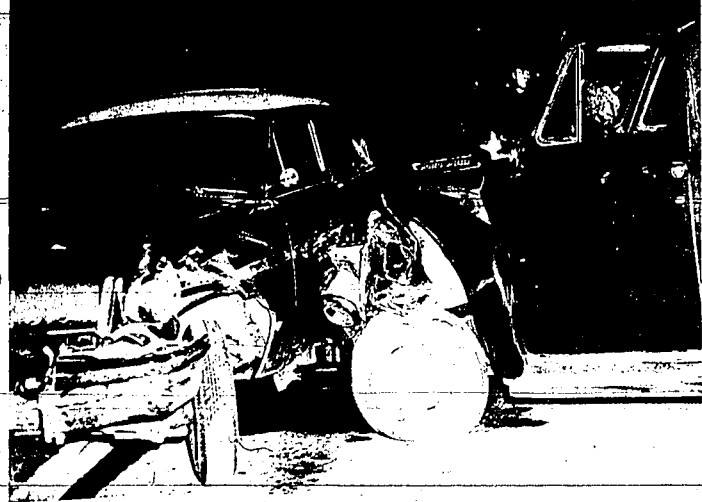

Taxpayers Get Record Advice

Charles O. Olson, Internal revenue agent here, warned Wednesday night many taxpayers make a mistake by not keeping adequate records and are caught short when their income tax returns are audited.

Records and the taxpayers' copies of past returns should be prepared for at least three years, in case the taxpayer is called upon to prove his return is right, Olson says.

The government does not prescribe any particular method of record-keeping. It leaves it up to the taxpayer to decide or adopt one most convenient to him.

However, the records must be adequate to reasonably substantiate what is reported in the return, Olson points out.

Receipts, paid vouchers, bills and canceled checks are among the best of records, with explanatory notations if the sums involved are extraordinary in nature or amount.

Most items should be recorded by notations accumulated on a day-to-day basis, the local agent explains.

When taxpayers try to approximate amounts without records, it is often costly to them because they give the benefit of doubt to the government, he says.

CHICAGO, April 3 (AP)—Douglas Sater, 21 years old and has a new baby, a baby on the way, not much money and a great deal of hope.

The performer, billed as "The Great Alton," broke a wrist and a leg bone but apparently received no fracture injury. It was reported at St. George's hospital.

Alton, 39, earlier had danced, turned somersaults and skipped rope on a wire high under the roof of the garden. He was descending a wire at about a 45-degree angle when he lost his footing and fell onto a trapeze mat over the solid floor.

"The greatest show on earth" was its most old-fashioned act, one with animals and clowns and gaily with high-wire acrobatics, and not one, but two high wire acts, about 40 feet above an old-fashioned cannon at the stunt act. The crowd's attention landed on the landmark and was immediately surrounded by clowns. They opened the door. Out stepped "the swiftest man on earth," 26-inch high Marcello, dressed like Elvia Preley, carrying a guitar and singing "Hour' Doc."

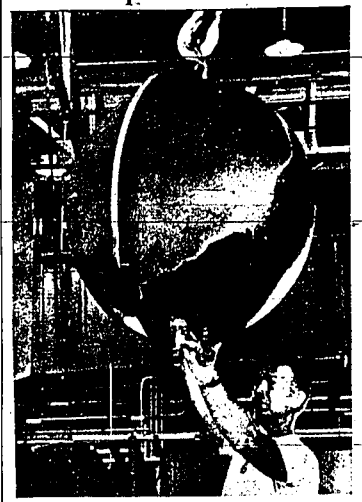

Dyed Easter Eggs Ward Off Evil, Old Superstition Says

It dates to a fine art, using varied symbolic and geometric designs. Some Ukrainian eggs are collectors' items over 100 years old. Pallas accounts during the reign of England's Edward I in the 13th century show the purchase of "one hundred and a half eggs" to be "stained in boiling or covered with gold leaf" for distribution to the royal household. It goes back much farther, however. Many a pagan culture celebrated a spring festival—the end of winter and the return of the sun—and it was the egg which had a place of honor as the fertility symbol of earth's reawakening. Earliest records of egg-dyeing was established custom among ancient Egyptians, Phoenicians, Persians, Greeks, Romans, Celts and Norse. In the Christian Easter festival, incorporating many ancient usages but transforming their religious significance, the egg became the symbol of the Resurrection, and the red coloring represented Christ's blood. Meanings changed with geography and the passage of years, but the age-old technique of coloring delicate egg shells has remained much the same through the centuries. Today in America, chemical dyes are used, but much of the world still relies on natural dyes of fruits, berries, grasses and leaves for color. A basic tool is beeswax to protect the designs through successive baths of color. Few American eggs are as elaborate as the Ukrainian. But they are being turned out for decoration or for amusement by children and mothers all over the country—using glue, sequins, fake gems, bits of lace, buttons and bows.

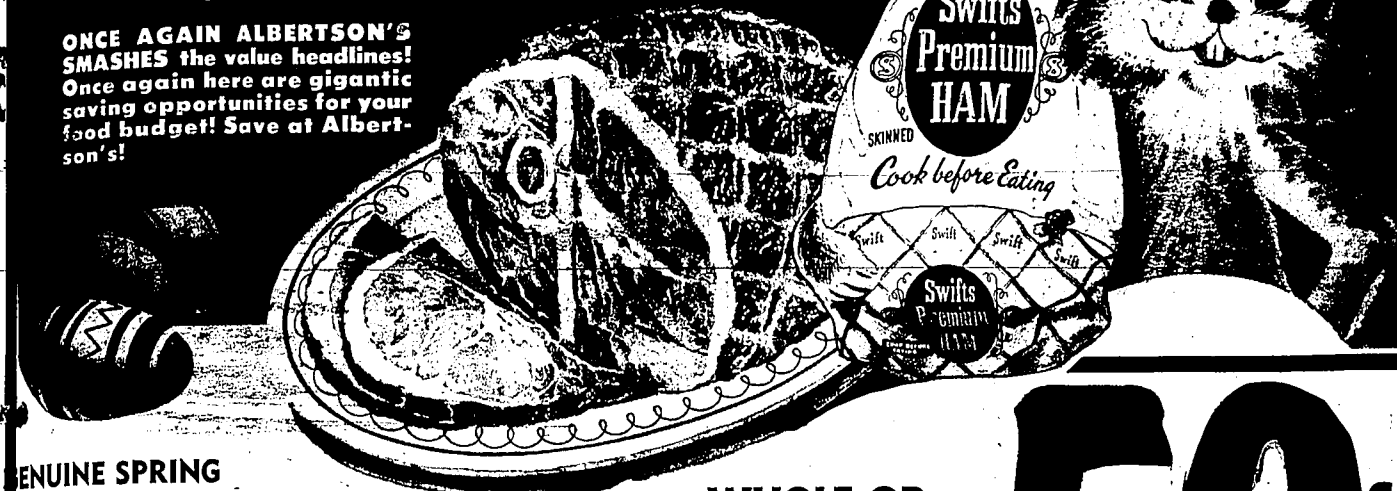

Strike Threat Is Problem of French Ruler

By United Press
The threat of paralyzing national strikes is confronting French Premier Felix Gualard with a new and serious problem.

A strike by one million workers in national industries under direct control of the government, stopped national activity in the entire country Tuesday.

This 24-hour strike was called by all the big labor unions—communist, socialist and Catholic—to back up a demand for wage increases ranging from 10 to 25 per cent.

Union leaders say the strike was merely a warning gesture, and will be followed up by bitter, longer strikes unless Gualard concedes the wage demands.

Gualard's position is that the budget will not permit wage increases at this time.

In the background lies the threat that strikes may spread to private industry.

The workers, in both nationalized and private industries, are getting the constantly rising cost of living.

They are angry because they would precipitate a real national crisis and cause demands, which might prove irresistible, for Gualard to call an authoritarian government to bring it the political stability it has long needed.

Increasingly, army officers in professional government and the need for a strong one.

The grim outlook is bringing increased attention to what political writers call the long shadow of Gue, Charles De Gaulle. So far, De Gaulle, wartime leader of free France and its first premier after the liberation, has been silent. But he is waiting for a chance in any such call might cause really serious riots.

Baruch Repeats 1933 Advice—Balance Budget, Forestall Dangerous Inflation

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—Bernard M. Baruch, tall and still vigorous at 67, gave his advice this week on the recession.

He was talking to the senate finance committee. Listening to him was like watching time roll back a quarter century. On Feb. 15, 1933, he gave this advice to this same committee on how to handle the depression.

What he said 25 years ago sounds strangely like what he is saying now. His advice was disregarded then. It may be disregarded now. Although he has been an adviser to every president since Wilson, his advice has often been ignored.

In 1933—with 12 million people jobless just a month before Franklin D. Roosevelt became president—Baruch was warning against the dangers of inflation and advising: "To get people back to work... we must balance the budget."

His theme then: "Reduction in public expense is indispensable to recovery."

But when Roosevelt took office he did just the opposite from what Baruch suggested. He really unbalanced the budget with relief spending and altered in a new concept of willingness to spend money that the government takes in in

revenue to get the economy back on its feet.

This week Baruch—ignoring any change in government philosophy—went back to his theme of 25 years ago.

He put his finger on inflation as the "biggest single peril to our economic health," rejected deficit spending as a solution to the present recession, opposed a tax cut, and even advocated a tax increase to keep the budget balanced if congress votes big new spending programs.

Both the Eisenhower administration and the Democrats in congress have talked the likelihood of a tax cut if the recession gets much worse.

A tax increase would take a sharp bite out of Baruch's income, since he's a millionaire, but he's also a man who in his long record of service to the government, never took a dime of salary or expense and even spent his own money.

It's been estimated that he's spent more than a million dollars of his own money for government work.

When he read from his prepared paper, typed with over-sized letters, Baruch put in his long glasses over those he was already wearing. He also wears a hearing aid that can be turned up or down at pleasure. His hearing difficulty didn't come

from age. He suffered a broken ear-drum during a fight in his college days after he hit a hammer and nails collided with the catcher. He was a boxer. At 68 he injured his right hand beating a man for abusing a taxi driver in New York.

Baruch looks just as self-assured—and is just as gracious—as he was during World War II days when he was studying the rubber shortage for President Roosevelt.

Although he has a genius for making money on the stock market—he was a millionaire at 30—his vision in other things wasn't always so accurate. For example:

In 1921, with the depression getting worse by the minute, he made a speech in which he said he could see prosperity returning.

U.S. Said Market For Foreign Beef

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—New Zealand and Australia are essential markets for beef production in those countries.

As the son of an army man he is perfectly willing to let the navy do the missile-inkering in the future. He soldiered with the 1st Army in Korea, is stationed in Korea.

The boy decided to make the rocket Tuesday while he was absent from school with a minor illness. He said he stuffed an empty metal carbon-dioxide bottle with the heads of matches from 10x paper match books. Then to aim the missile he put it in a bicycle pump tube and attached a fuse of potassium nitrate powder.

Educator Laments Emphasis Placed on Materialism in Culture for Americans

BY SAMUEL ANDREW MOORE (Instructor in Education) (Idaho State College)

What mean ye, fellow citizens, that ye turn every stone to scrape wealth together, and take so little care of your children, to whom ye must one day relinquish all?

It would appear unfortunately true that wealth in our American culture is restricted to the confines of materialism, that which one can readily use for show—and that which will procure goods to be used for show.

When people fail to count only their tangible assets, the lot of those who seek to educate is not easy. The bustling salesman can work his wiles with an intelligent businessman because he is pushing tangible merchandise. Too, the minister has an edge on the teacher, since, in most communities he is considered proper to solicit for a defined fund.

Probably the only socially acceptable value of an education is its worth in improving one's social acceptability. That the quest for knowledge can eradicate men is too often termed double-talk by the pseudo-intellectual.

The apathy of material-minded people toward education often causes those who reach to desire the removal of the function of education from public control. This can hardly be accepted as a solution to the problem. History provides evidence that education has been contemporaneous with the social system of the time.

Jerome has given early warning of our fate in saying that we must cultivate finer metaphysics with some care in order to destroy the false and adulterate. The task at hand is not one of attempting to impress upon people that their wealth, as seen through materialism, is the product of a learned people.

rather there must be an organized account taken of our greater wealth, one which is hardly quantifiable. We, as Americans, have the unusual asset of being free to make this accounting publicly. The right to think freely calls for all people. The right to act in accord with one's thoughts is less widespread. One becomes embittered when he notes the death of both thought and action among those having these rights.

Possibly it has been forgotten that in our democracy there is more than the right: there is the responsibility to exercise that right. The magnitude of material wealth-seeking might best be described in terms of the gross default we make regarding our public institutions. It is not inconceivable that the wealth-seeker should pay so little heed to the expenditure of his tax dollars! Apparently it is thought that one's responsibility is discharged with the paying of the tax.

Each individual in our society is personally responsible for the present state of affairs in all public institutions. With candor one might question the desire of the citizenry to take the time to feel guilty of this shared responsibility. It might be too much for the people to accept this responsibility especially since the larger portion of their formal education has been completed. The real address lies in the selfishness of avoiding responsibility. The words of Socrates still hold: "It is to those we educate today that we must one day relinquish all. In our lifetime we shall have to depend upon the judgment of today's youth. For the material-minded it might be added that those in the school today will be in their employ some year hence. This, therefore, is not a responsibility to be faced only by parents. The future of our public institutions is a matter to be

reckoned with by every person. To ignore the present situation will not insure tradition, rather it will succeed new societies which, in our public institutions, are not easily undone. Consistent with the right in both think and act, there can be no ready-made solution which might be presented. Possibly the solution must be a compromise of the thoughts and opinions being voiced today with the proven worth of what has been our heritage.

With regard to education, it is necessary to define clearly what shall be its function. We must then take to task the socially awkward process of seeing that the education provided in public institutions is that which we want. If it is felt that our schools should serve the function of Victorian finishing schools, then let us so adjust the curriculum. If a rigorous program of fundamental learning is deemed desirable, then let us employ only those who are qualified to dispatch such a task of teaching.

And, let there be compulsory measures taken to insure that only those mastering these fundamentals are permitted advanced training in the disciplines. In any event, should we do nothing, let us not sneer at those having vested interests or those engaged in the ancient art of secrecy.

Auto Concern Plan Is Denied By Big Union

DETROIT, April 3.—The United Auto Workers hung an "unacceptable" sign today on an American Motors corporation proposal that the union extend its present contract with the auto firm for two years and in some cases even reduce AMCO's labor cost.

The UAW also announced it would open bargaining with AMCO April 15. The AMCO demands announced yesterday at a press conference by Vice President-Industrial Relations Edward J. Cushman, were based on the company's contention its labor costs were still above those of its competitors—both in autos and appliances.

The AMCO announcement marked a "first" in union-management relations in the auto industry. In the past the union has publicized its contract demands in advance of negotiations while the companies have remained silent.

AMCO asked the union "freeze" all wages, benefits and pensions and eliminate further cost of living and production improvement raises until June 15, 1959, for 8,500 auto employees at the Kenosha and Milwaukee, Wis. plants.

It also asked that its 1,500 Kelvinator appliance division workers in Grand Rapids and Milwaukee be made over into a separate bargaining unit. The company said the workers are now being paid according to auto wage scales and this put them at a big disadvantage in competition with other appliance firms.

The UAW revealed it sent a notice of modification of its present contract due to expire June 15 last Monday, the same day it received AMCO's notice of termination and bargaining demands.

Tony Conno, assistant to UAW Vice President Norman R. Mathawa, said AMCO workers "would never accept eliminating the cost-of-living escalator clause and the annual improvement factor" as well as numerous other company proposals.

Also yesterday, Ford and Chrysler finished hearing the union's opening presentation of its demands and recessed talks until April 11 for Ford and April 15 for Chrysler. Talks with GM will resume next Tuesday.

The retired naval officer told the California Association of Secondary School Administrators he expected the development of passenger subs within 20 years.

Admiral Momsen, the glitzy submarines would travel up to 70 miles an hour on atomic fuel. Passengers would get a full view of the ocean bottom through port holes.

New Surgery for Cancer Is Found
MADISON, Wis., April 3.—University of Wisconsin cancer researchers have disclosed a new "microscopic" chemotherapy technique which will enable operations on cancer patients "ordinarily considered inoperable."

Doctors and scientists at the university's medical laboratory gave a progress report yesterday to visiting science writers on their efforts to find the cause and cure for cancer.

The scientists also told of findings that one cancer-causing chemical can immunize animals against some other cancers, evidence that "feedback" mechanisms are disrupted in cancer cells, and the discovery of a strange "undiscovered substance" in leukemic blood.

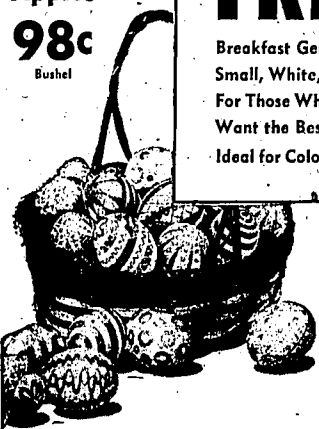

U. S. Airmen Fly Into 'Eye' Of H-Clouds

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 3 (AP)—Sometime next summer a 34-year-old air force major who has fought two wars will guide his B-37 through the mushroom cloud of a hydrogen bomb blast shortly after it has been detonated.

He said today he was "not overly concerned" about it.

Major Malcolm Bounds, Birmingham, Ala., is the squadron commander of what is probably one of the most unique squadrons in the air force. These apparently fearless men have one major job: find out what is inside a cloud of hydrogen cloud.

Note: Microscopists "It is amazing how many misconceptions there are about the danger of the clouds and fallout," he told Press. "Our air crews, for instance, get probably two to three thousand times as much radio-active exposure as the average person in the United States, and we're not overly concerned about their health. Of course, we treat it with a certain amount of respect," he quickly added.

The 10 planes in Bounds' squadron stopped here on the last leg of a flight to the hydrogen bomb test area in Eniwetok. Believe it or not, these men who apparently think nothing of flying through an atomic cloud don't want to chance flying to Hawaii, their next leg, against a headwind.

After Hawaii, they fly to the island headquarters on Eniwetok to spend the summer and to their job during the summer H-bomb tests. "They can't let off a bomb without the major said. "No one is to be exploding a bomb unless you have some idea of what happened." The planes in the squadron are equipped with two unique gadgets. One is a filter device about 33 inches in diameter which is a special scoop-like wine tank. The other is a steel "bottle" about a foot in diameter.

The filter is to collect radioactivity and the bottle to catch gases set off by the blast.

Collect Samples Within minutes after the blast, the planes dive into the clouds to collect their samples. They stay as long as an hour or as short a time as 15 minutes—depending on what the clouds are like.

Then the planes land again and specially-trained persons put the filter and bottle in the "cans" or boxes and within 24 hours the samples of the explosion are back in the United States, at Edwards Air Force Base, near Los Angeles, Calif., or Los Alamos, N. M.

Those samples will tell the United States if it has accurately estimated the purpose of this summer's tests: A "clean" H-bomb blast.

Briton Sees Red Tests Successful
LONDON, April 3.—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said today British "red" almost certainly be successful" if it decided to carry out secret nuclear tests.

He told the House of Commons that for this reason an inspection system would be necessary to police an international agreement to suspend nuclear test explosions.

This was his answer to Russia's claim that an international inspection to prove it is being carried out. Macmillan made the statement four days after Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko announced Russia is stopping nuclear tests and called on the West to do likewise. The western allies have refused to agree to this.

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'Practical Politicians' Are Set For Hayden Lake Conferences

HAYDEN LAKE, April 3 (UP)—A Catholic priest with \$16,000 and a ten to promote an abstract government study got his means and extremes together next week for an unusual conference of practical politicians.

Big names to education, labor and social welfare are agreed to meet with them in The Rev. Richard E. Twoby's first "National Conference on Political Parties" at this secluded lakeside resort April 10-13.

Such practitioners as Senators Neuberger, D. Ore.; McNamara, D. Mich.; Bennett, R. Utah; Jackson, D. Wash.; Republican Gov. Cecil Underwood of West Virginia and Democratic Chairman Paul Butler will eat and sleep here, talk and think for four days about the state of the democratic process.

Father Twoby, 44, chairman of political science at Gonzaga univer-

sity in Spokane, conceived the idea. He foresaw great merit in a quiet, informal roundtable of leaders from the three great organs of our civilization—the stadium (universities), the regnum (civil powers) and the sacrum (churches).

He switched from the academic to the practical, flew to New York and telephoned Henry Ford, president of the Ford foundation. He wrote down his proposal in a telephone booth and then spent 20 minutes with Head.

The Ford foundation sent a \$16,000 check two months later to pay expenses for 80 conferees.

Father Twoby then went after the

biggest names. At Independence, Mo., Harry Truman showed him through his library, discussed the conference for an hour, then said: "It's a splendid plan. I'd love to come. Nobody shows more about the subject than I do."

But Truman was committed on the dates. The Jesuit priest then buttonholed Adlai Stevenson, then Earl Nixon and Thomas E. Dewey. All endorsed the conference but their schedules were full.

He finally lined up five senators, four congressmen, including Steps McCarthy, D. Minn., and Bolling, D. Mo.; at least two governors, two college presidents, Chairman Jerome

Kuykendall of the federal power commission, noted professors from Yale, the University of Chicago and UCIA, and industrialist Edgar Kaiser.

Bertha Adkins, assistant chairman of the Republican national committee, agreed to come along with Vice President James Carey of the AFL-CIO and top schedul officers of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the American Farm Bureau federation and the American Medical association. Professor Twoby's own father, James Twoby, a Los Angeles finance executive, will represent the National Conference of Christians

and Jews.

With Republican Gov. Robert Smylie of Idaho as a consultant, Father Twoby mapped his program and picked this quiet resort area to provide a calm of contemplation to offer the harried men of great affairs the chance he often says he wants and needs to separate the urgent from the important, the passing frenzy from the value that endures.

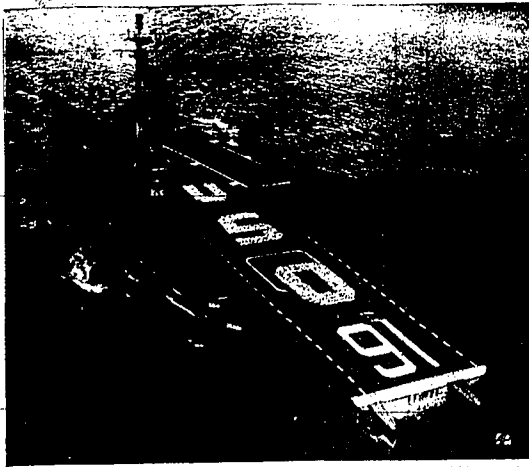

Benson Girds For Struggles In Farm Plan

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Now that farm programs for the current year are fairly well set, Secretary of Agriculture Benson today announced he is turning efforts to get long-range changes in federal farm policies.

Until President Eisenhower vetoed a bill Monday to rescind reductions in some farm price supports, Benson has been struggling to keep from losing ground with his program to lessen the government's role in agriculture.

Policy Endorsed
The veto, which had been expected by most farm leaders, gave Benson's philosophy that the best way to help farmers is to get them to produce more effectively in domestic and world markets by lowering price supports and easing production restrictions.

Aides said Benson realizes that there is not much chance of getting from the farm program revisions in federal farm laws needed to permit him to carry out his program. As a consequence he is looking ahead to the congress to be elected next November.

Accordingly, the secretary expected, to spend as much time as possible in the weeks and months ahead making speeches and writing with farmers in behalf of his views. His next speech is scheduled before a farm bureau meeting at Treboon, Mo., April 10.

The secretary has stated publicly on a number of occasions that he is confident that if enough people are brought to understand his program, they will be successful in persuading congress to adopt it.

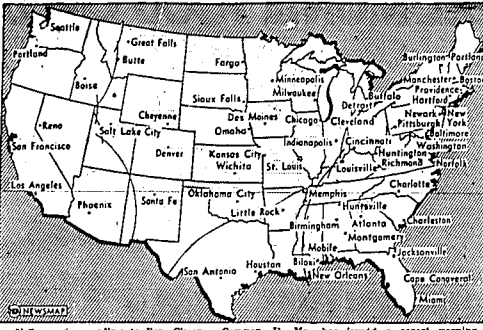

The U.S. navy, according to Rep. Clarence Cannon, D., Mo., has issued a report warning that Russia could use missile ships disguised as merchant vessels to stage a "deceptive" atomic attack on this country. Forty-three of the nation's largest cities and an estimated 85 per cent of the country's vital industry are located less than 500 miles from the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Cannon said there normally were about 75 unidentified ships within 500 miles of the U.S. coast at any given time.

Benson's Dairy Support Cuts Reflect Savings, Survey Notes

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson's slash in dairy support has produced immediate savings for consumers in many areas, a United Press spot check showed today.

Benson's order trimmed butterfat prices for the marketing year beginning yesterday to 85.6 cents a pound, a 10-cent reduction. Federal support for "manufacturing" milk used in making butter, cheese and other dairy products, were cut from \$3.25 per hundredweight to \$3.06.

Major New York city chains reported they reduced butter prices two cents a pound last week, anticipating the government action.

Chain store spokesmen here said there is a normal seasonal drop about this time in many areas as the spring "flush" producing season comes on, a Eatways Stores official here explained.

This spokesman said his firm was reducing prices of its premium brand milk in District of Columbia

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The word in Washington today is that news for Republican party regulars in the state of Pennsylvania—and from coast to coast.

The word is that Harold E. Stassen has a good chance in Pennsylvania to make a big and astonishing political comeback. Every Republican county chairman in the state is expected to support Stassen for the party's gubernatorial nomination.

Primary day is May 20. Stassen's chances of winning have been improved hour by hour. Like Minnesota, his native state, Pennsylvania will not be big enough for Stassen if he is nominated and elected governor this year. Stassen's ambition has been for years to be nominated and elected President of the United States.

As the Republican governor of big Pennsylvania, Stassen would be entitled to another try for the presidential nomination in 1960. Few who have observed his political career doubt that he has that in mind and, if not in 1960, then, in 1964.

All of this is bad news for Vice President Richard M. Nixon. Stassen spent himself and considerable money in the 1956 election, but mysteriously contributed money in 1956 to prevent Nixon's renomination for a second term. He argued that Nixon's name on the ticket would cost President Eisenhower millions of votes and, probably, obtain the election of the Democratic presidential nominee.

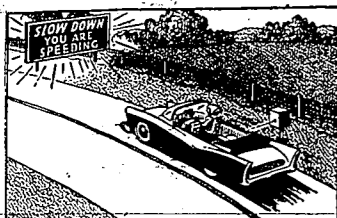
