Fryers, Steak Are Best Bets In Food Lines

Fryers and steaks—two good ways to meet husbands' hearts—were the best bets for bargain-hunting housewives this week.
Prying chickens are 2 to 6 cents a pound cheaper this week in widespread areas, although higher in some places.
Steaks are featured even though beef prices in general are still comparatively high. The nation's most popular meat is expected to get cheaper in the next few weeks, with the advent of warmer weather.
In addition, markets of fresh cattle—which are favored for steaks—are expected to expand last year's offerings during the spring.

Pork Cheaper
Pork chops—down 14 to 18 cents a pound in a few sections—and veal chops, off 5 to 10 cents a pound, will be the No. 1 attraction in some stores. Veal chops are still fairly good, however, with a going price of \$1.05 a pound in one chain store in New York metropolitan area.

Some housewives, possibly pincered by the recession, apparently are turning to baked beans as a main dish. Pea beans, a favorite for "boiling," are wholesaling for 49.50 a bushel, compared with 52.50 a year ago. Smaller production also has helped increase prices.

Good Vegetable Deals
Good vegetable buys this week include broccoli, lettuce, cabbage, and such other greens. "Green" peas, as broccoli, kale and mustard greens also are plentiful now, and reasons for the good deals are still fairly good. Mushrooms also are reported a little lower this week.

The first green onions from eastern growing areas are starting to arrive, supplementing the big supply of Texas green onions. They are now in the market and are headed upward in price temporarily, due to rain in southern sections. They are a favorite of the vegetable which were hard hit by frosts in the winter and spring. They are being sold at fairly high prices. Three include: squash, beans, cucumber, and eggplant.
Apples from both western and eastern orchards are plentiful and in vegetable displays, but produce men say prices and quality vary widely. Pineapples from Puerto Rico and Cuba are generally at attractive levels, and some Mexican cantaloupes are lower in price than usual.
Peanut butter is being sold at the market from California, Florida, Louisiana and Texas. Produce men say they are still on the high side of a good buy.

TRUMP FOR REALISM
The American people are more or less familiar with the Committee for Economic Development, an organization of 150 business executives and scholars working together to promote stable economic growth.

It was a rather startling announcement when the CED made its recent anti-recession recommendation for a 20 per cent increase in individual income taxes...

Speaking before the Society of Business Magazine Editors at Washington last week, Howard C. Petersen, chairman of the subcommittee on fiscal, monetary and debt management policy of the CED, made the following significant observation:

"Twenty-six years ago, near the bottom of our worst depression, a Democratic congress and Republican president agreed to increase taxes in an effort to reduce a prospective budget deficit in the early stages of an incomparably less serious recession, and facing a budget deficit in excess of 5 billion dollars, the whole nation is considering tax reduction to help arrest and reverse the economic decline. How can the CED have turned its back on the policy of the CED, made the following significant observation:

"In proposing a tax cut, the CED makes special emphasis on the point that it should be temporary for the duration of the recession only. A suggested termination date is March 31, 1959, so it would come at a time when congress would be able to consider what to do about it.

"The purpose of cutting taxes at present, as the CED sees it, is to leave more money in people's hands, with the expectation that if they have more they will spend more. If more is spent for goods and services, more goods and services will be produced and more people will be employed producing them."

"No one is more conscious of the value of permanent tax reduction than is the CED. But, as the committee points out, unless one thinks that recession is the normal state of the American economy, it is irresponsible to recommend a permanent reduction in the yield of the federal tax system in the face of a rising trend of necessary government expenditures.

"In a real sense we cannot, under these conditions, afford permanent reduction," says the CED. "If we cannot give ourselves tax reduction; we must earn it by restraining government expenditures and by increasing the nation's output. It is only the temporary condition of recession that enables us, temporarily, to give ourselves tax reduction that is not inflationary.

Idaho Voters Will Have Opportunity To Enact Eight Measures on Nov. 4

BOISE, April 18 (AP)—Idahoans may get their ninth chance in a quarter of a century this year to act as lawmakers.

Records of Secretary of State James H. Young show that eight measures have reached the election ballot since the initiative procedure was set up by the 1923 legislature.

Only three passed and only two are still on the books.

Now, backers of a proposed "right to work" law are gathering signatures on petitions asking for an initiative shutoff in the general election Nov. 4.

Petitions requesting an initiative may be signed by 10 per cent of those voting for governor in the previous election, in order to put a measure on the ballot.

A simple majority of voters is needed to convert the proposal into law. A failed signature is grounds for felony action.

The machinery had its first test in 1928. Idahoans approved by a 2-to-1 majority the law that created the state flat and game commission.

Today's Idaho law books show only one other statute put there by initiative vote. A 4-to-1 endorsement enacted the dredge mining act in 1924. This law is designed to regulate operation of mineral dredges on streams.

The third law, which passed but expired in the legislature, was known as the senior citizens grant act.

It would have given \$40 monthly to people over 65 to purchase medical, dental and optical care, artificial limbs, eyes and other needed appliances.

Idahoans passed the law, 9 to 1, in 1942. In the same election they elected the senators and representatives who a few months later, repealed it.

The supreme court upheld the legislature's right to repeal a law passed by the voters. The court ruled a successful initiative had "equal footing" with a legislative action.

The voters doomed five other initiatives. All had a common aim: moral reform.

In 1940 Idaho voters rejected two initiatives. One would have given the counties the option on whether to allow possession and purchase of liquor. The other, known as the Idaho sobriety act, would have restricted purchase and advertising of liquor by the drink.

Anti-liquor forces gathered some support from public concern over wartime hoarding and tried again in 1946 with initiatives on the Idaho sobriety act, the anti-sampling act, and the local option prohibition act. All three failed.

Backers of reform took their next effort of the legislature. The 1947 session enacted the comprehensive liquor control act. Still in effect today, the law provides that liquor can be sold from a bottle only under licenses issued by incorporated municipalities.

The Idaho Freedom to Work committee is sponsoring the initiative campaign for which petitions are being circulated in many parts of the state. The petitions must collect a minimum of 22,888 signatures this year. Committee Secretary Fred J. Smith of Boise said last summer the organization was aiming for up to 200,000 names.

Petitions must be filed by July 4. The committee's bill bans labor contracts which require union membership as a condition of employment. Labor groups have attacked the measure on grounds it would place them at a disadvantage in collective bargaining and in organizing unions. It would outlaw the "union shop."

Proponents say the bill would insure freedom of choice for the worker. They contend unions would be stronger and more democratic if membership were entirely voluntary.

The current initiative campaign began after a strong but unsuccessful fight in the 1927 legislature to enact a similar bill. The measure passed in the Republican-dominated house of representatives, but was killed by the Democratic-led state senate.

Supervisor Says Parks Show Efforts of Dedicated People

BOISE, April 18 (AP)—The man who supervised Glacier National park in Montana for 14 years has looked over Idaho's state parks and recreational areas and said they reflect the efforts of dedicated people.

John Emmert, who prefers to be called Jack, has been on his new job as director of the state land department's division of parks and recreational services, for four days.

But, he said yesterday, he didn't wait for his official welcome to the new post to inspect the state's 25 parks and recreational areas. He has been on the so-called State Land and Recreation Commission since last summer, a week before taking state facilities in north Idaho and southwestern Idaho.

"I haven't been on the job long enough to say what should or should be done," he said. "But I was surprised to see what facilities are already available. I thought that when I was in the national park service that we had dedicated people. Well, so has Idaho."

He paid tribute especially to A. A. Stokson and Lester Tovey, who have been in charge of field work in the south and north of Idaho respectively.

"They have done fine work and I am sure they have demonstrated in their work to be completely called by Idaho people to must feel for what they have accomplished in developing and maintaining the state's parks and recreational areas."

The other divorce was granted to Mrs. Violet Fern Hill from Rudolph Hill on grounds of extreme cruelty. They were married Nov. 15, 1934. They have a minor child who was awarded the mother. She was represented by May and May, Twin Falls attorneys.
