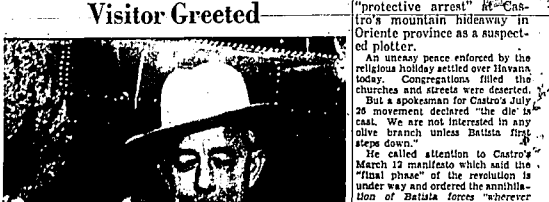

Police Court Reports \$2,877 In Fines, Bonds for Quarter

A total of \$2,877 in fines and forfeited bonds for traffic code violations was assessed in Twin Falls police court during the first three months of 1958 as result of citations issued by the city police department and arrests by the city police.

The amount does not include cases heard in Twin Falls Justice Court. The \$2,877 was collected for court. J. O. Humphrey, acting judge, reported that during the first quarter of the year, fines for speeding during the three-month period add to \$1,180. Police court record shows 106 cases of speeding with 91 offenders being adults and the remaining 15 juveniles. The court considers a person 18 years or over to be an adult. Pointing out that many other violations on citations and arrests made by city police. Fines for traffic cases heard in justice court

and justice court, Judge Humphrey said, "This report covers only cases where the city police department issued the citation or made the arrest."

Police court record shows four drunk drivers were fined a total of \$400, three were given jail sentences and all had their drivers' licenses suspended for one year, mandatory under state law.

Pumphrey points out that the maximum fine under city ordinance in police court for drunken driving is \$100 fine and 30 days in the city jail.

Six persons pleaded guilty in police court of reckless driving during the first quarter of the year. Fines total \$210 with one offender receiving a jail sentence of 10 days. One offender was suspended—three of the cases in police court, for violations of city ordinance. Fines amounted to \$1,000 with offenses including driving on a highway, disturbing the peace, of ways. Licenses of two drivers were furnishing liquor to minors, petty

larceny, battery and failure to pay a food bill.

Sitting as a justice of the peace, he disposed of 30 cases which included burglary, larceny, embezzlement, insufficient checks, malicious injury to property, obtaining money under false pretenses, no funds checks, variance, low exhibition, lead conduct minor child, petty larceny and assault.

During the period city police issued 1551 citations for parking violations and jaywalking. The record shows 1241 citation for overtime parking, 29 improper parking, 26 drivers were adults with one receiving a jail sentence and the and 11 citations for jaywalking. The usual bond for overtime parking and jaywalking is \$1 with a \$2 bond required for parking in an alley or on improper parking. All forfeited bonds and fines are turned over to the city treasurer as are all fines and costs received by the court.

Eye of Demos On Treasury, Says Speaker

BALTIMORE CITY, April 4 (AP)—Republican party officials here today told Democrats have a one-point program for resource development, the federal treasury, which also must meet massive defense needs and other programs.

In contrast, L. Lee Potter said, the Eisenhower administration has four points: "The federal treasury is deplete-plus individual initiative, private enterprise and teamwork at all levels of government."

Potter, special assistant to Republican National Chairman Demetrius A. Smith, discussed war resources and administration anti-recession plans in a speech prepared for a state-wide regional conference of GOP women.

Comparing Democratic and Republican policies as they relate to the Columbia river basin, Potter said:

"Between 1923 and 1953, the federal power commission licensed basin projects with a generating capacity of 1,757,000 kilowatts. Since 1933, generating capacity of over 5 million kilowatts has been licensed. In other words, five years of grant-works teamwork between the Republican administrative and local agencies has produced about as many kilowatts as all the Democratic in two decades—that ended in a basin known as 'dead'."

"We've broken the grip of the dead hand of federal monopoly on project sites, a monopoly which guaranteed that all those sites would remain undeveloped when vitally needed, as the congress could be lobbied into providing the necessary billions each year."

For the recreation, Potter said that Americans were "gratified and relieved when it became clear that this administration was not going to launch a bonapartism and waste the nation's resources in order to stimulate the economy."

He said detailed plans so far announced by President Eisenhower call for an accelerated spending only on projects needed by the country.

Radar Device Clocks Speed Of Tornadoes

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—A new type radar used by the weather bureau measured the speed of winds in the tornado that struck Wichita Falls, Texas, Wednesday at 230 miles per hour.

The bureau said last night that was the first time one of its new experimental radar sets using the Doppler principle had made a direct determination of wind speeds in a tornado.

The weather bureau credited the radar's quick spotting of the approaching storm as a factor in the warning that hit Wichita Falls with helping to keep down casualties.

Within three minutes, the weather bureau issued a tornado warning. Police sirens were sounded and local radio and television stations gave continuous announcements of the storm's progress until it moved over the city about 15 minutes later, the bureau said.

The Doppler radar is similar to that commonly used by highway patrol and television stations. It is a high speed electronic alarm, and the returning echo changes its frequency in direct proportion to the speed of the object with which it comes in contact.

Delinquency Rate Increase Is Noted

NEW YORK, April 4 (AP)—A new number of troublemakers suspended from the city's schools stood at 1,202 last week, an increase of 100 over the previous week.

The crackdown on troublemakers began Feb. 7 to curb a growing problem of juvenile offenses against fellow students and teachers.

Of the students suspended, 337 have been readmitted to schools, 337 sent to special schools, 33 sent to institutions and 122 have left the school system. The rest still are under suspension.

The superintendent of schools, Dr. William Jansen, reported that 20 narcotics users and 70 suspected users were discovered in the high school population in the past year, an increase of 13 users and eight suspects over last year.

The convict, Clyde L. Adams, was arrested Feb. 23 near Helena. He was serving a 15-year term for a 1941 act when he walked out of the Deer Lodge institution Feb. 10.

The unauthorised release went unreported for 10 days, until an anonymous letter invited state officials to examine the action.

By that time, Richardson had vanished. His arrest and deportation followed negotiations between U. S. and Canadian authorities, the attorney general said.

IDAHO FALLS, April 4 (AP)—Charles Peely, Jr., 18, one of two young men accused in an alleged dynamite plot to kill a young woman for her insurance, appeared yesterday for arraignment on a charge of conspiracy to commit murder.

Peely, who looked outwardly calm at the proceedings, asked Probate Judge J. H. Corey for a preliminary hearing on the charge. Judge Corey set the hearing for April 15 at 10 a.m. Peely was not represented by an attorney. He appeared with members of his family.

After Judge Corey granted the request, Monte D. Moore, Jr., who faces the same charge in the case, asked the hearing to complete his arraignment be continued until April 15.

States also represented Dennis Moore, 20, who is being held on \$10,000 bond in connection with the burning of an insured automobile.

Peely and Monte Moore are being held in lieu of \$25,000 bond each after they were charged with trying to kill Florence Chase, 24, by planting a dynamite bomb in a car. The woman, who said at one time she and Monte Moore were considering marriage, escaped death in the blast but is hospitalized with a broken pelvis.

The youths told officers in signed statements that they also set off a series of other blasts that had their southeast Idaho law in state of near terror last week.

Prosecuting Attorney Edward W. Pike said they told him the blast that injured the woman was part of a plot to collect double indemnity on an insurance policy that Moore took out on her life. The other blasts were set to make her death look like an accident, they told Pike.
