### Bridges Avers Recession Bill Displeases Ike

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—Sen. Frank Bridges, R. N. H., warned congressional Democrats today a possible veto unless it is watered down before it reaches the White House.

Bridges, chairman of the senate Republican policy committee, vetoed the measure passed by a 60-39 vote last night and sent it to the house. The bill would provide a billion dollars in 3 1/2 per cent loans to communities for public works projects, a house committee has been holding hearings on a similar measure which would provide two billion dollars in loans.

"I do not know if that bill goes through in its present (senate) form it might well be subject to a veto," Bridges told reporters. At a White House conference, Bridges has heard administration leaders discuss the bill and others in the executive package being pushed by Democrats.

President Eisenhower warned publicly against going too far, too fast with "massive" public works programs and other big spending plans. The President reiterated at his news conference yesterday that he was concerned about "uncoordinated and unwise operations" which would cost billions of dollars and "unnecessarily" aiding the economy. "Let's try to be reasonable," the President said. "Let's try to use the same common sense and not just give a Sputnik attitude about everything."

A "LITTLE" MISTAKE. The catalogue of mistakes a driver can make on the open road is long. Some are as rash only the wildest ever make them.

One of the most dangerous in the casual category is swinging onto a main highway from a side road or a roadside stop at an ill-judged moment.

In Baytown, Tex., that happened the other day with terrible result. The driver of a Cadillac whipped onto a main artery smack in front of a big gasoline truck.

Out off, the gasoline truck jammed on his brakes, causing his tank to crackle and jackknifed sideways across the road.

Behind the truck drove a woman with her four children. She, too, hit the brakes pedal hard. But she couldn't stop, and plowed broadside into the truck.

The gasoline exploded, the truck swayed and toppled onto her car. The woman, her four children and the truck driver died in raging flames.

Probably unaware of what happened, the driver of the Cadillac drove off the road. On his return, he rests the responsibility of this tragedy.

It occurred because that driver, like countless others, either was too thoughtless and impatient to observe the rules or never learned how to enter a main highway.

The rules are simple, rooted in common sense. You never split out directly in front of an oncoming car. You wait for a space big enough for you to slip into without forcing the next car on the road to reduce his speed sharply.

But such measurements are the very heart of good driving. If you can't make them, any highway is a death trap for you and all the others you might involve.

To be responsible for a highway death and know it is very bad. To be responsible and not know it is almost worse.

### Heart Ailment Takes Life of Senator Scott

BURLINGTON, N. C., April 17 (AP)—A tough-talking Sen. W. Kerr Scott, whose campaign to get North Carolina farmers out of the mud made him the state's most powerful politician, died suddenly yesterday of complications from a heart attack.

The "scowle of Haw River," who would have celebrated his 62nd birthday today, died at 4:35 p. m. in Alamance General hospital about 15 miles from his rural plantation at Haw River.

Scott, who had a recent medical history of hypertension but no previous heart trouble, was hospitalized April 9 with a coronary thrombosis. He had been making "astounding progress" toward recovery when death came without warning.

An autopsy performed last night showed that death was caused by a blood clot in the coronary artery which ruptured the damaged part of the heart. Doctors described it as an "unpredictable complication" which occurs in a limited number of heart cases.

Scott's successor will be named by Democratic Gov. Luther H. Hodges, the man most frequently mentioned as a possible opponent for Scott in 1960. Hodges is expected to act quickly to fill the vacancy which leaves the Democrats with only a one-vote margin, 48-47, in the senatorial election.

The governor's appointee will serve only until December and the remainder of Scott's term, which expires Jan. 1, 1961, will be filled at the November general election.

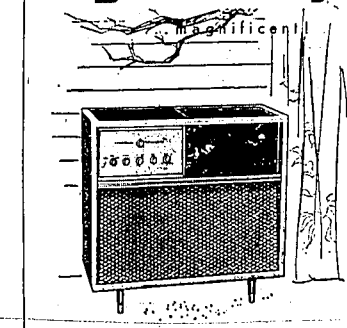

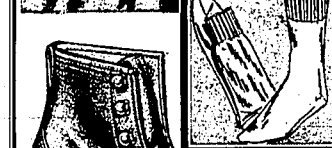

Twin Falls Rotarians were urged Wednesday to check the interest of a federal act at the state and general level, with special reference to pending legislation concerning the interstate commerce commission.

Addressing local club members following the weekly luncheon at American Legion hall, Ken Hartzer, representative Idaho Motor Transporters' association, said, "There is legislation pending which will adversely affect the ICC and eventually every member in this room."

Hartzer claims that the railroads are clamoring for the enactment of legislation which if enacted will bring about a radical and dangerous change in the motor transportation regulatory policy and process.

The danger to land and barge transportation is made evident by proposals made by the railroad in the rule of rate making in the interstate commerce act.

Hartzer asserted the railroads endorsed a recommendation reading: "In the terms of its power to control the rate of carriers subject to interstate commerce act, the commission shall consider the traffic of any other mode of transportation . . . or whether such rate are necessary to meet the competition of any other mode of transportation."

The speaker pointed out that such legislation had not been enacted but warned that trucks in the country must be on guard against such proposals.

The secretary would designate the site of the units "necessary for the support of an average-sized family at a suitably profitable level on that project . . . or any part of it compatible with the maintenance of irrigated agriculture as a component of a sound and stable society."

Barrett's bill larger farms would be authorized by the secretary.

Barrett doubts whether many projects could be built in mountainous states like Wyoming with the 160-acre limitation in effect. His bill would permit a man and wife to settle on two of the enlarged units.

He concedes there will be opposition, but he says the National Reclamation Association has approved his bill and he hopes the interior and agriculture departments will follow suit.

Secretaries of both departments have been invited to testify at the hearing to be held by the subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation.

# Industries Using Stage Shows To Make Sales in Recession

CHICAGO, April 17 (AP)—Industries are dabbling on the grease point and striking up the band.

They're hitting the road with full dress musical shows designed to inspire their salesmen to boost sales during the recession.

The productions have musicals, variety, comedy dance numbers and comedy acts.

They have girls, too.

But these definitely are no "gittle shows" for the pleasure of visiting firemen, Jack Rheinstrom, spokesman for one producer of industrial stage shows (Wilding Productions) said today.

Every show has a real, serious message, Rheinstrom said, and it adds up to: "Sell, sell, sell."

In one show now on the road, for example, a petite brunette dressed like a Salvation Army drummer beats a drum while another pretty girl emerges from a trap into a dazzling, figure-revealing costume and symbolically to victory over the recession.

Rheinstrom estimated that businessmen will pay out 10 million dollars this year for at least 100 major industrial shows. That's 20 per cent more than the record eight million dollars spent last year for such shows.

He attributed the increase to industrial firm's search for an anti-recession weapon.

Standard Oil, John Deere and Company, Libby-Owens-Ford, The-

dore Hamm Brewing company and Overhead Door company of Chicago are among the companies that already have put shows on the road in 1958, Rheinstrom said.

Despite the fact that industries pay from \$5,000 to as much as \$1,000,000 for the shows, Rheinstrom said, the public never sees them.

"They're seen only at conventions and sales meetings," he said, "and are strictly for the eyes and ears of America's key salespeople."

"One new in preparation will be seen by select audiences in virtually every major city and will cost approximately \$1,000,000," Rheinstrom said.

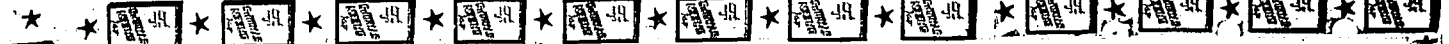

# 2 Solons Split On Ike's Veto Of Water Bill

WASHINGTON, April 17 (Special) — The Idaho representatives in the House split on the White House veto of the Rivers and Harbor Bill Tuesday. Republican James Hodge said the President's action was a "good thing" while the New York Democrat, "was disappointed."

Both representatives voiced their concern for the water rights question, which would have overridden the veto of the section 206 which would grant the corps of engineers new authority to supplement low water flows. The section changes most traditional state water law safeguards.

"It had better be sure where it is going with respect to water rights rather than grieves our Bureau," Hodge said. "The Bureau's project would have been authorized for preliminary work under the vetoed bill."

Mrs. Priest said she felt the safeguards for water rights in the bill were not adequately provided for, not that it is a different question, she added, saying she would join a veto to reverse the President's action.

Mrs. Priest said she was not tired to get separate bills in respect to the project through congress, as suggested by the President in his veto message.

"The bill grew in Washington that a 'clean bill' without any of the sections attached to each project would have a good chance of being passed this session. Sen. William F. Knowland, Republican, California, would like to see such a move. Knowland may join in support, if the chances of passing the bill are good, Representative Hodge said.

Representative Hodge said he would support a veto if all of section 206 were deleted.

Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, would not comment on the veto by Mr. Eisenhower. He said he could not be reached for comment.

# "Too Little, Too Late," Says Educator Of Foreign Language Study in Idaho

...possessing a superior foundation in English and the other basic subjects. Instruction in it should be continued to mastery in high school and college. At least toward foreign languages in Idaho are encouraged. The new fifth grade French and Spanish in two of the Pocatello elementary schools and the recently approved "out-track" program, which provides for a high standard, technical, academic and high honors curricula.

This program recognizes that there is a qualitative difference in students, and it requires three years of a foreign language in the academic and four years in the high honors curricula beginning in the ninth grade.

The elementary and high school foreign language programs need to be coordinated for greater effectiveness. The aim of such academic programs must be the mastery of the foreign language, not merely the memorizing of a pitiful smattering of grammar and vocabulary.

Such a program must be based on understanding, speaking, reading and writing the foreign tongue. The student's attainment must be checked by rigid entrance and comprehensive examinations during the high school and college years.

It is instructive to note briefly the language requirements in certain other countries. Of those students going to the university, West German schools require nine years of English or French with seven years of a second foreign language. The university-bound student in France, French schools require seven years of English or German beginning at age 11. In Japan, 77 per cent of the students in grades seven through nine study English; 96 per cent of those in grade 10 through 12; and practically 100 per cent of the students at the university level. The Soviet Union, where some 80 languages besides Russian are used for instruction, requires a functional knowledge of English as the first foreign language in the schools of the linguistic minorities not later than the second grade, and in all schools of the university-bound, six years of English, French or German.

Why this inattention on the study of foreign languages in other nations? The answer is obvious: those nations want trained people who can read the scientific journals, the newspapers, and the literature of the major languages; and scholars who can correspond with colleagues in their fields, and whenever possible speak directly with these colleagues in scientific and other learned congresses.

The United States can no longer afford to be the linguistic illiterate among the major powers. All this emphasizes the imperative need to develop here in Idaho and in the nation a corps of well qualified foreign language teachers. And, for them to operate effectively, they must have pupils well grounded in their own language and culture so that they can successfully take on a new language.

A demand truly qualified teachers. Nothing can be done to improve the situation without well qualified teachers. By qualified teachers we mean those with a balanced academic background in the basic disciplines: Their own English language and literature, mathematics, the sciences, history and geography; that is to say teachers with a deep knowledge of their own culture and of the past and a more than vague knowledge of the major world cultures and their past.

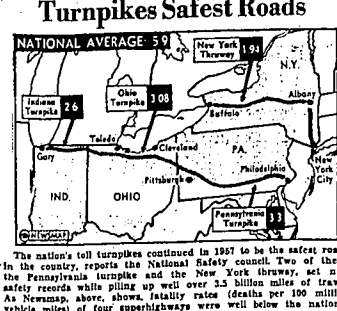
As to specific qualifications for the language teacher, it might not be amiss to consider the minimal requirements drawn up by the Modern Language Association of America: Teachers who understand, speak, read, and write the language well; who have a superior grasp of the language's grammar and of the culture associated with it. Moreover, the training of those who are to teach foreign languages should be the hands of selected members of the foreign language

departments of the state's teacher training schools.

A recent New York Times release points out our great inadequacy on the diplomatic front where, for example, in the sensitive Iron Curtain embassies, we have only one ambassador speaking the language of the country. This lack of linguistic training each day is a major problem in other fields.

According to United Nations statistics, 13 languages have at least 80 million speakers each. Chinese, English, Hindi, Russian, Spanish, French, Malay, Bengali, Arabic, Portuguese and Italian. Even the names of some of these are scarcely known in this country. What better list of basic languages to be taught on the college level could be prepared than this?

And on the elementary and high school level Russian should surely be offered along with the quite limited list of languages now taught. As Newsday, above, shows (fatally late vehicle miles) of four superhighways were well below the national mark.



# Russia Planning Large Cyclotron

VIENNA, April 17 (AP) — Russia, already in possession of the largest cyclotron in the world, is planning a new one with a capacity of 50 million volts, W. Sterling Cole of the United States said last night.

Cole, general director of the International Atomic Energy agency, had just returned from an official visit to Russia. While there, he saw the present largest cyclotron—seven million volts—being used for treating an atomic power for peaceful use. Cole's headquarters are in Vienna.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 17 (AP) — The state legislator and Gov. Averell Harriman have come to the aid of an absent-minded professor.

Officials said the inoculation drive is unable to keep pace with the spread of the disease in densely populated areas, due mainly to the shortage of water. Many of the victims had drunk unfiltered water which supplements the city's filtered water supply. While usually cholera is limited to slum areas, this year it has spread to the middle-class groups.

### Murray Avers Funds Needed For Park Plan

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—An additional \$1 million dollars is needed to keep most phases of the Mission 66 program on schedule, says Senator Murray, D-Mont.

The program is the national park service's long-range plan to expand and improve the nation's parks.

Murray, chairman of the senate interior committee, says the program may never be completed unless the funds are not substantially increased above administration requests.

He said yesterday that the program is jeopardized because of what he termed inadequate requests for money by the Eisenhower administration. Instead, he said, the administration reduced appropriation requests of the park service for the year beginning July 1.

"It will take an additional 13 million dollars to keep on schedule the mission 66 program for camp grounds, buildings and facilities, and additional 9 million will be needed to keep road construction on schedule," said Murray.

"Furthermore, funds needed for management and operations have been cut by about a million. By slashing the budget requests for the NPS, the administration broke faith with congress, which has given warm support to Mission 66."

"The very existence of a recession should call for a program ahead of last year's level," he continued.

"Additionally, there has been an 11 per cent increase in the park use in the last two years. More than 60 million Americans have visited our parks last year and the number is growing."

"It will grow only if we can maintain these parks and equip them to handle our expanding population."

### Earthquake Jolts Japanese Region

The earthquake, which hit at 8:35 p. m. (4:25 a. m. MST) was centered in the ocean off Fukushima prefecture at a depth estimated at 24.94 miles, according to Japanese seismologists.

In the Tokyo area, the quake registered an intensity of two (weak) on the same scale.

# 17 PLAYERS ASSIGNED TO COWBOY ROSTER FOR 1958 SEASON

## Squad to Leave for Magic Valley Saturday; Opener Set With Boise on Monday

MESA, Ariz., April 17—Roster for the Magic Valley entry in the Pioneer league was filled late Wednesday night by the Chicago Cub parent organization and will include nine rookies. Announcement of the 17-man roster was made by Gene Lawing, Cub farm director. The Cowboys, which include six men who have worn Magic Valley livery before, will leave here Saturday morning and are expected to arrive at Twin Falls Jostin field about 7:00 p.m. The team opens at home Monday against the Boise Braves.

Manager Richard (Dick) Wilson reported he was "well-satisfied with the club, especially the signing of left-hander Tomlin and outfielder Ken Fisher to his squad."

Wilson, a rookie, is expected to be the ace for the Magic Valley pitching staff as he has shown up in the spring drills. In addition, four other rookies will be included on the coast. These are Joe Johnson, an infielder from Portland in the Pacific Coast league; Walter Thorne, who saw limited action in the Pacific Coast last year; and a brief appearance in Twin Falls, and Lee Price.

The other two each have one year's experience behind them and both began last season with Magic Valley. The first is left-hander Jim Powers, who completed the season in the Pioneer league at Bakersfield of the California league after a short stay in Twin Falls, rounds out the staff.

At fielding positions, the Cowboys will have the same last name but spelled differently. They are Ken Fisher and Ken Fisher, who are Ken Fisher and Ken Fisher. As an extra tongue-twister, one of the catchers is Jerry Fisher.

Starting out at catcher position possibly will be Ken Fisher. He is dinged by Bakersfield last year, and hit .271 in a bright spring training. Backing up Fisher will be Frank Piro, a one-year man who hit .270 with Pulaski and Lafayette in 1957.

In reviewing the lineup, Lawing said "it is not a bad club. A young club that will get better than the team Magic Valley had at the first of last season. And he added, "we will have more money available than last year to reinforce the weak spots."

MANILA, April 17 (AP)—President Garcia today gave his approval for the establishment of United States nuclear missile bases in the Philippines.

In an exclusive interview with the United Press he said the Philippines was ready and willing to face the wrath of the communists if such bases were set up.

"If missiles are needed for the defense of this area, I think some agreement can be worked out," Garcia said.

The wrath of the communists, the Philippines are firmly allied with the United States and the free world.

During the hour-long interview, Garcia also said there is plenty of room for improvement in the use of American energy in the struggle with communism in this area. He said specifically that the United States should "define her policy in regard to the Indonesian situation as the leader of the free world bloc."

"I had hoped to obtain about 200 million dollars in development loans during his June visit to the United States, but the strengthening of the economy of this country and make the Philippines an effective democracy," he said.

"Success in the Philippines will be reflected in neighboring Asian nations."

Said Communist China had launched a campaign of economic subversion in the Philippines, using large-scale smuggling from Hong Kong into the southern Philippine islands. He thought, however, that the numerous and economically powerful overseas Chinese remained firmly anti-communist and for the most part supported the Nationalist Chinese government.

Commenting on his scheduled trip to the United States in June, Garcia said:

"Philippines-American relations since independence have been close. I do not mean there have been no disagreements but we have not allowed these disagreements to hurt our relations."

"The U. S. was most generous in aid for the great reconstruction program. It is to the best Philippine interest that these ties of friendship continue."

"For the present time loans would be the best thing the U. S. could do for us to help us to help ourselves give us assistance so that we can use our own tools to strengthen our economy. Any success here will reflect in neighboring Asian countries."

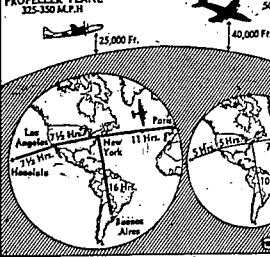

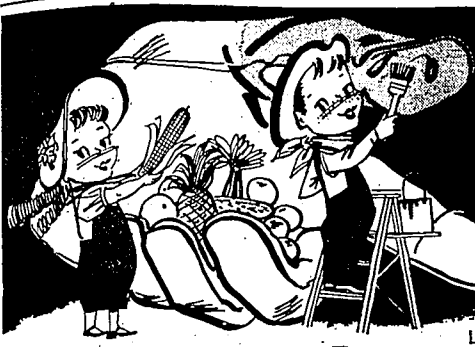

### Nasser Wants Way to Better U.S. Relations

CADDO, April 17 (AP)—President Nasser seems to want better relations with the United States, but there is a definite limit to the price he is willing to pay. Signs of a general improvement in relations are noted, but seasoned observers caution against hope for a dramatic solution to problems between the two countries. "Improvement" is being gradually achieved as a result of steady hard work by both sides, not with dramatic abruptness," one qualified source said. "Excessive optimism in Washington could even damage relations a bit by making Nasser think he already has taken him for granted."

So far, most optimism has originated in Washington. The reaction already has largely confined to publishing Washington reports of improved relations and a percentage easing of anti-American propaganda in Nasser's press and radio. J. S. Ezratty, Nasser's representative in the United States, said Nasser's hopes of better relations are high. He said Nasser has big plans for the Aswan dam project. Nasser rejected by nationalizing the Suez canal. The reaction in the United States rose in the wake of the Suez canal. Nasser's grasp of the situation with the United States, he said, is leading to stopping the attack, it kept the freeze on 30 million dollars in Egyptian government assets and led to the release of nearly all forms of economic aid. Dulles said Thursday the freeze would be lifted if Nasser came to terms on compensating the stockholders of the old Suez Canal company.

Observers here concede that Nasser would like improved relations with the West for these reasons: 1. Nasser probably has gone as far with the Russians as he can without alienating his policy of so-called positive neutrality. If he goes much farther he risks becoming a satellite.

2. Before going to Moscow on an official visit next week, he would like relations with the West improved so he can then bargain his position with the Russians.

3. Egypt needs an agreement with the West on the Suez canal compensation to pave the way for necessary loans to expand and improve the canal.

### Food Stamp Plan On Surplus Eyed

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—The growing level of unemployment is prompting a drive in Congress Wednesday for a food stamp plan of distributing surplus commodities to the needy. At hearings by a house agriculture subcommittee, Representative Sullivan, D. Mo., called the present method of surplus disposal from warehouse depots "a monstrous fraud on the needy" through "hit-and-miss dumping."

Representative Griffiths, D. Mich., said that while the government is spending billions on farm programs every year, "it is past the point of question" that thousands of people are hungry in Michigan and elsewhere.

"By failure of the secretary of agriculture to approve one of these food stamp programs, he is endangering the administration's foreign aid and trade program," she said.

Mrs. Sullivan and Mrs. Griffiths are among authors of more than a dozen food stamp bills before the subcommittee.

## X-Rays From Radium Watch Dial Might Harm Future Races More Than Fallout

NEW YORK, April 17 (AP)—Fallout is presumably dooming some of tomorrow's children to disease or death.

But then so are radium-dial wrist watches that glow in the dark.

In fact, X-rays from the watch could be many times more dangerous to your descendants than fallout.

Fallout frightens and causes moral concern primarily because of the hereditary damage it is, will, or might be causing.

Scientists disagree on the extent of this risk because so little is known directly about the effects of radiation on human heredity. They have to guess from studies of fruit flies, plants and small animals, which become and are passed on to the next generation.

One expert guesses that natural radioactivity is causing about 10 percent of all changes in human genes, the carriers of hereditary traits.

Most—but not all—geneticists think any dose of radiation, however small, adds to this risk of genetic damage, especially if it is continued long enough.

So therefore fallout would be producing some genetic damage.

Some scientists say the addition is practically imperceptible. Others say that in time, fallout means hundreds of thousands of infants will be lost in miscarriages, or are doomed to be sickly, feeble, or short-lived.

No one can prove he is right. Continuing and intensified studies of radiation will produce the facts.

Atomic energy commission experts say the added risk of genetic damage from fallout is not as great as the added risk of moving from a wood house to a brick or stone house. Reason: The brick or stone house exposes you to increased natural radioactivity, an increase greater than average exposure from fallout.

One AEC scientist calculates the average radium-dial wrist watch exposes the wearer's sex glands to about twice the radiation he gets from natural sources. X-rays from the watch hit the glands when his arm is at his side.

Other scientists think the AEC is estimating the effects of fallout far too low. And they say fallout is not evenly distributed, so some persons are getting a heavier dose than average.

Some also argue that radioactive strontium 90, which accumulates in bones, will cause thousands of cases of leukemia and bone cancer.

AEC spokesmen say there's no proof for this. They report one amount of strontium found in children's bones so far is about one one-hundredth the amount considered a very safe dose.

Many argue a moral issue. You don't have to wear a wrist watch, they point out. But you can't avoid fallout drifting down upon you from somebody testing bombs.

They say we have no right to expose others to any risk.

Another point which some make is: Suppose fallout dumps only 1,000 children the world over. That

### U. S. Receives 200 Proposals For Shooting Man Into Space

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—The house space committee heard testimony Wednesday that the government has received 200 proposals for putting a man into space.

Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, director of the national advisory committee for aeronautics, said proposals from various groups ranged from "floating" a man into space to orbiting him around the Earth several times.

Dryden gave the figure after he and Lieut. Gen. Donald L. Putt, air force chief of development, were asked for comment on an army proposal, revealed yesterday to fire a man 150 miles up with a redstone missile.

President Eisenhower told his news conference he would not approve any project for putting man into space unless his scientific advisory committee found it to be useful and necessary.

He made the comment when a reporter noted that an army witness had protested to a congressional committee that the Pentagon was withholding approval of a manned rocket flight. The President evoked a big laugh by asking the reporter if he would volunteer for the space trip. The reporter begged off, saying the army already had plenty of volunteers.

Under the army's redstone plan the "space" man would be protected by a sealed capsule and, after a 10-minute dash, would fall into the ocean and be fished out alive.

Putt called this "just a ballistics ride." He said the air force has a program "somewhat similar to that."

### Billy Graham to Open 6-Week Cow Palace Crusade April 27

**SAN FRANCISCO, April 17**—Evangelist Billy Graham opens a six-week crusade in the Cow Palace April 27. Advance preparations already have reached a high pitch throughout the bay area.

Statistically, the San Francisco revival will be overshadowed by Chicago's 10-week crusade in the New York's Madison Square garden last year when more than two million persons attended and 45,000 made decisions for Christianity.

The Cow Palace will seat 16,500, about 2,500 fewer than Madison Square garden, and the crusade can be extended at most to eight weeks. But in other respects the San Francisco effort may surpass the New York crusade.

The Rev. Walter Smith, crusade director, reports that 1,100 churches of many Protestant denominations have promised cooperation, compared with only 600 in New York at this same juncture. Since March 10, 4,500 persons have been taking conductor training to assist the drive, Charles Riggs, director of training, says this evening.

Mrs. Marie Dimmick charged her husband with cruelty. She asks the court to award her attorney's fees.

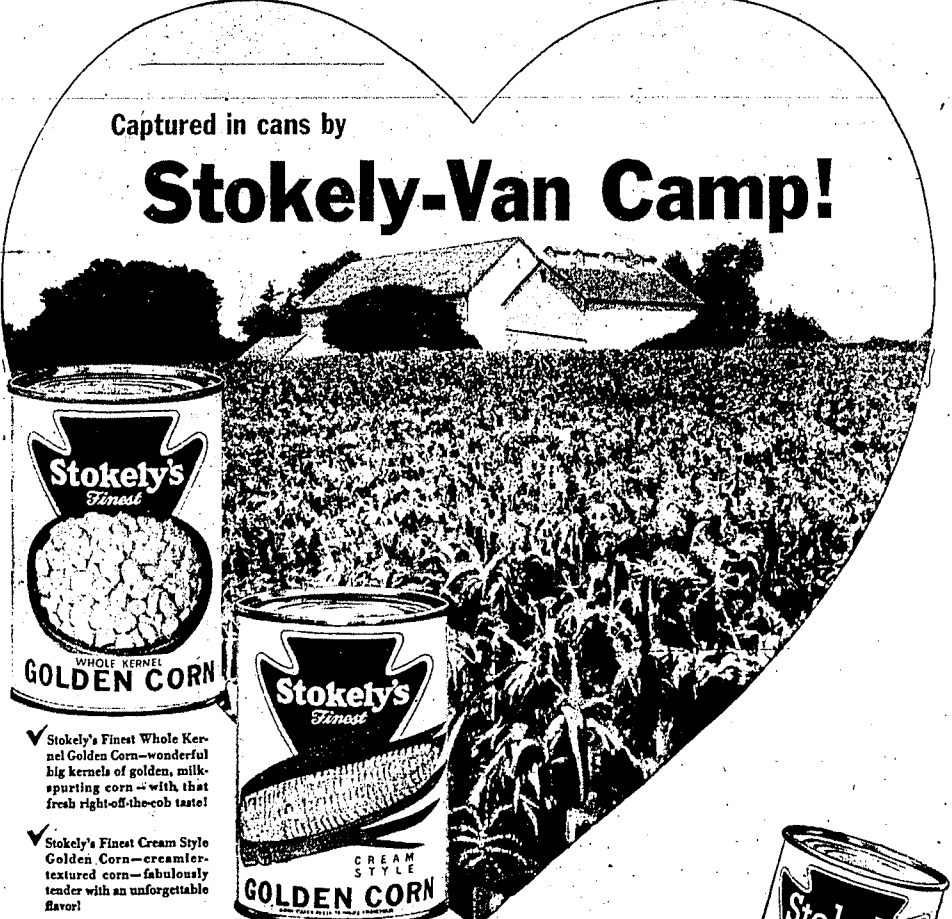

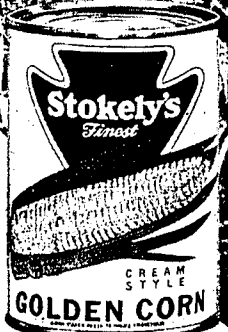
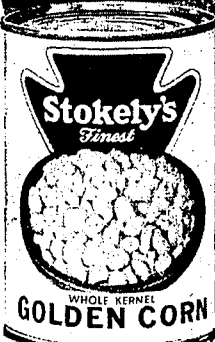
