That's what we have got to do if we expect to avoid a depression, war and trouble.



BURLEY, May 10—The congressional social committee of the Chamber of Commerce met at 7:30 a. m. Friday at a breakfast session to hear Judd Sedam present a discussion on the social security legislation now before congress.

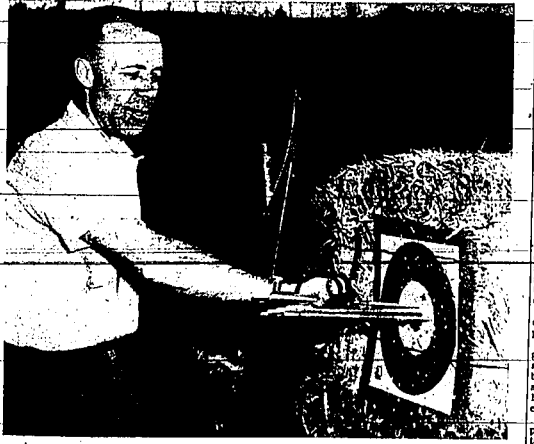

Injuries included a broken right femur, broken right collarbone, severe hand and face injuries, concussion and shock. David's two months in a body cast, Benedict's hospital, JEROME, were helped by the expert care and facilities available to distract a small boy's attention from his painful injuries. His mother was only allowed to spend the afternoon and evening visiting hours with him, which she did every day. The collection of her responses helped his adjustment to the changed routine and confinement. When David came home in a body cast covering the lower half of his body and both legs, he brought with him a beloved scrapbook holding many cards sent to him by well-wishers. At home Mrs. Ross undertook to make her son comfortable. Most disheartening was the pain incurred from traction abrasions on his ankles, heels and right foot. 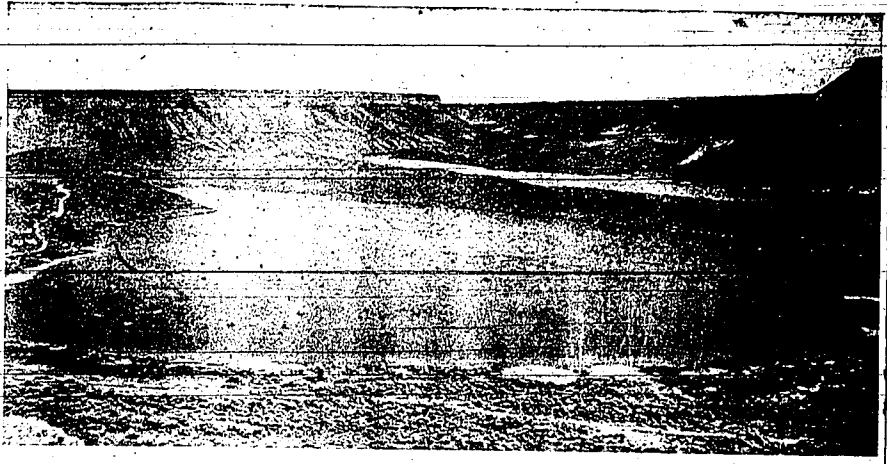

## Old Days of Refuge for Specific Use of Wildlife Only Are Gone for Idaho

Once upon a time, and not too long ago, almost any kind of real estate that was set aside for wildlife purposes really was "set aside." Within its boundaries nobody was allowed to use a gun, bow and arrow, trap or fish hook. The area was reserved as a sort of "nest plot" for wildlife—and that was that.  
Today, the special wildlife management areas that are needed for wildlife purposes usually include some crucial "set-aside" segments of the life cycle structure of one or more wildlife species. Some are dry water ranges where a short-term winter forage threatens to reduce the numbers and vigor of a big game herd.  
Some are wetlands (often waste areas) that furnish a vital link in the chain-of-waterfowl resting, nesting, feeding and loafing areas that is essential in keeping the fly-ways full of birds. Some are planned primarily to benefit upland birds—All have one thing in common—they serve some essential purpose for the species in question.  
So far, the same thing might have been said of many of the old-time "refuges" or "preserves." But here is where the difference comes in. Today, other uses of the areas are allowed, or even encouraged, so long as they do not interfere with the essential purpose for which the area was acquired.

The Idaho fish and game department has a considerable area of wildlife management areas which are already doing a substantial job of furnishing recreation to the public. They are a small segment of the recreation opportunity in Idaho at present, but as economic development and population increases continue, the contribution of these areas will become more important.  
Chief among the areas making an important recreational contribution are those on large reservoirs and lakes, those associated with the Hagerman fish hatchery, and the North Lake-Market Lake waterfowl projects. Others are smaller, but are locally important. Some are little more than plots of land acquired to enable the public to reach an important fish or game resource in order to share in the harvest. A few are nothing more than spaces for a road to go down to the water's edge, and room at the end to launch a few boats.

On the major areas, the one at Lake Pend Oreille is outstanding. Public parking, picnic tables, boat landing and other minimum facilities were used by 21,109 people between May 1 and November 30, 1957.  
The C. J. Strike area, where development is less far advanced, recommended 2262 throughout the year, including 1500 fishermen, 653 hunters, 209 picnickers, and 183 others. The high point of the year was April when 618 people were checked.  
This record does not include the

many fishermen using the Crane Falls lake area since seepage from the reservoir has developed a fabulous little 80-acre trout fishery. Biologists warn that the high initial production of such a water may soon begin to taper off, but while it is good, Crane Falls lake has been terrific.  
A graded road and boat landing areas have made the lake available to thousands of fishermen. On opening day (May 1 this year) there were about 150 boats on the lake by 8:30 in the morning, and by nightfall 847 fishermen had been checked out with about 2,500 fish.  
At Hagerman, 8,072 hunters and fishermen were checked during the year; to say nothing of hundreds of visitors who stop by the hatchery to watch its operations and gaze with awe upon the raceways swimming with trout, or merely for a nice place to eat their picnic lunch. On the Hagerman wildlife management area surrounding the hatchery are several fresh water lakes constructed or improved by the department for fishing. These drew 2,818 fishermen during July, alone.  
In eastern Idaho, North Lake is developing into an important hunting and fishing ground, and will be even more so with the further development of the new water-lake area near Roberts. At North Lake nearly 3,000 fishermen, hunters

and others were checked—a number that can be expected to increase as the resources available in the area build up.  
These are only the most outstanding from the point of view of human recreation. Others are of great importance in the service they perform for wildlife, though only a few hundred human visitors may be counted in a year. One of their important functions is as feeding and wintering areas for waterfowl, and for upland birds as a "byproduct."  
Though most of the wildlife management areas are made up of rather rough and marginal lands, most of them have patches that can be partially cultivated. Green crops planted on these lands for game birds are partly cut down and left on the ground, and partly left standing. Wintering birds clean it all up, neatly every year, though some of the plantings are substantial.  
For example, at North Lake 165 acres were planted to grain last year, and 80 acres at Market Lake. Wildlife management areas also produce the hay that is stored each year in department storage near deer and elk wintering areas to be conveniently at hand in case emergency feeding should be necessary.  
Other habitat improvements also are being made on riparian areas: Perennial grasses, shrubs, trees and other forage, food or shelter plants-

ings are made on a continuing program so that the habitat offered by the area is continually improved. Growing stocks of game species other than those primarily concerned in the original plan, reflect the success of the program.  
However, it still should be remembered that those are "people areas." No longer maintained as inviolate refuges, these areas are serving their full purpose for wildlife, plus additional value for human recreation.

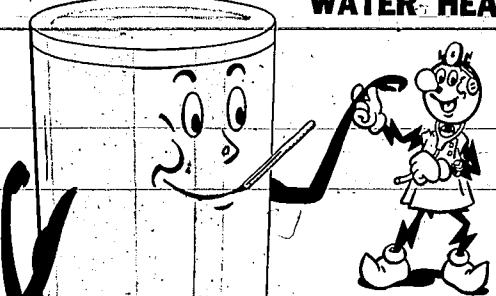

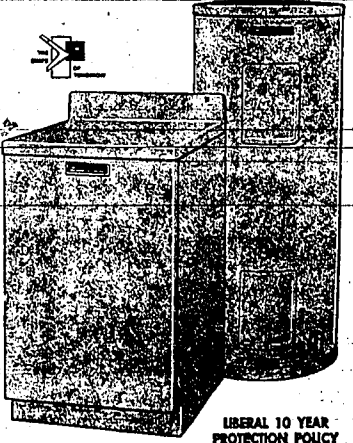

Archery, consists of 14 target sports, similar to a golf course. Practice targets are available, too.

The club holds inter-club competitive matches twice a month plus 1500 Invitational tournaments a year open to all archery clubs in the state.

Archers also participate in state, sectional and national matches held each year. The Twin Falls club was host to the state archery tournament in 1955 which saw 180 archers aiming arrows at targets on the three new field courses.

Some members of the club are enthusiastic about archery. "I guess it is because archery is so wholesome and is such a broad sport. The things a person can do with a bow and arrow are unlimited. Hunting for big and small game, shooting birds and shooting fish is part of the sport and archers have organized games to play with bows and arrows such as archery golf or competitive target shooting."

Most popular use of the ancient but modernized weapons is hunting the same now as when the weapons were invented.

Arrows shot from bows have killed animals as small as rats up to elephants. Birds and fish have gasped their last as victims of archers.

And as a hunting weapon, the bow and arrow has proved safer than rifle, Burson points out. Not until recently has a fatal accident occurred from a bow and arrow and that accident was one in a million shot. A man shot at a deer on top of a mountain and missed, but the arrow continued on ward and struck another hunter on the other side of the mountain.

The elephant killed by an arrow was dropping through the jungle in Africa when an archer dropped it using a bow with a 103-pound pull, about the most powerful bow ever used in modern times. The arrow did it to win a bet, Burson explains. Many members of the local archery club report having killed deer during special bow hunting seasons and add it is more fun than killing deer with a rifle. Stalking the deer makes the sport because the hunters have to be much closer than men with rifles.

Killing game with arrows is much more humane than using rifles because the arrows, if they are sharp, do not cause the animals as much pain as bullets. Burson tells of one instance where a deer was shot with an arrow and the deer kept on grazing until it fell dead from loss of blood, not aware that the sharp arrow had penetrated its body.

Pheasants and ducks have been dropped by hunters using bows and arrows. The archers have a special arrow with light steel rings on the point which form a pattern to make it easier to hit birds. "The rings serve an additional purpose of preventing an arrow from penetrating the bird's body when hit, according to James Middleton, a much experienced member of the club.

Small game such as rabbits are fairly easy for experienced archers

to bag, Burson says. Duke Florence, a member of the archery club, bagged a roe buck last Sunday by this practice at the archery range.

Who are often the target of archers, too, are porcupines, foxes, fish such as carp and suckers are fair game for archers year round in streams and lakes, which are open for normal fishing during the season. Special barbed arrows are used.

Where archers have access to the ocean, they shoot sharks and other big fish using bows and arrows. Big arrows attached to regular fish lines.

The expense of outfitting an archer is relatively small compared to outfitting a hunter or fisherman, Burson explains. The needed equipment includes a bow, 6 to 12 arrows, shooting glove, arm guard and quiver for the arrows. A complete outfit can be purchased for about \$35, Burson says. However, that price is for a very inexpensive bow. Better, but more expensive equipment may be as high as \$90.

Dependent on the archer's needs after he becomes experienced and the hunting accomplished, the expense of archery equipment varies.

There is special equipment for special purposes. Burson adds. Besides the special arrows to shoot fish and birds, there are special arrows for hunting big game, small game, and there are target arrows.

And special bows are made for special "shores," too. "The bows are made to have either a weak or strong pull which is determined in pounds. When an archer refers to a bow having a 50-pound pull, he means 50 pounds is required to pull the bow the full length of a standard 28-inch arrow.

The amount of pull for a bow should correspond with the strength of the user, Burson explains. If a person can successfully pull a 50-pound bow, it does not mean that if a person can successfully pull a 50-pound bow all day, then the bow is right for the person.

Archery equipment manufacturers make three types of bows, the most expensive type is made of a piece of wood or fiberglass and has the ends bent slightly in the opposite direction of the feathered pull. The semi-recurve bow is in the middle of the cost bracket, yet it can have varying amounts of power. The full recurve bow is the most common among archers of the Twin Falls club, the full recurve is made of either wood or fiberglass or a combination of both and has the ends bent sharply in the opposite direction of the pull.

Most of the full recurve bows are made of laminated wood with fiberglass face and back.

The most common arrows used by the archers are made of Port Orford cedar, a straight-grained, strong aromatic cedar which has good spine qualities. Burson explains manufacturers also make aluminum and fiberglass arrows, but they are almost twice as expensive as wooden arrows so few archers use them.

Trick stick arrows use aluminum

without too-foo feathers when shooting birds," Middleton says.

The equipment used today, as compared to that used by the Indians, is considerably better because of the advancements made in design and use of materials, Burson notes.

The bows of the American Indians that reached the West during the pioneer days are of no comparison to present-day bows. Burson believes an Indian bow of comparable size to the archer's present-day bow with a 50-pound pull would not throw the arrow as far because the Indian bows did not have the cast of present-day bows.

A modern bow with 60 pounds pull will propel an arrow about 400 yards, he says.

The archery club vice president, John Routh, demonstrated the power of a 60-pound bow by shooting an arrow without a point into a one-inch thick piece of wood from a distance of 25 feet. The arrow went through the wood and about one and one-half inches protruded on the opposite side of the board.

Cross bows have considerable penetrating power. They are seldom used by members of the archery club. In fact the club will not use a cross bow because they are so dangerous as a loaded rifle," he says.

All Twin Falls archers shoot their bows by instinct, which means they do not use sights on the bows. Sights are available which screw onto the center of the bow and provide what better accuracy, Burson says, but slow down shooting, thus the archers try to do without them and build their ability on instinct.

The field archery course is used similarly to a golf course by the archers. There are 14 targets on the course, each target spaced around the course as are the holes of a golf course. The archers go around the course in groups of four, each archer shooting four arrows at six degrees with a possible score of 30 on each target and a possible score of 240 on the entire course. No archer has ever shot a perfect score on the course.

Some archers play archery golf, using a golf course but shooting arrows with the final objective of hitting a yarn ball on the green instead of putting a golf ball into a hole on the green.

Members of O-Yo-Kwa-Bowmen club compete among themselves, betting leather discs called "clubs" which they purchase from the club. The person with the most leather discs at the end of the year receives a goat prize, usually a good trophy, according to Burson.

Other competition prizes are awarded members too, he says, including pins for women who get a score of 25 or better on the field course and for men who get a score of 150 or better.

All of the local competitive matches are in preparation for competition in state, sectional and regional matches held each year.

The state match will be held this year at Coeur d'Alene, according to Burson. The sectional match of five northwestern states will be held in Bend, Ore., and the national match is scheduled for Dravling, Mich. Approximately 1,200 archers are expected at the national matches.

The archery club offers new members a seven-week course in archery in the last class completed just three weeks ago. 14 persons attended, Burson notes. The only members for persons attending the classes are to be more than 12 years old and to provide their own arrows.

### Construction Boost Shown Here in April

Authorized construction during April in Twin Falls, represented by 41 permits and valued at \$223,300, was 52 1/2 per cent above last year, according to state building permit data released by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

For the first four months a total of 118 permits, valued at \$755,185 were 38.2 per cent above last year. Included were 52 permits for new dwelling units, valued at \$469,000, or 59 per cent above last year.

In the state-wide picture, the report shows employment in construction, as given by the Idaho state employment service, is approximately five per cent higher than last year.

New dwelling units authorized in April in the nine leading cities in Idaho and the metropolitan area adjacent to Boise totaled 209, some 60 per cent above April, 1935.

Idaho Falls continues to lead all other cities in residential and total construction. However, in eight of the nine cities, both residential and total construction are above last year.

Availability of mortgage money and somewhat lower interest rates are in contrast to conditions one year ago. FHA and even VA mortgage funds have entered the market in significant quantities, and the relatively better prices for land and income from potatoes and cattle have also influenced demand for housing, the report states.

Percentage change from April, 1935, to last month show Twin Falls up 102 1/2 per cent on new dwellings, down 24 1/2 per cent on total residential construction; down 35 1/2 per cent on alterations and repairs, with an increase of 20 1/2 per cent on total construction.

### Particularly Pets Animals Are Blamed for Spreading Much Disease

The fact that a three-day conference on animal disease and human health was held last September in New York under the auspices of the New York academy of sciences and the U. S. public health service offers testimony to the importance of animals as a source of human disease. The disorders which are involved are vast in number and their causes range from viruses and higher forms of life, such as animal parasites (worms) and fungi.

Some of the diseases which can be spread from animals to human beings are well known, such as brucellosis or undulant fever, and rabies or hydrophobia. Others will probably be unfamiliar to most readers under such names as leptospiral (Weil's disease), or listeriosis.

Some of the diseases which are spread from domestic animals, some from wild animals and some from birds, some like Rocky Mountain spotted fever, or plague, animals and pets are likely to come

in closer contact with human beings.

Even man's best friend, the dog, can be responsible for human ailments. Some fungus diseases (commonly called ringworm) can be spread by these animals. Furthermore, some of the intestinal worms or parasites can attack human beings as well as the dog.

For these reasons dogs should not be allowed to lick children, and parents should be careful to avoid letting their children come in contact with dog waste in sandboxes or other play areas.

But when reasonable precautions are followed, the pleasure which children receive from pets usually outweighs the dangers of contracting disease from them.
