Suggested Retail Prices On Cars Required by Bill Given Subcommittee OK

WASHINGTON, May 5 (UP)—A senate subcommittee today approved a bill that would require auto manufacturers to label their cars with suggested retail prices. Violators would be penalized by \$1,000 fines for each instance. The legislation—endorsed by General Motors and Ford, the two biggest auto makers, but opposed by some retail dealers—was sponsored by subcommittee chairman A. S. Mike Monroney, D., Okla. He said it is "the car-seller's business."

The price label would have to be in addition to the retail price of the car. The label would be required for cars with a suggested retail price of \$1,000 or more. The bill would require auto manufacturers to label their cars with suggested retail prices. Violators would be penalized by \$1,000 fines for each instance. Loyalists Win Rebel Capital In Long Siege

SINGAPORE, May 5 (AP)—The Indonesian loyalists announced today that their troops marched yesterday into Bukittinggi, the rebel rebel strong-hold and their last major strong-hold on Sumatra.

The loyalists said the city fell at 11:15 p.m. Sunday to infantry columns which immediately began "sopping up" the surrounding countryside.

The loyalist advance on Bukittinggi had been stalled for more than a year, but neither side had reported any fighting in the area. It was reported that the advance may have been slowed by the rugged terrain as the approaches to Bukittinggi.

Rebel guerrillas are expected to continue fighting in the hills and focus of insurgent activity shifts to Merano on Celebes island, believed to be the base of the rebel air force.

Week-end reports indicated that guerrilla warfare has already begun. Brig. Medan said a grenade thrown by a "suspected person" wounded a soldier in Pomakang island, while a "suspected rebel" fought loyalist forces on the outskirts of the city.

The rebels "fled in disorder, with apparently heavy casualties," the government radio said.

Brig. Medan reported also that loyalist planes strafed four villages believed to be "rebel hideouts" in north Sumatra over the weekend.

Church Backs Statehood for Alaska Drives

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—A deluged new drive to make Alaska a state this year gained momentum in Congress today.

Simultaneously, a leading Alaska booster in the senate called for an "initial grant of legislative authority" that end to "unfettered paralysis" that kept statehood legislation "languishing in the limbo of inaction."

In a 15-minute speech today, Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, said the congressional act of changing the status of the territory is the "only real barrier" to statehood for the territory.

Church said the American people "are overwhelmingly in favor of Alaska statehood... that our continued refusal to grant it can only be regarded as a deliberate flouting of the popular will."

In the house, Rep. Clint Engle, D., Calif., has served notice he will introduce to take the Alaska bill directly before the house May 16 if the powerful rules committee will clear it by then. This measure has been tied up in the rules group, chairmanship by Rep. Howard W. Howard, R., D., Va., since Engle's committee reported it last week.

Economy, Tax Cut Urged by Head of NAM

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—The National Association of Manufacturers today renewed its demands for a "strong" government recovery and a curb on the "power of union monopolies" as measures to cure the recession.

Milton C. Lightner, president of NAM, said his organization deplores increased federal spending for "pensions" and any step-up of government intervention in business and state economic planning.

Lightner spoke before the house banking committee which is holding hearings on bills to relieve unemployment.

He urged the committee to reject all the bills pending before it, calling them part of an "opportunist" move by advocates of federal spending and interference with state and private enterprise.

Under Administration, Alaska what he termed "the historical demands for the discredited anti-union-policies-measures which are proposed for great depression of the 1930's." Lightner praised the Eisenhower administration for "concrete steps" in relating such demands.

On taxes, he suggested cutting corporate and individual income taxes to make money available for investment in job-making industrial expansion.

A gradual 10 per cent cut in corporate taxes over the next five years, he said, would release more than four billion dollars, a total that would go directly into business expansion. He suggested an additional 10 billion dollars could be put into the private economy during the next five years through a gradual reduction in all brackets of individual income taxes.

Lightner's testimony followed a production by Commerce Secretary Charles McNinch, who said the United States is headed into a "profound" despite signs of recession that is now seen "everywhere around us."

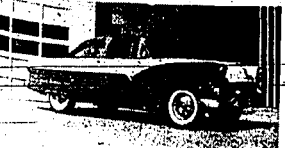

Record Numbers Of U.S. Tourists Seen for Europe

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—More Americans will visit Europe this year than ever before, according to advance travel reports.

The European travel commission has estimated that more than 675,000 U.-S. citizens will visit Europe this year—75,000 more than last year.

Passport and renewal applications in the first quarter of 1958 totaled 160,892, a 20 per cent increase over the same period last year. About 75 per cent of the passports were for western European destinations.

The trans-Atlantic passenger conference, representing 28 steamship lines, reported a 25 per cent increase over last year's figure in the number of passengers carried in the first quarter of 1958. More than 81,000 persons traveled to Europe by ship in the first three months of this year.

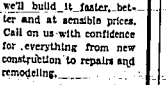

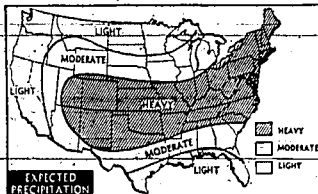

NEW YORK, May 4 (U)—There usually are only two days in a modern office.
One is today, when life is wonderful. The other is any day on which you aren't paid, and life seems ordinarily hopeless or hopelessly ordinary, depending on your mood.
Friday is usually easy to get through. The boss looks because one knows that at twilight he will have a full pocket as he sallies forth to pursue his private desires. Tonight freedom-tomorrow the mortgage payment.
But on every day that isn't payday, one feels the burden of effort. He knows no release from the way of living. His dreams seem impossible, the routine of life appears endless, and anyone who whistles out loud is frowned on as a traitor marking time.
"I will have to go on like this forever!" a man asks himself silently as the fellow workers around him loom more as fellow prisoners in a common cell.
But there is a third kind of day in an office—the day someone dies. And as one grows older, it seems to come more often.
You come to work one morning and instead of the usual greetings "What's new?"—there is, for a change, something really new. "Did you hear so-and-so died last night?"
Who was so-and-so? It makes no difference what his rank was in life, whether he was an executive or secretary, his rank. In death he suddenly stands out larger. For one day he is the most important man in the office.
"You may have worked 30-40 years from him for 20 years and never even noticed the color of his eyes. All of a sudden, through the pooling of office-memories, you learn a lot about him."
Everyone has a memory: "Only last week I heard him say in the washroom he never felt better in his life."
"He's got three kids—but two of them are raised."
"He only had four more payments to go on his house."

"Remember during the last economy drive, when they wouldn't buy a new pencil sharpener, he got so mad he went out and bought one himself!"
"Punny thing about him—never wore anything but blue striped shirts to work."
"He always worried about ulcers, and then just to think—it was his heart all the time."
Everyone looks at so-and-so's desk—somehow it now stands out from the others—and wonders who tomorrow... or the next day... or the day after... will be sitting at that desk doing so-and-so's job... why don't they ever make time on a guy's desk when he dies?—somebody asks. But they never do.
So-and-so is gone, but the work hasn't. The human herd, looting, turns its horns toward the future and plods on.
There has just been another death in the office.
