Bill Changed Now to Assure Water Right

WASHINGTON, March 31—Cong. Hamer Budge, R., Idaho, today said language which he had termed previously as "dangerous" to the traditional water rights of the western states apparently has been removed from a bill, S. 947, which authorizes the army corps of engineers to enter compulsory water projects. The bill, passed by both house and senate in slightly differing versions, went to conference to iron out the differences. Budge said the conferees apparently had given the western states the same protection against preemption of their water rights which they now enjoy on water projects by the bureau of reclamation.

Market Fight Being Waged By Aluminum

NEW YORK, March 31 (AP)—In the battle of the metals aluminum has always been—and even more so now—Aluminum is fighting vigorously for new markets in the face of a glut in the supply and old customers were standing in line. Now, it is being eyed new fields in which to produce confidence in the use of aluminum.

Science Finds Way to "Melt" Clot of Blood

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 31 (AP)—Dangerous blood clots are safely melted away after a newly-discovered chemical, scientists reported today.

It has done a good job in dissolving clots blocking blood vessels in the legs of 31 patients. Next it will be tested against clots blocking arteries bringing blood to the heart muscle. Such blockage causes coronary artery disease.

The new agent is different from another chemical recently reported, in Boston, as a promising anti-clot drug. It is called streptokinase and was derived from streptococci.

Well-Treated In Red China, Claims Ex-GI

HONG KONG, March 31—(AP)—Lance Sullivan, the first of three U. S. Negro volunteers in Korea to return to the western world, told today he was well treated in Red China.

He said he is satisfied that he has learned all about the international situation while he was working as a labor operator in a red auto factory.

"I think the world is in a state of general anarchy for peace," he said. Sullivan, who appeared bored by the reporters and photographers who were with him on his arrival here, spoke to them only briefly. He abruptly terminated the interview after he had given a few minutes, saying he was tired.

Consular officials said Sullivan, who has since decided to return all along yesterday, received all proper papers, but as Soviet comrades and other international comrades.

Sullivan is the man of 21 ex-OIs opposing to meet with their captors at the end of the Korean war. He has been dishonorably discharged from the U. S. army.

On his arrival here, he was wearing a blue suit and a green tie. He carried a suitcase, a topcoat and a hat, and a bunch of bananas.

Exit of March Rainy in East, West Regions

March appeared headed for a precipitous exit from the east and west coast and most of the nation's interior.

In the West, a blinding snowstorm halted a 10-man relay party yesterday. The relay team was stranded dozens trapped in the high Sierras of Yosemite national park.

Main yesterday damped rain Sunday services over most of the South, with the Rocky and Rocky mountain regions.

Early today rain was general over the mountain states from New York south through South Carolina, but only scattered showers in the Florida. Light snow occurred in the mountains of New York and Pennsylvania.

The heaviest rainfall during the night drained Charleston, S. C., to 1.48 inches, according to the rain total in the past 24 hours.

Seawind gusts hit the Pacific coast states and northern Rockies early today, turning to snow at higher elevations.

A rare hail storm, with stones a quarter inch in diameter, and show winds from the north, hit the western plains and northern Rockies.

Warning trends were reported over the Rockies and western plains. New England showers and drizzle ranged from the 20s in the northern Great Lakes through the 50s and 60s over the middlelands and the 50s in most of California and across the Southwest coast of the United States.

Skiing began clearing in northern Florida today after heavy rains yesterday canceled all ski and baseball seasons.

Weathermen said rain is expected to continue through the middle of the week. Scattered showers were expected in the Pacific coast and northern Rockies, the western plains. Elsewhere, skies were to be fair to partly cloudy.

Ford, Union's Contract Talk Is Under Way

DETROIT, Mich., March 31.—Ford Motor company's top negotiator said today opening negotiations with the United Auto Workers today that if both sides "fill their responsibilities" the auto industry and the nation's economy.

John B. DeWan, Ford vice president of industrial relations, made the statement as Ford-UAW 1958 contract negotiations opened at Ford's central office building in suburban Dearborn.

Heading the union bargaining group of 50 were President Walter P. Reuther, Ford's Department Director Ken Bannan, Tomorrow, Reuther will join a Chrysler negotiator in another opening of contract talks.

From tomorrow on the UAW will be bargaining with the auto industry until present contracts expire May 20-June 1, barring an unexpected early settlement by the two sides.

The UAW's first bargaining session was last week with General Motors and these talks will continue April 8.

General Motors tomorrow turns its attention to the end of contract negotiations with the International Union of Electrical, bargaining agents for nearly 90,000 GM workers. But the IUE and 19 other smaller unions are pretty well following the UAW's collective bargaining program.

'Blue Monday' Is Dead as Industry Aids on Washday

NEW YORK.—Time was when the words "blue" and "Monday" were automatically joined together. But now, Monday is not necessarily blue for a long washday for homemakers.

The chemical industry has changed all that with products that wash properly, reduce washday, the industry says, to an hour or so any day in the week.

The experts say, first off, that most test-tube textiles can be washed in the machine just like other washables. Since better than 370-million pounds of man-made fibers were produced in the United States last year, it stands to reason that a good portion of the weekly washday will be made up of these synthetic fibers.

The chemists give these laundry tips:

Wash synthetic materials frequently, but along with the other wash.

Cut down the length of time you let your washing machine run when washing man-made materials. Too long a washing session dries up the fabric.

Put the machine before the spin cycle. Hit out the synthetics which can drip dry. It's the spinning and draining which causes the wrinkles in the wrinkle-resistant materials.

Use a little water, help in the final rinse. This does a two-way job, the experts say. It helps the dye finish and cuts down on some of the synthetics.

Economist Notes Five Points As Guide to Slump Recovery

NEW YORK, March 31—What should we watch to see if the country is recovering from the recession? When are we likely to emerge from it?

Dr. Geoffrey Moore, associate director of research at the National Bureau of Economic Research, listed several items which, he said, should be watched closely. They included:

1. An increase in the average work week. This has occurred prior to an expansion in employment in practically all recessions. In both the 1953-54 and 1948-49 recessions the average work week started to lengthen four months before over-all business turned up.
2. The latest figures on the work week are for February. They show it has declined for 15 straight months. This is an increase in new orders and in contracts for future construction. These ordinary signs of recovery tend to six months before an upturn in industrial output or employment.
3. A contraction in the scope of the recession—that is, in the number of business indices affected by it. This has happened first in all 24 recessions and depressions the bureau has studied. It occurs usually 6 to 12 months before an upturn in aggregate business activity.
4. A variety of evidence is necessary before the recession can be said to be over—not just figures on employment, retail sales or other individual economic barometers.
5. It is important to adjust the statistics to seasonal variations. Monthly comparisons alone, without adjustment, don't mean much.

Bank Assets Hike, U. S. Report Says

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Ray M. Clifney, comptroller of the currency, reported yesterday that assets of all national banks on Dec. 31 totaled \$120,500,000,000, an increase of \$2,820,658,000 from the previous Dec. 31.

Total assets on Dec. 31, based on statistics from 4,677 active national banks in the United States, also represented a four billion dollar increase in assets reported by 4,671 banks on Oct. 11, the date on which previous statistics were based.

Clifney also reported that bank deposits on Dec. 31 totaled \$109,400,000,000, an increase of \$1,941,400,000 over Dec. 31, 1956, and \$5,027,623,000 over last October.

The assets represented an increase of 2.4 per cent over Dec. 31.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Dr. John P. Hagen, director of the navy's project Vanguard, says he believes the American and Russian satellite programs "are about even" along with the "ever-tightening" of the present
