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12 Dead as Two Planes Meet in Air

BRUNSWICK, Md., May 20 (AP)—A Capital Airlines turbo-prop plane with seven passengers and a crew of four collided with a military plane in partly clear skies above the Potomac River valley today. All 11 in the passenger plane were killed, and a 23rd in the military plane was killed in the crash. The pilot of the Maryland air national guard plane, Capt. Julius R. McCoy of Baltimore, parachuted and was taken to Frederick Memorial hospital at Frederick, Md., with severe burns on his face and hands.

City Manager Predicts Surplus In Budget as Spending Declines

The city of Twin Falls is not spending as much money as anticipated in the yearly budget and, in fact, receiving more income than expected, City Manager Joseph Lattimore reported Monday night at the regular meeting of the Twin Falls city commissioners. Lattimore estimated that receipts paid into the overall general fund will be \$156,000 more than anticipated and expenses from that fund will be about \$25,000 less than budgeted for last year.

WASHINGTON, May 20—The state department informed senators yesterday that Vice President Nixon was warned in advance of the "dangerous" situation in Venezuela and was told of rumors of an assassination attempt before he reached that country on his recent goodwill trip. But Robert Murphy, deputy secretary of state, told the senate foreign relations committee. On the basis of assurance by the Venezuelan government of its security measures, violence in Caracas was not anticipated. The intensity of the demonstrations which followed and the failure of the Venezuelan security forces to act effectively were not foreseen.

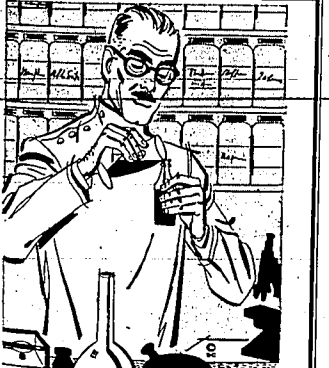

NOTICE MAY 20 — Clarence E. White, Idaho state director of the Department of Agriculture, announced today that the postoffice department will distribute nearly 1,000 livestock survey cards this week in cooperation with his office. It is expected that the cards will be in the hands of livestock raisers by the first of the week. The cards are to be used to obtain accurate information on the number of animals on hand and the acreage of crops. This information is used to determine the need for individual crops this season.

About half of the cards are pre-addressed by the state administrator's office and the other half are being distributed randomly to other farmers and ranchers throughout the state. About 2,000 acreage cards also were mailed within the next few days to crop reporters from the state's office.

White noted the U. S. postoffice will send the cards to their respective offices for their cooperation in the survey.

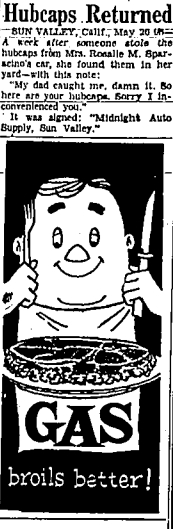

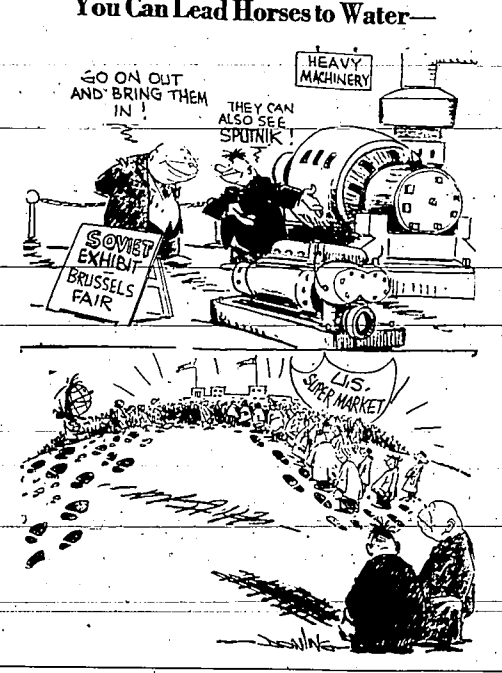

Idaho Official Seeks Rocket Blasting Sites

BOISE, May 20 (AP)—Idaho's aeronautics director said yesterday he may hire him up within the next two weeks an area intended for controlled experiments in rocket launches.

That until he does, Chet Moulton said, any unapproved launching could result in penalties for those responsible. He listed as possible penalties a \$1,000 fine for setting a fire on the public domain and legal suits for damages to property.

Moulton said that if experiments get in a hurry and send up their rockets before the final completed arrangements for the controlled launches then a ban on all launches could be ordered by the next state legislature.

"All I want," Moulton said, "is to see that any launches are done in an orderly and safe manner. I don't want to prohibit them but there have been too many instances of serious damage to property and injury and death as a result of uncontrolled launches."

There have been no deaths from rocket firings in Idaho, although there have been elsewhere in the nation.

In Idaho Falls, J. L. Peterson said he hopes to launch two rockets by mid-June if weather conditions are favorable. He said he is going ahead with his plans despite the ban ordered by Moulton, on unlicensed launches.

Peterson said the Idaho Falls rocket society that written Moulton several letters but received no reply. Moulton said he wrote Peterson last week.

Moulton said he is negotiating for two sites at present, one to serve the Magic Valley area and Boise valley and the other to accommodate rocket launches in eastern Idaho. He said he hopes to complete arrangements for one of them within two weeks.

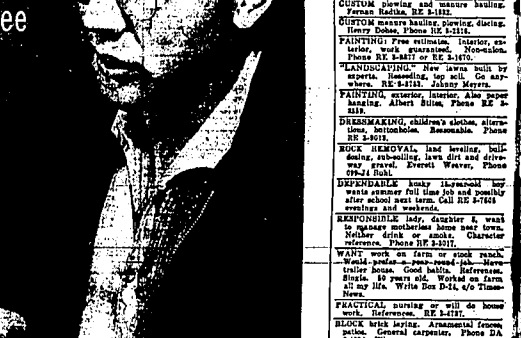

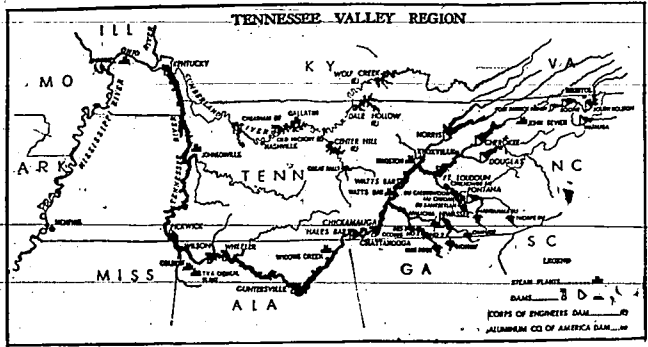

Coupon Ruled Not Right Way To Have Name Taken off List

BOISE, May 20—Atty. Gen. Donald W. Smith ruled yesterday that signers of "right to work" petitions can have their names removed, but not simply by clipping a coupon and mailing it to the secretary of state.

The coupon-clipping plan had been proposed by the Committee for Industrial Peace in Idaho, a group opposed to the proposed "right to work" initiative.

"Right to work" legislation would seek to outlaw union shop and closed shop agreements. The Idaho Secretary of State James H. Young, who is in charge of circulating petitions to put it on the ballot in November as an initiative.

The committee for Industrial Peace published newspaper advertisements containing the coupon. It urged persons who had been "misled" into signing petitions to clip the coupons, and mail them to Secretary of State James H. Young.

Young, who has received only one of the coupons so far, asked Smith when his legal opinion.

Smith replied that signers of petitions may withdraw their signatures any time before July 7, but he would not do so.

"I can stay only three days," she told Sophie as they embraced repeatedly.

"We'll worry about that later," replied the sister.

Then the girls looked at each other's tear-streaked face and said at the same time:

"We look awful."

Another embrace followed and both girls dug into their handbags for compact to make repairs.

Sophie came to the United States shortly after the war. Her sister was kept in a displaced persons camp for a while, then she married Weyger and also came to this country.
