De Gaulle Given Call for Service In French Crisis

PARIS, May 28 (AP)—Gen. Charles de Gaulle sped to Paris after being called by President Rene Coty to discuss the crisis in France. At the same time 30,000 Frenchmen demonstrated in Paris against his return. The word that de Gaulle was going to see the president normally would mean that he would be asked to form a new government. The general, accompanied by an aide, had driven out of the city and headed toward Paris. There had been no announcement, however, of his destination or the purpose of the trip.

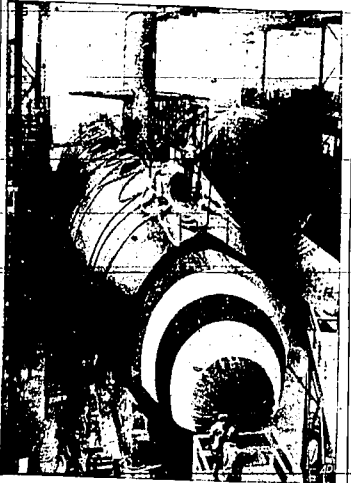

Use of Funds for Married Students Housing Advised

BOISE, May 28 (AP)—The executive board of the Associated Students of the University of Idaho today recommended to the board that \$10,000 in student fees be used during the next two years to help pay for construction of married students' housing.

Dr. D. E. Theophilus, university president, had announced earlier that \$1 million in federal money would be used to help pay for the campus because of the danger. Plans for a \$10,000 project cannot be made until representatives of the federal government and the state agree on a method of financing, he said.

The new fee to be assessed against students is \$100 a year. The fee would be used to back up the plan.

No Tax Cut Decision Indicates Ike Thinks Slump About Over

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower's decision against any tax cutting now indicates he believes the recession is about over—or that the forces of recovery have been contained, as General Eisenhower might put it.

The new foe to be assailed against has shored off so much of the purchasing power of the dollar.

Those who think otherwise may still have their day in congress and some predict that the excise taxes on autos may be cut to help sales of that beleaguered industry's product and on freight rates and passenger fares to help the faltering railroads.

Warm weather has brought a number of hopeful signs to back up the President's apparent view. That the worst of the industrial slump is over. Outdoor jobs have opened up and cut the rise in unemployment. A number of industries have reported the first quickening of new orders after a long decline.

Steel mills are operating at a better rate than at any time since January—although some of the new orders may be to beat the price rise.

Advocates of individual income and excise tax cutting now have argued that it would stimulate consumer buying and thus put men back to work. Corporate income tax cutting and easier depreciation allowances, proponents say, would help business hold its profit margin without price hiking.

The argument against tax cutting and the one the President seems to have accepted—is that rapidly increasing government spending means a growing treasury deficit and federal debt. A tax cut now would only make this worse. This would set the stage for future inflation, since the government would be pumping more money into the economy than it was taking out—a more roughly com-

PROTECTING SCENERY

The recent announcement by Gov. C. William O'Connell that he would lead his state's legislature to enact a strong law banning billboards on Ohio's part of the new interstate freeway system focuses attention on a problem that each state will have to face in the near future.

The federal highway act of 1952 offers a bonus of one half of one per cent in federal highway funds to states as an inducement to keep billboards off the system. This could amount to quite a sum, since the 10-year program in most states will be figured in the billions of dollars.

But Governor O'Neil called this part of the law "weak," containing too many exceptions. Ohio—or any other state—could get the bonus by passing a law that would do this.

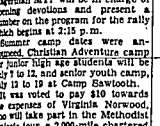

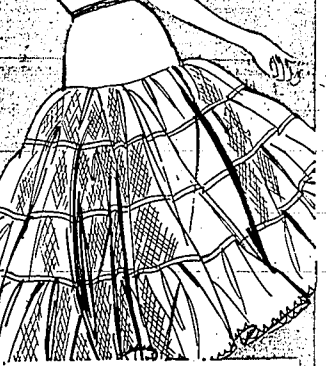

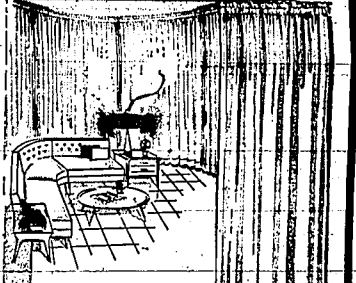

Leafhopper Control Program Planned If Congress Okays \$300,000 in Funds

A coordinated program to control the beet leafhopper on 35,000 acres in Magic Valley and Owyhee and Ada counties is ready for implementation by the federal bureau of entomology and the agricultural research if and when Congress approves \$300,000 for the program.

The program, outlined in a memorandum of a recent range staff meeting in Washington by BLM Director G. M. Kerr, a copy of which was sent the Times-News by U. S. Sen. Henry Dworshak, is dependent for its execution on the approval of funds by both houses of Congress. According to Dworshak, a bill containing a \$300,000 appropriation to cover the cost of the program was approved May 20 by house and senate conferees. "The measure will now go to both houses for approval," Dworshak notes.

Kerr's memorandum, addressed to the area BLM administrator, sets forth a seven-point program for the control of the leafhopper.

The first step, according to Kerr, will be to set up a meeting with officials from the state BLM office, the Idaho state department of agriculture, the Idaho bean commission and federal agencies directly involved. Kerr says such a meeting will "permit all concerned to express their views and agree on the most effective approach to solve the problem."

Secondly, the BLM official states the agricultural research service will designate the general areas to be given priority in the 1959 research program.

Receding of ranges presently supporting growth in which the beet leafhoppers thrive with the types of areas which inhibit the hoppers are part of the federal program to curb the infestation of the insect.

The third step in the program outlined by Kerr is to have the BLM select the specific areas to be treated within the general areas designated by the agricultural research service for all federal lands on which there will have obligations for control work. "This includes air force withdrawals," Kerr notes.

Next, the BLM will determine the specific areas of withdrawal land.

New 1-Man Bomber Is Flying Arsenal of Powerful Weapons

PARMINDALE, N. Y., May 27 (UPI)—The air force yesterday received its first delivery of a new type one-man bomber so light it could stage a fast-land war by itself.

Tabbed the P105 Thunderchief, the jet plane is a flying arsenal of the nation's most potent weapons—nuclear and otherwise. It could deliver a hydrogen bomb to any point in the world within a few hours.

Gen. O. P. Weyland, commander of the tactical air command, said cooperation gave this other data on the craft:

Capable of traveling at twice the speed of sound, it can deliver more firepower than the entire U. S. air force during World War II and the Korean war.

In addition to nuclear weapons, it is equipped to carry both guided and unguided missiles, clusters of rockets, 4,000 pounds of conventional bombs and napalm fire bombs.

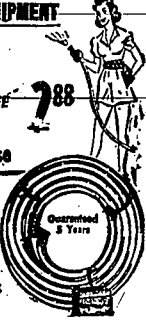

Mexicans Prefer U. S. Autos Over Small European Models

MEXICO CITY, May 28—Those European cars are not hurting the sale of U. S. autos in Mexico. You see lots of European models darting in and out of the increasingly heavy traffic, but the Ford, Chevrolet and Plymouth still dominate.

There are several reasons. All car imports are on a quota basis, and American companies which have long led Mexico's market are holding "their" percentages with government backing.

Mexicans like the flashy American car, the spacier the better. Americans may complain of fain and fins, but Mexicans ask for more power and driving range are important in a country where service stations are sometimes 100 miles apart and many major highways circle 10,000-foot mountains. Also, the larger car is preferred by many who like to pack a family or to take the machine for a picnic or a trip. Thousands are converted into buses and taxis.

Mexico is one of Detroit's better foreign customers. In 1956 Mexico bought some 45,000 cars, trucks and buses.

But the government, to save its dollars, says no. The duty amounts to about 110 per cent. The lower-priced three-coat almost as much as a small Cadillac in the United States.

The official import total actually is deceptive. One newspaper recently estimated that 45,000 cars are brought in annually by individuals through special privileges or by smuggling.
