













### Industry Asks Changes Over French Policy

PARIS, April 2 (AP)—Private industry demanded today that the government denationalize the management of the French steel industry which had been nationalized by a 24-hour general strike.

The demands of a denationalization campaign that would stir up a political storm in parliament, was the same low-income Frenchman who cheered nationalization 11 years ago, today is backing the demands for denationalization.

The steel controlled industries have lagged behind private industry in wage levels for their workers. Yet they operate largely as a single entity which must be made up by the taxpayers.

Moreover, these enterprises are the holder of perennial labor unrest and form the largest bulwark of the communist party in France.

Factor nationalization of the government into France's largest employer. It now controls 21 different companies or entire industrial branches, such as steel, aircraft and mines. Other government projects range from transportation and utilities to garbage collection.

Yesterday's strike by nearly one-million government employees effectively halted business lines and crippled air service. The 24-hour walk-out was more than a symbolic gesture, but it must come unless the government bows to union demands for a 20 per cent raise.

The workers threatened to walk out again April 16. That is the date Paul Baudouin, minister of industry and commerce, has set for further discussion of the wage demands which he already has rejected.

### Music, Cleric Give Tribute To Composer

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—A jazz trumpet's sweet shrill and a Negro minister's sultry said a final goodbye to W. C. Handy today in a Harlem church.

"His personal blues are now ended," the Rev. Dr. Abim Clayton Powell, Jr., told the thousands who filled the Abyssinian Baptist church for the funeral of the "Father of the Blues."

"No more the problems of Beale street. No more the iterations of Memphis. No more the vexation of the St. Louis woman, no more the cynical love, oh love, oh careless love."

The Negro minister and congregation spoke to an overflowed crowd of 3,000 that jammed the main auditorium and 4,000 who filled another room in the big Harlem church. They and a vast crowd in the street outside listened to the service over loudspeakers.

A high point was a trumpet solo, "Holy City," by one of the top trumpeters of modern jazz, Cookie Williams. That was Handy's own instrument and of it he once said:

"Life is something like a trumpet. If you don't put anything in, you don't get anything out. And that's the truth."

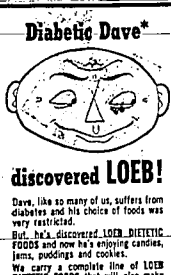

### Lower Down Payments Set By New Law

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Starting today, homes financed by FHA-insured loans can be purchased with down payments as low as 3 percent. The new law also provides for a \$145,000 maximum loan, and a 30-year term. The legislation is designed to help the housing industry by reducing the barrier to entry for many people who are unable to make the 20 percent down payment required by conventional banks.

**See Benefit**  
John M. Dickerman, executive director of the National Association of Homebuilders, said the law could be of "immense benefit" to moderate-income families unable to buy homes because of the high cost of down payments. He said the law would also add to the tax burden of the government by forcing the government to assume obligations which rightfully belong to housing.

**Lower Rate Is Effective**  
Federal Housing Commissioner Norman Mason ordered the lower down payment rate on FHA-insured mortgages into effect immediately. The reduction will apply not only to new applications, but to those already on file and not yet completed.

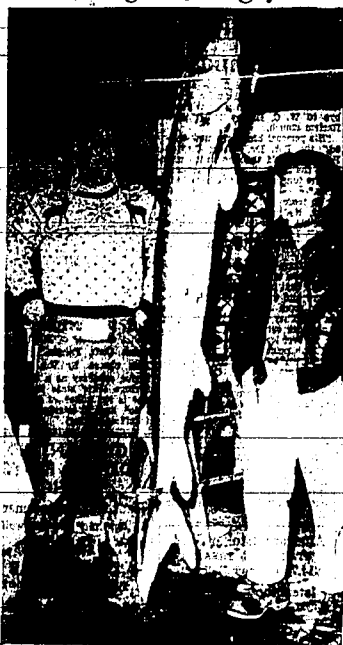

### GOP Struggle Over Primary Vote Looming

**BISMARCK, N. D., April 2**—Rep. William Langer looked forward with "relief" today to a Republican primary fight for reelection, but said he was not sure he would be expected to bow out in favor of his successor.

Langer, who will be seeking a fourth term in the Senate in a party primary, was bypassed last week by the GOP state convention in favor of Lt. Gov. Clifford Burdick, now in his 10th term in the House, struck by Langer, his longtime Republican political ally, and withdrew his name from the nomination race.

**Receives setback**

However, Monday night Burdick received a political setback when a state-wide powerful Non-Partisan League endorsed his son, Quentin, for the congressional seat.

Quentin said yesterday he expected his father to support him. Burdick personally said he would not oppose his son, so it seemed likely the house would lose one of its most colorful figures.

Observers also noted signs that Burdick may have lost some of his political popularity. They pointed to his highly-publicized marriage to a 20-year-old widow recently as a possible stumbling block in courting North Dakota voters.

But the 71-year-old Langer apparently gave no thought to retiring when he promised a hot primary campaign against Duffy. The election is slated for June 24.

Langer announced in Washington yesterday he would make a "fight to the finish" against the younger Langer, who has worked against his father as attorney general, governor and senator.

Langer, an independent spokesman sometimes called "Wild Bill" in the Senate, added "I'm in the kind of fight I relish."

**Political observers** said Langer may have the toughest battle of his career, citing his age and his health as the chief obstacles in his campaign. Langer has been ill with pneumonia, pleurisy and other ailments.

**Too Early to Comment**

Mrs. Ethel Cooley, Minn. national GOP committeewoman from North Dakota, said it was too early to comment on the Langer-Duffy race, but said much depends on Langer's health.

W. S. Davidson, Williston, Langer backer, predicted that "people who never voted before will vote for Langer. We're going into every county and set up Langer-for-Senate clubs."

**We're dead-set** that Duffy won't go to Washington, Davidson said, but he added he would support an strenuous campaign. He scheduled a speech for next Monday night at Bismarck, N. D., and said he would speak in every county in the state if possible.

### Ownership of Moon Looms as Legal Problem as Man Nears Space Travel

**WASHINGTON, April 2**—Who owns the moon? Nobody. Who will win either the United States or Russia hits it with a rocket? Still nobody knows.

There are no universally accepted rules to cover the ownership problem. But, with both the United States and Russia talking about hitting the moon, many legal experts are pondering it. Their studies extend far past the moon to the whole vast area of outer space generally.

Experts advance several possible theories about ownership of outer space. Some are:

- Apply the principle of law of the sea. That means each nation would own a limited amount of air directly above its territory and all space beyond would be un-owned just as the high seas belong to no nation. Any nation would be free to send rockets through the free outer space just as it is now free to send ships onto the high seas. But each nation would exercise sovereignty over its territorial air just as it now does over its territorial waters.

—Let each nation have sovereignty over an inverted cone of air space extending from its boundaries on Earth indefinitely through space. The trouble with this theory is that because of Earth's rotation the air-space above a nation is constantly changing. Thus the moon, sun and other celestial bodies would be subject to constantly changing claims on the world alike.

—Permit a nation to own the air above it for as far as the country is able to exercise effective control. The hitch here is that each nation's control would vary with its scientific progress.

The United States has taken an official position on the question of who owns outer space. But Rear Admiral Chester Wood, navy judge advocate general, has suggested that the law of the sea might be a starting point for the space lawyers.

He emphasized that this is his own personal idea, not the government's. He also said it "would be good quality has no substitute."

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**OK Ship Travel**

**GENEVA, April 2**—A new principle of international law was approved today in effecting the passage of Israeli ships through Arab waters to Israel's southern port of Eilat.

The 87-nation conference on the law of the sea, approved the principle 21-20 over the opposition of Arab nations and the Soviet bloc. It provides for the innocent passage of foreign ships through straits connecting the high seas with the territorial waters of a coastal state.

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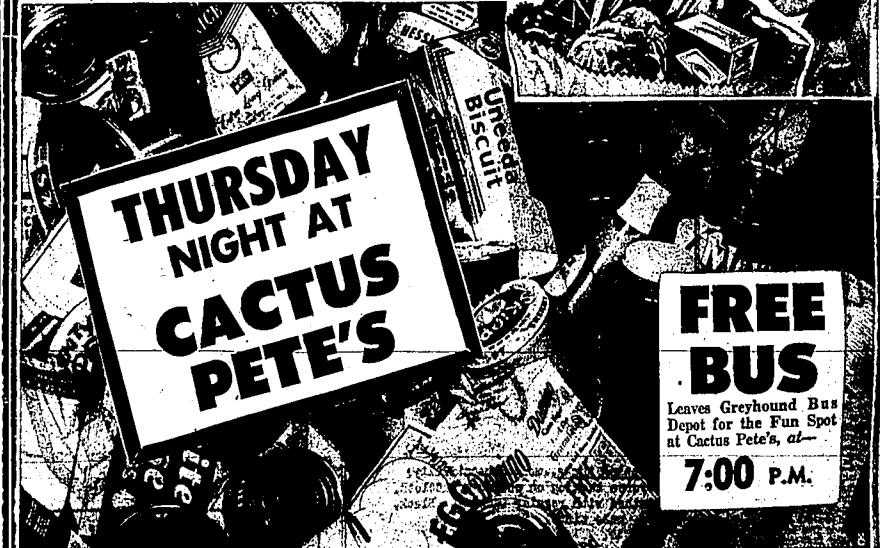

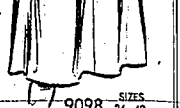
