Water, Highways Claim Six Lives in Gem State During Accident Wave

Drownings and highway accidents have claimed the lives of six persons in Idaho. A seventh person also is feared to have drowned. The body of Blair Hall, 22, Rexburg, was found today in Quail lake near Plano, 12 miles northwest of Rexburg in Madison county.

His companion, Brent Beattie, 19, also Rexburg, is missing and believed drowned. A search was started for the two men early today after they disappeared late last night while boating on the lake.

Beattie, 19, of 215 S. 1st, Rexburg, was manager of the Kellogg store. He and Ronald Rickman, 22, Smelterville, drowned yesterday in separate accidents while searching for their lives when their light truck plunged into the north fork of the Clearwater river.

Three persons died in two accidents on Gem state highways. One was killed when a 1957 Buick Wildcat, driven by Albert Heath, 10, Kootenai, and Thomas Hahn, 10, Kootenai, was killed when his plane crashed into a tree after a collision with a car.

Two other persons in the car were injured. A companion with each of the victims was taken to the hospital.

'Ike' Urges Russia To Join Arctic Air Inspection Project

State Board Selects Dean of New College

The university was also authorized to grant five 90-hour courses in university proficiency and medical education to build up college houses.

Compromise on Western States' Water Rights Problems Is Being Worked Out

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—Work on a compromise to guarantee western states' water rights is being pushed in Washington. White House officials, however, are reluctant to make any promises.

Indications are that western states' water rights will be guaranteed by federal legislation. In the meantime, the federal government is working out a compromise with the states to guarantee water rights.

The 1958 rivers and harbors bill, introduced by Sen. Arthur W. Watkins, R., Utah, Wallace F. Bennett, R., Utah, Henry C. AUGUSTA, Ga., April 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower has again urged congress to pass new legislation to authorize \$125,172,000 for "sound water projects" shared by his four states.

In a letter to congress, the president said he was doing so because he felt about 150—would either be a waste of money or would destroy fundamental resources development.

The bill provided for navigation, beach erosion control and other projects in earlier sections of the country. The 28% to which Eisenhower objected carried a cost tag of about \$6 million dollars.

The president, in his veto message, said he would be willing to approve what he called the sound projects worth \$125,172,000 and he urged congress to lump them in new legislation for speed.

Today he sounded that appeal and also said he is willing to approve 18 other projects. He said congress will make modifications to the bill.

The list of projects from the vetoed rivers and harbors authorization bill which President Eisenhower today recommended be approved included Bruce Eddy dam in Idaho at \$4,200,000.

Plush Base Is Emerging for Missile Force at Old Camp

COOKE AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., April 28 (AP)—The site of a long abandoned airfield and infantry camp here, the age of the missile base and the missile is emerging in a riot of pastel hues.

Barracks in creamy white, training and administration buildings in dreamy green, the hospital in calm, quieting blue.

The old fort slogger of World War II days would hardly know what to make of it. Who ever heard of a barracks intrude with the walls and individual stall showers?

The air force, in order to hold on to its highly trained maintenance, is providing deluxe accommodations at Cooke AFB, now under construction as the first base capable of firing 5,500-mile intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The 100-million-dollar construction program has moved along so quickly that the first missile firings are only months away. The base is 160 miles northwest of Los Angeles.

The 1st Missile division, first unit of its kind, is under the Strategic Air Command. It is commanded by Maj. Gen. David Wade.

The enlisted men's barracks are an even more radical change from those of the 1940s. In the past, instead of dormitories and upstairs dormitories accommodating 75 men, the new barracks house 34 men, two each in spacious rooms.

Altogether, 210 of the old Camp Cooke buildings are being renovated. Surplus structures will be removed when it is determined how many of the 1,500 existing buildings will be needed.

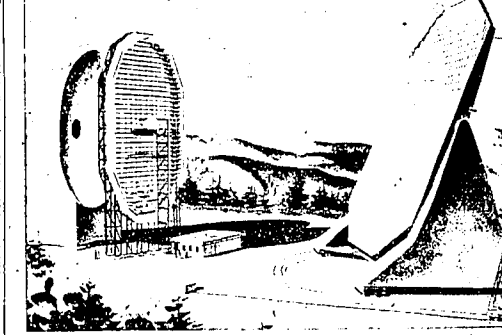

Glenns Ferry School Busman Completes 32nd Driving Year

GLENN FERRY, April 28 (AP)—William Peterson is completing his 32nd year of driving the school bus in the sprawling Glenns Ferry district.

"Before they had radio and TV, the farmers used to all set their watches and clocks by me," Peterson recalled Monday.

Peterson has owned eight buses, beginning with a converted model T truck with a wooden body, which carried 18 passengers. He now owns two carrying 36 and 48 passengers, respectively.

In the early 1940s, a bridge across the Snake river near Hammett, on Peterson's route, was condemned because of rotting timbers. Peterson was authorized to stop his route short of the bridge. He preferred not to do this, however. Every school day for six weeks, while the bridge was being repaired, he let his passengers out and drove across the bridge alone. The children walked across and he picked them up on the other side.

Peterson said they would have had to ride the rest of the way in an open vehicle otherwise, and it was too cold.

For 10 years, Peterson's wife drove the family car to pick up a few children at isolated ranches hard to reach by bus.

Peterson has had only two minor accidents and few disciplinary problems, he reports. He recently received the contract to operate the school bus for another year.
