Outdoor Services at Drive-in Theater To Be Held by 3 Christian Churches

Outdoor church services will be conducted again this year at the Motor-Vu drive-in theater in Twin Falls beginning Sunday and lasting through August, according to the Rev. Paul Kenny, pastor of the Christian church in Kimberly. Outdoor services were held last summer at the theater for the first time in this area.

The services will be conducted through the cooperation of the Kimberly Christian church, First Christian church in Twin Falls and the Valley Christian church in Twin Falls with the approval of the Twin Falls Ministerial association.

The three pastors, the Rev. Mr. Kenny, the Rev. Don Hoffman of First Christian church and the Rev. Ralph Wiley, Valley Christian, will be in charge of the services. Each will conduct two services while ministers from other denominations in Twin Falls will preach at the other services.

The Rev. Mr. Kenny's services will begin at 8 a. m. and last till 8:45 a. m. Following the services an informal fellowship period will be held in the theater snack shop where doughnuts and coffee will be served.

The services are open to all denominations.

Persons are urged to attend the services in their cars and are expected to attend in any clothes they prefer. "Come as you are," the Rev. Mr. Kenny says.

The services will utilize the facilities of the theater with loud speakers for every car. Communion will be offered every Sunday, a tract of the Christian churches, and the songs and program will be printed on bulletins to be handed occupants of the cars as they drive into the theater.

Music will be organ music and songs by small groups. There will be no choir.

Offerings will be collected for expense of conducting the services. Last year the surplus money collected through offerings was given to the ministry of the migrant labor camp in Twin Falls.

Regular services will be conducted at the three Christian churches in addition to the services at the theater.

The largest attendance last year was about 125, the Rev. Mr. Kenny said. He hopes to have larger crowds this year.

AEC Hearing Slated June 3

WASHINGTON, May 29 (UPI)—The Atomic Energy Commission has set June 3 for a public hearing on a proposed \$192,378,000 atomic energy construction program, including 11 million dollars for a gas cooled reactor at a site yet to be selected.

A spokesman for the atomic energy commission said there is no indication now of the site for the gas cooled reactor, estimated to produce 45,000 kilowatts of electricity.

He said the AEC cannot specify a site at this point since it is not known what firm will build the plant.

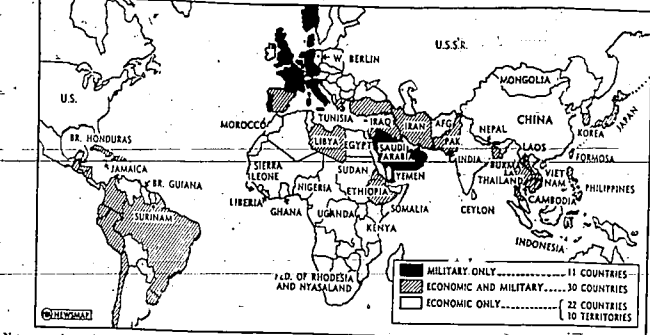

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Tito Emerges With Victory In Party War

It looks as if President Tito of Yugoslavia has won a big victory over the Russian Communist party.

It looks also as if the Soviet Premier, Nikita S. Khrushchev has won a victory over the "Stalinists" in the ruling Russian Communist party presidium and central committee.

For the past few days ago, there were rumors that Tito might be driven out of the world communist movement because he persisted in refusing to conform to the party line—that is, to put himself behind Khrushchev's line.

But now Khrushchev has sent Tito a surprisingly friendly message of congratulations on his 65th birthday anniversary.

... Accept my cordial congratulations and wishes for the prosperity of Yugoslavia people," Khrushchev said.

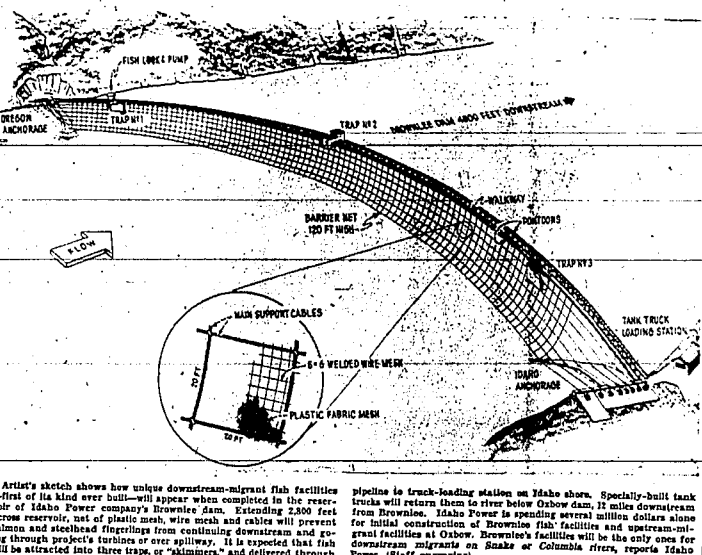

Huge, Novel Net to Save Fish Migrating Downstream



Giant Net Being Installed Now Above Brownlee Dam to Safeguard Small Fish

BROWNLEE, May 29 — A new project unattended for nearly a century is being speedily worked and a first of species on the broad lake now forming behind Brownlee dam, Idaho Power company reported today.

Workers are weaving plastic mesh, wire mesh and stout cables—some three times thicker than a man's wrist—into a 300,000-square-foot net, or barrier, for downstream migrant fish facilities to be installed in Brownlee's vast reservoir.

First of their kind ever built, these ingenious, multimillion-dollar facilities are designed to protect salmon and steelhead migrating upstream toward spawning grounds.

Brownlee's net, with openings as fine that not even the smallest fingerling can swim through, will be strung across a sweeping downstream current in the reservoir to prevent the migration of fish through the project's turbines or over its spillway. The net will be located nearly a mile upstream from Brownlee's huge rock-fill embankment.

Three unique devices called "skimmer" spaced across the 120-foot-deep net will trap the fingerlings and deliver them through a pipeline to a truck-loading station on the Idaho shore.

Special built tank trucks will return them to the river below Brownlee dam, 12 miles downstream from Brownlee's second unit of Idaho Power's new three-dam development that also will include Hells Canyon dam.

Big thought to spread over some seven acres, the net will be composed of a screen of plastic mesh with one-eighth-inch square openings, and a 12-inch mesh with six-inch square openings. It will be braced by a waffle-like network of vertical and horizontal cables with horizontal cables stretching between two huge concrete anchorages already from up and down the reservoir.

Take-up devices at the end of each of the seven horizontal cables will raise or lower the barrier as the reservoir level changes.

Fabrication of this gigantic and complex barrier is as unusual as the net itself, said Gomer Condit, Idaho Power's resident engineer.

Budge Asking Extension for Road Projects

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 29 — Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks has told Gov. Hiram H. 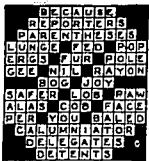

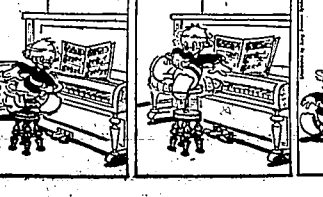
