

Parity Change May Result in Support Boost

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—A change in the parity price standards may require the agriculture department to increase the price support for 1958-crop wheat about 2 1/2 cents a bushel over the previously announced minimum of \$1.78 a bushel.

A report to be issued by the department tomorrow on the level of parity prices in mid-March and the new parity prices as of the same date is expected to indicate such an increase.

When Secretary of Agriculture Benson announced the 1958-crop wheat support last year, he put it on the basis of 75 per cent of the 1954-55 parity price of the grain to be at the start of the grain marketing season. The estimated parity price of \$1.77 a bushel.

But since then, parity prices have increased for minimum production. The wheat parity was \$2.30 a bushel in mid-February and may reach \$2.45 or more by June 30, when the final wheat rate must be announced. A rate based on 75 per cent of a parity price of \$2.60 would give a support price of \$1.95 a bushel.

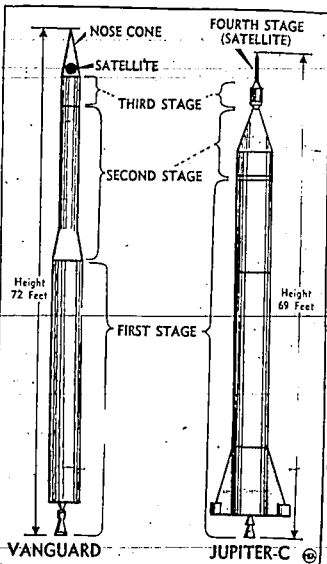
The 1957 support rate was \$2 a bushel.

Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices declared by law to be fair to farmers in addition to prices charged them. Parity prices themselves more up and down with corresponding changes in costs of goods and services buy.

Benson has yet to announce the minimum support rate for the 1959 wheat crop. He has promised to do so before growers vote June 20 in a referendum on continuance of marketing quotas. In view of the big surplus on hand, the 1959 rate is expected to be set at 75 per cent of the parity, the lowest level permitted under the parity price support law.

A two-cent-a-bushel increase in the 1957 support rate would add about 20 million dollars to the value of the indicated crop.

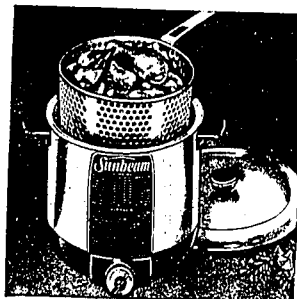

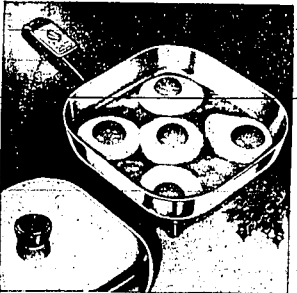

will allow power on the Columbia in 1960 and continued work of four lower Lewis dams, it is said.

The committee approved establishment of a wide area of central control to uniform policy and method of operation in the region. Construction of the Park highway in the Western Montana area is also being supported by the committee.

The group voted to hold its next meeting June 26-27 at Glacier Park, Mont., in joint session with the Missouri Basin Interagency committee.

During an afternoon panel on national forests, it was revealed that the forest service is planning a center of operations in the large Pacific Northwest wilderness area—the Selway in north central Idaho and the Bob Marshall in northwestern Montana. Public hearings will be held later in the year on the boundary of the Selway.

Talking part on the panel were Dean Everett Wohlstein of the University of Idaho, director of forestry, A. R. Croft of Ogden, Utah; E. Barry of Missoula, Mont., and A. T. Ringler of Boise, Idaho, director of the forest service.

Lumber has been the principal product of the Selway. It is said, but the emphasis is shifting to water-based, recreational and tourist use.

The chairman of the water management committee, A. L. Dandridge of Coeur d'Alene, Wash., said a normal spring runoff is expected, but "major flooding" is anticipated.

Idaho's irrigated land can be made mid-Atlantic coastal region last night in the Selway and Bob Marshall areas, said Mark R. Kulp, state reclamation engineer.

Productive irrigated land has been added in Idaho at the rate of 100,000 acres a year for the past 10 years, he said, with most of the development through private capital.

"Most of our development has been guided by economic factors and the Selway is a different kind of plan, the resources would still be undeveloped."

The committee, which held a day-long session at the University of Idaho, is made up of representatives of federal agencies operating in the basin and the governors of the seven states.

Winds, Rains Sweep Areas Of East U. S.

High winds and occasional rains lashed southern New England and the mid-Atlantic coastal region last night in the heaviest and stormiest weather over the Northeast.

Despite the general rains, which followed a continuing pattern of vicious spring snowstorms, weathermen there said there appeared to be no danger of flooding.

Forecasters said they expected river rises in New England and the Chesapeake Bay to be below flood stage because drift ice was following the storm system.

Northerly winds up to 50 miles an hour whipped Atlantic City, N. J., last night, and rainfall amounts ranged up to one-third of an inch at Honoine and Pikesville, Va., and Knoxville, Tenn.

Moderate rains also doused parts of Georgia and Alabama overnight. Some snow was mixed with rain in parts of central Pennsylvania.

Melting snow and ice lashed rivers elsewhere, prompting flood warnings in Missouri and stranding about 40 loggers in New Mexico.

The Meramec river in Missouri crested at light to light flood stage today at Pacific, Mo., and at one and one-half feet above flood stage at Valley Park, Mo.

Airmen from Kirkland air force base yesterday flew a second "mercy mission" over the Texas panhandle, mired by mud and water in a logging camp north of Cuba, N. M., since rescue attempts over the area failed, easing the threat of more flooding.

Reinforced rain and snow pelted the northern and central Rockies last night, but generally, heavy rain fell in the Texas panhandle dumped about one-fourth inch of rain at Amarillo.

Fair skies prevailed over most of the region west of the Rockies from the eastern Dakotas into the Great Lakes region.

Weathermen predicted partly cloudy to cloudy weather today from the Gulf coast region north through the Ohio valley and the Atlantic coast, with light rain continuing in southern New England and New York state south into the Carolinas.

Rain was expected to clear up of California and extend into the central and southern plateaus, while fair weather was forecast for the Great Lakes region.

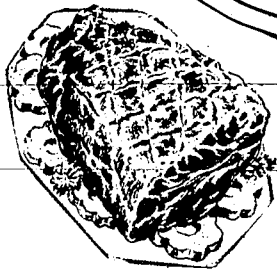
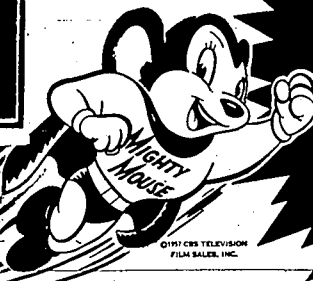

Construction Labor Row Is Believed Due

BOISE, March 27 (AP)—The possibility of a new labor dispute affecting the construction industry in Idaho loomed today.

In its weekly newsletter to members, the Idaho branch of Associated General Contractors reported that it was in receipt of official notice of opening or termination of the labor agreement between the contractors' organization and the Ironworkers district council of the Rocky Mountain area, local 732.

Said the AGC newsletter: "The ironworkers are demanding \$1.46 cents per hour as a general wage increase for all classifications; (2) a jointly administered pension plan to be financed by employer contributions of 10 cents for each hour the employe is paid; (3) the right to review the entire agreement; (4) wage increases, working conditions and other provisions to become effective June 1, 1958."

According to the AGC, the proposed wage increase, if granted, would raise the ironworkers wage to \$1.75 per hour, a 12.3 per cent increase.

Commented the newsletter: "The most damaging contribution that organized labor can make to further the increased inflation is to raise the price of general construction costs without increasing profit or productivity."

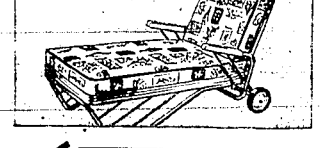

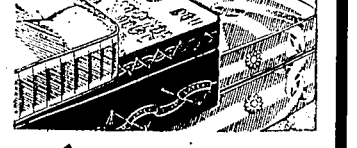

Scientific Groups Stand Best Chance to Get Congress Aid

WASHINGTON, March 27—(AP)—Scientists' fight to have the best chance of any group in this country—to get the money they need out of Congress. There are numerous reasons but none more compelling than these: 1. For the Russians to get ahead of us. 2. Congress, being made up of laymen, is in a poor position to judge the price tag on work and equipment needed to explore outer space. Last night, President Eisenhower released a 4,000-word study on space science prepared by his science advisory committee. Dr. James Killian is chairman. Killian and 17 other scientists signed this study explaining the importance of space exploration, with satellites and men, for scientific and military reasons. Their price tag for getting a man to the moon and back again: a couple of billion dollars over a number of years. But before man went on such a mission there would be many other preliminary investigations of space and the planets. It is easy for anyone remembering the national shock here when Russia sent up its two Sputniks—to foresee Congress opening the purse strings. Even so the scientists put their price tag far down in the body of their study as if to make the cost look minor when compared with the need and the benefits from the exploration of outer space. It was, apparently, a coincidence that on the day Eisenhower released the study this country sent up its third satellite. Yet none of the three American satellites is in the same league—in size—with the Russian Sputniks. So this country still has a long way to go to catch up with the Russians. Even as the third satellite went aloft there was concern here that the Russians—pretty sure since they make plans for a reunion.

Slump, Early Easter Affect U. S. Buying

NEW YORK, March 27 (AP)—Receipts in the U. S. for Easter gifts are expected to be lower than last year's. These are some of the things affecting U. S. retailing as the 1958 Easter shopping season enters the windup phase.

An Associated Press survey of Easter shopping trends in 19 major cities give this picture:

Receipts in industrial areas where employment is off sharply, merchants hope to do about as well as last year, but they're counting heavily on an assist from the weatherman.

"There's nothing wrong with Easter business," says a New York department store official, "but 10 days of sunshine, that's what you need."

Receipts in some southern and eastern cities to the deepest gloom in middle and far western manufacturing centers are "further down the history books" have been told off.

Some merchants say the earlier Easter date (April 6 this year vs. April 21 in 1957) is hurting sales. Others say it makes no difference. "We're not really affected," says William Weber, vice president of Abraham and Straus, big Brooklyn store.

Department store executives are generally optimistic. "What pre-Easter business?"

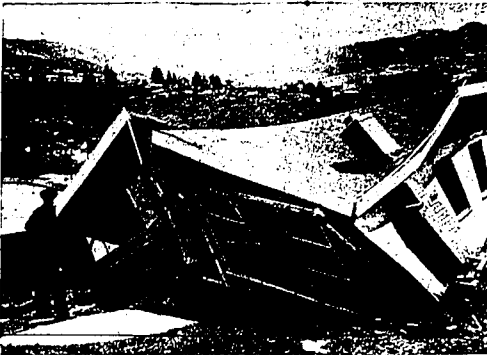

Probable Cuts for Excise Taxes Seen This Year by Congressional Sources

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—Congress is almost sure to vote a cut in some excise (sales) taxes this year, Democratic congressional sources said today.

They predicted the legislation will include at least a reduction in the auto excise taxes and probably also in levies on other "depressed" industries when they consider "mixed" tax legislation later in the session.

This word came from highly placed, informed congressional sources in an important role in tax legislation. President Eisenhower and some of his chief cabinet officers were regarded, meanwhile, in a behind-the-scenes campaign to get business to contribute to its own recovery by more effective selling and price cuts where possible.

The campaign is not being carried on publicly, but is brought up when administration leaders confer with business groups on economic problems. Some advisers close to the President's office are also in the picture, particularly those who are in charge of the price for a tax cut.

President Eisenhower hinted at the price-reduction drive at his news conference yesterday. He said that Americans "now should be buying on the basis of the worth of the product that is offered to them" and business should expand by "better salesmanship."

Eisenhower and Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson are throwing cold water on any suggestion of immediate tax relief. Administration sources said this means that the President, Anderson and federal economic leaders want to assess economic conditions next month before making a tax move—if then.

Congressional circles credited Anderson with encouraging the chief executive to hold back any tax recommendation until April readiness of the economic barometer are taken.

The President also indicated Wednesday he thinks the recession has hit bottom or is close to it.

Not all his advisers and other high-level government economists agree. Several have said recently they think the recession may continue on a slowly-declining down-sloping curve.

Ford Is Eyed As Target for UAW Strike

DETROIT, March 27 (AP)—The United Auto Workers was in position today to pick any one of the three major auto makers as a June 1 strike target.

Speculation was strengthened that Ford, rather than General Motors or Chrysler, would be selected if the union decides a strike is necessary to win its bargaining goals.

Negotiations with General Motors corporation were adjourned to April 1, already the expiration date of contracts with Ford Motor Company and Chrysler corporation.

"The union has put itself on the same strategic track it followed in 1955 negotiations, when the present contracts were signed. Then it extended the General Motors contracts an extra week and stalled negotiations there while putting bargaining pressure on Ford."

John Bugas, Ford vice president and top bargainer, has said: "We are the logical target—Chrysler is too weak and a principle established there might not be accepted by the other industry, or the union might kill Chrysler off in a strike. General Motors is in the strongest position to resist and a strike there would be much harder to finance."

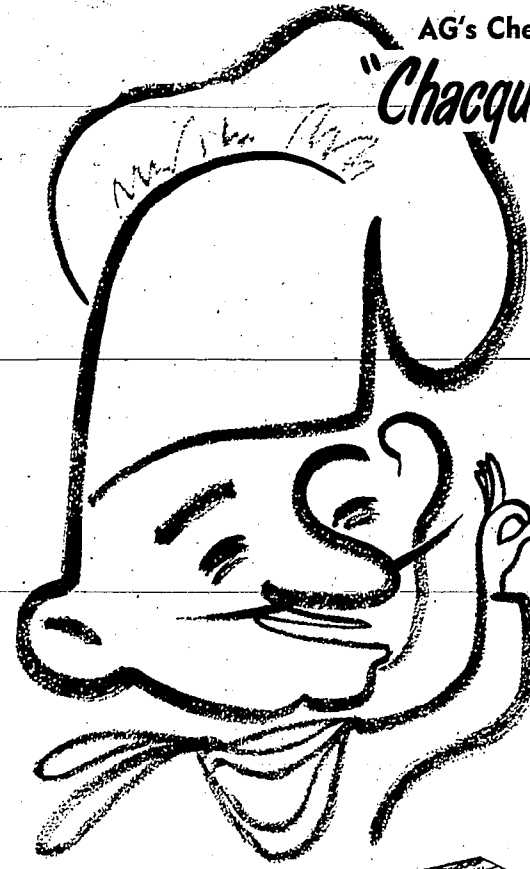

Oregon Solon Is 'Surprised' On Disclosure

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—Senator Neuberger, D. Ore., says he was surprised that a secret plan for two-stage construction of Hella canyon dam was made public.

He didn't mention any names but Senator Morse, D. Ore., disclosed the plan in an interview in Portland, Ore., last Thursday.

"If we lose out on the high Hella canyon dam battle, we might build the high dam in two stages," Morse said in hopes for a federal dam in Snake river gorge.

"We could build a low dam now, but give it sufficient foundation that it could be built to full height at a later date," he said, adding: "There is precedent for such a plan, because that is the way Grand Coulee was built."

Neuberger told newsmen yesterday "I was surprised to see it in the Oregon press because I had adhered to the usual procedure so strictly that I had not even discussed this proposal with my wife."

Neuberger said public power interests presented the plan to the Oregon congressional delegation at a breakfast last week as a "last-gasp way to save Hella canyon to all else failed."

Rep. Gracie Frost, D. Ida., an outspoken Hella canyon supporter, said she considered the two-stage idea "still in the talking stage." She said it isn't known yet whether the plan is feasible, and added she still is holding out for the high dam.

Idaho Power company has been licensed to build three dams in that part of the Snake. Two, Brownie and Osborn, are under construction. A high federal dam would flood them out.

Morse said in that event "we could salvage Brownie dam by moving its generating equipment to a new damsite."

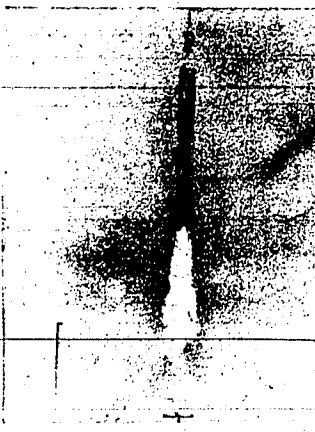

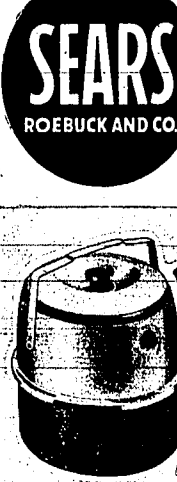

Virus Is Eyed By Expert as Villain of Fat

BETHESDA, Md., March 27 (AP)—A "villain" could be the reason some people get fat, a cancer researcher says.

This peculiar virus could infect and upset their "appetite"—the appetite-thrombosis, the brain could make them eat more than they really need, so they get fat.

The fatness-virus idea is mainly speculation. But it has some basic studies of mice which get fat like humans, and suffer human-like diseases, said Dr. Frank H. J. Dixie, University of Maryland.

Microscopic studies disclose strange dot-like objects in the hypothalamus area of animal brains, he said. Appetite control is thought to be centered in this region. The dots might be viruses which infected the appetite center. The fat mice could be hereditarily susceptible to this particular virus.

Dr. Dixie described the fat mice to science writers visiting cancer research centers under auspices of the American Cancer society. He joined in with scientists of the National Cancer Institute on latest reports in cancer research.

The newly developed strain of fat mice seems similar to humans in many respects, Dr. Dixie said. They get middle-aged spread easily. They get a variety of cancers, are fairly well subject to diabetes and to hardening of arteries.

When they are mated with another genetic strain of mice, their offspring become highly susceptible to cancer of the liver. Eating too much could be the reason, putting a burden on the liver and pancreas.

Dr. Dixie said, insurance company statistics show a greater risk of cancer of the liver, pancreas and bile bladder among overweight persons, he said.

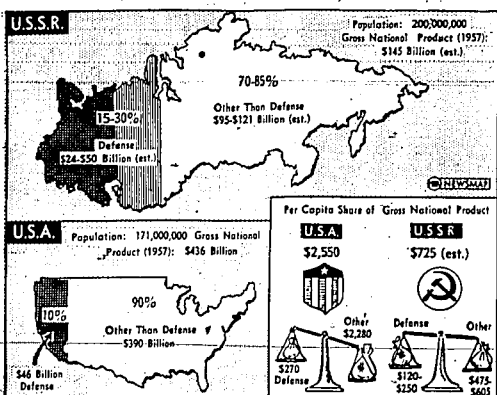
Measles Increase
