Burley Man Dies At Gravel Pit as Crane Hits Head

BURLEY, May 2—William E. (Bus) Jones, 41, 1543 Elmo avenue, was killed instantly about noon Friday when he was struck on the head by a V-shaped crane while setting up a gravel and hot mix plant at the Holmes Construction company gravel pit two miles west of town on highway 30. The crane was on the bank of a gravel pit and the operator, R. Paulsen, was standing on top of the truck ready to receive a cover for the gravel bucket inside. Cecil Powers was inside the truck. As they were about to set the cover on the bucket, and it was started to be lifted by the crane, the truck bucked and the chain holding the hook to the crane, gave way. The hook, carried by a crane, county cooper, said a jury will be impaneled immediately for an inquest. The body was taken to the McLaughlin funeral home.

President's Arctic Inspection Plea Is Vetoed by Russia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 2 (AP)—The Soviet Union Friday vetoed President Eisenhower's Arctic inspection plan after denouncing it as a gimmick to help get military aid in the United States. The plan called for a 13-nation security council after Secretary of State Acheson had declared in Washington that Russia's selection of the Arctic was a sign of sincerity toward a summit conference. The Soviet Union cast the only negative vote. It was the 83rd time the Soviet Union had cast a veto in the council.

Pacific Nuclear Test Will Be Started Soon

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—The first shot in the new U. S. nuclear test series in the Pacific is imminent, government sources said today. In fact, they said it was overdue. The weather—presumably adverse with threatening to carry radioactive fallout beyond the test zone—was blamed for delays. Exact timing of the first test was not disclosed by the atomic energy commission. A brief AEC announcement, however, was expected to follow the first shot. The new tests were intended against a backdrop of international controversy over the program.

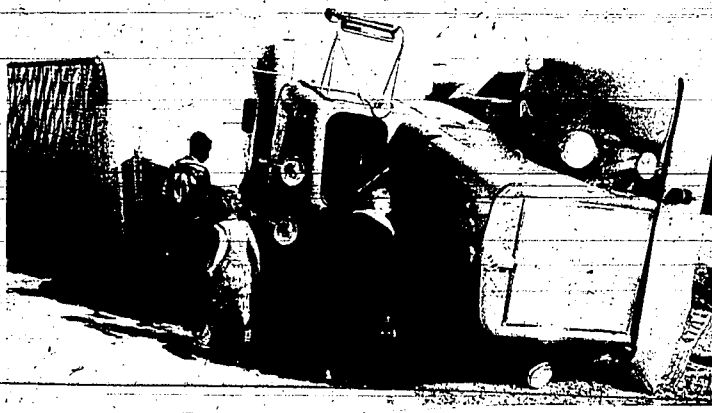

Benson's Planned Trip to Russia Seen As Project to Ease East-West Tension

WASHINGTON, May 2 (Special)—A trip to Russia by U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk, in a move designed further to ease East-West tensions, has indicated a willingness to visit Russia and other countries behind the iron curtain.

The trip, now scheduled for late June and early July, would be the first journey to Russia by a U. S. cabinet officer since Secretary of State George Marshall attended a foreign ministers' conference in Moscow in 1947, a couple of years ago. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, then chief of the U. S. air force, visited Russia to watch air maneuvers.

An invitation to visit Russia was extended personally to Benson several weeks ago by the new Soviet ambassador, atriale Mikhail A. Gerasimov, who visited the secretary's office for that purpose.

Benson's formal acceptance has not yet been delivered to the Russians. When it is sent, there appears little doubt but that it will be readily acknowledged. Menzhikov says.

"It will be most welcome."

The Benson tour, if successful will be but a forerunner of trips to Russia by other top U. S. officials, perhaps including Vice President Nixon in the fall. The state department is heartily in favor of such a program and would welcome top Russian

visitors here.

The Benson trip would "set the example" with the Russians protocol. In 1955 Russian Farm Chief W. Matkevich (then Deputy Chief) led a delegation of a dozen Russian farm experts to the U. S. The trip was promoted by the Dept. of Agriculture and Tribune.

Benson's journey, of course, is always subject to cancellation should matters of serious concern to the farm policy come up in congress.

The secretary would be accompanied by Mrs. Benson, several personal aides and the first of some 35 U. S. farm technicians who will visit the Soviet Union this summer. The technicians will go over in groups of four or five; those accompanying Benson will farm economists.

The Benson schedule includes a week or two days in the Russian countryside, visiting collective and state farms; two days in Moscow consulting various Russian officials, including Prime Minister Khrushchev, who is visibly concerned over falling farm production at home; several days in "PIONEER" zone, and stops in various western European capitals to discuss possibilities of U. S. farm surplus abroad.

The visits of the U. S. farm experts are ambitious undertakings. Their trips, costing some \$2,500 each,

will be paid for by the organizations for which they work. Only a few employees of the department of agriculture.

In the past few years three other U. S. delegations have visited Russia. A party of 18 from the housing industry went there; a party of some half-dozen from the restaurant industry, and a small group of public health experts have made the journey. They all were given the "red carpet" treatment.

The Russian farmers who visited the U. S. in 1955 were so feted that they complained about having to overeat and drink. They also fared better than a group of Russian newsmen who visited the U. S. capital building later the same year. Sen. William Langer, R., N. D., took a casual look at the newsmen, told

"I met the Russian farmers here a bit ago and I must say they were a much better looking bunch than you."

The red newsmen openly showed their anger, muttered by their state department escorts about "the bad manners of some of your gentlemen."

Twin Falls has a new daily through express service to Seattle and similar hours faster and more comfortable than any other service by Greyhound Lines, effective Friday.

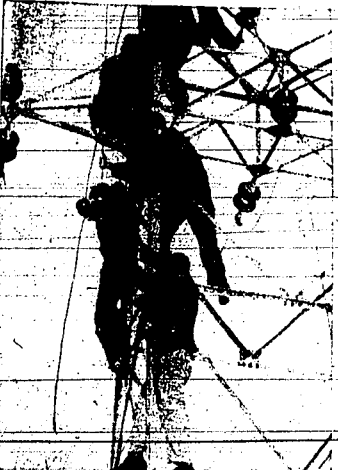
Express service was initiated Friday with an eastbound express departing at 6:30 a. m. and the westbound express leaving for the Pacific coast at 4:45 a. m.

Reports Show Trend to Step Up Purchases

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—New government statistics indicate people may be starting to buy more. This could be a hopeful economic sign.

The federal reserve board and the commerce department reported a March pickup in business at department stores and wholesale establishments. But other reports issued yesterday showed the key auto industry still running in low gear.

At the same time, the treasury was rushing income tax refunds to millions of Americans in hopes it would help bring about economic recovery.

Market Recovery

In reporting on March store sales, the federal reserve said this activity "recovered substantially from the low level of February" but still was below March a year ago. Auto sales also were below the corresponding span in 1957.

The commerce department said wholesale sales in March rose 10 per cent from February. Non-durable goods showed a 7 per cent gain in the month.

Low Installment Buying

Another federal reserve report said installment debt defined by 180 million dollars in March, reflecting account of seasonal factors, attributed almost wholly to a drop in new credit for auto buying.

The treasury said that by April 24 it had mailed \$2,452,000,000 in income tax refunds—31 per cent more than a year ago. Nearly all refund checks are to be out by mid-May—about two weeks earlier than usual.

Benson Opposing Dairy Legislation

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson yesterday strongly opposed proposed self-help dairy legislation contending it would result in higher prices to consumers and decreased production.

He told the house agriculture committee that a drive for increased consumption of milk and its products, through regular market channels, offers the best solution to the dairy problem.

Benson said self-help operations as distinguished from government programs, are to be encouraged. But he said the plans proposed are, not the answer for dairymen.

Before the committee are 13 bills, similar in tone, designed to give farmers control over production and sales of dairy products and the right to set support levels.

Dairy farmers would be assessed a fee such as 25 cents a hundred pounds of milk, to pay costs of the program.

Fine Paid for Liquor Count
