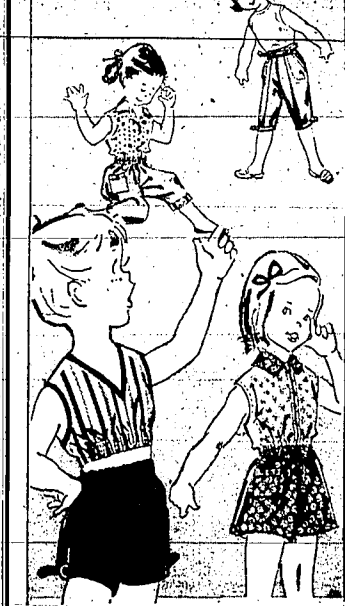
