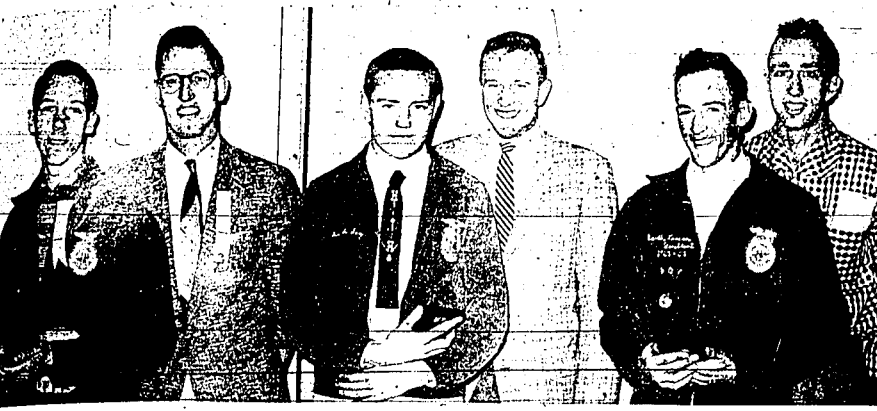

Criminal Example, Unreasonable Goal Face Young Drivers, Expert Contends

LOS ANGELES, March 18—A Los Angeles accident prevention specialist charged today that the "confusing" exchange of car generativity, license production, criminal example and unreasonable expectations which American parents have imposed upon young drivers "cannot but result in the tragedy of youth as the which which this country is now enduring."

Speaking before some 2,000 members of the Western Safety Congress here today, Dr. Maxford K. Strasser, accident prevention specialist for the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies discussed the subject, "Are we unfair to young drivers?"

His answer did not absolve the young driver of total blame, but he cradled his whip at his fellow speaker for a too comfortable acceptance of the "status quo" and really lashed out at all parents "whose faith is too blind, concern too casual, attitude too frail" when it comes to controlling "kids in automobiles."

In his safety expert observation, Dr. Strasser said, "It would no doubt be popular for me to answer the question with a resounding 'No.' We would superficially claim to be fair to young drivers because we are less strict now than we were a generation ago, but we cannot all feel a sense of satisfaction in knowing that this was a virtually insurmountable problem and that we were doing just about as well as could be expected in view of the adverse circumstances."

"Of course, we would continue to kill 12,000 young people and injure a half million at an economic loss of one and a half billion dollars annually. The automobile would continue to be a vital accessory to 40 per cent of the juvenile crime and delinquency in the country. But can we really maintain a calm detachment when speaking of a problem so important to the well-being of our children and mine. I think it would suggest that we get down to specifics."

Dr. Strasser broke down the total problem into five sub-questions.

Are we unfair to young drivers through the example we set?

The answer—Yes. The unquestionably poor example that we set is expressed in several ways: (1) Though sound driving practices (a) through repeated violation to an almost sadistic contempt for the moral responsibility involved in driving.

"We have failed to teach a moral stigma to the flagrant violation of traffic laws. The California high-ways where makes nearly three-hundred of a million arrests for

of a period of driving apprenticeship in our licensing procedure. A period must be provided after the initial license is issued for young drivers to acquire experience under restricted conditions. (2) We must personally and individually accept the responsibility of providing our sons and daughters with adult guidance during this period."

4. Are we unfair to young drivers on the point of accountability?

"Here we have unquestionably been fair in extending to young people the privilege of full use of motor vehicles on our streets and highways. We have tried to endow them with the sense of responsibility required. Perhaps we have gone too far in our efforts to be fair, for their failure to assume responsibility has brought tragedy. To be fair, each parent must saddle his children with mature responsibility if they lack the capacity to discharge it.

"Our attempts to be fair have caused us to put juvenile violations in a special category, so that violators are not held fully accountable in regular traffic courts for their driving actions. I think this a grievous error for it does not really protect the careless youth and encourages the truly anti-social youngster."

5. Are we unfair to young drivers when they purchase automobile insurance?

"Here, again the answer is no. Insurance rates are based solely on the experience of particular classifications of drivers under various conditions of exposure. Young women drivers are no great insurance concern and pay no higher rates than anyone else. Young male drivers under 25 do pay higher rates. Why? The answer can be found in the average claim settlement level and the claim frequency for various classifications of drivers.

"In Los Angeles, for example, as in in most other areas, the car with an occasional young male driver has a claim settlement level twice as high as the family car without such a driver, and the claim frequency is about one and one-half times as great. For a car owned or principally operated by a young man under 25, the claim settlement level is three and one-half times as high as other family cars and the claims are twice as frequent.

"The young men make their own rates. They also find that they cannot invariably buy insurance if they want it. If they are unable to get it through their own agent or broker they can get it through the Assigned Risk plan which operates in every state, paying a surcharge only when they have bad driving records.

"It would be discriminating against all other automobile insurance buyers if the bad experience of the young male drivers were charged to all of us."

Concluding, Dr. Strasser said, "The question 'Are we unfair to young drivers?' like most important social questions, does not have a strict yes or no answer. But just by asking and analyzing, we can discover some provocative insights to progress that we'd better get out of our chairs and follow."

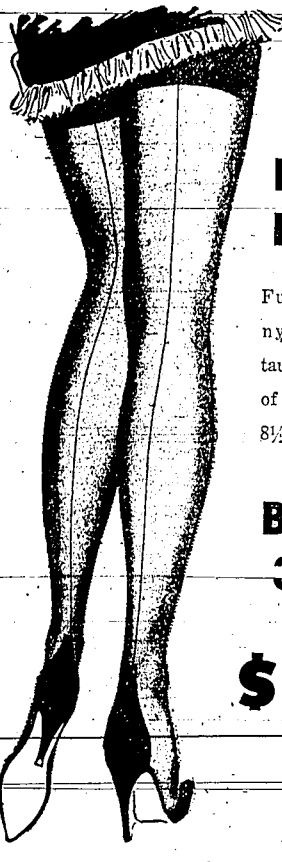

Reserve Plan Is Lauded by U. S. Bankers

NEW YORK, March 19—Bankers today hailed the latest move of the Federal Reserve in reducing the dollar reserve in a jolting move to the economy.

The latest move, a cut of a half percentage point in the amount of reserve banks must keep in reserve against deposits in reserve. This can be blown up at least six times to around three billion dollars in credit.

That jump brings to six billion dollars additional credit in the Federal Reserve system out against deposits in reserve. A similar reserve requirement by three billion dollars.

This vast sum will have a chain reaction on the economy, bankers believe. The process may take some time, but it is expected to be one of the biggest levers possible to get the economy out of its slump.

Now are you going to force people to borrow money just because it's available in larger amounts?

The "barn" experts have the answer to that.

"You don't think banks are going to let additional funds available to them lie on the shelf. They'll put them to work just as quickly as possible and the whole process will mushroom into a real giant."

Bankers aren't going to run money down people's throats, they will put it to work, however, and the chain reaction will gather momentum.

Biggest beneficiaries are expected to be the municipalities now raising funds at a record rate for the construction of new schools, roads, sewers and other public works.

The housing industry eventually will benefit through release of new funds for mortgages at moderate rates and to hold in high esteem that this industry could be the one which lifts the nation out of its recession.

Administration Waiting for Business Outlook in April Before Tax Actions

WASHINGTON, March 19—The administration is waiting for a business outlook in April before it moves to effect a personal income tax cut, Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson told GOP congressional leaders yesterday.

These two factors are responsible for the administration's hesitation on tax reduction. If the President eventually decides on a cut, he is expected to take a major personal role both in drawing up plans and presenting them to Congress and the public.

"Blastoff" Jar Damage Cited In Orbit Miss

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., March 19 (AP)—The tremendous blastoff power of the army's last Jupiter-C rocket may have jarred loose vital parts in the fourth stage and kept it from landing properly and putting the second Explorer satellite into orbit.

Sources said today that Army scientists feel that after a second attempt from the flight March 5 that a fluke of this is what spoiled the second satellite attempt with the four-stage Jupiter-C.

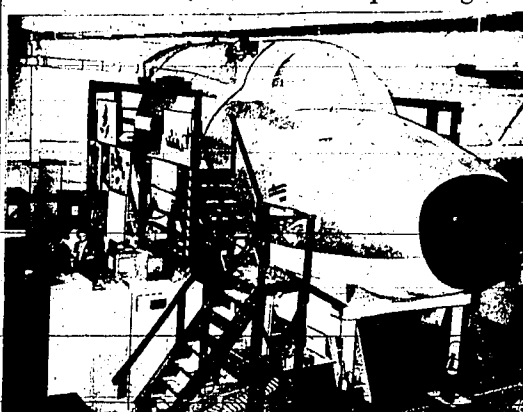
But it is also considered a major problem to remedy in the Jupiter-C now being readied here for another satellite try. It was reported. The coming attempt is expected next week.

The first three stages of the last Jupiter-C worked almost perfectly and got the bullet-shaped Explorer II well on its way to going into orbit.

But the fourth stage failed to "kick in" with the final boost to give the satellite the 18,000-mile-per-hour velocity necessary, and it fell back into the denser air of the atmosphere and burned up.

Army scientists were reported to feel that the jarring in the fourth stage was shaken out of position during the rocket's take-off and did not function properly in the critical moments of the Earth's "kick." The jarring, about 18 inches long, is inserted in the fourth stage, is inserted in the fourth stage and is set off automatically during flight and in turn ignites the solid propellant of the rocket.

Jerome Civic Club Presents Group's Building to Jerome for Use as Library

Jerome Civic Club Gives Library, Seeks Historical Society and Museum for Area

JEROME, March 19—The Jerome Civic club drive to found an historical society and museum to preserve the heritage and lore of the early settlers of Jerome county is one of the most ambitious projects of an organization which has spent half a century in promoting the welfare of the community.

The Civic club was organized June 24, 1909, by a group of pioneer women determined to build a better community on the "four corners" of civilized living—their improvement, good schools, well-sustained churches, and cultural interests.

Mrs. W. A. Hicks was elected first president and during the first year the library began with books given by those attending a social sponsored by the club.

The club also earned \$65 with which books were purchased.

As the years went by and the members of the Civic club devoted their time and energy to all of the facts of community betterment, the library remained the heart of the club's cultural endeavor. In 1910 the club rented a room in a cottage in the 200 block on East Main street to house the growing collection of books and to provide a waiting room in town for women from farms around the community.

In the early days the club not only worked the various projects which improved the town, but also assigned most of the recreational activities enjoyed by the town's people. Box socials, plays, dances and flower shows were given.

Many of the social and recreational activities they sponsored were natural fund raisers, and in 1914, the first major material contribution to the beauty of the city was made when they presented it with South Park. Work for the park had begun in 1912 and when the seeding and planting was completed, each was given to the community. North Park was turned over to the city council in 1918.

Soon after it was organized, the Civic club joined the American Federation of Women's club. The club has been in the federation three different times. The club last withdrew from the federation in 1920 and is not now a member. The Jerome unit received a citation from the federation for its work during the 1920's under the federation's program.

A music association and book review club were formed and \$500 was given to the hospital fund.

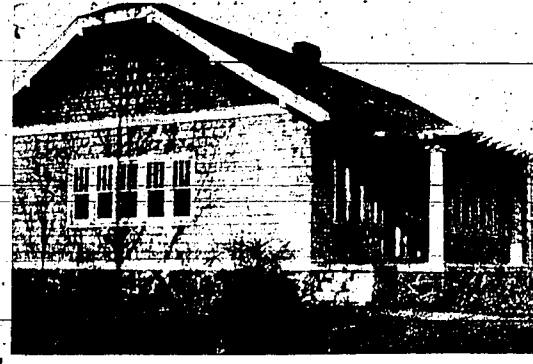

Keep Own Opinions, Budding Politicians Advised by Solon

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 19—Gen. Wayne Morse, D. Ore., warned future politicians today against sacrificing their own opinions to those of the voters.

Morse said the officeholder who follows voter opinion at the expense of his own beliefs "will time and time again sell his constituents short in the matter of ethical standards and values."

Why, do I say that? I say it because frequently public opinion is wrong—based upon misrepresentation, misinformation and misunderstanding of the facts," Morse said.

His remarks appeared in "A Guide to Career Opportunities," including articles by leaders in 15 different fields, published today by the student daily, the Harvard Crimson.

"There will have to be agreement on additional message bands as more satellites go into orbit, else there will be confusion in tracking them," said von Braun, director of development operations for the army's ballistic missile agency at Redstone arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

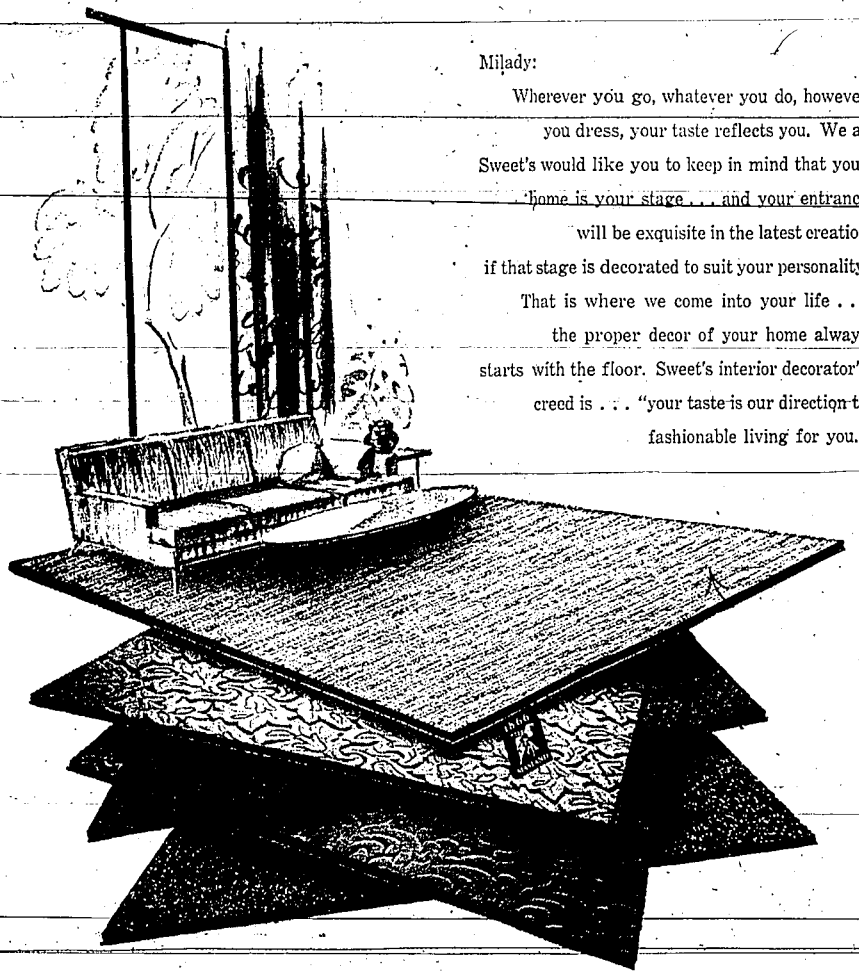
Idaho's Members Named for Board

Spring Shows in Paris Indicating Space Age Fashions May Be Arriving Already

By MADEANE WALKER
PARIS, March 19—Have space-age fashions already arrived? Look at the picture from Paris spring shows and you may think so. There's the blimpish "Trapeze" silhouette by the most seasonally successful designer of the season, Yves Saint-Laurent, 51-year-old successor to Christian Dior.

There are the out-of-this-world outlines of Jacques Heim's "Spoon" shapes, all the way from a saucer to the moon, the full-blown silhouette of Jacques Griffe and Missey Rouff, which take off right from the shoulder in a puff of fantasy, and the caught-up, back-blown draperies of Jean Dessès, resembling strange wines.

Experts really do believe that fashions are entering a drastically new era. They have been headed that way for the last several seasons, since new styles always must arrive gradually so as not to be too much of a shock. But this is the first Paris season which finds normal or body-following silhouettes almost entirely out of the picture.

"The body is no longer in style," avant-garde designer Pierre Cardin declared humbly for his opening this spring. "It is no longer a question of the dress fitting the body; the body must take the form of the dress."

That statement is a fine rebuttal to the old-fashioned view that the dress should fit the woman.

One thing that they all have in common is that they take small notice at all of the waistline. The belt may be high under the bust, low on the hip, or nowhere at all in the "baby" dresses, full from shoulder to hem. And the hemline is always high. Fashion writers actually saw a lot of the new fashions in the mannequins paraded.

These skirts, 18 or 19 inches from the floor, give the knee no covering at all when the wearer sits. The designers have, in fact, hit high-water marks, short of returning to frankly above-the-knee fashions of the 20s.

But while the new fashions have something to do with the waistline, they have a completely new and different emphasis on the hips, all evoked from the sack, and to most eyes they still look like sacks, tricked out in various ways, but buyers would rather have us know them by any other name—18 seems that there is some resistance to the sack, a sexless wear. "Husbands detest sacks," said Dessès, "so I've made a new kind."

Chief architects of the new fashion era have been Christian Balenciaga, the mysterious, shy Spaniard who originated the new silhouette, and Christian Dior, the fashion czar who died last November.

They were shocking to the eye—the bare bones of a drastically new style was "in." This season has new outline—and few and darlings in its full blossoming.

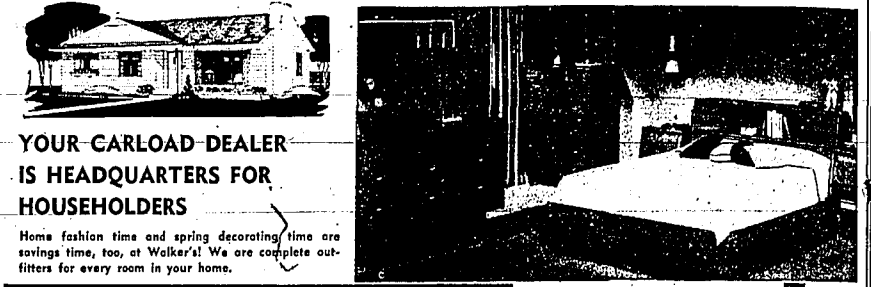
Declo Man Writes Account Of Revolution in Venezuela

DECLO, March 19 — How it feels to live through a shooting revolution was described in a letter recently received by Mr. and Mrs. Gene Moon from their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Durell Moon. Moon is employed by the Sweeney Mobil Oil company and lives in Anaco, Venezuela. He was graduated from the University of Idaho, Moscow, and in July, 1955, he and his bride, the former Marilyn Morgan, returned to Twin Falls, Idaho. They visited there last summer, returning to Anaco in July for another two years. Moon writes that international flights had been canceled and postal service suspended. He said people in Caracas could send cables but that there was no office in Anaco. According to Moon, they were awakened at 4 a. m. one Thursday by a noise like a bomb exploding and yelling and horns honking. A news bulletin from Radio Guaracambota, stated that Dictator Marcos Perez and his family had fled early that morning by plane. There was no law for a time and the populace of Caracas was frightened, shooting fire, trampling and blowing car horns.

ins are vengeful and here in Anaco, several Venezuelans armed with machetes and pipe came into the service company office and made one of the Americans go with them. They were going to beat him up in the village because he had fired a worker and they wanted to get even. Some friends of the American got him away from the mob before he was hurt. Moon said that when law was restored all liquor stores and bars were closed and that the curfew throughout the country is from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. No one may be on the streets or highway without a government permit during these hours. Moon said the army now controls the government with a group of men called the cabinet and that Admiral Wolfgang Lamazabal as president of the junta. In a speech to trustees of the Ohio Highway and Turnpike Association, Teller added:

"The Japanese should have been warned, then a demonstration bomb should have been exploded over Tokyo and the ultimatum calling for surrender should have been given."

Slash for Costs of Atom Power Seen

CHICAGO, March 19 (AP)—The high cost of atomic power may be cut drastically as handling of relatively cheap uranium oxide fuel improves, a Canadian research executive says.

W. E. Lewis, vice president of research and development for atomic energy of Canada, Ltd., told a panel of nuclear industry executives Tuesday that uranium oxide offers an advantage in long-lasting, high burn-up qualities.

Lewis, addressing an atomic energy management conference held in conjunction with the 1958 nuclear congress and atom fair, suggested that a fuel cost of 15 mills per kilowatt can be achieved by careful planning.

Although uranium oxide retains fission product gases fairly well and is chemically stable, Lewis said, its principal drawbacks are that "it is a bad conductor of heat and is liable to crack under thermal shock."

Tularemia Battle Outlined at Meet

PORTLAND, March 19 (AP)—State and federal health officials met here Tuesday to work out a campaign for fighting tularemia—a rare and serious disease which could be spread as a result of southern Oregon's field mouse infestation.

Five suspected tularemia infections in humans were found in laboratory specimens from 22 Klamath county residents, the meeting was told.

However, the tests were not conclusive.

The disease has been found in a number of rodents since the huge infestation of mice began last fall. The meeting was told that virtually all surface water in the infested area is heavily contaminated with tularemia organisms.

Well over 100 feet deep also are contaminated easily, a spokesman for the state board of health said.
