PROTECTIVE ARCTIC FLIGHTS

If the Soviet Union had a real case, it would have fought the battle in the United Nations, win or lose, on the issue of American military flights through Russian territory without dropping charges before the U. N. security council in the face of certain defeat indicates that, once more, the Russians were concerned not with truth but with propaganda.

They know full well that any military or political struggle with its name constantly simulate the circumstances of defense and attack. Surely the Russians do it themselves. No one would think much of their aerial defenses if they did not.

To suggest that some trigger-happy general might one day choose to send a nuclear bomber flight all the way to its target is ridiculous. This is not French North Africa, where combat already flared and the lethal bomb load bad as it is, consists simply of ordinary high explosives. 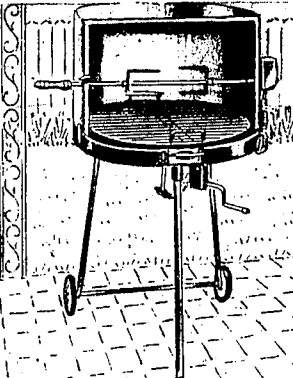

Reconsidering Of Assessment Ruling Sought

BOISE, April 30 (AP) — Atty. Gen. Grayson W. Smith said yesterday he will file an appeal with the Idaho supreme court to reconsider its decision that decreed traditional tax assessment procedures unconstitutional.

An appeal for rehearing will be filed in the case involving three tax assessment agreements owned by R. M. Farmer, Smith said.

In that decision, announced April 23, the high court called the state tax commission's so-called "price index" system of assessment unconstitutional. The system conflicts with the section of the constitution requiring all property to be taxed uniformly. The court said in a unanimous opinion.

Similar approaches to assessment have been used in Idaho since 1932. The supreme court said property should be assessed at full value.

Much of the preparation of the case for rehearing has been assigned to Atty. Gen. Elbert E. Smith. He called the decision a "wonderful" case for rehearing and will be filed between now and May 15, the deadline.

Smylie Urging Solons to Act On Trade Bill

BOISE, April 30 (AP) — Action on union future trading bills were expected by the Idaho state committee today by Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

Smylie urged in a letter to Commerce Chairman Sen. Allen J. Zander, D. Ia., that three bills which would amend the Mercantile exchange have been postponed until May 7.

"If 100 per cent of the union growers in Idaho and in neighboring Missouri county, Ore., have as the condition of the union future trading, Smylie said.

"Delaying for further study will serve no useful purpose," the governor said.

"It seems to me that such a display of unanimity among an agriculture committee is certainly merited consideration."

"Especially in view of the fact that the action which is opposing the legislation neither represents growers, shippers or consumers of commodities."

Elimination of futures trading would allow growers to meet consumers' needs, Smylie said, "instead of having to hold the market price of a commodity to suit the speculators who we feel is greatly responsible for creating surplus in the commodity."

Futures trading of agricultural commodities involves sale of the commodity at an agreed price for delivery at a future time. Idaho agriculture groups and officials have attacked the legislation as creating artificial surpluses and shortages which adversely affect the prices they receive.

Senate Okays Pay Increases For Services

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP) — A general pay raise for the army, navy and air force was approved today by the senate yesterday.

With a minimum of debate, it passed a bill providing \$78 million dollars in increases over the first year of operation.

The measure goes back to the 1940s when it had approved increases totaling 683 million dollars. A senate-house conference may be necessary to adjust the inflationary effect of the two bills.

Senator Stennis, D. Miss., urged the legislation on its passage through the senate, said it is "aimed at providing a remedy for the alarming shortage of trained and qualified personnel in the armed forces."

"Almost everyone in uniform with less than two years of service would get an increase of at least 6 per cent per year, plus a 40 per cent cost-of-living boost. Additional money would be offered for proficiency among enlisted men and especially responsibility among officers."

Personnel in the coast guard, public health service and the coast and geodetic survey would also benefit.

The proficiency and responsibility pay would range from \$70 to \$150 a month for a limited number of officers and men under the senate version.

"There would also be a six per cent increase for all persons on the regular pay scale."

All increases would become effective the month after President Eisenhower signs the legislation, possibly in June at the rate it is now moving through congress.

Senator James D. Eastland, D. Miss., asked Stennis whether the new pay incentives would permit abandonment of the practice during the next year, which is now pending between 10,000 and 15,000 young men into the army each month.

"I do not think we can go that far," Stennis replied.

Stennis said that with respect to both officers and enlisted men the army is "in a very tight spot."

Bus Concerns Ask Authority For Rate Hike

BOISE, April 30 (AP) — Most bus companies in Idaho are asking the Idaho public utilities commission yesterday for authority to increase the fares by up to 10 or 15 per cent.

The commission opened hearings on a docket which includes 76 requests from bus operators and truckers, most of them for rate and fare increases.

The commission on National Bus Traffic Association, Inc., appeared before the PUC and asked a straight 10 per cent increase on passenger fares, not including commutation or charter or express rates.

Among those appearing were William Hastings, San Francisco, western division traffic manager for Greyhound Lines; William Niskaem, Bend, Ore., vice president of Pacific Trailways; Robert Cuning of Boise, for Northwestern Empire Lines; and Mrs. J. P. Dewey, Twin Falls, Sun Valley Stage Lines.

Clearwater Stage Lines, Boise-Winnemucca Stage, and Weiser-Nor Meadows Bus line also were included in the hearings, according to William C. Rappaport, acting director of the board, said the commission likely would slash today. Remaining requests are chiefly from agencies representing truckers, he said.

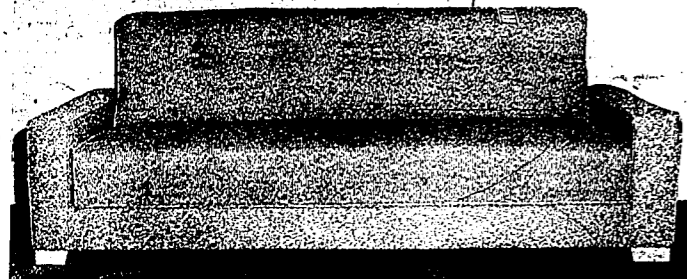

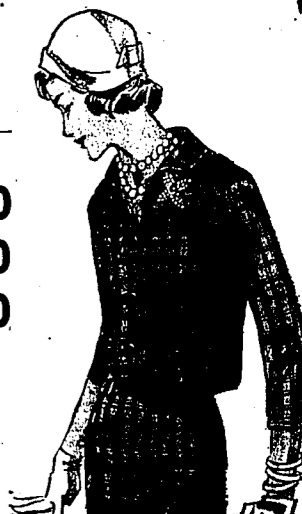

Physicist Claims Moon May Be Covered With Mile-Deep Dust

DENVER, April 30—One leading physicist said last night that much of the moon may be covered with dust two-thirds of a mile deep and more treacherous than quicksand.

A fellow scientist of equal repute forecast that no appreciable quantity of loose dust would be found on the moon's surface.

The latter, Dr. Fred L. Whipple, director of the Smithsonian astronomical observatory at Harvard university, declared the moon's surface material "should not blow badly in a rocket jet—would be sufficiently rigid for support of the normal structures and operations required of a lunar expedition."

But Dr. Thomas Gold, noted professor of astronomy at Harvard

ground, could prove the point. "I suppose that some such experimentation will be carried out before any landing by even an unmanned device is attempted," Gold said.

Gold said that while for many years the craters of the moon were thought to be volcanic in origin, with solidified beds of lava between them, there are few if any volcanic mountains on the moon and certainly no single active volcano there.

He suggested that a process—erosion—impacts by small particles and by ultraviolet light and soft X-rays from the sun—has reduced the rocky surface of the moon to very fine powder.

Whipple countered that there was "clearcut evidence of small scale volcanic activity" on the moon, and that no evidence had been found to support the view that systematic erosion had produced layers of dust.

Pension Plan Protection Is Given by Bill

WASHINGTON, April 30.—This is an ABC on the bill passed by the Senate to protect 14 million people now covered by pension and welfare plans.

The method of protection: to compel those running the plans to file with the secretary of labor detailed reports on their administration and finances.

Needs House Okay

This bill cannot become law, of course, unless the house also passes it before congress adjourns this summer. There is no certainty the house will act.

Three years of investigation by Senate committees into the operation of pension and welfare plans preceded the action by the full Senate.

One of the bill's sponsors—Senator Kennedy, D. Mass.—said the measure, including enforcement, but-complaints and review fees, and union and insurance representatives' collusion by a union management, union and insurance representatives.

No Accounting

Kennedy added it is an exception, at least in the case of employees — for whom the plans are set up — are given any accounting of the financial operations or the reserves.

And he said, "unless the employer is given information as to the operation and status of his plan he has no means of knowing whether the benefits he is relying on will be forthcoming."

Billions Involved

The various plans now in existence involve about 28 billion dollars. They are run by employers alone, by employers and unions, or by unions or insurance associations. Ninety per cent are administered by employers.

In some cases the employers pay all the costs; in some employers and employees both contribute. The bill would require the employer to establish from government or union funds those covering the operation of the plan.

It makes no difference how they are sponsored, financed, underwritten or administered if they provide for any or more of the following: death benefits for employees or their dependents; medical, surgical or hospital care or benefits in the event of sickness, disability, death, unemployment or retirement.

Requirements Noted

This is what the bill if it becomes law—calls for:

Those charged with responsibility for management of a welfare or pension plan must file an annual report with the labor department and must provide this information:

Detailed accounting for the money put into a plan, the money spent by it, the salaries and fees charged to the plan, to whom paid, in what amounts and for what purpose.

Audit Necessary

This report filed with the government must be based on an audit by an independent, licensed accountant. The various documents required to be filed with the government under this bill will be open to public inspection.

The taking part in a plan—of other interested parties—can get a summary of the information filed with the secretary of labor by asking him for it.

In administering this act the secretary would be assisted by a 12-man advisory council made up of representatives of labor, management, the public, and other interested parties.

There are criminal penalties for willful false statements, the destruction of records, embezzlement, kickbacks and other self-dealing.
