Committee of 50 On Development Plans Meet Here

BOISE, April 16 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie's Committee of 50 for Economic and Industrial Development will hold its first meeting in Twin Falls, Idaho, today.

The meeting will be held at the Regency Hotel, Secretary Louise Shadlock of the department of commerce and development announced yesterday. There will be an afternoon meeting also.

Each member will be assigned one or more of the committee's four subjects of study, according to preference expressed in answers to an inquiry made among the 50. Shadlock said.

Subjects of study, outlined by Smylie, are:

1. Do Idaho laws and perhaps the constitution, need amending to permit local units of government to participate financially in plant acquisition and development projects?

2. Should Idaho consider giving special tax treatment to certain types of development projects?

3. Should the department of commerce and development be assigned an active role in this regional and local program, or should a new, or existing, service agency with fund-raising and public relations responsibilities be set up?

Paul Verion of Boise, former state representative, was chosen chairman of the committee. It will meet in Boise on April 22.

The full committee meeting will launch a series of working recommendations to be made to the legislature.

Local members of the committee are: Dr. James S. San Francisco, regional planning officer for the housing and home affairs department; and Dr. J. W. Peterson, regional planning officer for the housing and home affairs department.

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower today calmly but firmly rejected former President Truman's prescription for fighting the recession. The President turned down Truman's proposals for an immediate five billion dollar tax cut and a lowering of federal interest rates amid these related developments: 1. Senate-Republican Leader William F. Knowland said he does not think there will be a general tax cut this year, but there is a "possibility" of a reduction in excise taxes. 2. Former Chairman Marriner Eccles of the federal reserve board urged a "prompt" six percent cut in federal income tax to forestall a "more drastic" anti-recession action later. He told the senate finance committee there should be cuts in income, corporation and excise taxes rather than public works spending.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON.—A constitutional amendment which neither major party dares to try to repeal is generally held accountable for the confusion and contradictions today at Washington.

The country is in a political-madness provided by a third term for a President.

Although there are other contributory factors, veteran legislators and politicians believe that this political madhouse is largely responsible for President Eisenhower's loss of control over the executive branch and in the party. For this reason, he is under daily attack on the part of the opposition and he is supposed to command, and from interests historically allied with the GOP.

His congressional leaders—Bridges, Knowland, Dirksen, Bantolin, Ives, Simpson—desert him on many important issues. His program, including farm, tax reductions and anti-recession measures. They have combined with the Rayburn-Johnson leadership to veto the initiative from the main line of the House.

More importantly, this impression of presidential aloofness and indifference has become a national issue. It is being used by the opposition in letters on congressmen, newspaper columns and the White House itself.

1100-DINNER TALK LOYALTY—The politicians render only superficial 1000-dinner talk loyalty to Eisenhower. They are not really sympathetic with him and the legislation which he demands a more determined antirecession program, especially a tax cut and official action to lower food prices.

In the East, GOP-ers are running in preparation on an anti-Eisenhower platform. They are agitating and sympathetic with the opposition which demands a more determined antirecession program, especially a tax cut and official action to lower food prices.

SAVE FOR A HANDFUL, Republican members from the Midwest are on such a course. Their position on legislation on this session's most important farm bill, which would have kept partly support payments at their present level, is a case in point. They are the unseemly chaos which demands Secretary Ezra Taft-Holt's scold.

NIXON IS ACTUAL GOP LEADER—The fact is that, if the Republican party has an accepted leader today, he is Vice President Richard M. Nixon. He seems certain to be the 1960 presidential nominee. It is because he listens to their complaints and takes their language, because he is a man who is willing to help them, and because he is now their only intermediary with the White House. They are not out of contact with the President.

Moreover, Nixon has taken a popular and political line in his address on such a course. His position on tax reductions, lowering of prices and building up their shattered organizations. It is no exaggeration to say that the country is in a state of confusion and confusion with the GOP today.

ADVERSE EFFECT OF NON-PROHIBITION—The prohibition has also had an adverse effect in nonprohibition areas. Their uncertainty over 1960, when the Democrats will face an Eisenhower administration, has made them without support and approval from many White House policies. They have no compunction in parting from a "lame duck President."

The most amazing development in present-day politics is the virtually unanimous demand of ultra-conservative Republicans for a return to the prohibition era. Not even in Hoover's darkest days did such organizations as the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers support a Republican chief executive.

IKES' INDIFFERENT ATTITUDE—Finally, there is the indifference of young Ike. He is not suggesting that he skips his job or neglects his duties. He has a certain indifferent attitude in many respects.

He has done little to inspire or strengthen the nation's confidence in his leadership. He has made no determined effort to save his legislative program from congressional sabotage.

Former President Truman, who served in legislative, executive and political intrigues, is highly respected. He reflected the sentiment of political millions. When asked what he would have done to combat the present political situation, he replied:

"I'd be doing something 'I wouldn't be sitting still or playing golf, I can tell you that!"

Five years in the making, the Timber Resource Report contains some challenging findings. For example, the report states that the total volume of timber in the United States is estimated to be 200 billion cubic feet. This is a tremendous amount of timber, and it is estimated that the United States produces about 10 billion cubic feet of timber each year.

While the report advocates a sharp increase in lumbering in national forests to make the full use of the timber resource, it also stresses the importance of conservation principles. It reminds us that watered protection of wildlife habitat are primary values of forestland.

Rocket Expert Says United States Can Send Man Into Space Within One Year

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Rocket expert Werner von Braun said yesterday the United States could send a man 150 miles into space "one year from the word go" on such a project.

The Russian, he said, already have the capability of shooting a man 200 miles into space. Von Braun said it is convinced that this country could get a man into space soon the Russians will do it first.

As for who will shoot a rocket to the moon first, von Braun said Russia will try before the United States. He said it would be many months before this country is ready for an attempt.

Von Braun, the nation's top rocket expert who helped launch two of the first U.S. satellites, coupled this country's call for vigorous action "to overcome as quickly as possible the obvious lead which the Russians now enjoy in this field."

He testified at the first public

hearings of the special house committee on space problems and debated afterward to reporters.

Von Braun said that while his organization has the capability to shoot a man into space now using the Redstone missile, probably about a year to perfect the device. He said the project, developed about three months ago, probably would be the use of four missiles.

The first three, Von Braun said, would be for lift purposes and would carry animals. The fourth would carry a man.

As for the value of the project, Von Braun said the man in the capsule "could be subjected to micro-enclosed flight." A natural development, he added, would be to transport troops and supplies to ballistic missiles.

Eventually, Von Braun said, it will be possible to transport a person across the Atlantic ocean in an intercontinental ballistic missile in about 30 minutes.

The union said it would accept working conditions during mediation.

The union's 1,241 pilots employed by the airline are paid from \$400 to \$1,500 a month. The ALPA said the scale was about \$200 higher than that of other airlines.

A company spokesman said 38-40 percent of the pilots would accept the plan that included a 10 percent pay boost and several side benefits.

 The incidental in studying life rather than primary, the report explains. The report also suggests a reward system for students who demonstrate "scholastic capacity" warrants.

To recommend greater emphasis on the "three R's" the PTSA notes... students reach the ninth grade without adequate facilities in English, English composition, comprehensive reading, spelling and arithmetic.

Some suggestions made in the report had been discussed earlier by the high school principal, W. L. LeCombe, administrator of the school board.

Items mentioned in the report previously discussed and rejected during the last year include a recommendation for a seven-hour class schedule at the high school and to discontinue lunch periods. Also previously discussed was a recommendation to permit the building of a new high school building.

Naval Base in Cuba Assured In No Danger

HAVANA, April 16 (AP)—The Cuban government reported today it had eliminated a potential rebel threat to the huge American naval base at Guantanamo.

An army communiqué said government troops had driven off a number of rebel bands operating in the Guantanamo area, near the eastern tip of Cuba.

Rebel troops, awaking out of the Sierra Macarina mountains, had engaged the army in sporadic clashes in this section for the past 48 hours, but the government said the rebels were retreating and the fighting here was "heating an end."

The communiqué also claimed two other government victories at Pinar del Rio and at El Dorado, near Bayamo, in Oriente Province, chief center of rebel activities against the government of President Fulgencio Batista.

It said heavy casualties were inflicted on the rebels in the Pinar del Rio fighting and that much arms and equipment were captured in the El Dorado attacks. The communiqué said the capture of nine more rebels brought to 50 the number of rebels being held.

Batista said meanwhile there was no possibility of an all-out civil war against his regime because the rebels did not represent public opinion. He said their methods were "communist" and that the solution to Cuba's troubles lay in free elections.

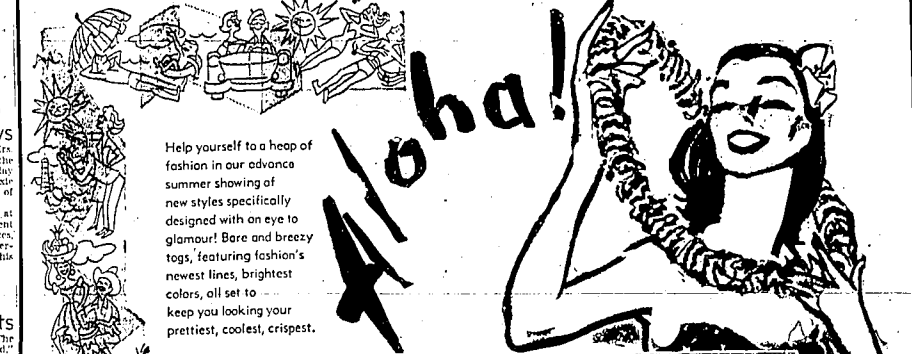

40-Year-Old May Be Best Relief Pitcher

PHOENIX, Ariz., April 16 (AP)—One of the top relief pitchers in baseball this year could well be a grizzled, crinkly-nosed veteran who didn't become an established major league pitcher until reaching the age at which most stars fade.

Marv Grissom, 40-year-old right-hander for the San Francisco Giants, had an earned run average below 3.00 for the first time during the season he celebrated his 36th birthday anniversary.

That was 1934, his second season with the New York Giants, who gave him his third first in the majors. Grissom, never starting a game after the first month of play, had an ERA of 2.38 in 122 innings.

Since then, Grissom's earned run average—achieved entirely in relief when the record was greatest—have been 2.57, 1.58 and 2.60.

Grissom's a pretty good record for a guy who played his first professional game when he was 23.

Grissom said the only cut in down on his farming in 1938, so he went to spring training for the Cincinnati Reds with his brother, the first National League pitcher between 1924 and 1931.

It could always throw pretty hard, he said. "But I'd just play a little catch. Hank Gowdy, the old catcher, showed me how to pitch that year with Cincinnati."

Go Grissom went home to Los Molinos, Calif., to play three seasons of sandlot ball. His first year he pitched ball, Grissom won two and lost four with San Bernardino of the old class C California State league. Then the military came along to delay his baseball career.

Grissom spent single seasons with the Giants, Detroit, White Sox and the Red Sox—pitching with trips to the minors—before sticking with the Giants in 1933.

"This being able to play when you're not so hot is what I like. It's a real thing. There are a few that just happen to get the right break, or have the physical build."

Grissom claims his first ball hit his best pitch. He throws his curve six different ways and uses a screwball and changeup.

And with them all, he has control. The 6-foot, 7-inch 265-pounder pitched for six years in the 164 innings he pitched during the last two seasons.

Warning Note Is Sounded on Dog Licenses

Twin Falls dog owners were reminded Tuesday by City Clerk Constance J. Leiser that if their pets are not licensed by May 1, they will be fined \$100.

Mrs. Leiser noted that the ordinance passed by city commissioners last Nov. 18 requires all dogs "harbored or maintained in any city" to be licensed and renewed when they reach the age of 6 months.

Mrs. Leiser said 255 new licenses were issued up to Tuesday. She estimated there are approximately 1,000 dogs still to be licensed.

Violators of the ordinance are subject to a fine of not less than \$5 and no more than \$100.

A fee of \$4 is charged for a license for each male or spayed female and \$7 for each unspayed female.

The ordinance provides that the owner must register his name and address and the name, breed, color and sex of his dog. In addition, if a spayed female has not been registered before, a certificate must be presented from a veterinarian showing that the animal has been spayed.

For each dog, a veterinarian's certificate must show the dog has received an anti-rabies vaccination. The provisions of the ordinance are not intended to apply to dogs in the city temporarily not more than 30 days—such as "seeing eye" dogs when properly trained and in actual use.

Each dog owner will be issued a license certificate and metallic tag for each dog registered. The ordinance provides that the shape of the tag will be changed every year and have the year for which it was issued stamped upon it.

Every owner is required to provide a collar for each dog so that the tag can be affixed to the animal's collar and worn at all times. The ordinance requires that all dogs must be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian with anti-rabies vaccine by the time they are 6 months old and every two years thereafter on the date of the first vaccination, provided that the vaccine used is of the child-embryo type. Otherwise the dog must be inoculated annually.

A tag issued by the veterinarian will have the date stamped on it and also give the name of the pharmaceutical firm compounding the vaccine, according to the provisions of the ordinance. These tags must be displayed on the animal's collar.

Mrs. Leiser points out that no license can be issued by the city unless proof of the anti-rabies vaccination is displayed.

The deadline for getting new licenses is just about two weeks away. Mrs. Leiser noted, adding, "I would like to urge dog owners to obtain their licenses and avoid a last-minute rush."

New Test May Help Determine If Person Is Cancer-Immune

PHILADELPHIA, April 15 (AP)—A fatty substance isolated from human cancer cells possibly may help in developing a test to determine if a person is immune from cancer.

Such a test is not yet in sight, Dr. Maurice M. Rappoport of the Sloan-Kettering Institute of New York City said today.

All told, some 7,000 of the nation's top medical researchers will hear 2,100 scientific papers on such topics as cancer, heart disease, tranquilizing drugs, and vitamins.

Dr. Rappoport, together with three other Sloan-Kettering scientists, reported that the specific problem is finding "antibodies against cancer cells that would be useful in cancer diagnosis."

Antibodies are the substances manufactured by the body as a defense against foreign matter.

Dr. L. B. Peit of Ottawa, chief of the nutrition division of the Canadian national health and welfare department, told the American Institute of Nutrition it is incorrect to assume that Eskimos have extra fat on their bodies to protect them against the arctic cold.

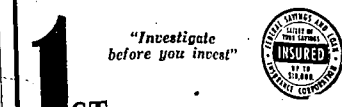

Powerful New Pain Killer Now Gets Test on Humans, Animals

SAN FRANCISCO, April 16 (U. P.)—A drug 100 times stronger than morphine in pain-killing ability has been produced in the laboratory and is being tested on humans and animals. It offers chemists an opening to develop a new line of better as well as stronger pain killers. The drug is called piperidine, but it has to go through several chemical changes before it can be used on humans and animals. A group of scientists from Los Alamos, N. M., cradle of the atom bomb, told how the contamination of growing plants from radioactive fallout might be reduced. This report was presented to the meeting by Dr. Eric B. 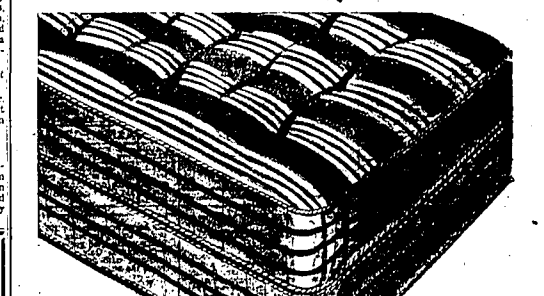
