## On Sewer Project Urged Barms Roof Hits Idaho Region In Defense Action

A \$1,600,000 bond issue was recommended Monday night to the Twin Falls city commissioners to cover a proposed sewerage system and treatment plant and needed changes in the city's water system. They said the West should enter the top level talks only if the preliminary negotiations show a change of easing world tensions.

### Forecast That Ike to Resign Brings Denial

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Paul Butler, Democratic national chairman, predicted last night that President Eisenhower may resign before the end of his second term. "Unshakable confidence," said Steele Alcorn, Republican national chairman.

Butler said there are indications that Eisenhower may feel the burden of office is too great for him and that he may leave the White House in advance of the GOP-presidential nominating convention in 1940.

On Radio Interview  
The Democratic leader expressed his views in a radio interview. Alcorn replied in a statement issued by his headquarters.

Only the other day President Eisenhower was asked in his press conference if he intended to resign, and he answered in a characteristically forthright and unqualified manner, Alcorn said.

The answer, therefore, is confronted with the necessity of choosing between the President's unqualified denial and Mr. Butler's ridiculous speculation.

No White House Comment  
Introduced by Democratic leader's statement and asked for comment, Mrs. Anne Whelton, the President's associate press secretary, said:

"The White House has no comment on the Butler speculation, but we do not see it as a possibility."

Butler asked he "would venture to say that the President is physically unable to continue to discharge the responsibilities and duties of the presidency."

Butler said he feels that Eisenhower for the most part is showing no particular zest for his job now.

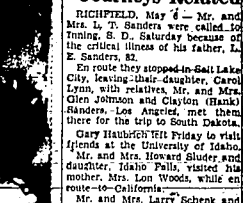
The department said state police hunted out 38 traffic tickets during the week, including 7 resulting from use of radar equipment.

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YOUTH STATISTICS ALARMING

Much as we may be inclined to grow tired of hearing about juvenile delinquency, and in spite of attempts to minimize the problem, the ugly facts persist in starting us in the face—and they're getting uglier year after year.

What really was another thunderbolt came out of the federal bureau of investigation recently. Not only have major crimes in the United States hit an all-time high, but the FBI blames much of the crime on persons under 21.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported an estimated 2,796,000 major-crimes—in 1957—one every 13 seconds—and an increase of 23.9 per cent above the average for the previous five years.

What was most alarming about the FBI report, however, was the fact that youngsters under 18 accounted for 47.2 per cent of the crimes of murder, manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and auto theft.

One of the most significant facts, which contradicts a popular misconception, is that arrests of youngsters under 18 increased 16 per cent in cities under 25,000 and 8.1 per cent in cities of 25,000 or more.

Whenever the matter of juvenile crime comes up, a good many voices are raised to the effect that we must treat the social and economic ills which produce youthful offenders.

No sensible person can quarrel with such suggestions. But some urge them with such singleness of mind that they put a disproportionate emphasis on the social and economic factors.

There is, however, another side to the issue which is obviously of the utmost importance. That is the effective protection of the law-abiding people of this country.

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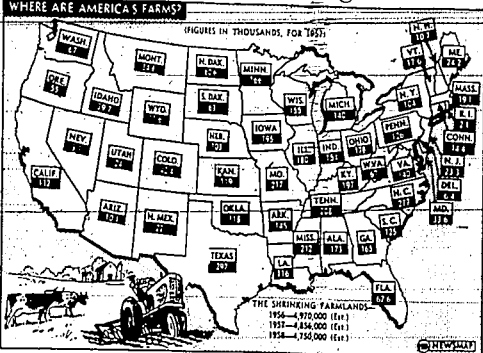

### McLemore Fails in Attempt to Observe Good Posture Week

By HENRY McLEMORE

"I'm a 'weepling' 'You'd have to search far, wide and long before finding anyone more conscientious than I am about observing the nine or 10 official weeks, one or two of which are at least almost every day."

I eat apples when the apples are in season, I celebrate their people—their week, and the same people for seven days—pears, dogfruit, sauerkraut, and I wear cotton during cotton week.

McLemore went during wood week, rubber boots during rubber week, keep off the grass during the grass week, buy a new hat for my house during better lighting week, and hang around the pool hall a lot during national another week.

All of which is said to point up my failure to observe national good posture week. Like business, I was in a slump and there I stayed all week. I was ashamed every time I saw a good posture worker drive by.

I tried to pay tribute to good posture week—tried my best. But incorrect—or comfortable—posture has been a part of me too long. I just couldn't change. Had I stuck at good posture for seven days I would have taken a medical team, working overtime, a week to have, unbeni me.

I am sure that I was not alone in sort of skipping good posture week. We Americans are a nation of slouchers, either standing up or sitting down. Watch a group of us on, say, a day coach train ride. The train will not have more than three slouchers before every passenger lucky enough to have a little spare room, will be curled up like a sleepy anchovy.

One leg will be curled up on the seat, the other will be hung across the arm of the seat, and left to dangle in mid-air, the head will be propped on the window sill and the neck will be bent like the stem of a hollow pipe.

Yet, the person thus draped, will be asleep, and breathing deeply and comfortably. The fact that the arm rest has stopped circulation in one leg, and his head has a dent in it from the sill, won't bother him a bit.

That an American upright for a journey of even a few hours is to torture him, he wants, in slumps, slouch, and sort of flow about in every direction.

### Solons Reject Frills Planned For Diplomats

WASHINGTON, May 6—Congressional pressure has forced the state department to cut out plans for canvas beach huts, mountain retreats and cabin boats for U. S. diplomats at scattered points around the world.

But the department still intends to build swimming pools in Tehran, Port-Au-Prince and Seoul for the recreation of the foreign service officers and their families.

These glimpses of the state department budget were offered in closed-session testimony before a subcommittee of the House Appropriations subcommittee last January and February.

In censored transcripts made public today, subcommittee Chairman John J. Rooney, D. N. Y., indicated another state department program—teaching French to U. S. diplomats in a villa on the French Riviera—is too frilly and expensive to suit him.

State department officials headed by Deputy Undersecretary Loy Henderson acknowledged beach huts, mountain retreats and cabin boats had been combed out of an earlier recreation facilities program "in the light of the advice and guidance of this committee."

But the three swimming pools and other playground items are still needed to ease the hardship pools, overseas, they said.
