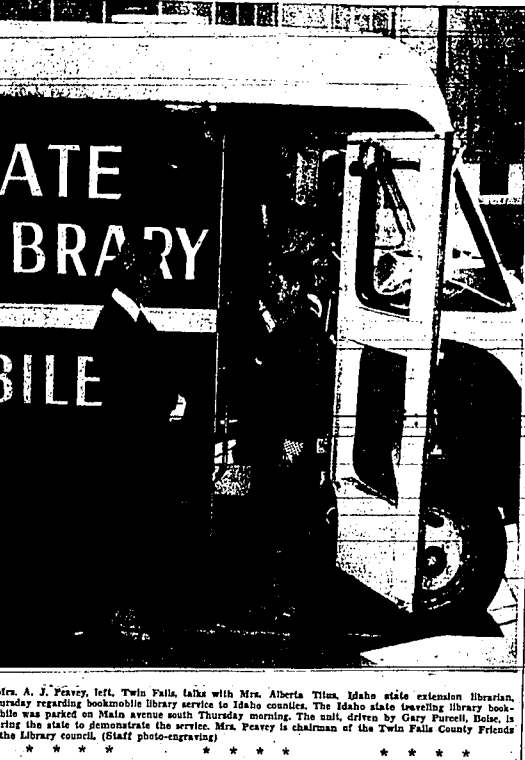

Butte County Assessor Hits Tax Opinions

ALCO, May 8 (AP)—Butte county Assessor Harold Anderson said yesterday he does not agree with the main tax commission's statement that assessors have difficulty gaining entry to atomic energy installations there. 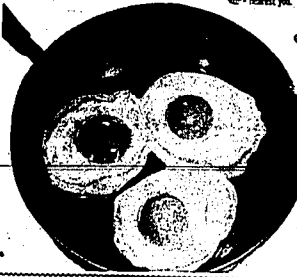

Handicapped Utah Woman Rates Honors

NEW YORK, May 8 (U)—A Salt Lake City woman, Mrs. Louise Lake, today was honored by the National Foundation for Infirmitis Paralysis as the "handicapped-American of the year."

Mrs. Lake, herself a polio victim and a director in the department of rehabilitation for the LDS hospital in Salt Lake City, is the first woman to receive the President's trophy from the foundation.

Dr. E. O'Connor, foundation president, said recognition of Mrs. Lake is a tribute to her courage and determination to overcome her handicap.

She has been teaching others at the LDS hospital to cope with the eating, dressing and personal hygiene problems faced by the handicapped.

Mrs. Lake was a victim of polio in 1945 and entered the hospital in 1955. She returned to Salt Lake City in 1956 and began her work at the hospital.

Rebels Claim Raid Knocks Out Airfield

SINGAPORE, May 8 (U)—The Indonesian rebels said today they have captured the airfield at Palembang, destroying two planes on the ground and damaging runways, communications and other facilities.

The rebel broadcast reporting the raid made no mention of casualties.

Amboib is a small government-held island near the coast of Dutch Guiana.

The insurgents' Manado radio reported that one of the bomber pilots was killed and another was wounded.

The rebels also reported that they had captured the airfield.

Mesh Damage
Soon afterward, rebel planes bombed Amboib, destroying two B-1 and one C-47 on the ground and all operational buildings and fuel dumps, the broadcast said.

The airfield was so damaged that it will be out of commission for a long time.

The "B-1" mentioned in the broadcast presumably was a B-17 or propeller-driven Mustang fighter of World War II vintage.

A rebel spokesman said the insurgents' raids of recent weeks have frightened shippers out of east Indonesia, leaving the sea "completely deserted."

Ships Turned Back
At least one liner scheduled for Indonesia has turned back here this week, and Singapore firms no longer issue war-risk insurance on ships bound for east Indonesia.

A Chinese businessman who arrived from Bandung today said Communist arms, equipment and technicians are pouring into Indonesia by sea and air. He cited reports that experts from Russia, Red China and satellite Czechoslovakia have arrived in recent weeks.

The loyalists said they have received their first jet planes—about 20 Russian MiG-17s.

The rebels have also captured the town of the communist world, but that no fighters or bombers have been received.

Firms Permitted To Redeem Land

LEWISTON, May 8 (U)—District Judge John W. Cramer ruled yesterday that the Bell Land and Cattle company and Foxley and company could redeem about 43,000 acres of land in Nez Perce and Lewis counties, although the firms had defaulted on payment.

The judge set a redemption payment of \$218,221.06 by May 20, plus daily interest of \$37.35 from March 23, and payment of rent, taxes, insurance premiums and other costs.

Bar Bell and Foxley were defendants in a suit brought by Mr. and Mrs. Ross Howard and Medicine Walter to quiet title to the large cattle ranch. They claimed the firms had defaulted on the purchase contract.

Judge Cramer ruled the companies had a right to redeem the land because of their large equity.

Hungarian Secret Courts Protested

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands, May 8 (U)—The International Commission of Jurists said last night the Hungarian communist government was holding secret trials of lawyers in Budapest.

In a communique, the commission said it has received information about the trials and that Secretary-General Norman B. Mackenzie of England has asked permission to attend as an observer. Mackenzie said he is unable to attend because of Hungarian Premier Ferenc Kadar's expressing concern regarding secret trials "under a legal regime which does not insure the minimum guarantees for the interest of accused persons."

Will Ike Do Anything Besides Talk as Major Problems Face Tough Battles?

WASHINGTON, May 8 (U)—President Eisenhower is getting his hair shaved on two major programs: the anti-communist campaign and the defense program. He has talked a lot in favor of both. It remains to be seen what the results will be.

He has a record of making public statements in behalf of programs he sends to congress and then leaving the intricacies to others—like the pressing member of congress but something then. Telephoning them.

It is for this fact particularly that he's been criticized for lack of leadership. Now his reciprocal trade program and his plan to reorganize the defense department are getting kicked around.

Take them one at a time:
Reciprocal trade—This 24-year-old program dies June 30 unless congress acts.

prolong it. Eisenhower has asked that the executive order be made permanent. He considers this program of the utmost importance in the long run. But there are many who are skeptical. The Russians are stepping up their trade program. The trade itself doesn't mean much to them.

Last November Premier Khrushchev said "we declare war upon the United States... in the peaceful field of trade." But three years ago he explained what was behind Russian trading.

"We value trade least for economic and most for political purposes." In 1957 American exports were \$2.1 billion. Imports only \$1.5 billion.

Eisenhower asked, from both Democrats and Republicans, a majority in both parties in the house appear to be against it.

Republicans oppose it in the house. Exports mean a lot of money to a lot of American workers and businessmen because of the competition involved. Knocking out the trade program would jeopardize the jobs of 4 million American workers. Part of the trade program not only complain it hurts them but argue tariff-setting should be controlled by congress.

Opposition is coming from the South where the textile and plywood industries feel hurt by imports; oil states in the Southwest are opposed; so are zinc and lead states in the West. And the coal miners of West Virginia are against it because imported fuel and residual oils are in competition with coal.

Defense reorganization—Its purpose is to provide the "unified planning and direction" of the armed forces by restructuring the authority of Secretary of Defense McNamara and the joint chiefs of staff.

Even the armed services themselves, as they expressed their views to congress, are divided: The army and air force are in favor; the navy and marines have found things about the plan they don't like.

And there's division in congress, even among the most powerful Democrats. For example:
Rep. Carl Vinson, D. Ga., chairman of the very influential armed services committee of the house, is the toughest and hottest foe. But

Rep. Clarence Cannon, D. Mo., and chairman of the extreme nationalist appropriations committee, is all-out the opposite.

There's a good chance—despite all Eisenhower's lipsticks to the contrary—that the plan will be badly watered down if not shored aside. Victory committee is writing a substitute proposal.

Just to show what kind of watered-down program faces us, let's look at the plan as it is. It's a package on the back of an envelope. Foreign aid—in this field Eisenhower's program looks healthier. He asked almost four billion dollars to continue it another year. The howl from affairs committee has moved after lobbying off \$300 million. It still may see rough days.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, May 8 (U)—A veteran Danish diplomat was charged yesterday with spying for foreign powers. He was held for trial.

The diplomat is Einar Hiechinger, 52, trade adviser at the Danish embassy in Bonn and formerly attached to the embassy in Washington.

Hiechinger was taken into custody by Danish security agents in Bonn after certain state papers were reported missing at the embassy.

WASHINGTON, May 8—A top labor spokesman told congress today they attempt to restrict the formation of unions would be "impractical, unjust and dangerous."

An administration-backed proposal before the committee to force unions to elect officers and amend laws by convention action drew Hayes' fire. He said the machinists have "sought and obtained democratic operation through direct membership referendum."

Opposes Change
"Any change," he said, would be "against our will, against our customs, and in spite of the successful operation of our own democratic procedures."

Hayes, whose union is rewarded the most in the many proposals to curtail the many proposals to curtail federal policing of unions.

Breathing the "fumes of democracy are many and varied." Hayes nevertheless supported certain proposed legislation for stiffening federal policing of unions.

Agricultural technology and farm belt politicians have squared off for a major tug of war.

Many farm politicians direct their energies essentially toward maintenance of the status quo. The main effect of many governmental programs in agriculture also is to slow down adjustment to change.

Agriculture is now in the midst of its third great revolution. It is changing from a way of living to a way of making a living. It is changing from a business of arts and crafts to a business undergirded with large amounts of science and technology. Productivity per worker on our commercial farms is increasing phenomenally. Still greater increases lie ahead, as we substitute more capital and technology for labor.

Will the people who man the farms of America be permitted to share fully in the benefits knowing about modern science and technology, or must they live with a ceiling over opportunity imposed by governmental programs designed to maintain small, inefficient, often peasant-type production and living units on the land?

The present agricultural revolution, resting on basic science and closely allied with the widespread advance of automation in both production and distribution, is threatening the traditional pattern of labor.

Will the people who man the farms of America be permitted to share fully in the benefits knowing about modern science and technology, or must they live with a ceiling over opportunity imposed by governmental programs designed to maintain small, inefficient, often peasant-type production and living units on the land?

displace men. We will produce more with fewer farms and with fewer workers.

This is not a new trend. It has been going on for decades. It has only been accelerated in the present decade. It will accelerate still more in the decades ahead. All the power of government can stop it, but it should not. It can only confuse the mind.

The point is that economies that are increasingly difficult for an individual, during his productive years, to accumulate a sufficient amount to finance an economically sized operating unit. This will become increasingly true in the decades ahead.

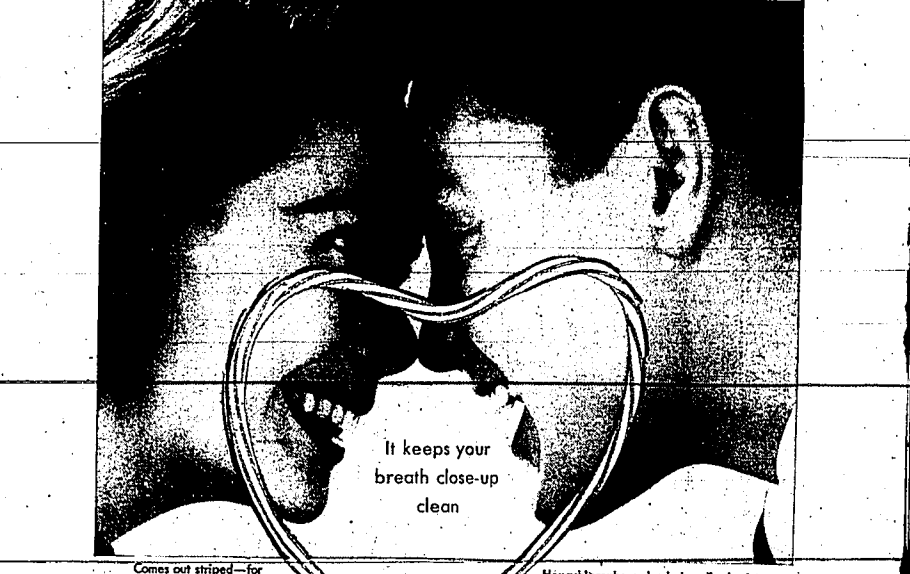

Survivors of Veterans Get Tip on Claim

Arnold H. Helweg, veterans administration representative here, outlined court procedure and tip on survivors of veterans in filing claims for compensation or pension.

1. If the veteran's death certificate does not contain a statement as to cause of death, it should be accompanied by a certificate from the attending physician or other competent person as to treatment and cause of death.
2. A widow filing a claim should furnish the record of her marriage to the veteran. If she or the veteran was previously married she should, if possible, furnish copies of the death or divorce certificates to establish that the previous marriages were dissolved.
3. If minor children are among the survivors, birth or baptismal records should be furnished, together with the names of both parents and date of birth. If the children were adopted, a copy of the court order should also be provided.
4. Parents filing a claim must establish their relationship to the veteran by furnishing the VA a certified copy of the veteran's birth or baptismal certificate containing the names of both parents.

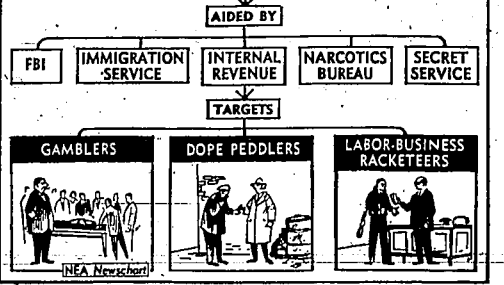

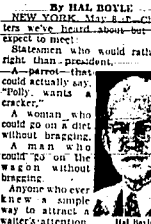

**Economy Buys
In Vegetables,
Meats on Lists**

Housewives and mothers get some cheerful news at their favorite store for Mother's day week-end—cheaper, more plentiful vegetables and a wide variety of economy cuts of meat.

The tried and true inexpensive standards such as chuck roast, ground beef and chickens will be featured in many supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores. To be sure, these specials are more costly than they once were, but at least they are less than steak and other fancy cuts.

Turkeys also will be the No. 1 item in some stores, reflecting the current plentiful supply of gobblers. Veal is more popular in recent weeks with offerings ranging from stew meat at low as 29 cents a pound to chops at 69 and 89 cents a pound.

Fish at Peak Season
Supplies of fish also are approaching their peak season with offerings of cod, haddock, flounder, smelt, herring and the easy-to-prepare fish sticks. Statistics show we eat an average of 159 pounds of red meat and 20 pounds of poultry apiece each year, but only 10 pounds of fish. This is less than the average of 11 pounds 50 years ago.

Vegetable prices, too, are lower as weather-delayed early spring crops come to market along with those normally sold in the stores at this time of year. More-than-seasonal drops are predicted in the next few weeks.

New Crops Arrive
Cabbage and celeriac are two good examples. The late unimpaired winter freeze in Florida sent prices soaring a few cents ago, but now crops planted when the weather eased are coming to town in increasing numbers. They compete with vegetables from other areas, leading to lower prices.

Other good buys this week are spinach, celery, endive, radishes, carrots, onions and potatoes. New arrivals from California supplementing the last of storage crops, while onions are available from nearby areas as well as the regular Texas crop.

Weather is still playing tricks on bargain-hunting shoppers, however. As California apparatus eased off, New Jersey was set to take over with its normal crop, but heavy rains hampered the Jersey harvest. The two states have 70 per cent of the nation's spinach acreage.

Sweet Corn Cheaper
Yellow sweet corn, on the other hand, is cheaper this week as supplies increase. It is a fairly good buy. Others in that category include yellow squash, snap beans, sweet potatoes, lettuce, eggplants and peppers. The latter two tend to small sizes, however.

Apples still rule as the best bargain among fruits, although watermelons are more plentiful with North Carolina joining the parade and Virginia expected to fall in line. A week or California's berry shipments increased this week, produce men say. Peas and Florida oranges are rated fairly good buys.

**Helicopter's Jolt
Dislodges Nickel
In Boy's Throat**

TWENTYNINE PALMS, Calif., May 8 (AP)—A hard landing in a helicopter ended a merry flight—and the need for it.

When a 3-year-old Frank Crouch swallowed a nickel, it lodged in his throat. He began to choke.

Doctors at Twentynine Palms marine base where Frank and his parents live—put the boy in a helicopter, fed him oxygen, and sent him to Riverside for hospital treatment.

After four minutes the pilot had trouble controlling the craft, and made what he called a "precautionary landing" on the desert.

"I went down hard—and so did the nickel," Frank swallowed hard and could breathe again. His parents, Capt. and Mrs. W. M. Crouch, took him to the hospital for observation. Doctors said nature would solve the boy's problem.

He met here with Louie Stubbins, secretary of the department of commerce and development, J. H. Swinney, director of the Idaho Historical society, and officials in the sign division of the department of highways.

**Borrowers in
Minidoka Are
Paying Loans**

RUPERT, May 8—Of a three-million-dollar total cash farm income for Minidoka in 1957, nearly one million has been paid back to the farm home administration, according to Robert J. Harrison, county supervisor.

Following an analysis of the crop year of 1957, 229 homesteaders showed a total income of \$2,375,700 as compared to 268 area borrowers with a total income of \$3,194,675. The area covered by the district includes Minidoka and the east end of Jerome counties.

Of the two million dollars remaining, over \$500,000 was spent for farm living and \$300,000 for capital expenditures. The borrowers spent an average of \$2,050 for farm operating expenses.

First-crop homesteaders had 102 per cent of the county average in potato production; 91 per cent in wheat and 88 per cent in sugar beets. Third-crop homesteaders had 113 per cent in potatoes, 114 per cent wheat and 104 per cent sugar beets.

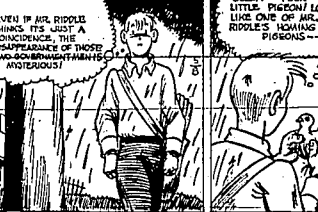

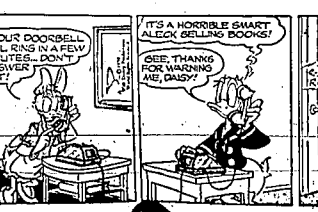

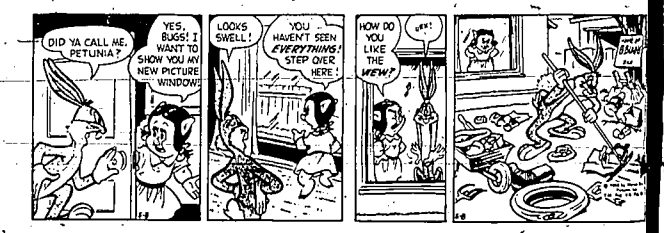

Attitude Must Change Before System Of Education, ISC Professor Asserts

BY GEORGE E. RECKLER, Ph.D. (Assistant Professor of Chemistry) Idaho State College, Pocatello, May 8—In the post- Sputnik era, the educational system is being re-examined. Apparently the education which our children receive must be improved in order to enable them to defend the American way of life.

However, since the educational system is a direct result of the American way of life, there should be some modification in our philosophy to permit any change in the educational system. The American school teachers is frequently one of mild contempt, or of complete indifference. Many Americans regard the school as a process through which one must pass in order to get to the place to which they will not be a better mother of the day.

To enable improvement in the educational system, attitudes must change. Knowledge is not the end of the universe in which we live as man's greatest legacy and must be given adequate training from the day of his birth. In the schools this training is formalized and systematized in order that some of man's knowledge, gained since the dawn of history, could be given in the best form to each person for his own use. The teachers who preach that knowledge is the end of the universe, will respect the teachers and the schools, only if respect be accorded.

Two criticisms frequently heard in recent months are that teachers are too "soft" on the students and that the "life adjustment" method of teaching is inadequate. The term "life adjustment" has many meanings. In most elementary schools the "life adjustment" philosophy has the implication that pupils need only spend class time daily at their studies to be passed from grade to grade. As a consequence many students in the sixth grade may have reading ability equivalent only to that which their fellows acquired in the third or fourth grade.

It is believed that students learn more if kept with others of the same age level than they will if put with younger students. It is also believed that the social development of the child is best if he is in class with children of his own age group.

Whether one agrees with the above educational philosophy or not, it must be recognized that skillful and competent teachers endorse it. Unfortunately, it engenders an attitude in students which should not be encouraged in school just as it is not encouraged in life in general. The youth learn that they may succeed with little effort and expect to obtain philosophical of teaching.

The unusual person may be able to teach a subject in which he has not had thorough training. Unfortunately, many of us in the teaching field are not of this caliber. If many of our colleagues when a student finds the course of study he has selected too difficult, particularly in science, he is likely to change to a teacher-training curriculum because it offers an easy path to a college degree.

It do not mean to imply that there are not able students in teacher training, but that these courses are so easy that incompetent students are apt to gravitate toward them. To insure more highly qualified teachers in our school system it would be well to modify many teacher-training programs to include more study in selected major fields such as English, foreign languages, mathematics, physics, etc.

It is believed that the improvement in the subject has a deeper knowledge of the subject and more complete, completion of more division requirements in a subject would give the future teacher more valuable training in mental discipline.

This kind of training is sadly lacking in programs which require that the future teacher complete only the minimum requirements and sophomore requirements to his selected field.

To screen out the incompetent student it is necessary only that the faculty of such a teacher-training program maintain quality standards which will eliminate the totally unfit. I believe the students in such a teacher-training program should welcome the opportunity to study a chosen field more thoroughly. Certainly all teachers graduating from such a program would merit our respect.

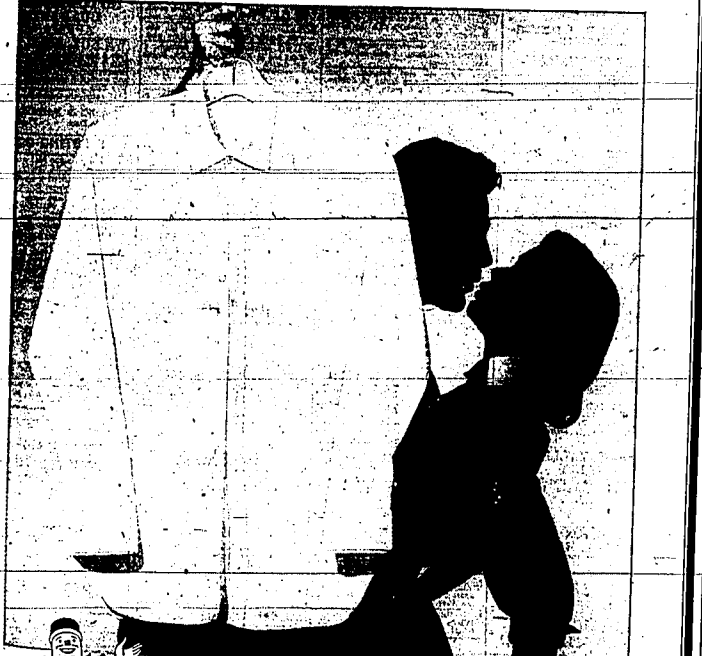
