### Every Idaho Family Pays \$14 Per Month for Debt Interest

**WASHINGTON, March 24**—(Special)—It costs each family in Idaho \$14 per month to pay the interest on the national debt today, Sen. Henry C. Dworshak reports.

Dworshak said that before congress "runs wild with expenditures and slashes revenues to add billions to the national debt, it should study the effects of the spending of the past and see what it costs each family in the nation."

The senator said the interest on the national debt is "unavoidable" and to slow the second largest item of expenditure in government, ranking behind defense. "It is stunning to think that we are paying today just in interest alone, more than the total budget was 20 years ago," Dworshak said. He pointed out that interest has year look 74 billion dollars in tax money "while in 1933 the entire national budget was less than 7 billion dollars."

"We are not making a dent on the national debt, and if we keep adding, we are giving our children and grandchildren an inheritance of crushing debt," Dworshak pointed out.

### Demos Attack Farm Boss in Book Burning

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Some Democrats have hurled Secretary of Agriculture Benson on a charge of book burning.

Benson critics in both house and senate accused the agriculture secretary of destroying 2,500 pamphlets of a recent farm census report which one senator said showed the way the administration's policy was being carried out.

The department acknowledged destroying the pamphlets because of what it called "a smattering of what it says they were destroyed."

The report, which was compiled by the Agricultural Research Service, was in charge of farm population statistics.

The report, entitled "Farm Population Estimates for 1957," shows a drop in farm population last year from 22 to 20 million.

The issue was raised by Senator Preminger, D. Wis., when he put a question into the Congressional Record under the title "Book Burning at the Department of Agriculture."

### Senate Chiefs Foresee Okay Of Road Plan

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Senate leaders of both parties joined Saturday in predicting passage of a major bill to speed up work in the nation's roadbuilding program.

The bill, expected to come up for debate tomorrow, would make available to the states one-and-one-half cents for each dollar of federal funds this year that is possible under present law.

Senator Gore, D. Tenn., chairman of the public roads subcommittee and sponsor of the measure, and Sen. Francis Case, R. S. D., senior Republican on the subcommittee, both said they expected the bill to win Senate approval.

Gore told a reporter he hoped it might be possible to send his measure directly to conference with the House, which already has passed a less sweeping highway bill. But he emphasized this would be up to House leaders.

Case said he had reserved the right to seek some floor changes to details of the Gore bill, but he believed the main features would be acceptable.

The bill, Dekaban said, changes made in the original measure by the public roads subcommittee has improved it from his point of view.

As introduced by Gore, the bill would have provided new financing schedules to meet all the increased cost of the new \$1,000-million national superhighway network and put it back on its original 15-year schedule.

The subcommittee took out the long-range financing, and limited the new funds to the next three fiscal years. Gore said he went along with this but was confident the bill still would put the road building program on schedule for the years directly ahead.

Case said he did not believe the new estimates were "firm enough to justify writing a revised long-range financing plan now. He said there was some evidence road building costs have turned downward.

The bill as sent of the floor would make available \$1,000,000,000 more in funds for the superhighway network—the interest system—that otherwise could be parceled out this year.

The bill also includes a special \$400 million dollar supplementary federal fund for the three other federal credit systems—the primary, secondary and urban—for fiscal 1959 starting this July 1.

The \$400 million would have to be matched by the states only on a 70-30 basis, instead of 50-50 as is normally required, and two-thirds of the state's share could be borrowed from the federal government.

### Probe Slated On Deaths of Trio in Mine

BUTTE, Mont., March 24 (AP)—Governor W. J. Franklin said Saturday he plans to hold an inquiry into the deaths of three veteran miners.

Officials of the Ansonia company, operator of the mine, said the three apparently suffocated Friday while on a routine inspection of the 3,400-foot deep Badger mine.

The mine, which yields mostly copper, was closed down several months ago.

The victims were foreman Steve Hurley, who would have been 68 Tuesday, assistant foreman Earnest Harkin, 49, and ventilation engineer Joe Shugart, 60.

Oxygen-equipped searchers probed after the inspection party failed to return at lunch time. They found Harkin's body at mid-afternoon near the bottom level of the main shaft.

The bodies of Hurley and Shugart were found about five hours later. Officials theorized the trio got trapped in a "dead air" pocket in which there was no oxygen.

### Air Guard Slates Slash in Strength

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—Staff officers of the 48th Air Guard Squadron of the Idaho air national guard's 124th fighter group today made plans to put into effect the new table of organization that will reduce the unit's strength approximately 20 per cent.

The new group structure, scheduled to become effective April 10, lowers strength to 833 active and reserve personnel, according to Major J. Johnson, commanding.

Johnson said that present planning indicates that the air defense group structure and still have over 70 vacancies in varied technical skills for both prior service and non-prior service personnel.

### Rock 'n' Roll, Presley Threats To Soviet Control Over Youth

BERLIN, March 24 (AP)—Even the hideous communist East Europe will be watching Elvis Presley's army career.

The Memphis recently has become a symbol of the "lost generation" behind the iron curtain. Youngsters who live under communism. Here they have a fight for the right to dance to rock 'n' roll music. No matter what sort of music it is, it is a rhythm tune, you must take your hat off to the jitterbug in Russia and the Soviet satellites. It takes courage to hop around like a rock 'n' roll.

Presley fans in East Europe were often heard to defend themselves against communist anti-jazz squads during dances. And they face opposition outside the dance hall—at school and at work.

In Moscow, the determination of a group of students to dance as they please started a free-for-all. The dance hall manager ordered the band to stop playing because the kids were "executing outrageous movements of boogie woogie and rock 'n' roll."

In the East German town of Zella-Mehlis, a communist youth dance ended in a fight over an "Elvis Presley song." The German communist newspaper "das volk" said a band in the town played "such rock 'n' roll rhythms and other songs of American origin that the youths fell into a fit."

The report added, "one youth spontaneously ran to the microphone and despite the protests of the free

German youth secretary, sang an Elvis Presley song. A fight resulted." Communists in the Soviet zone of Germany are so bitterly opposed to rock 'n' roll that they have organized "room squads" to tour dance halls and bars out hot jazz lovers. But the squads have not been able to squelch the Presley movement.

Why are the "adults" reds such staunch enemies of rock 'n' roll? Many persons in the West could live without it. But for different reasons. In communist countries, some westerners think rock 'n' roll stands as an expression of individuality, of youth's determination to be different, to stand out from the mass.

This runs counter to communist ideology. The communist emphasizes "collectivism," that every person is a cog in a machine who must subject to command.
