Canadian 'Bush' Train Provides Link Between Centuries in Haul Into Wilds

CHURCHILL, Manitoba, April 8 (AP)—The train walled northward along a single track in the wild Canadian bush, traveling a thin line between the 19th and 20th centuries.

In the freight cars, complex electronic instruments for a new electric dam, precision tools for a nickel mine, radio parts for a bush pilot, food, clothing, wash tubs, a bicycle, and a bag of cement.

Outside, endless frozen lakes, stunted spruce and birch trees, snow on the unmarked ground.

Three Indian children scurried under and over seats, even up the baggage racks.

At each settlement, the arrival of the train sets off the same cycle. The whole population turns out to meet the train—the Indians, the white trader, the trapper, the

Anglican or Catholic missionary, the tall, formidable Mountie, who seems 8 feet tall, who seems to see everything and say nothing.

The settlements have names like Plover or Nomonch or Chasse-mine or Kellest or Thicket Portage. Many were named after railroad men who built the line in 1929 and after French and English explorers who came here 200 or 300 years ago.

Small as they are, some of the settlements serve as transportation centers for even larger settlements deeper in the bush.

But the whole cycle starts with the Hudson Bay railway, which by all odds must be one of the finest, most informal railroads in North America.

Five years ago an Eskimo woman came aboard, half-hidden in seal-skins. As the tide progressed and they began to feel the heat, she peeled off layers of clothing.

Few Wiretap Cases Found In California

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8 (AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company uncovered "no more than 30" cases of wiretapping in the past five years, according to its report yesterday to the state public utilities commission.

The PUC had called a hearing on wiretapping in order of the state legislature which required telephone companies to keep records on wiretapping.

There was not a single incident of wiretapping turned up by 43 of California's smaller telephone companies, according to a spokesman for the group.

Charles L. Wickstrom, an engineer for the P&T, said it had turned up 60 suspected cases of wiretapping in the past five years. Company employees reported 18 cases and customers reported the others.

"More than half of these 60 cases were actually wiretapping," Wickstrom said.

About two-thirds of the cases were in southern California, he said. Only three cases had led to prosecution, he said.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—The leopard got up and charged on me, held my gun in front of me and we went down, the cat falling off me.

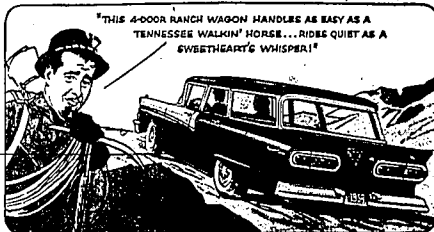

PTA Council Told Schools Here Face Teacher Shortage Because of Salary

Twin Falls schools are facing an acute shortage of well-qualified teachers, Arthur Kleinkopf, assistant superintendent, told members of the PTA Council Monday night in the Junior high school library. It is becoming more difficult each year to fill vacancies, and the reason always is related to the low salary scale, he declared. "We are between \$500 and \$550 below most other states and \$1,000 below California, so you can't blame the teachers for going to other states," he pointed out. There is a need for approximately 107,000 new teachers each year nationwide, but only about 100,000 are trained annually. The assistant superintendent said that his office receives many applications which are immediately put into the "no" file because they contain so many grammatical errors it is obvious they were not written by educated persons. "But when September comes and we still have vacancies, then we have to appeal to any local people who have taught, regardless of their qualifications," he stated.

"Subterfuge" Not Planned, Avers Lawyer

PORTLAND, April 8—An attorney for Pacific Northwest Power company has denied there was any subterfuge in the firm's application for a license to build a high mountain sheep dam on the Snake river.

"If we wanted to file for license, we would want to file first," said the lawyer. "But we have been waiting until there has been a determination in the question of fish passage."

Oppose Dam
Conservation groups have opposed construction of New Power dam on the Snake river because it would damage the Columbia river salmon runs.

Senator Morse, D. Ore., said that the Pacific Northwest should give more clearly the location of the dam for which it is seeking a license. Morse said there was little doubt that the application is not for a dam, but for a high mountain sheep dam.

The question arises, whether the application is honestly of a utility company as to include a New Power dam on the Snake river.

Apply for License
The company applied to the federal power commission last Monday for a license to build the high mountain sheep dam.

He said the application also stated that the company was making a study to determine which projects should be built to meet the test of comprehensive development. He said any one or combination of dams might meet the test for consideration.

Red Nuclear Bomb Test Bans Fails to Excite Most of World

By United Press
Soviet Russia's suspension of nuclear weapons tests has failed to cause the world sensation for which the Kremlin obviously hoped. In fact, the biggest impact seems to have been registered in the United States, where it was called a great Soviet propaganda victory in the cold war.

In other countries, even the "neutralist" ones like India, the announcement caused much less excitement than Washington has feared. A survey of reports which have

reached the United States from foreign capitals indicates that there are several reasons why the big propaganda bomb proved to be more for us a "dud."
1. The Kremlin "telegraphed its punch." It was reported long in advance of Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko's announcement to the Soviet parliament that Russia intended to suspend tests.

2. The announcement was made immediately after Russia had completed a long, important series of tests, including at least three in the million-ton H-bomb range. It will take a long time for Russian

nuclear scientists to assess the results of these tests, and hence a long time before new ones would be planned.
3. The announcement was made with the knowledge that the United States was just about to start a series of long-scheduled tests in the Pacific, and was plainly intended to cause an international resentment against the United States.

4. The announcement was so judged about with qualifications as to be almost meaningless. Gromyko and Russia reserved the right to resume tests unless other countries followed its example. This means that if the United States carries out its tests, Russia can say that it must make more tests in its own defense.
5. One thing that seems to have

thured in the reaction to the Gromyko announcement is that they caused an abnormal amount of radioactive fallout.
Democratic Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota asserted that the United States had permitted Russia to "get away with political murder" in its suspension of propaganda by keeping silent on the fallout.
He said that the Eisenhower administration publishes its analysis of the Soviet tests. Humphrey said: "Informed scientists believe the Soviet explosion saved into the atmosphere at least twice or possibly three times more radioactive material than ever before."
Scientists of the atomic energy commission did not agree with this, but certainly the tests were very "dirty."

Given in Japan, the Soviet announcement caused little excitement. Japan, caught in the middle between the Soviet tests in Siberia and the American tests in the Pacific, is more active than any other country to the fallout menace.

United Press advices from Tokyo say that while the Japanese welcomed the Soviet announcement, they inclined to doubt Russia's good faith.

"Legally Fantastic" Attempts to Ban Tests Can't Win, Lose AVer Officials

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The consensus of official opinion here is that the six-nation group trying to stop nuclear testing by legal means can't win or lose.

A spokesman for the administration spoke for the anti-test suit filed here Friday as "legally fantastic" and doomed to fail. He forecast no better chances for the suits projected by the same group in Russia and Britain.

But administration and congressional sources conceded that opposition to the legal maneuver have devised an effective means for getting before the court of world opinion their contentions:

—The nuclear arms race is pushing ever closer to the brink of a war which could destroy mankind.

—Nuclear tests alone, though the radioactive fallout they send all over the world, are scattering thousands of the living to agony and premature death and thousands yet unborn to disease.

The 16 plaintiffs are a varied group representing science, philosophy, socialism, religion, motherhood and fishing. In the injunction pleading of a conditional test suit filed in federal court here, the suit said the right to live without radioactive fallout is a fundamental right of man.

The plaintiffs include American Scientist Louis C. Pauling, American Chemist Linus C. Pauling, American philosopher Bertrand Russell and German Pastor Martin Niemöller. Whatever the plaintiffs may think, the position arm of the United States has made the injunction important military and foreign policy decision to go ahead with tests, this lawyer said. "Can 16 people demand that the judicial arm upset it when I don't want it there?"

"That it is entirely possible," this official added, "that for propaganda purposes the Russians will extend the glad hand to the attorneys for the group when they visit Moscow."

He indicated he felt that would be about the extent of the "cooperation" which the attorneys say they hope to get in Russia.

He conceded, however, that the plaintiffs already have scored a publicity success. He said there are many sincere persons in the world who feel exactly as the plaintiffs do—that nuclear tests should be banned at once for the health of humanity and the sake of peace.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The government yesterday charged two schools in Washington state with using deceptive offers of employment to lure their students in specialized airlines training.

The federal trade commission complaint named Northwest Air College, Inc. of Spokane and American Air College and Training School, Inc., Seattle, and four former or former officials of both schools.

The FTC complaint said salesmen for the institutions made what it called 16 separate misrepresentations in interviewing prospects.

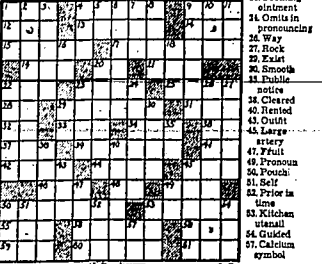

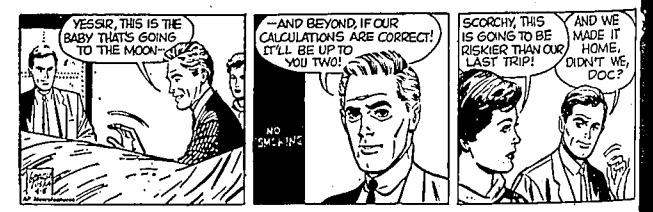

To bring everybody up to this standard, the world still has a long way to go. Officials of WHO, as a coordinator of this effort, are conscious of this.

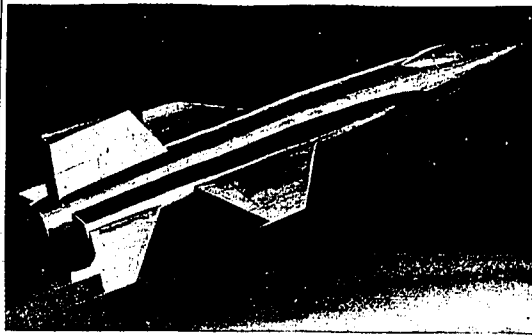
Says its Brazilian director general, Dr. M. G. Candau: "no one in WHO underestimates the tasks which lie ahead."

"We must still find answers to many virus diseases, and to the degenerative diseases."

"We have not yet begun to apply the means of modern medicine and science have provided us to protect the mental health of future generations."

"Finally, there is the great challenge of the atomic age with all its opportunities for human betterment, but also with all its risks for the safety of man."
