Air Force Abandons Hunt For Top-Secret Nose Cone Taken Skyward by Missile

Missing Airman Is Safe, but Wife Injury Reported

State's Big Court Decision Assessing Principle Is

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., April 24 (AP)—The air force abandoned search today for a top-secret missile nose cone hurled skyward in an attempt to solve the problem of reentry from space. In an official statement, the air force said efforts to recover the nose cone which was blasted aloft here Wednesday night "have been discontinued." The heavily classified cone was designed to protect the warheads of ballistic missiles from the friction heat of the Earth's atmosphere.

This means it will be the longest flight any American ballistic missile has yet attained. It requires only a few minutes to reach the way to the Ascension Island area off the African coast.

Spud Futures Trade Policy Held Harmful

BOISE, April 24 (AP)—Robert Reichen, Idaho commissioner of agriculture, has asserted that fluctuations in futures trading in potatoes "do not follow the law of supply and demand."

In a message addressed to "all segments of the potato industry in Idaho," Reichen said:

"I feel that the futures trading of Idaho potatoes in the New York mercantile has harmed the Idaho potato grower."

"Fluctuations in the futures trade do not follow the law of supply and demand. It is a device to supply the normal daily usage yet to speculate on the price of the potato crop."

He noted that the house agriculture committee of the United States Senate has passed a bill to prohibit futures trading on potatoes.

Reichen, as chairman of the Idaho potato and onion commission, has urged members of the Idaho congressional delegation to bring the bill out of committee.

BOISE, April 24 (AP)—Balloting will begin next Monday on proposed changes in potato marketing agreements affecting growers in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon, the department of agriculture said yesterday.

BOISE, April 24 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court overthrew yesterday a principle upon which the state has assessed property taxes for the past 10 years.

The court said the so-called "price index" system of the state tax commission is unlawful. It directed reduction of tax payments on three apartment buildings in Postville owned by W. M. Farmer.

Farmer had protested the assessments, claiming a higher figure was set on his property than on other comparable property in the county. Bannock county commissioners, sitting on a board of equalization, upheld the assessment.

Farmer appealed to the state tax commission which affirmed the board of equalization's findings. The findings also was affirmed in district court.

The supreme court held, however, that the price index method is not a constitutionally valid method of assessing property taxes. It said the constitution requires that taxes be taxed uniformly.

The court also ruled that the Idaho tax commission uses a manual containing a price index showing the value of property improvements based on construction costs. It said the manual is a guide and control for assessors do not have to follow it.

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General Says War Danger Worse Daily

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, air force vice chief of staff, said today the threat of global atomic war is increasing "with every passing day."

LeMay, long-time commander of America's strategic bomber forces, said U. S. military forces are "in a day in and day out" in a "very good" shape for a general atomic war.

He outlined some of the new weapons being developed for the B-70 bomber which will go 2,000 miles an hour, and the "mini" ballistic missile which he said will have "startling potential."

There is no threat of nuclear security of the United States that can remotely compare with the ever present possibility of general war," he said.

Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, army chief of staff, told the publishers on the other hand, that the United States was "probably justified in assuming that neither side would voluntarily start a general atomic war."

He said "atomic parity" with both sides able to destroy each other brings about "mutual deterrents." As a result, Taylor said, the communists are more likely to start limited wars and nibbling aggressions to gain their end. He agreed on the need for powerful air forces, but said there should be "comparable" attention to plans for dealing with small wars.

Adm. H. D. Felt, vice chief of naval operations, said the free world would be in "very good" shape for a general war if it kept its reposit forces relatively invulnerable—chiefly by dispersing at sea advanced aircraft carriers and submarines.

Under a condition of "nuclear stalemate," Felt said, the communists are likely to turn to limited forms of armed conflict and the free world must be prepared to stamp out small wars quickly.

He said authorization "is a reflection of the trust imposed in the institution—a trust and confidence that this college has both the capacity and stature in management and organization its diversified program in the best, interest and highest sites on the campus, at least moment-

arily, adequately meet the demands of the unmarried students.

He said the most apparent need now was for laboratories and instructional facilities.

Buildings of the 206-man dormitory complex were dedicated in honor of the late John R. Dyer, head of the school, 1929-34; the late Emory A. Owen, Idaho Falls attorney and state board of education member; the late Ethel E. Hofffield, head of the 1952 education department, 1938-47; and Dr. John R. Nichols, Los Angeles, Calif., head of the college, 1937-47. Dr. Hofffield also was a state superintendent of public instruction.

Three four buildings bear the names of leaders in education who were first of all students, next teachers and last makers of educational policy," said Smylie. "Some of these who are or will be honored in these halls will follow the same pattern."

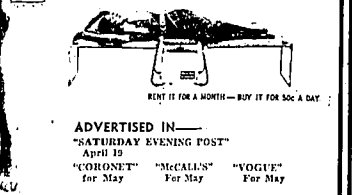

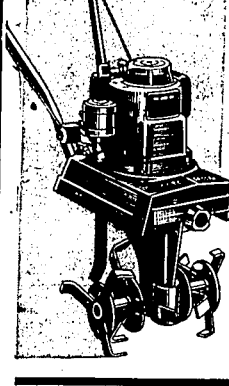

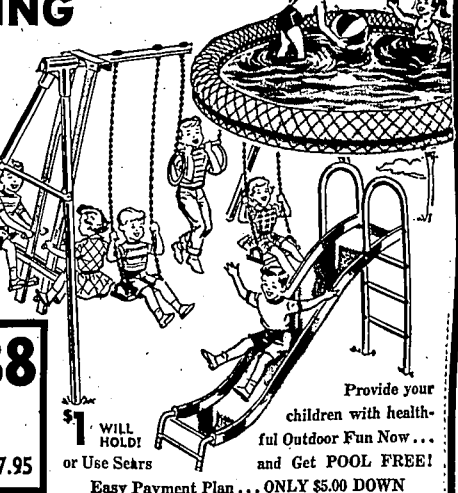

Britons Agree On Method of German Unity

LONDON, April 24 (AP)—Britain's Labor party agreed with the Conservative government to support the reunification of Germany through free elections to occur the first of May, and to abstain from both sides of the Iron curtain in central Europe.

A Labor-Conservative agreement on foreign policy issues was announced by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain last night, and approved by Labor's executive committee and the general council of the big Trade Union congress.

The statement provided British diplomacy with a solid foundation for possible summit talks negotiations.

The reunification of Germany and the Iron curtain are expected to be among the big topics at any summit conference.

Labor avoided committing itself to the communist-backed Raspecki plan of Poland for an armistice conference that pending any summit talks no steps should be taken on armistice with German forces with nuclear weapons.

Publishers Blast Attempts to Hold Up Official News

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—Secrets in government came under fire yesterday at the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

This was coupled with an attack on efforts to suppress news of the recession or other unfavorable events.

"When you cannot publish the news, because you cannot find out the news from your own field officials, it is censorship," said J. H. Steinhilber, Lancaster, Pa., publisher.

ANPA President William Dwight said no constructive and confident attack could be made upon the restriction by throwing and in the hands of the public eye or by asking it to bury its head like an ostrich.

Work in Forests Is Advocated for Delinquent Boys

BOISE, April 24 (AP)—The Idaho fish and game commission has been asked to put juvenile delinquents to work in Idaho forests. A north Idaho public judge says it would help rehabilitate the boys too.

"I have found that work therapy works very well," Judge Francis Slep of Sandpoint said in describing his experience with juvenile delinquents.

Judge Slep asked the commission yesterday to contribute at least \$300 to help pay the boys' expenses.

The youths would be assigned in groups of 10 to two-day work camps, under adult supervision, in various counties. Each boy would work eight hours a day.

"The request is very unusual but we will do our best to see if there is something we can do," Chairman Athol Johnson told the judge.

Foreign Trade's Effect on Idaho To Be Reported

NAPPA, April 24 (AP)—The U. S. department of commerce has agreed to prepare a report on the economic effects of foreign trade in Idaho, the state league of women voters announced yesterday.

Mrs. James R. Gunderson, president of the league, said Idaho's congressional delegation asked for such a study at the request of the league.

She said the league made the request after holding an office by Commerce Secretary Weeks to prepare for any congressman a report showing effects of exports and imports in his district.

"Idaho exports many agricultural products and it is hoped the requested studies will reveal exact figures on the total Idaho foreign trade picture," Mrs. Gunderson said.

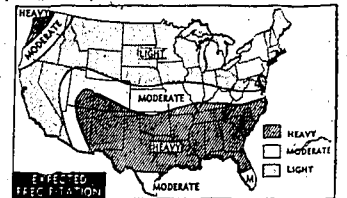

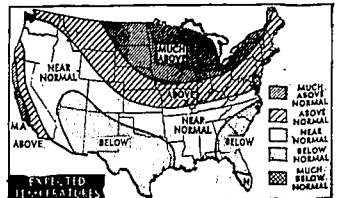

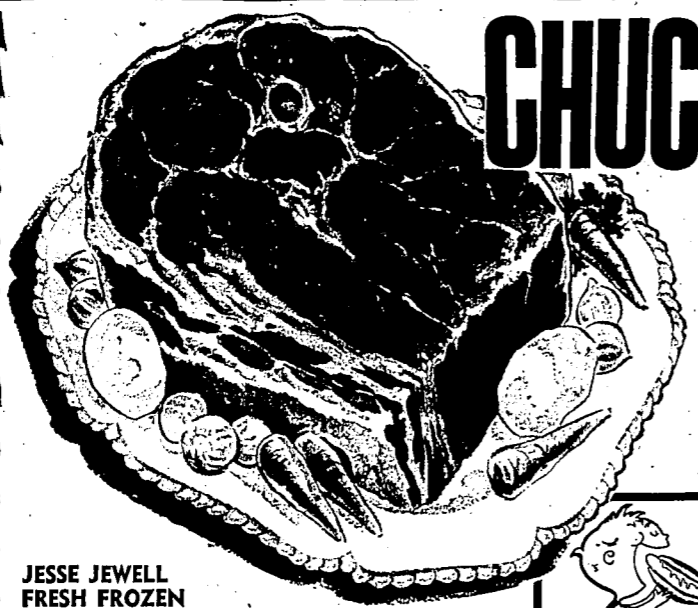

The replacement cost depreciation for subsequent years is deducted. The value for assessment purposes is then fixed at 25 percent of the replacement cost, less depreciation.

The court said this system is in error because it does not take into account the fair and actual cash value at the time of the assessment. "The price index system, Krenn wrote, 'could result in an excessive or discriminatory value'."

Cash value was defined in the opinion as "the value at which the property would sell for at a voluntary sale made in the ordinary course of business."

The method is illegal whether used by the state tax commission or by the assessor, the court said.

Other criteria of value such as income, location, cost, actual cash sale value, or other pertinent factors should have been considered in determining assessed value," the court said.

Attorneys said real property has been assessed at less than cash value in Idaho since 1913.

James G. Cass, assistant attorney general, said effects of the ruling would be "very far reaching." He said that county assessors are required by law to have their real property rolls completed by the first Monday in May.

Increases for Crime Blamed On Juveniles

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—The FBI reported yesterday that major crimes in the United States hit an all-time high last year. It blamed much of the crime on persons under 18.

FBI director J. Edgar Hoover said there were an estimated 2,794,000 major crimes in 1935—one every 113 seconds. The figure represented an increase of 23,200 over 1934. It was 23.9 per cent above the average for the previous five years.

Youngsters under 18 came in for much of the blame for the burgeoning crime rate. The FBI's uniform crime report for the nation's police department showed:

—Persons under 18 accounted for 47.2 per cent of the crimes of murder, manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and auto theft.

—Arrest of persons under 18 increased 16 per cent in cities under 25,000 and 81 per cent in cities of 25,000 or more.

—Since 1932, the population age group 10-17 increased 22 per cent while arrests of persons under 18 increased 55 per cent during that period.

The report also showed crime is increasing about four times as fast as the overall population, since 1920. Crime increased 56.2 per cent while the population grew 13 per cent.

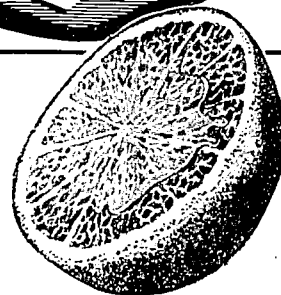
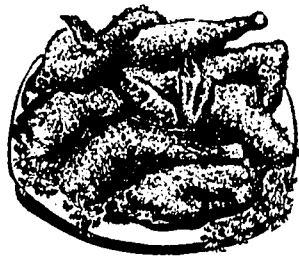

Demo Leader Sees Gains in Both Houses

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler predicted yesterday Democratic gains at least 40 House seats and 8 to 12 senators in the November elections.

He commented in an interview on the unusual statement by Meade A. McCormack, Republican national chairman, that "I just don't think it's in the cards" for the GOP to capture control of the senate.

Butler contended, however, that the Republicans will take a bare majority control of the house, but like the senate is now controlled by Democrats. He talked with newspaper editor White House correspondent with President Eisenhower.

Senate Republican Leader Knowland commented: "I think it's too early in the ball game to call the game yet." Knowland said, "I think the battle will be a close one, but the outcome will be determined by conditions later in the year."

But Senator Goldwater, R., Ariz., noting that "the arithmetic's against us," said that as a practical matter he has to agree with ALCORN.

In November, the voters will fill 34 senate seats and all 435 house memberships.

Twenty-one senate seats, the Republicans now hold, and only 13 Democratic seats, are up for election. Six of the Democratic seats are in the normally Democratic South. Present division of 49 Democratic, 47 Republican.

"We are looking for a gain of from 8 to 12 seats in the senate," Butler said. "I don't think we will lose a seat we now have."

McLemore Finds It's Easy to Get Lost in Washington, D.C.

I am in Washington, D. C. on my annual visit to my congressman to get my free seeds, to see the cherry blossom, to climb the Washington monument and to get lost.

So far, I have accomplished only the last mentioned.

To me, the "D. C." after Washington stands for "darned confusion" and "lost."

The Frenchman who drew the original plans for the city must have used a garden hose for a ruler and done a most of his work on a merry-go-round.

I was thinking yesterday, as I drove around DuPont circle for the twelfth time, how unfair it was to limit a President to two terms. Eight years isn't long enough for a man to learn his way about Washington. I'd be willing to bet that FDR even in his fourth term, couldn't find his way to the Union Station without asking.

Not that asking for directions helps much. A good 90 per cent of the people in Washington are lost all the time. Only the small hard core of government workers know their way about, but the chances of a visitor to the city running into one of them is remote.

This must be my one hundredth visit to Washington over the years.

but it is still the maze it was to me on my first visit. The circles are at the root of the trouble. If a motorist did not have to make his way around them, navigation wouldn't be so difficult. But something mysterious happens to all the streets when they reach the circles—they seem to disappear into thin air. You enter a circle on, say, Massachusetts avenue and are lucky to make an exit on a street named N. W. 1st, or S. W. 7th, Massachusetts just dissolves.

This streets and avenues run every which way, too, and never let anyone tell you their don't. And don't place any faith in a map of the city, one wrong turn and you'll wind up at the zoo or the Chillian embassy, when you are aiming for the Treasury building.

Visitors would be lost for years, and become public charges, were it not for the Washington monument. It is so strangers what the North Star is to mariners. Were it not for his way about Washington, he'd be everywhere, navigation in Washington would be impossible.

It has saved me a dozen times. Yesterday I had circled a circle containing a statue of General Thomas. I believe, a good fifty times and was becoming dizzy and faint, when Washington's monument came to the rescue. I set my bearing on it and finally reached it.

It wasn't where I wanted to be, but at least there were good patriots about it, admiring it, and I knew they wouldn't let me starve. In fact, a gentleman who had been looking for the Corcoran gallery for six hours without any luck, shared a ham sandwich with me. "It usually takes me two sandwiches and a

thermos of coffee to reach any place I start out to find in Washington," he explained. "And I usually take an extra sandwich for just such an unfortunate soul as yourself. Hope you like mustard."

I would like to give my readers the temper of the capital at the moment, but at the moment I can only give my own temper. Being lost, it is drizzling.

Surgeons Save Girl's Life by Removing Extra Heart Vessel

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 24 (AP)—Doctors have lifted a certain death sentence from a pretty little girl here by correcting one of the rarest heart conditions in medical history.

They discovered on operating on the 8-year-old that her trouble had been diagnosed incorrectly. Had doctors known this earlier, they could have given her a normal life years before.

But Paula Brisson, a sparkling blond, is normal now and that's all

keeps the body alive while the surgeons work.

When surgeons operated March 20, they found no hole but an extra blood vessel running between the right coronary artery and vein.

This unwanted vessel kept the heart from getting all the blood it needed and made the organ work much harder. It had the same effect on Paula as if she had had the more common hole in the heart.

The surgeons tied off and severed the extra vessel. This made the girl completely normal, although she must have rest and quiet for a time.

Doctors say Paula's is the third case in recorded medical history of a similar extra blood vessel.

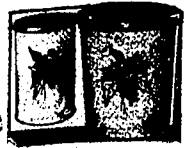

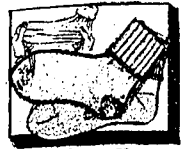

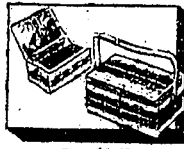

General Says Trip to Moon Near for U.S.

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Brig. Gen. H. A. Boushey said yesterday the United States could land a man on the moon within eight years.

Boushey, six force deputy research director, also told the house space committee that establishment of a base on the moon would provide "numerous advantages both civilian and military."

"The moon, Boushey said, would make a 'secure base to deter aggression.'"

It also would provide "unparalleled advantages for astronomical observation" and for keeping an eye on Earth.

"Lunar launching sites, perhaps located on the far side of the moon which could never be viewed directly from Earth, could launch missiles earthward," Boushey said.

The general said a lunar observatory using existing equipment could detect a 1,000-foot object on the Earth's surface.

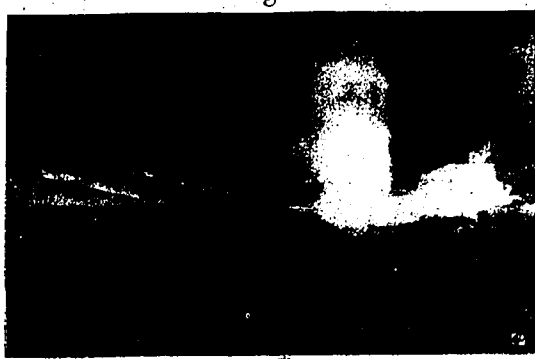
Within the next 15 to 20 years, Boushey said, improved telescopic equipment will make it possible to detect from the moon an object smaller than 100 feet on Earth—such as "individual aircraft missiles."

But long before a lunar base is established the United States will be able to launch satellites and space platforms with "tremendous observational powers," Boushey said.

Balston sinks stern first in the Pacific ocean approximately 116 miles west of San Francisco, carrying with it 8,000 tons of Lewisite and mustard gas manufactured during the war. The ship was towed to sea and deliberately scuttled in an area where the depth is more than two miles. The move was a safety measure as the containers of gas were beginning to deteriorate in storage. It took more than three hours for the ship to sink after the scuttling had been ordered. (AP photo)
