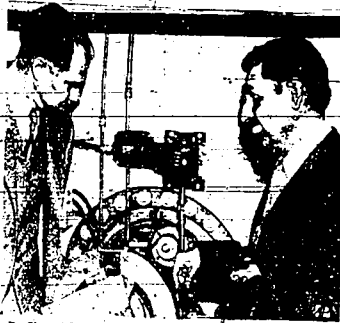

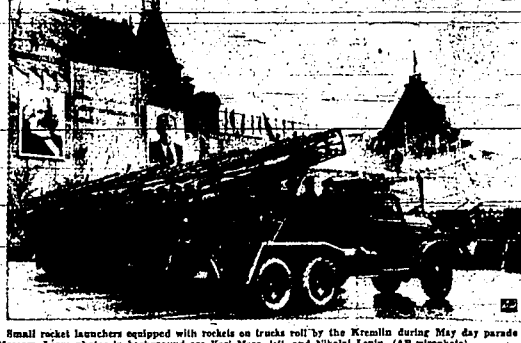

40 Indicted in Plots to Take Arms to Cuba

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., May 7 (AP)—A federal grand jury indicted 40 Latin, mostly Cubans, yesterday on a charge of trying to take a boatload of arms to Cuba and join a revolution against President Fulbright.

The indictments were issued March 27 on the south Texas coast in a 70-foot freighter by a coast guard cutter, which rammed the freighter three times.

The coast guard and customs agents seized a total of 40 men. They included 25 Cubans and one Mexican and four crewmen—one Panamanian and three Ecuadorians.

Subsequently, all except the Mexican and the boat crew went on a hunger strike. They dated, and some had to be sent to a hospital, until the night of April 2.

The grand jury studied the case all yesterday and returned the indictments today.

The charge specifies that they unlawfully, wilfully and knowingly did conspire to "begin and set on foot and to provide means for and to take part in military expeditions and enterprises to be carried on from within the United States and in particular from Brownsville, Tex., against the republic of Cuba; a foreign state, with which the United States at all times mentioned herein has been and is now at peace."

Words can get in the way of doing the things that you want to do so to do what your teachers and parents say. When telling a child what to do to use as few words as possible. Use only the briefest words. It is the trimmings that confuse.

A mother wants to send a child to school. "Maybelle, get your books and your school bag and get up stairs and on the left hand side of the bureau in my room you will find a simple arrangement. Now listen. It is lying on the top, on the left hand side of the bureau in my room. Bring it to me and I will send you to school."

By the end of this speech Maybelle has lost the thread of the story. Upstairs—maple—blue and lefthand—forget? Slowly she mounts the stairs and looks about for whatever she was sent to get. Maybe she sorts out the right thing, maybe she calls "m-mother" and did you say? What did you tell me to get? I forget. Maybelle is not yet ten and only 7 years old. How the important words of the direction were drowned.

Had her mother been content to make the statement and the question as bare of words as may be, then, before she tells the children to go to work on it she will have several of them state the problem in their own words. If this is not

done the language is likely to swamp the idea for the youngsters. This language difficulty is often the cause of seemingly aimless behavior. Words do not have the same meaning for them as they have for their elders. A child who is likely to drown out the meaning for them and confuse things beyond understanding. Speak slowly clearly and use as few words as possible and the children will appear to be so much brighter and obedient and teachers will be delighted at the child's progress.

There is a story that accents this. The secretary at the desk in an army office put up a sign. "Tell your story walking." A good idea for those who must communicate with children. Be brief, pointed, use no unnecessary words.

Report Shows Slight Dip for Farm Returns

BOISE, May 7 (AP)—Prices received by Idaho farmers dropped slightly in the past month, the department of agriculture reported yesterday.

The survey said the farm price index for April 1958 stood at 250 percent of the level in 1914, that was 2 percent under the level a month earlier but was 4 points higher than the level in the same month in 1957, when it was 242.

The lower index of prices reflects the all crops, compared to 1957, was brought about by a 10 percent lower average and alfalfa seed, along with a slightly lower average for wheat, but the department said more than offset the gains made by red clover seed, all hay and other commodities in the same as a crop index remained the same as a year earlier.

Livestock prices moved up, the department said, with the index set at 244 on April 15 compared with 204 on March 15 and 234 on April 15, 1957.

BRUSSELS, May 7 (AP)—Three weeks before the World Fair in Brussels Belgium from a good tourist buy to a nightmare of high prices.

So much so, in fact, that Belgian tourist chief Arthur Haulot has appealing to fair visitors to help him in his effort to bring inflation prices of hotel rooms and meals and "the other trimmings of a trip abroad have skyrocketed since the fair opened. There's a fear that thousands may go home in disgust rather than pay."

"Prices have risen," says tourist commissioner Haulot, "but there are bargains around. If the foreign tourist just refuses to pay exaggerated prices, we'll lick the inflation."

Haulot has price-control powers almost unprecedented for peace-time. He can blacked hotels that overcharge, obtain refunds and see that court action is taken through the ministry of economic affairs.

Before issuing his warnings to tourists, Haulot tried an appeal to hotel and restaurant owners.

But with a shortage of enforcement inspectors and a ready demand for anywhere to sleep and anything to eat, price control has largely been ignored.

Restaurants that charge legitimate prices have started handing out signs reading "No increase for the fair. Eat here for a dollar."

Music hall comedians are coming up with variations on the joke that "You can save money by visiting each of the 47 countries responsible instead of coming to Brussels to their pavilions."

Mountain Goat Hunts Set for North Idaho

BOISE, May 7 (AP)—Most of northern Idaho north of the main Salmon river will be open to general hunting of mountain goat this year, Rose Leonard, state fish and game department director, said Tuesday. Exceptions are Lemhi county and the Shoshone park and Big Malheur creek areas, which will be closed to mountain goat hunting this year.

In addition, Leonard said, 60 permits will be offered in 10 controlled hunts, all but one of them running from Sept. 6 through Sept. 26. The other will be a late season hunt Nov. 23 through Dec. 7 in Lemhi county, with only five permits available.

Two new areas are being added to the early controlled hunt, Leonard said. Two permits will be offered for a hunt in the vicinity of Atlanta on the Boise river and five for a hunt in Lemhi county north of the Salmon river.

It's Hard to Convince Backward People That Democracy Offers More Than Reds

By JAMES MARLOW
AP News Analyst

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—If you were born and raised in a backward or recently liberated country, which would seem to hold out to you a good life faster: the American way of life or the communist?

One of this country's greatest and most critical problems—in giving aid and encouragement to the backward and liberated nations—is in persuading them to take the Western road.

Over the week-end President Eisenhower emphasized the importance to the United States of non-communist countries everywhere.

"There is not a person in the United States that is not affected every single day by what happens in Africa, in far Asia, in Europe and all of South America. We are no longer independent economic units."

Allen Dulles, the best informed American on what the Russians are up to, recently stuck his finger into the middle of the problem in a talk of

to the 4th annual meeting of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

Dulles is the highest of Secretary of State Dulles. And as head of the central intelligence agency he has agents all over the world reporting back on communist activities everywhere.

He said: "For some reason the recently liberated countries seem to feel that the Kremlin has found a new and magic formula for quiet industrialization which is a hallmark of becoming a modern state."

In this country, with its long tradition and practice of democracy and its gradually modified form of capitalism, people have no trouble choosing between the freedom and fruits of democracy one one side and communism on the other.

But the people of this country have achieved their present industrial, social and scientific eminence and their living standards after many years of effort.

At the same time the best example of a backward country which has

made the most progress faster than Russia. Now put yourself in the position of a native of a backward country which has no long tradition of democracy or personal freedom.

Assume, too, that you want for yourself and your children food, job, a good home, education, medical care as fast as possible.

The United States isn't promising miracles overnight but the Communists are. Which would you choose?

This is what Dulles says: "Moscow's foreign aid program has particular appeal in the underdeveloped countries because Russia until so recently was an undeveloped country itself."

"They recognize American economic and industrial leadership in the world but they feel that the democratic process of economic development may be too slow."

"Bovine propaganda charges that it took the West 10 years to achieve industrially what the Soviets have built in a generation. In the newly developed countries the drive for

economic betterment has become a crusade, not always based on reason. "Also these countries feel that we in the United States are ahead of them and that while they may aspire eventually to an equality something like that of the Soviet Union, they cannot in the foreseeable future hope to reach the high standards of living of this country."




