Eisenhower May Consider Ending Nuclear Testing

WASHINGTON, April 9 (UPI)—President Eisenhower said today that he is very seriously considering suspending U. S. nuclear tests if the forthcoming series in the Pacific proves the United States with necessary scientific data. After the 1958 tests are completed, the President said, U. S. scientists will tell him whether they provided most, if not all, of the information they sought. If the information they obtained in obtaining the needed information, the President said he would then consider very seriously a suspension of further nuclear testing. He said it would be perfectly possible that the United States, in that event, would make a unilateral statement of its intention to halt nuclear testing.

States' Views On Columbia Unit Sought

BOISE, April 9 (UP)—The seven states represented in the Columbia interstate compact committee are expected to meet here today and may discuss how much power they want to give the proposed regional agency. Traffic Experts Believe Existing Laws Adequate

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9 (AP)—Many traffic experts believe the application of existing controls in most states would reduce the nation's annual road deaths by 25,000. But at the final session of a two-day conference by 700 of them from 11 western states there more education of drivers and more enforcement of laws through collection of needed data. M. Gillis, director of California public works, "Invariably we get as much out of safety as we are willing to demand."

The conference was called by the California Highway Patrol for traffic safety, said, demands enforcement and strong support by all citizens.

R. S. Petersen, chairman of the Western regional conference called for a halt in traffic deaths in opening the two-day meeting yesterday. "The traffic fatalities are a challenge to everything else," he said. "In the name of humanity, it must be stopped."

He was supported by Justice A. F. Bray of the California district court of appeal, Gov. Robert D. Holman of Oregon and many others. George D. Clyde of Utah, who led with California, Oregon, Washington and Arizona, urged improvements in traffic control.

Earle E. Kohler, law enforcement commissioner of the state of Idaho, said driver education in the schools, a study and possible revision of the state's driver license laws, additional state police officers to keep up with highway growth and improvement of the state's traffic code.

State Highway Engineer G. Bruce Benedict of Idaho said Idaho's right-of-way acquisition law was the greatest handicap to the progress of building modern state highways.

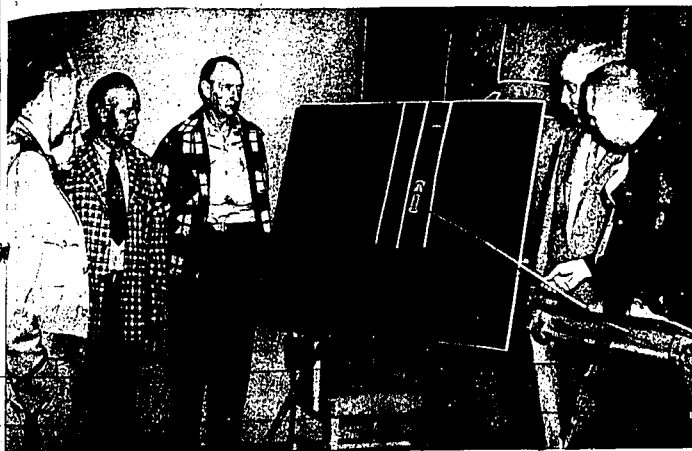

Levy Election Scheduled for Area's Schools

REPORT, April 9—The two-mill school plant facilities fund levy election will be held Friday. Voting will be from 1 to 7 p.m.

Voters from Heyburn trustee district No. 1 will vote at the Heyburn Junior school; those from district No. 2 at the Paul elementary school; district No. 3 will vote at the school in Rupert; district Lincoln school in Rupert; district Lincoln school in the Accequin school. No. 4 will vote at the Accequin school.

Any qualified elector of the district may vote. To be qualified they must have lived in the district for more than 30 days and be a taxpayer, or the husband or wife of a taxpayer, or a partner in a business, or a person who is obligated to pay taxes on real property within the district.

In the event that a two-thirds majority favors the two-mill levy, the board will be authorized to set up such a levy for a 10-year period beginning Sept. 1, 1958. This levy would set up a plant facilities fund raising around \$21,000 per year for 10 years.

Money raised by this levy would be used to provide new furniture and equipment for the new Paul and Lincoln high school additions, and to furnish the eight classrooms and the dining hall through the federal aid money, purchase buses and create a reserve fund to assist in constructing badly needed school buildings in the near future.

The annual budget hearing for the district will be held at 8 p.m. Monday at the Lincoln school in Rupert. This will be to review the budget for the coming year, and all interested persons are invited to attend.

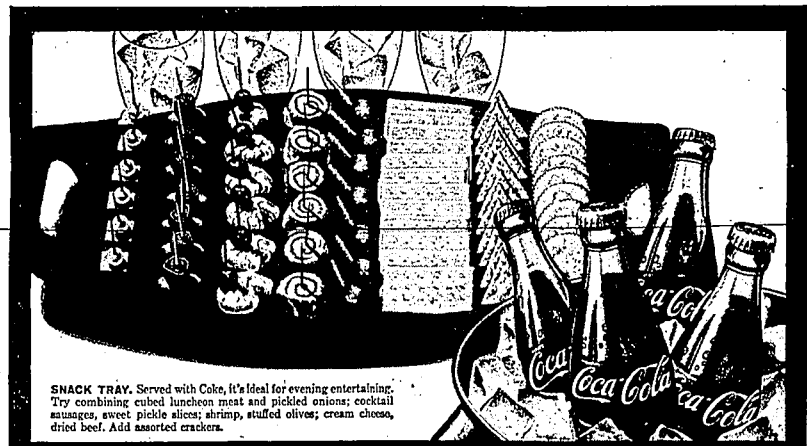

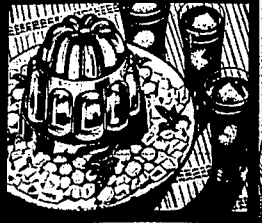

State Police Patrol 107,268 Miles in Valley During Quarter; 747 Arrested

Idaho state police in 1958 have run up a total of 107,268 miles patrolling highways, worked 7,609 hours and arrested 747 persons during the first three months of 1958. State Police Lt. Clark Hand's quarterly report for the fourth district spent 5,068 hours patrolling highways, 200 hours investigating accidents, 57 hours on various courts, 25 hours driving about 121 hours giving safety talks and instruction to groups, five hours in motor inspections and 91 hours operating radio units. During the quarter the patrolmen issued 117 warning tickets regarding truck, trailer and passenger car safety. Ninety-sixty talks were given and equipment checked 2,900 drivers in-

cesses and issued 914 oral warnings. Of the 747 arrests made by state police in the valley, 22 were for drunken driving and 65 as a result of radar speed checks. Fines in various valley courts check. Results of the arrests amount to \$10,206. Of this total, \$2,875.40 was for drunken driving. Radar fines amounted to \$1,259 for the three-month period. Money brought to the state treasury as a result of checks on trucks suspected of having an increase in weight registration amounted to \$1,947.93.

In addition district officers assisted in 249 instances, gave information to 1,747 motorists and first aid to six persons injured in accidents. Ninety-nine trucks were given equipment, checked 2,900 drivers in-

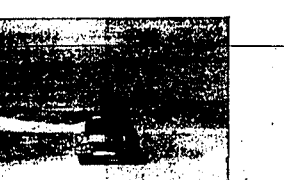

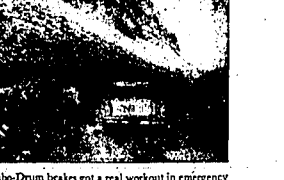

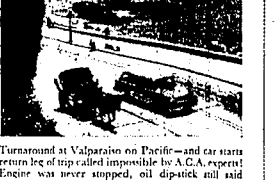

Group Draws GOP Charges Of Socialism

WASHINGTON, April 9—The staff of the senate Republican policy committee has accused Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) of formulating a "blueprint for state socialism in America."

A staff study, prepared for use by senate Republicans and made public Monday, also described former President Truman as "the chief mouthpiece of the collectivists."

"Some Old . . . Smeared" In a reply, the ADA said the GOP committee charges were "the same old tired and discredited sneers which the right wing of the GOP uses in detail of any positive or constructive program."

The ADA said the committee staff should devote its time to doing something about the unemployed and "the precarious international position of the United States."

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., one-time ADA chairman, called the staff report "a piece of plain old-fashioned Republican demagoguery undoubtedly written by a political scribe at the Washington Post."

Labeled Fendergast Politician The House staff also called Truman "the Fendergast politician (who) . . . inherited an administration of policies which have been strongly affected by communists and fellow travelers."

The ADA program was described as "a collection of bills of goods—a program of laundered communism—with the bill of rights locked to the ADA's personal status program presents a distinct parallel to that of the communists."

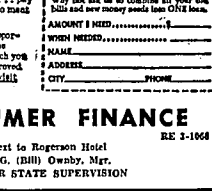

Construction Dip Is Noted In Twin Falls

New dwelling units authorized last month in eight leading Idaho cities total 17, representing a 53 per cent increase over the same period last year. In Twin Falls, however, new dwelling authorizations were 23 per cent below the March, 1951, level.

Figures released Wednesday by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust Company show 18 new dwelling permits authorized in Twin Falls last March. Seventy-nine were authorized in the Boise metropolitan area, a 100 per cent increase over last year. For the state, 167 permits were authorized, representing a 53 per cent increase over March a year ago.

Total value placed on the 173 new dwelling permits in the eight cities listed at \$2,415,938, or 61 per cent above the same month last year. Twin Falls new dwelling construction was valued at \$90,000, a 10 per cent decrease from March, 1951.

For the first three months of the year, 51 permits valued at \$52,243 were issued for new dwellings in Twin Falls, a 219 per cent increase over the first quarter of 1951. In the first three months of 1952, 22 permits valued at \$270,500, or 148 per cent above the same period last year, were authorized for new dwelling construction.

Information released by the bank indicates that the availability of mortgage funds, somewhat of a significant factor in residential construction.

For the past eight months, residential construction has been equal to or ahead of the state, according to the bank's information.

In March in the state at large, 315 permits valued at \$3,156,440 in value were authorized for new dwelling construction, a 10 per cent increase over the same month last year. In Twin Falls, total construction was valued at \$210,485, 10 per cent below March a year ago.

Navy Near 'Breakthrough' in Conversion of Heat to Power

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The navy believes it is on the verge of a "breakthrough" in efforts to convert heat directly into electricity.

If it is, cheap power will be on the horizon and the existing conventional power industry faces a revolution.

In testimony before a house appropriations subcommittee, Rear Adm. A. M. Morgan of the bureau of ships said:

"We are on the verge of a breakthrough apparently in conversion of heat to electric power through thermoelectric couples."

Morgan added that "we should have something definite on this in a matter of three years."

In thermoelectric couples two different metals are joined, and one is heated. Electrons thus stir up a flow from one metal to the other, creating an electric current.

Such couples in the form of thin bars or wires have long been used as temperature gauges and even as heat pumps. The efficiency of conversion was too low, however, to make them useful on a large scale.

Morgan did not specifically mention atomic energy. But nuclear power enthusiasts dream of finding a way to convert atomic heat directly into electrical power. This would eliminate costly items like heat-transfer equipment, boilers, turbines and generators.

Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the atomic energy commission has said often he is confident such direct conversion will be achieved. Scientists generally believe when hydrogen energy is harnessed, if it ever is, direct conversion will be one of the dividends.

But uranium fission plants, like the mammoth power station at Shippingport, Pa., have had to em-

21 Cadets, Officers and Lone Sailor Kept Here 3 Days by Plane Trouble

An airplane land of 21 air force ROTC cadets, several air force officers and a lone sailor left Jostin field for Minneapolis, Minn., at 10 p.m. Tuesday after nearly three days of being stranded in Twin Falls because their plane was forced down here Sunday morning.

The cadets had flown a week ago to San Francisco for a special annual honorary air society meeting. They left California early Sunday in a two-engine C-119 transport with two additional air force officers and a sailor "hitchhiking" to Minneapolis.

A hydraulic oil leak developed when the plane was southwest of Twin Falls, forcing the pilot, First Lieut. Arthur Calloway, to feather a prop and shut off an engine. The plane, halted at Jostin field just before noon Sunday.

Another plane of the same type flew from Minneapolis Tuesday, arriving at Jostin field about 8:30 p.m., and took the cadets and the other passengers to Hill air force base near Ogden. From Utah the group expected to be flown on to Minneapolis early Wednesday.

The crew of the downed plane is still in Twin Falls waiting for their ship to be repaired. A maintenance prop specialist flew from Ogden Monday to work on the plane. However, parts could not be obtained at Hill air force base or Mountain Home air force base, so no work could be done until the parts were flown from Minneapolis by the plane dispatched to pick up the cadets.

The group was housed at the Flogerson hotel during the enforced rest. A special hot took them to the hotel Sunday and returned them to the airport Tuesday evening.

The pilot related that the engine, a 160 Joseph Lyons, spotted evidence of an oil leak during a routine 10-flight inspection. Lyons said he noted some ice had been turned a "bright cherry red" by the hydraulic oil leaking into it. "It looked like a great big strawberry cream cone," he commented later.

The leak was spotted when the plane was about 18 minutes from Twin Falls at an altitude of 12,000 feet. The pilot said Lieutenant Calloway estimated the ship's speed at 200 knots, or about 250 miles per hour.

The pilot said he dropped the plane to 11,500 feet and radioed

Senator's Poll Returns Cross Section Of Iowans' Opinions Over Vital Issues

WASHINGTON, April 9—The most urgent questions confronting the voters rate as most important campaign year are these:

—Which issues and problems do you think are most important?

—How do they stand on these issues and problems?

The campaigning politician who knows the answers will know, also, how to get himself elected. It is almost as simple as that.

With that in mind, consider the poll being conducted now by Sen. Thomas E. Martin, R, Ia. Martin has published a compilation of responses from what he describes as his ninth annual questionnaire to the people of Iowa. He reported that in February he mailed 45,028 questionnaires to Iowans, addressed to every 20th household in town and country.

The senator obtained the names from rural directories, city directories and telephone directories. No ordinary pollster is Martin. He reports how many questionnaires he distributed and tabulates replies in terms of people instead of percentages. Moreover, he breaks the returns down occupationally and between men and women.

Martin asked his Iowans to indicate among 16 suggested issues those which they considered most important today.

Businessmen, white collar workers and miscellaneous respondents made a number of suggestions.

Farmers made farm prices and farm policies 1 by 20-side the margin. Professional men named American foreign policy, women

voiced overwhelmingly for maintaining peace after government choice was government spending. Their third, farm prices and policies.

Laboring men rated taxation and maintaining peace after government spending. Farmers put government spending in second place and maintaining peace third. Businessmen voted second and third places to peace and labor policies. Second and third choices of professional men were peace and spending. White collar workers rated taxation and American foreign policy two and three. Miscellaneous respondents named peace and taxation.

These preliminary returns were

from 5,633 replies received of which 1,242 were from farmers and 2,205 from women. Labor contributed 621, businessmen 206, professionals 325, white collar 432 and miscellaneous 328.

Each category gave a favorable majority vote to this question: Do you approve increasing the federal debt to build hospitals, highways, schools, flood control projects, etc., to stimulate the economy when needed?

All categories gave labor favored federal law to prohibit the union shop, the so-called right-to-work law. The labor vote was 312-to-314 against such. Women voted most heavily for a law to require unions to report their financial operations to the government.

The combined votes of all categories made the No. 1 national issue of 1958, government spending No. 2, farm prices and policies No. 3 and taxation No. 4. Least interest was in the administration of outer space programs.

Louder Voice

Workable System of Artificial Respiration Urged by Doctors

NEW YORK, April 9.—Artificial respiration as it is now taught and practiced by laymen can't save lives in the majority of cases, and should be replaced at once by a method which will work.

These were the conclusions of three scientists after extensive experiments involving 25 unconscious persons and the efforts of 167 untrained persons to revive them. They reported their findings in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The artificial respiration method now taught to beach guards, Red Cross first aid courses, to Boy Scouts, and others are the chest-pressure, arm-lift or the back-pressure, arm-lift techniques.

"Under field conditions," the scientists found, they don't work in most cases because the airway of the unconscious person is not kept open. The method which will work is the mouth-to-mouth way. The rescuer clamps his mouth over the mouth of the unconscious person near death from air lack and forces his own breath into that person's lungs.

It is the oldest known method of artificial respiration and is described in the Bible. Scientists assumed it isn't used because of a rescuer's "hesitancy to touch with his mouth the mouth of a moribund (dying) patient."

To overcome that objection, the scientists devised a combined metal always and mouthpiece which can be carried about in the pocket. The always and is inserted into the unconscious person's throat, which leaves the mouthpieces projecting from his mouth. The rescuer then takes the mouthpieces into his mouth and forces his breath through it.

The scientists are Drs. Peter Sa-

lar and Lourds A. Zaccarano of the Baltimore city hospitals and Dr. James O. Egan of the University of Buffalo (N. Y.) school of medicine.

The big trouble with the presently used artificial respiration methods is that they require both hands of the would-be rescuer and he has no hand with which to prevent a kink in the airway, even if he knew how.

To keep the airway open, the head must be kept extended. To do this, two hands are needed. They hold the unconscious person by the jaw bones, just beneath the ear lobes and pull outward.
