U.S. Navy Ship Is Believed Going to Coast of Lebanon

Fears of Assassination Cut Short; Plans Remain Secret

Nixon's Visit to Venezuela

GIBRALTAR, May 14 (AP)—A 12-ship U. S. navy amphibious task force sailed hurriedly for secret orders tonight for the eastern Mediterranean, apparently to take up ready positions in the Lebanon crisis. Two amphibious force flagships carrying United States Marines each led a squadron of attack transport, landing ships and supply vessels away from this western Mediterranean naval bastion. The U. S. navy refused to disclose their mission, but it is believed they have moved to assume positions within reach of the Lebanese coast 2,000 miles to the east.

Like Says Nixon Riot Shows Red Influence

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—President Eisenhower today may have been reflecting a pattern of communist inspiration and exploitation. But, he told a news conference, he believes economic troubles are partly responsible for the anti-American demonstrations in such countries as Venezuela and Peru. Eisenhower said the Communist Party has been behind the demonstrations in some other parts of the world, but added that the unrest in France Algeria may be something else.

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—The cost of living in the United States rose to a new high in April for the 24th consecutive month, the national industrial conference board announced today. Consumer prices in April rose 0.4 per cent from March and 3.4 per cent from the same month in 1957. The index for April 1958 is 100.4, up from 100.0 in March 1958 and 97.0 in April 1957.

The time and method of Nixon's departure had been a cause of concern of officials both here and in Washington because of the attack yesterday which he and his wife narrowly escaped serious injury or death.

France Sends General to Take Command From Algerian Rebel

PARIS, May 14 (AP)—The French government today ordered Gen. Raoul Salan to take over command of Algeria from an insurrectionist junta led by a tough paratrooper. Premier Pierre Pflimlin also banned all public demonstrations throughout France and in Algeria. Salan, commander of all troops in Algeria, was ordered to take full command in the North African colony from paratrooper Gen. Jacques Massu. Massu demanded that President Rene Coty put various cabinet orders to delay at the head of a government outside the cabinet. "This would be a military dictatorship," he said.

Bank Charter Case Is Taken To High Court

BOISE, May 14 (AP)—A legal brief defended the Idaho finance commissioner's right to refuse a charter application to the Federal Reserve Bank of Central Idaho, and asked the state supreme court to set aside a lower court judgment which had ordered him to do so.

An appeal against the 10th district court decision was filed yesterday in the Idaho supreme court by Attorney General Graydon U. Spaulding.

The appeal brief argued that the federal court was wrong in ordering the bank chartered after a decision in March, 1957, at Grangeville, site of the proposed institution.

Grangeville had one previous banking facility, a branch of the First Security Bank of Idaho.

The application for the new bank had been filed in March, 1956, by a group of Grangeville residents. They filed suit to compel the issuance in December, 1956, contending the charter was justified.

The appeal brief quoted a state supreme court decision in 1954 which held that the state could not charter a bank in a place where a new bank is established.

Attorneys for the state also contended that the Grangeville residents "sufficiently failed to show any clear right to the duty sought, and is a refusal upon the commissioner to act favorably upon their applications."

Caldwell Area Water Supply Not Approved

CALDWELL, May 14 (AP)—Approval for the Idaho department of health said yesterday that the Caldwell water system in most communities of the Caldwell area is not approved. He said only the system in Parma has the unqualified approval of the department.

Keith Kay, director of health education, reacted to a query resulting from a recent outbreak of illness in Alder, farming community 10 miles west of Caldwell. Many residents of the area were stricken and the ailment was traced to a contaminated water supply.

Kay said that the Caldwell water system has only provisional approval and there are reservations in the approval of systems of all other communities in the county, with the exception of Parma.

He said the health department has in power to enforce its findings. He said it only makes recommendations and attempts to educate residents of a community in making the necessary improvements.

Cancels Permit

The commission said the health department had not appeared to answer orders issued to show cause why the permit should not be revoked.

WASHINGTON-Speaker Sam Rayburn has become the main thing to a political dictator on capitol hill since the reign of the late "Uncle Joe" Cannon 30 years ago. Whatever domestic or foreign legislation comes before the house is first examined by the speaker...

Never in its life has the Soviet Union been able to maintain a successful propaganda line indefinitely. Sooner or later its real purposes are showing, and the game is up with all but the totally blind and gullible.

Many questioned their sincerity in this proposal, but still insisted it would have tremendous effect around the world. Let's assume that it did, but now what have they done? With a marvelous chance to prevent good intentions by accepting President Eisenhower's Arctic inspection plan...

And that means that always Russian peace proposals are intended not seriously but for propaganda effect. A nation truly committed to the achievement of a lasting peace would grasp earnest proposals calling for rigid enforcement of arms control, arms production, and managing military maneuvers.

When the Russian news item was broached the idea of new summit talks, the United States government was widely berated both at home and in many quarters abroad for its evident reluctance.

It's the same old Kremlin, and so it will be, through gimmick after gimmick designed to trick the world's peace-hungry billions.

Such an improvement in Secretary Benson's acceptance seems to be coincident with evidence of new top-shelf and down-shelf news items coming to be rather commonly remarked now-days as "no-recession-in-agriculture" and "no-matter-of-farm-terms-problem" of last year were about 10 per cent farm crops of April, 1957, which is the seasonally-farm crop rose only 3 per cent in that period.

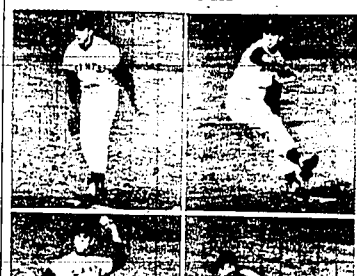
