Many Problems Facing Congressmen Eager to Return Home for Elections

WASHINGTON, May 27 (UPI)—Congress, anxious to get home for the November elections, has a host of problems to solve before it quits. At the rate it's going, congressmen won't get out before sometime in August.

Major pieces of legislation still unfinished are defense reorganization, Alaska statehood, taxes, labor reform, foreign aid, reciprocal trade extension, unemployment pay, and a space agency.

In addition, action still has to be taken on the usual appropriations bills, voting the money to keep the government agencies running another year.

Defense reorganization—neither house has acted on this yet. And, since both houses must approve before a bill is passed, this will need some doing. President Eisenhower months ago asked for a streamlining of the defense department.

Alaska statehood—giving Alaska statehood is a question kicked around in congress for years. The house may decide yes or no this week. If the house bores this aside, no senate action will have any meaning.

If the house approves, the senate may still stall because approval of statehood for Alaska is almost certain to bring pressure on the senate to approve statehood for Hawaii.

Taxes—Yesterday President Eisenhower came out against an income tax cut, even though there is a recession. So it's unlikely those taxes will be chopped this year.

But unless congress acts to stop

them, there will automatically be reductions on July 1, on corporation taxes—from 52 to 49 per cent—and on certain excise taxes, most of them imposed during the Korean war.

Eisenhower asked congress not to let the automatic reduction take place, for it would mean a loss of about three billion dollars in revenue to the government.

Labor reform—By mid-June a bill to put some curbs on unions—on at least on union bosses—should land in the senate's lap for consideration. This is a hot potato.

Foreign aid—The house has passed a foreign aid bill, and it may get senate consideration this week. There's no question foreign aid will be continued. The only question is: How much will congress cut it?

Eisenhower asked \$3,500,000,000. He won't get that much. But first congress must approve an authorization bill—which sets a limit on how much can be spent—and then it must vote the actual appropriation.

That's another fight weeks away.

Reciprocal trade—Neither house has acted on this yet. The house may start debate on it this week. But it will be sometime in June at the earliest, before the senate acts. Some kind of reciprocal trade bill is sure to be passed.

Extended unemployment pay—The house has approved a bill to give federal loans to states which want to extend unemployment pay to jobless workers who have already used up all this kind of pay to which they're entitled. The senate started on it today.

Space agency—Neither house has yet acted on a bill to establish a control over developments for the exploration of space.

The incident was announced shortly after jet from Alameda and Moffett field resumed flying after they were temporarily grounded as the result of confusion over flight restrictions ordered in Washington last week.

A United airlines pilot, who was not identified, reported that shortly after his DC-7 took off from San Francisco International airport Wednesday, two navy jets "straddled" his plane.

3,353,000 Great Plains Acres Reported Damaged by Wind

WASHINGTON, May 27 (UPI)—Oklahoma, 85,000 acres, and Texas, the agriculture department said 1,183,000 acres of the 1,182,000 acres today land damaged by wind action in the five northern great plains states, about 70 per cent, or May 1 totaled 3,353,000 acres.

This was 1,200,000 acres more than any in the other northern plains states, the amount reported as of April 1: Idaho, 21,000 acres; North Dakota, 307,000 acres; South Dakota, 1,700,000 acres; and Wyoming 800,000 acres. The reports for 1952 and 1953 were: More than 90 per cent of the report from 274 counties covering about 263 million acres in the 10 great plains states.

The department reported an additional 8,100,000 acres on May 1 were damaged in range and other land in condition to slow compared with was reported, damaged, 29,100,000 acres a year ago.

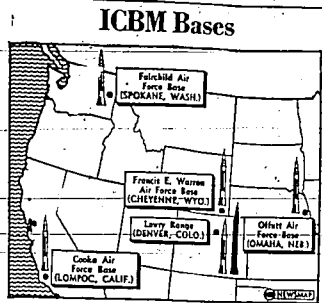

Unknown Servicemen of World War II And Korea Selected for U. S. Honors

ABOARD USS CANBERRA, May 27 (UPI)—Two American warriors who lost their lives and their identities in the country's last two wars came home yesterday. A third was buried at sea.

The unknown servicemen of World War II and Korea will find a final resting place in Arlington National cemetery, across the Potomac river from Washington, D. C.

Selection of the World War II unknown was made on the railwrecked deck of this guided-missile cruiser by a navy enlisted man who holds the medal of honor for conspicuous gallantry in the Korean conflict.

He made the choice from two identical caskets, one containing the body of an unknown from the Euro-

pean theater and the other an unknown from the Pacific.

The unidentified unknown was committed from the same deck to the bottom of the ocean 27 miles east of Cape Henry, Va., where the water is 115 feet deep.

Between the two unknowns of World War II at the selection ceremony lay the body of the nameless hero who died in Korea. His body and that of the selected unknown will be entombed in Memorial Park, beside the unknown soldier of World War II.

The three bodies in wooden shipping cases were transferred by "fish line" ropes yesterday 25 miles off Cape Henry from the cruiser Boston to the Canberra. They were placed in bronze caskets in a closed com-

partment. Three teams in turn changed the positions of the two World War II unknowns so that the war theater in which each died would not be known.

Each casket was borne to the ceremonial deck by six sailors wearing blue arm bands and placed beneath the Canberra's former masts pointing to the distant gray sky. The ship moved at five knots through a gently rolling sea. The mournful strains of Chopin's funeral march played by a navy band was punctuated by the solemn tapping of the American flag and the flag of the Army, Navy, air force, marine corps and coast guard ranged at the heads of the caskets.

Rear Adm. Lewis S. Parks, commander of the Atlantic fleet, cru-

force stepped to the microphone. "These men did not fall to us when the chips were down," he said, "and we must not fall them in the days and years ahead when communist forces will press ever harder to drive the free world into slavery."

"It is not necessary that we know their names. It is enough that they were our comrades, and our shipmates."

The medal of honor winner, Hospitalman William B. Charlett of Key West, Fla., picked up a wreath—a circle of red carnations around an anchor of white carnations—and walked to the foot of the casket of the Korean war unknown.

DETROIT, May 27 (AP)—Automotive trade sources now are estimating 1958 car assemblies at not more than 4 1/2 million units. Sales should go slightly higher.

Last week the industry built 82,277 cars against 87,401 the preceding week. In the same 1957 week it made 174,458 cars. So far this year U. S. factories have built 1,387,551 cars compared to 2,791,862 in the like 1957 period.

General Motors accounted for 63,291 car assemblies last week, Ford for 24,200 Chrysler 15,400, American Motors 4,000 and Studebaker-Packard 33 Packards and 1,181 Studebakers.

Masked Men Set Fire to Chicago Area Restaurant

CHICAGO, May 27 (UPI)—Two masked men "kissed" off a fire that destroyed the Villa Lamin restaurant in suburban Skokie. The incident was believed to be the second in a series of attacks on Chicago area restaurants two weeks ago.

Authorities estimated damage to the plain restaurant at \$100,000. The owners, Chris and Eugene Davy, brothers, were unable to explain why they were singled out as victims of the mystery attacks.

On May 14, two masked men of similar description, spread gasoline about Algernon Pinnick restaurant in suburban Hazelwood and set it afire. Damage to that blaze was estimated at between \$750,000 and one million dollars.

Poles believed the Algernon fire had been financed from revenge against the owner, Gus Alligauer, for giving information to the senate subcommittee investigating the Chicago restaurant-labor union situation.

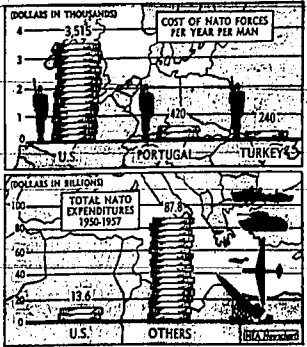

15 Burned in Portland Bus By Lightning

PORTLAND, May 27 (AP)—Fifteen persons were burned, some seriously, when a bolt of lightning flashed off the sky, rolled along a trolley wire and then struck a loaded trolley bus. As a ball of fire raced through the bus, headed west along 22nd street, the driver flipped open the doors. The passengers tumbled out, minutes before the \$20,000 vehicle burst into flame. The injured, suffering from smoke inhalation and first or second degree burns, were taken by ambulance to a hospital. Most of them were held there overnight for observation and treatment. Some of the passengers' hair and eyebrows were singed. The spectacle of some were darkened by the smoke. Some lost shoes, purses and umbrellas as they scrambled out of the burning vehicle. The bus was halted for a traffic signal at the intersection of 22nd and land's east side when the bolt struck. The lightning strike was only one of several that peppered the city just as the evening rush hour started.

Police Fire Into Riots on Ceylon

COLOMBO, Ceylon, May 27 (AP)—Police fired into crowds and threw tear gas bombs yesterday to break up attacks by Sinhalese-speaking extremists on members of Ceylon's Tamil minority. Several hundred people were reported injured in widespread rioting. Premier Solomon Bandaranaike said in a broadcast that week-long Sinhalese rioting in east and north Ceylon, which took at least 15 lives, had been brought under control. He appealed for order. Sinhalese and Tamils have clashed repeatedly since Bandaranaike, elected in April, said Sinhalese will be the only official language in Ceylon.

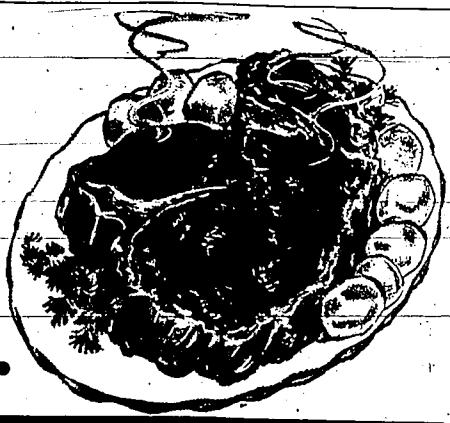

Fire Guards Told as Season Starts; Public Caution Urged

SHOESHONE, May 27—Fire organizations in Shoshone are being compiled in preparation for the 1958 fire season by the bureau of land management, Wood River grazing district, Shoshone office.

The annual fire school will be held in Shoshone on June 21. James Gabeltas, fire supervisor, will be in charge of the training session. This school will cover fire suppression and prearrangement activities.

Forecast conditions this spring indicate that another severe fire season can be expected. There is considerable dry forage still present from last year in addition to this year's growth.

Because most range fires are man-caused, the public is cautioned to be extremely careful. Campers are urged to build their campfires in safe areas. "Under no conditions should motorists throw burning material from vehicles. This is believed to be a major cause of fire because many range fires originate along roads and highways, officials state.

The official fire season is from June 1 to Sept. 30. During this period, anyone wishing to burn forage on private land near federal ranges must obtain a burning permit from the bureau of land management.

All range fires on or near the federal ranges within the Wood River grazing district should be reported immediately by calling the fire lookout at Hotch Butte, Shoshone—Tucker 6-2003—or district office, Shoshone—Tucker 6-2001.

Per diem guards are assigned throughout the district for the purpose of reporting and taking action on range fires within their areas. These men are equipped with fire-fighting tools and organize fire-fighting crews made up of residents within their areas.

BLM Supervisor Warns of South Idaho Fire Peril

BOISE, May 27 (UPI)—A dangerous fire season is being predicted in southern Idaho's forest and range areas because of unseasonably dry conditions.

J. R. Penny, state supervisor for the bureau of land management, noted the southern Idaho fire history experienced one of the worst ranges and forest fire seasons in its history unless extreme caution is exercised.

Penny said so far conditions in the forests and range areas are "borderline" at the point of dryness usually prevailing in the latter part of June. "We want to impinge upon the users of the range and forest lands the extreme danger that now exists."

Under near normal conditions last year, the BLM official said, 543 fires occurred on land under the agency's jurisdiction with a loss of \$1,000,000. He said 285,000 acres of timber and range land were swept by fire.

Some Benefit May Result in French Crisis

The one sure thing about the French political crisis seems to be that it will last a long time.

In the end, it may prove to be a good thing for France.

Apparently, the end is in sight. The French parliamentary system of government had been falling to pieces bit by bit due to the increasing succession of smaller crises which resulted in the overthrow of premiers by the national assembly, the controlling house of parliament.

Prima facie evidence

Professor Pierre Primolin is fighting hard for the national assembly.

Today, or any day soon, Primolin may know his fate.

Dispatches from Paris emphasize more and more the odds against him. They say that he has almost no chance.

The alternative to Primolin, or to another parliamentarian, is Gen. Charles de Gaulle, the great unknown of French and world politics.

About all that is known of de Gaulle—this includes his own policies—seems to be that he wants very badly to be France's leader, with virtually no opposition, and that he would like to be put in office legally.

But de Gaulle would have handicaps too.

First, there would be the danger of internal trouble. The communists and the socialists, who bitterly oppose him, certainly would not accept him without a fight.

The communists have made it known they will call a general strike at once if de Gaulle is called to power. There is little doubt that the non-communist unions would join the red-controlled General Confederation of Labor in the strike.

The odds seem to be that the French public as a whole would accept de Gaulle calmly if not enthusiastically, but with a certain approval of his political designation.

Bad Risks Expected

Whether there would be disorders on a serious scale nobody knows.

The communists certainly would be expected to foment riots.

Whether labor unions generally would join in them, and to what extent, is uncertain.

General de Gaulle would have control of the formidable army of police, totaling about 200,000 men including the republican security guards and the mobile guards.

If Primolin stayed in office, he would have the Mercurian task of retaining authority over the rebellious armed forces. Then he would face the problem of the future of Algeria as his predecessors have done.

Foreign Problems

If de Gaulle took office, he also would face the fact that his wrecked government after government, he would have "autonomous" power. But he would have problems—France's relations with its former North Atlantic Treaty Organization allies and with Soviet

WASHINGTON, May 27 (UPI)—The atomic energy commission says a proposed act of congress banning further U. S. nuclear weapons tests would endanger national security.

Rep. Charles O. Porter, D. Ore., introduced the bill, which would cut further U. S. tests as long as other nations halted their tests too.

AEC Commissioner John B. Graham vetoed the house-made atomic energy committee yesterday that the bill failed to recognize that the great hazard to this nation and to the world is not that of nuclear testing but, instead, the catastrophic hazard of nuclear war.

Graham also said that such legislation would be "an obstacle rather than an aid" to effective disarmament negotiations.

But Porter countered that stopping tests was "only one step, an important step, to turn back from the arms race and relieve an anxious world."

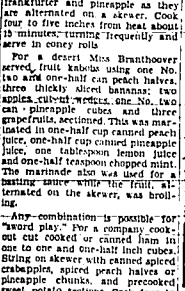

For a quick amok flavor loss a few damp hickory chips over coals near end of cooking time or brush on a commercial amok product. Salt and pepper after being broiled on one side. Turn with tongs and turner. If you do use fork be sure times go in not in meat.

Brown said every umpire, manager, coach and player knows what the pitchers are who throw at batters' heads and it wouldn't take much more doing than stronger enforcement on the part of the officials to put a stop to the whole thing.

Brown said that as far as he knew Murray was not fired or suspended by the National League. "I can't blame Murray for ordering his pitchers to throw right back at the Giants. I'm backing him up a thousand per cent in this fight," said Brown.

His added: "Any ball club that doesn't throw back at one throwing at it doesn't have any guts. You saw what happened in the first game of a doubleheader. Catcher Taylor, involved in the deal that brought Hush from Chicago to Milwaukee, scored the only run of the game. When Russ softened the pain by pitching the Braves to a 5-2 victory over the Cubs in the nightcap."
