Seven Drown In Attempt to Rescue Child

ROCKPORT, Tex., May 25 (AP)—Struggles of a drowning man drew 10 rescuers off a sunny beach yesterday and six persons perished, including the little girl the others tried to save. Also drowned were an air force chaplain, the girl's mother and four other children. The tragic sequence started after Janice Bailey, 9, stepped into a deep hole off the small public beach opposite this Texas port on the Gulf of Mexico.

Leona Berry, 47, a housewife from Syracuse, N. Y., dived in.

Wayne Bailey, an airman from Foster air force base at neighboring Victoria, was in the crowd of more than 3,000 persons along the bodies of his wife and daughter pulled from the water.

"It's my wife," he cried out when Mr. Bailey was brought ashore dead.

"That's Father Berry; Oh, my God—there comes my daughter!"

Crowd Helpless Dick Fox, 30, a rockpeter of 30 feet high that was surf bather knew what was happening but there was nothing he could do.

He identified other dead as David Curtis, 7, Aransas Pass, Tex.; Marjorie Torres, 11, Rockport; Aurelia Torres, 10, Rockport.

Fox said 30 emergency carpenter, swimming or in boats, joined in the rescue. "Twenty others stood at the beach, where they quickly took a respirator. The seven bodies were recovered within an hour and a half."

Man, 80, Child Hurt in 2-Car Traffic Smash

An 80-year-old man was in "fair" condition Monday in Magie Valley Memorial hospital as the result of a two-car accident Sunday four miles east of Twin Falls which also hospitalized a Twin Falls mother and her 3-year-old daughter.

The man, P. H. Whitaker, Declo, ran a stop sign at the intersection of a county road and Highway 34 and his 1956 Chevrolet crashed into the side of a 1946 Pontiac driven by Charles Homan, 28, 552 Fifth avenue.

Mrs. Homan, 24, and Carla Homan, 3, were in good condition Monday at the hospital. Homan's 2-year-old son, escaped injury. Homan was treated at the hospital and released.

Whitaker was driving west on the county road. Homan was driving east on Highway 34. The 1956 Chevrolet plowed into the side of the Pontiac, sending Homan family knocking it off the highway where it overturned. Benjamin and Carla were injured.

Whitaker incurred broken ribs and pulled teeth as well as lacerated wrists. Mrs. Homan had a severe cut on her head and bruises. Charles was cut on her foot and bruised.

A witness to the accident told Benjamin that Whitaker did not stop for the sign. The wreckers were called to move the wreckage and an ambulance to take the injured to the hospital.

Supreme Court Rules in Favor of Equal Rights for Negroes

WASHINGTON, May 26 (UPI)—The supreme court ruled in three cases today in favor of equal rights for Negroes.

The court decided upholding the rights of individuals in picking and citizenship cases.

The nine justices unanimously reversed the conviction of a Negro for the murder of a white woman in New Orleans. It said the Negro was unlawfully excluded from the grand jury.

"The decision may lead to a new trial for the Negro who had been sentenced to death for the murder of Mrs. Mabel Clark, an Italian white woman, four years ago."

The high court also rejected, in a brief order, an appeal by New Orleans city officials from a federal court order throwing out Louisiana

De Gaulle Goes to Paris, Is Expected To Meet Pflimlin

PARIS, May 26 (UPI)—Gen. Charles de Gaulle left his rural home tonight apparently for Paris and possible talks with Pierre Pflimlin over the French republic's steadily worsening crisis. All France watched de Gaulle's next move, a bitter defiance from the insurrectionists in Algeria and Corsica heightened the suspense. General de Gaulle drove swiftly away from his hideaway at Colombey-les-Deux-Eglises, 150 miles southeast of Paris at 7 p.m. (11 a.m. MST). He headed toward Paris.

Westerners to Seek Curbs on Metal Imports

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today plan to hold a hearing on the proposed trade bill this week to debate on extension of the foreign trade agreement which may be signed by the end of the month.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is expected to have been cleared for tariff action for protection of domestic production of metals and to send the bill back to the House by the end of the month.

The House committee in the hope of leading on tariff provisions in the bill has been increasing in recent weeks for import taxes on copper, lead, zinc and other metals. Many metals mining areas have been hit hard by unemployment due to mine closures.

The bill has been given a priority in the Eisenhower administration plans to take no tariff action on metals.

The tariff reduction plan is expected to lead to a loss of 100,000 jobs in the metal industry, according to the committee.

The administration apparently has been working on a tariff reduction plan for copper, lead, zinc, aluminum, fluorapatite and tungsten. It is expected that the tariff reduction will pay domestic producers the difference between market prices and stabilized prices.

One of the arguments advanced for the tariff reduction is that it would not disturb the balance of payments.

The bill is expected to be passed by the end of the month.

U. S. Seeks to Get Russia to Admit Visitors

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The United States has made another in a long series of attempts to serve to freedom of travel in the Soviet Union.

The state department said in a note delivered to the Russian embassy today that the United States would be glad to drop all limitations on Russia—travelers from the Soviet territory closed to citizens of this country.

Both Russia and the United States now keep a tight rein on their territory closed to citizens of this country.

The note was sent to the embassy last Thursday and made public yesterday.

If Russia does not want to take such a far-reaching step now, the department proposed that the Soviets at least ease some restrictions on American travelers on a temporary basis.

For example, the United States offered to open up all of Maryland to Soviet travel if Russia would open the Moscow-Moscow-Vladimir area. All of the closed area within 25 miles of New York City would be opened in return for the opening of a similar area around Leningrad.

All of New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York and Massachusetts would be opened in return for the opening of Leningrad and the western regions of the Ukraine.

San Francisco would be opened for the opening of Chelyabinsk, Seattle, Wash. for Omsk, Newark, N. J. for Yerevan; Memphis, Tenn. for Nizhny Tagil; San Diego, Calif. for Vladivostok; Rochester, N. Y. for Ulan-Ude; Atlanta, Ga. for Kopezhnik-Dagion, O. for Leningrad; St. Paul, Minn. for Zlatoust, and Hartford, Conn. for Ketchik.

France Faces Final Showdown Between Pflimlin Government, de Gaulle, Reds

(Editor's note: France, rocked by the military, faces this week what may be the final showdown between the Pflimlin government, the Gaullist government, and the Communists.)

Joseph W. Collins, chief French correspondent for the Times, writes from Paris as soon as the crisis was over.

The government is expected to be replaced by a new government.

The government has asked everything, including its own existence, in exchange for the passage of the constitutional bill.

If Pflimlin is defeated, nothing could save France from the ultimate showdown with all its threat of bloodshed and civil war.

When the great mass of Frenchmen would stand in such a case is still a matter of debate.

The tens of thousands of Frenchmen, strolling the streets of Paris and jamming restaurants and moving his Whitman holiday week.

But if de Gaulle should establish himself firmly in power they would be the first to come out and cheer him, as they did on liberation day in 1944.

PARIS, May 26 (UPI)—Only a narrow margin separates France from the final days of civil war.

The fourth republic set up amid all the burning hopes born of the World War II resistance and liberation, was reeling.

The great showdown was on 11 involved.

A weak parliamentary regime, shaken by chronic political crises for the past 12 years, that suddenly was making a desperate eleventh-hour effort to reform itself.

Gen. Charles de Gaulle, the fourth republic's former premier, French leader, who sees France's only hope of salvation in scrapping the "regime of parties" and replacing it with a firm executive authority.

The communists, who have polled more than 5,000,000 votes in every French national election since they are setting their sights now at a new communist-dominated "popular front" that would turn France swiftly into another Moscow satellite.

What made this crisis far graver than any of the scores of other political blizzards that have shaken France since 1945 was that for the first time the stakes were high.

Frenchmen have long time, in a country which has had 26 governments in 13 years it was inevitable.

The only surprise was the way in which the fourth republic was able to survive at all.

For more than three years a 400,000-man French army has been locked in a seemingly endless struggle with the Algerian rebels in Algeria. Successive French governments have been unable to make a total withdrawal, but the cause was not French settlers, but the Algerians.

Word of a planned "sell-out" in Algeria touched off an explosion of anger and fear that came to a head May 13, as a caucus middle-of-the-road Pierre Pflimlin, a member of the Catholic Popular Republic (CPR), prepared to form a government in Paris, which it was hoped would end France's latest four-week-old crisis.

A vast mob of angry settlers invaded government house in Algiers, ransacked and set up a "committee of public safety." Denouncing Pflimlin as a traitor, they demanded power for de Gaulle, Gen. Raoul Salan, commander-in-chief in Algeria, and Gen. Jacques Massu, an avenging paratrooper, put themselves, or allowed themselves to be

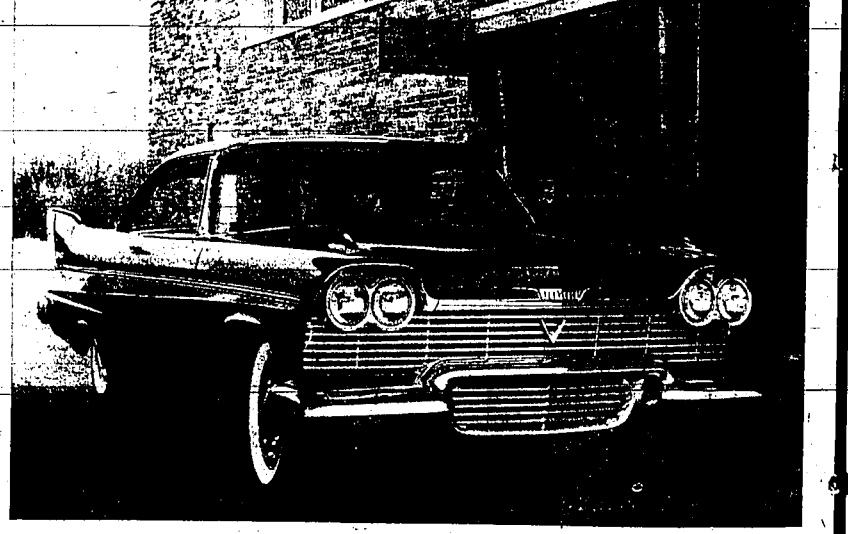

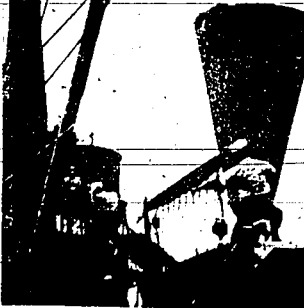

France Can't Adjust Despite Its Wide Political Experience

WASHINGTON, May 26 (UPI)—The idea that in the evolution of history, France has become only a second-rate power at best. They still dream of glory.

Out of their chest, their dreams they give, their desire to hold what they have—in this case their Algerian colony—they look more and more not to freedom but to authority. That authority is represented to them now in the person of one man: Charles de Gaulle.

The French pride themselves on being practical minded but the growing detraction to and the degrading of their country is a plain fact.

The French do not know—because de Gaulle has never said—exactly what he will do or what direction he will take. If he chooses him as the master of their fate they are relying on hope and not on a stated policy. He has not stated his policy—their fate.

Whether he wants to be a dictator or to indicate he wants plenty of power.

The freedom-minded French held to the free choice of their own destiny. They held Indochina until it was clear they were forced out by the Japanese. It was the British who had to go back into Indochina after the war and hold it for the French until they could resume control.

They showed no evidence of giving freedom to the Vietnamese—training neither an administrator nor an officer corps which would have been necessary to run a new government.

In the end the Indochinese nationalists, led by the communists, revolted and forced the French to give up their hold on the country.

They lost their grip on what they held in North Africa except for Algeria—they made the mistake of trying to invade Egypt until ordered by the United States and Russia to stop.

Bit by bit France has been growing smaller, less powerful.

The French, despite all their experience in politics, are too politically immature to face the real situation.

They have now had 23 governments since World War II. What they face, if they pick de Gaulle, is something they can't even predict.

Five Airways Will Be Laid Out Over U.S.

WASHINGTON, May 25 (UPI)—The Federal Aviation Administration plans to cut the number of air collisions soon by laying out five airways across the country in which all pilots would fly under instrument flight rules.

The FAA Administrator James M. Pyle said yesterday he would put the "limited access" system into effect by July 1.

The program would allow pilots to fly over mountainous areas on instrument flight rules, considered safer than visual flight rules.

Pyle said in a television interview that the program would be "like the Nation's" airway system, which is used by 10,000 to 20,000 pilots. Within these airways pilots would have to fly under instrument flight rules, but outside them they could fly under visual flight rules.

The program outlined by Pyle would be a series of 10-mile wide corridors in the wake of air collisions or near-collisions.

Each force and navy need last year to drastically curtail jet flights under visual flight rules to prevent a disaster of collisions with commercial planes.

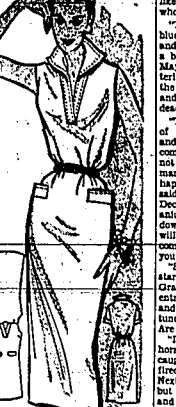

Senate Starts New Measure For Farm Aid

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Appropriations committee today accepted a two-month-old veto of a price support freeze, the senate agriculture committee started work today on a new approach to farm legislation.

Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D. La., asked leaders of two large farm organizations to open the two weeks of hearings at which the committee will try to develop a workable program.

Ellender vetoed on March 31 a bill which would have fixed support prices on major crops at 1946 levels through next year. Average restrictions also would have been held up to the year 1953. He called such action ill-advised both for farmers and for the nation.

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., asked senators to give a careful review to the Ellender veto before deciding whether to try to override or start anew.

Ellender's move indicated the senate will not accept a total price support freeze. The measure requires a two-thirds vote, a larger margin than the 60-40 margin that sent the farm freeze to the White House.

Numerous proposals are pending before the committee and no firm indications what type of measure may emerge.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R. Vt., ranking Republican on the committee, said today it is a good chance for congressional agreement if a new farm bill is restricted to cotton, rice, corn and other livestock feed grains.

"If we try to load it down with conditions and various farm area pet plans then we will be in trouble and probably get nothing," he said.

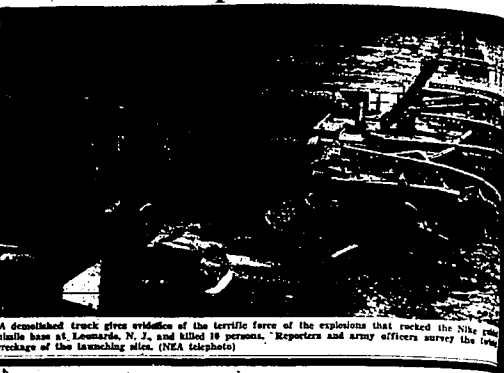
