Judges Asked To Overhaul Tax Decision

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Atty. Gen. Graydon W. Smith asked the Idaho supreme court yesterday for a rehearing in a controversial income tax case. He argued the court's decision might cost the state "thousands and thousands of dollars."

The court held that Roy V. Carl, a Potlatch electrician, could claim this travel expense to and from the site of construction job as income tax deductions because he works at the site as temporary and short duration.

Smith argued that there is no distinction in the state income tax between temporary and permanent employment in determining whether travel expenses are deductible.

He said the state tax collector had denied such deductions ever since the law was passed in 1921. Since that time, he added, the section involved has been re-enacted eight times without changing its meaning.

"By refusing to follow long and consistent administrative construction, which has received legislative approval and is this law, this court is judicially jeopardizing the fiscal management of this state," the attorney general said.

Revenue Needed

Smith recalled that the 1957 legislature "had to hold over beyond terms in order to find ways and means to get additional revenue."

By the court's opinion in the Carl case, he argued, "the admirable effects of the legislature are nullified."

He said the law could amount to many thousands of dollars in actual revenue, plus the expense of going to court in borderline cases arising under the court's interpretation of the law.

Torn-up Streets, Heavy Rains Plague Burley's Businessmen

BURLEY, May 13 — Guest speakers at the Chamber of Commerce membership meeting Monday noon were Mayor J. Leonard Saltonstall, Joe Hucklebee, city engineer, Harold Holmes of the Holmes construction company, who has the state contract on current street reconstruction in the city and Tom Hartz and Marie Harting of the state highway department.

They were invited to bring businessmen and property owners up to date on the street program. Mayor Saltonstall was introduced by Cliff Blom, president, and acted as moderator. The mayor said the street program was progressing as fast as possible under the circumstances.

Harting explained that the highway department didn't expect such soft conditions so deep and that the moisture content in the ground warranted a drying out period before the fill. He said if rain stops it would be only a short time until the surface.

In answer to requests for the streets to be repaved after the flooding said the department had "budgeted" because the soil tests proved that it would not be feasible to make it any better than absolutely necessary.

Harting Holmes thanked the merchants for their cooperation and patience and said that there is only one way to build a road, to start at the bottom and build it all at once. Plans were to have the job finished one month ahead of the contract, deadline, Oct. 1, but rain has delayed the work.

Hucklebee said the Olathe Nelson construction company, also had been delayed by rain. He said an irrigation lateral had flooded Twenty-first street Sunday night but it was fixed. He assured his listeners that the contractor would not constrain the work with the merchants or that business would be completely isolated when work begins on the downtown alleys. He said alleys construction would start as soon as the streets are filled and made passable. He added merchants would be informed two or three days in advance of construction in their immediate vicinity and delivery trucks will unload in alleys by 10 or 11 a.m. to make way for construction.

Holmes explained that at the end of each day's work the company tries to give everyone an approach to his business.

Concerning rebuilding sidewalks, Tom Hartz explained that wherever the contractor was at least a new sidewalk would be supplied. He told those who wanted to replace sidewalks on their own volition that a subcontractor was available.

The problem of air-conditioner drainage is the major problem on alleys, according to Hucklebee. He said the building code provides all air-conditioners will drain through ordinary drainage vents and not into the alleys, causing surface to break up.

Building Hike May Put Stop To Recession

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—"Home building will lead us out of the current business recession. This optimistic estimate came yesterday from Neil O. Severin, president of the National Association of Home Builders, who said it was based on widespread industry reports of a healthy spring in building. Severin gave much credit for the housing gains to this spring's \$1,650,000,000 bond issue. He said new funds available for mortgages, lowered down payment requirements on some government-insured mortgages and extended the GI home loan program another two years.
