Measurement Of Acres for Wheat Starts

Wheat reporters have started recording acreage for the 1958 crop today by Ted Scott, chairman of the Twin Falls county agricultural stabilization committee.

He says each farmer in the county will be contacted in the next few days on his farm.

Scott says farmers will be notified of any excess of this amount and will submit July 15 to dispose of the excess.

Scott notes that public law 85-202 to which climacteric credit for wheat acreage in excess of the allotment, had been superseded by public law 85-60, requiring that for 1958 only the farm base acreage will be used in considering future allotments.

He says there is no excess here in compliance with the allotment and will regard to the amount of excess.

This revision was made because some farmers had already planted their 1958 wheat. The bill was enacted, Scott says.

Castro Rebels Stage Hit-Run Raids in Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba, April 15 (AP)—Castro's guerrillas staged hit and run raids in three Cuban provinces today.

The rebels burned air base to which warehouse in the province of western Cuba. Damage was estimated at \$40,000.

The government sent reinforcements to La Coloma in Pinar del Rio to run down the about 100 rebels who landed over the weekend on a yacht from Mexico.

Army headquarters said one of the invading rebels was killed by Batista forces. The other was captured. The yacht "El Correo" in La Coloma bay. They said it was owned by a Cuban doctor who had fled to the United States.

The rebels were left for Tampa, Fla. five days before the landing. He is a former member in the Cuban house of representatives.

The army also claimed it had seized 100 rifles and 100 rounds of ammunition the invaders carried in a farm house owned by Rodriguez' brother.

The rebels scattered into the hills after landing apparently to join up with a band of 50 others forming the area.

'Ghost Town' Described for T. F. Students

Gold from the Idaho city area north of Boise was a factor in the north's victory in the civil war, Twin Falls junior high school students were told by O. A. Kelker, Twin Falls representative for the Idaho Historical society.

Kelker delivered three lectures and showed slides to the 1200 students between a 4 a.m. and noon Tuesday at the school auditorium. Color slides of the famed ghost town and adjacent settlements were shown.

In tracing Idaho City's history Kelker said, "Gold from Idaho territory, found in the mines and placer diggings of the Idaho city area, enabled the North to meet financial obligations and purchase supplies and munitions to successfully carry on the war."

Kelker told the students the area "fabled" first to go in the late 1800s the basin was home to more than 30,000 people and 8,000 lived within the limits of Idaho City. Today, the town has about 200 residents and four ghost towns in the surrounding area have a few if any residents, Kelker said.

Arrangements for the lectures and slides were made by Mrs. Vera C. O'Leary, principal, and Nadine Zeck, instructor. The Idaho City Historical society is sponsoring the series of the regular Idaho history classes.

Kelker has shown a similar show of Silver City to nine junior high school classes in Magic Valley.

Auto Workers Open Deal for New Contract

DETROIT, April 15 (AP)—The United Auto Workers today opened 1958 contract negotiations with American Motors Corp., the firm which has already told the union it wants some wage reductions in the next two years.

American Motors beams the fourth auto firm to start contract talks with the UAW. The union today is reexamining proposals with Ford and Chrysler and tomorrow will meet again with General Motors.

Yesterday, both the UAW and the International Union of Electrical Workers met with General Motors negotiators. Neither side divulged the subject of talks. The IUE, seeking the same contract as the UAW and representing about 30,000 GM appliance workers, met with the company again today.

The American Motors-UAW contract covers about 10,000 production workers, 9,000 of them at auto appliance plants in Milwaukee and Kenosha, Wis., and 1,000 appliance workers at Grand Rapids, Mich. The UAW last January laid down its demands for auto industry bargaining this year: an annual wage boost of at least 10 cents an hour instead of the present six cents; better pension, insurance, unemployment benefits and job rights; and a share of the profits above a 10 per cent return.

Just the "big three" auto companies have declined to make their proposals to the union public. However, two weeks ago American Motors, one of the "little two" U. S. firms along with Studebaker-Packard, took the offensive against the giant 1,500,000-unit Ford.

Edward L. Cushman, industrial relations chief of AMO who led company bargainers today, declared the company wanted to freeze wages and benefits for two years.

Private Hospital Insurance Scheme Thrives in Britain

LONDON, April 15 (AP)—Even in this land of socialized medicine a Blue-Cross-type hospital insurance scheme is thriving.

Billions, it seems, like that little something extra which they can't get for their 45-6 week average national health service subscription.

The British United Provident Association, a non-profit organization, has been supplementing the NHS for more than 10 years.

Right now, a spokesman said, more than 700,000 Britons are enjoying its benefits, and more are coming in each month, mostly under group plans launched by their employers.

Under NHS, set up by the 1948 labor government, Britons get free care in hospitals, free treatment from doctors and free medicine—free, that is, except for the 4-cent fee on each prescription and the fixed weekly charge deducted from their salaries.

Such a system appears to leave little room for a Blue-Cross-type of organization. But the BUPA, surprisingly, has more clients than it can handle.

"Many people don't feel that socialized medicine, with everyone on the same level, gives them the same benefits they get from their own private-doctors before the war," said Herbert Cooper, BUPA spokesman.

"They want the same personalized care they used to get—and they're willing to pay for it. Membership in BUPA gives them private care about the expense of calling in a private doctor who isn't in the system."

The doctor examines him, and if hospital treatment is required sends him either to a BUPA-owned hospital or to a private room in a state-owned hospital. BUPA picks up any tabs not exceeding \$66 a week. BUPA doesn't have any of its own doctors, although it does retain one or two to treat members who don't regularly go to a state doctor.

BUPA does not come in conflict with the government departments which run the NHS.

"Everyone can still have free treatment if he wants," Cooper said. "BUPA is something extra—you might call it the inexpensive sauce with the free steak."

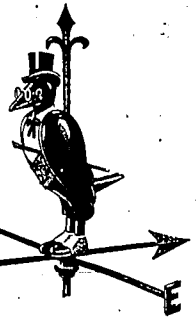

Wet Weather Delays Field Work in Area

BOISE, April 15 (AP)—Field work was progressing reasonably well April 1 in lower elevations of southwestern and south central Idaho, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

However, the USDA noted, work in the northern and eastern portions of the state was delayed by cool and wet weather.

Soil moisture supplies in dry farmed areas and irrigation water supplies in irrigated areas are considered to be adequate to plentiful, the USDA said.

Too Wet to Farm
In north Idaho, snow and frequent rains in most localities have kept fields too wet to permit much farming activity to date, the department said. However, there has been some plowing, seed bed preparation and fertilization in some areas.

"While very little spring crops have been planted as yet, the season appears to be normal to possibly 10 days ahead of normal," the department said.

Planting Progress
The USDA also noted: "In the lower elevations of southwestern Idaho, the plowing of land for row crops is well over half done. Planting of sugar beets, potatoes and onions has progressed well. Apples are in early to full bloom, while other fruits are in the bud stage. Plantings of spring grains varies from nearly complete in some parts of southwestern Idaho to less than half in other areas."

Wheat Estimate Down
Idaho's winter wheat crop for 1946 is estimated at 18,254,000 bushels, the department said, which is five per cent below the 1937 estimate and four per cent less than the 1947-48 average production.

Milk production for March was estimated at 128 million pounds compared to 124 million pounds produced in March of 1937 and the 1947-48 average of 108 million pounds. The state's egg production this March held steady at an estimated 28 million, which was unchanged from a year earlier on the average.

The reported condition of cattle was the same as a month ago, but above the 10-year average for April 1 and the highest for that date since 1951. Sheep also are in the best condition since 1951.

The department reported also that the index of composite wage rates for Idaho farm workers April 1 was at a record high of 509 per cent of the 1910-14 average. This compared to 524 a year earlier.

Factory Jobs in California Drop

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15 (AP)—Manufacturing employment in California decreased by 10,000 workers between February and March, according to the state department of industrial relations.

Department director Earnest B. Webb reported yesterday that 1,129,000 wages and salary workers were employed in factory jobs in March, as compared with 1,140,000 in February.

Increase in food products, ordinance and aircraft industries were offset by declines in the automobile, machinery and fishing-canning industries.

The increase in aircraft employment was the one bright note of the report. It marked the first increase in the industry since April 1937—the postwar peak.
