BURLEY, April 25—An Ogden man was killed instantly and his wife hospitalized in an accident at 9:55 a. m. Friday, 12 miles east of Burley on highway 30 south. The fatality is the ninth for the third traffic death in Cassia county this year. The first and second deaths were Cassia county and Mrs. L. E. Harris, Burley, Glen S. Folkman, route 2, Ogden, was driving a 1955 Oldsmobile south west, according to Cassia county Sheriff LePage Layton, when the car went about 135 feet into the soft shoulder of the road around a curve. The driver avoided going into the borrow pit, but when the vehicle hit the road again it overturned twice.

Mrs. Davis was rescued dramatically shortly before dark yesterday after her courageous orchestra leader husband, Bruce Davis, 36, Fresno, Calif., had spent three nights and two days in the plane wreckage.

An air force helicopter from Portland plucked her to safety from a 6,200-foot plateau. Mrs. Davis and her husband were reported "doing very well" at John Day. She said she was having considerable pain from frostbite lesions which required attention. Attention was given to her wounds at this time that amputation will be necessary.

NUERNBERG, Germany, April 25—A Nuernberg court has found six former Nazi officers innocent of executing three German villagers in the final days of World War II.

The court ruled Wednesday in the case of Lt.-Gen. Max Simon, former commander of the 10th SS army corps, and five of his officers.

They had been accused of executing three farmers who had sheltered German youth on their way to attack invading American tanks, and also shooting two Bavarian village officials who had refused to carry out Simon's orders to hang the farmers.

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Nixon Favors Cut in Tax if Dip Continues

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon said last night there was a "substantial likelihood" that the tax rate will be cut if the Eisenhower administration is able to give the economy the help it needs.

He said that if further government help is needed to boost the economy out of the present slump, it should be a tax cut "designed to put money in the hands of investors and job creators, as well as consumers."

Nixon told the nation's newspaper publishers that the "primary responsibility for the recovery must be assumed by American business and labor and the other vital forces which make up the private sector of the American economy."

Address Publishers The vice president spoke at the annual dinner of the National Association of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, concluding a two-day tour of the West.

There will be no depression in the United States, Nixon told the publishers. "The American economy is sound."

Nixon said the government would not "stand by and allow a recession to be prolonged or to open the door to depression without decisive government action."

He warned against an "expanding binge" that "can only lead to a hangover of debt and inflation later."

"The use of massive spending for current federal activities to combat the recession should be strictly limited to the emergency of the present situation," he said.

And consumer buying isn't the only answer, Nixon said. "Business, he said, has got to get out and act, at attractive prices."

Encourages Advertising "New products, increased advertising, lower prices can have a dramatic effect on consumer psychology," Nixon said.

He said he had been told by publishers that national advertising was down about 40 percent although local advertising had remained fairly stable during the recession weeks.

"I can think of no more important factor in the success of national advertisers," he told the publishers. "The very people who have most at stake in the success of our free economy should be betting on its growth rather than on its collapse."

Labor leaders also have a responsibility, Nixon said, to restrain themselves from seeking a raise when increases which are based on neither increased productivity nor the correcting of inequities.

Crash Victim Spent Three Days in Wilds

BOISE, April 25 (AP)—U. S. District Judge Fred M. Taylor said today that a man who was found in a car wrecked in a forest in Idaho last week had spent three days in the wilds.

The case was brought by the widow, daughter and father of the man, who died in the crash.

Richard Ben Alirex, the Californian who died after a traffic accident in the woods in 1957.

CHICAGO, April 25 (AP)—The president of United Air Lines called on the civil aeronautics board yesterday to be "a little more frank with the public" in fixing responsibility for the cause of an earlier crash which killed 49 persons. W. Patterson told a company stockholders meeting the CAB's conclusions were the cause of an earlier crash involving a UAL air liner was "an insult to the intelligence of the American people."

Crash Killed 49 This was the air collision with a Trans World airplane over the Grand canyon June 30, 1936, in which 49 persons were killed.

After full and complete hearings they reached the conclusion that the accident was caused by the failure of both pilots to see the airplane of the other, Patterson said. Patterson said UAL's investigation of the recent accident occurred when a bomb was placed aboard the plane. His address: Effort Put Forth

"My conscience is clear that we in United Air Lines did everything in our power to do our best to prevent these accidents. We admit the problem of traffic control is a very complex one."

"We cannot excuse government for trying to solve a problem with limited authority and responsibility. I can only say that I hope the coincidence of those in government agencies involved is as clear as I believe ours to be."

Patterson told the shareholders that there is not a single proved safety device that has not been installed on UAL aircraft.
