## Bodies Found In Plane That Fell in March

ENTERPRISE, Ore., June 2 (UPI)—The bodies of two Lewiston, Idaho men who were about a plane that disappeared March 2 were recovered about 35 miles northeast of here Sunday near the Oregon-Idaho border.

The victims were Art Johnson, 35, the pilot, and Ed Schmitter, 45. The two were flying a Beechcraft Bonanza plane from Ontario, Ore., to a meeting in Lewiston when the crash occurred during a storm.

The wreckage was first sighted Friday by motorist Earl Barker, an Enterprise lumber broker. Barker's parties were unable to go into the area Saturday due to a storm. The bodies were brought to Enterprise at 4:27 p.m. Sunday.

Wallowa county Coroner Lenaholm said he believed the crash of the two men was instantaneous. Many aerial and ground searches were made during the first six weeks but the plane was missing, but no trace had been found. The area where the crash was found with the two men was covered with snow at the time of the crash, authorities said.

## 76 Persons Killed In Holiday Traffic

Motorists set a tragic record during the Memorial day weekend, a United Press International tally showed today. UPI count showed 376 persons killed in traffic accidents in one nation during the three-day Memorial day weekend. In addition, the tally showed 146 persons drowned, 18 lost their lives in the accidents, and 80 died in other accidents, to bring the holiday death toll to 620.

The toll in the United States was the highest in the history of fatalities. No state was next with 27, followed by Illinois and Texas, 21, Pennsylvania 20, and Ohio 18.

Deaths in California, reported no deaths. The death rate closely followed that in the nation's generally, to a low state Thursday, and peaked during the generally weather Friday, moved still up Saturday and Sunday. The highest weather covered the weekend during the final hours of the holiday.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 2 (UPI)—A fire-bombing in a crowded shopping district in Chicago Sunday killed two people and hurt 40 others.

The blast struck a building which was being used as a warehouse for furniture. The blast was caused by a firebomb which was thrown from a nearby building.

## Hells Canyon Bill Of Subcommittee

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The house interior reclamation subcommittee today voted down a controversial bill for federal construction of a dam in Hells canyon, the deepest gorge on the continent. Rep. Wayne Aspinall, D., Colo., subcommittee chairman, said the bill would demand a vote of confidence on its own measure. A 15-13 vote apparent-ly ended a year-long fight over whether the federal government or Idaho Power company should build the Snake river dam.

## Negligence of Truck Driver Blamed in Richfield Death

PARIS, June 2 (UPI)—Minister of State Louis Jacquot told newsmen tonight that the Idaho completed its memorial week-end with five fatalities. Four persons lost their lives in automobile accidents and one person drowned.

The drowning victim was Mrs. Howard W. Sigler, 50, of War, who according to a Bannock county Sheriff Don Ryan, yesterday he jumped from a boat into a pond near the mouth of the Snake river. He was a motorist who was driving a Buick when he was struck by a car.

## Budget Claims Plan of Marr Is 'Fantastic'

Budge, following action by the house irrigation and reclamation subcommittee voting down the bill, said the plan is "fantastic" because it would require the state to pay for the dam, while the federal government would pay for the power.

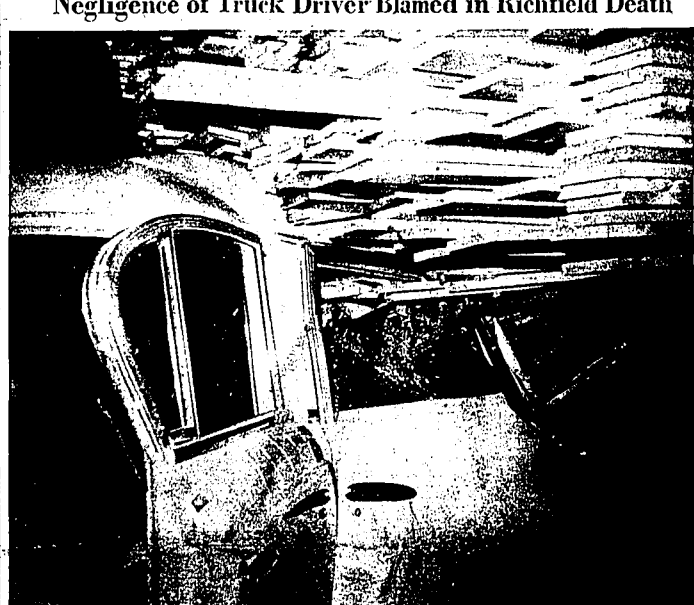

### Probe, Financed by Trujillo, Clears Him for Death of Foe

NEW YORK, June 2 (UPI)—A United States state department report of May 2, 1957, which cleared Dominican Republic dictator Gen. Rafael L. Trujillo of involvement in the two-year-old disappearance of his avowed foe, Dr. Juan de Galindez, cleared him for death of Foe.

In essence, the lengthy report discounted rumors that the 40-year-old Galindez, a Spanish exile, was kidnaped by Trujillo agents, flown to the Dominican Republic and murdered.

It further cleared involvement in the case American pilot Gerald Lester Murphy, captured by some quarters as the flier in whose plane Galindez was spotted from New York to the Dominican Republic.

### Airlines Endorse Plans for Safety

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UPI)—The Air Transport Association, spokesman for the nation's scheduled airlines, today endorsed legislation to create an independent federal aviation agency to work for safer air travel.

It urged deletion of one provision allowing almost anyone to appeal rulings and regulations of the new aviation administrator.

It also called for greater integration of military officers in the proposed set-up to avoid future "sniping" at its directives by the armed forces.

James T. Dale, civil aeronautics administrator, disclosed yesterday that he is considering establishing at least one more transcontinental skyway similar to the three airway systems to go into operation June 15.

### U. S. Answers Soviet Charge Of "Buzzing"

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UPI)—The state department has notified Russia in response to a Soviet complaint—that the U. S. may be keeping a close watch on shipping in the ocean approaches to the United States.

Moscow had protested that U. S. aircraft had buzzed Soviet travelers in international waters near the Grand Banks southeast of Nova Scotia.

State department spokesmen offered Lincoln White said the Soviet complaint was made about mid-April and that it received a prompt answer.

Privately, informants said that the behavior of the Soviet traveler fleet along area and air routes between the 17, 8, 604 coast and Europe is suspicious in some respects.

### UAL Pilots End 100-Day Walkout

LOS ANGELES, June 2 (UPI)—Pilots of Western Air Lines, idled 100 days by the longest complete shut-down in commercial aviation history, took refresher courses today to get the line back in operation by June 10.

The pilots, members of the Air Line Pilots association, went back to work yesterday, ending a walkout which had grounded W.A.L. service to 47 cities in 13 western states, Canada and Mexico since Feb. 21.

Company officials began calling back furloughed hostesses, clerks and mechanics as they were needed. They hoped to have complete service restored over the airline's 9,153-mile system in about 10 days.

### Conflicts Are Reported for Farm Agency

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UPI)—Conflicts continue to be up among farm groups over a \$25-million-dollar fund conservation program.

The public centers around the fact that the spending and supervision of the programs are divided between two rival administrative agencies. Each is inclined to be suspicious of the other and each would like to see all the programs brought under its own roof.

Each district involved involved are the 2,775 local, state-authorized soil conservation districts and the agriculture department-run farmer committee setup, maintained principally to help administer soil conservation programs.

The department operates four different conservation programs. One called the soil conservation program. It operates through state-authorized soil conservation districts on a cooperative basis. This program is administered, at the national level, by the soil conservation service. It assists in preparing conservation farm plans, and in giving technical guidance in the application and maintenance of conservation practices.

A second program is the agricultural conservation program under which payments and grants of conservation materials and services are made to farmers for carrying out approved conservation practices.

This program, which is tops in money with 250 million dollars a year, is administered in the states and counties by the farmer committee system of the commodity stabilization and conservation service. There are more than 3,000 county committees and several times that many community committees.

A third program is the Great Plains conservation program, which is directed to assist producers in the central Great Plains achieve a more stable agricultural production by changes in cropping systems and soil uses. The soil conservation service directs this program.

### Anti-Trust Suit Against 3 Soap Makers Revived

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UPI)—The supreme court today revived the government's civil antitrust suit against three leading soap companies and their trade association.

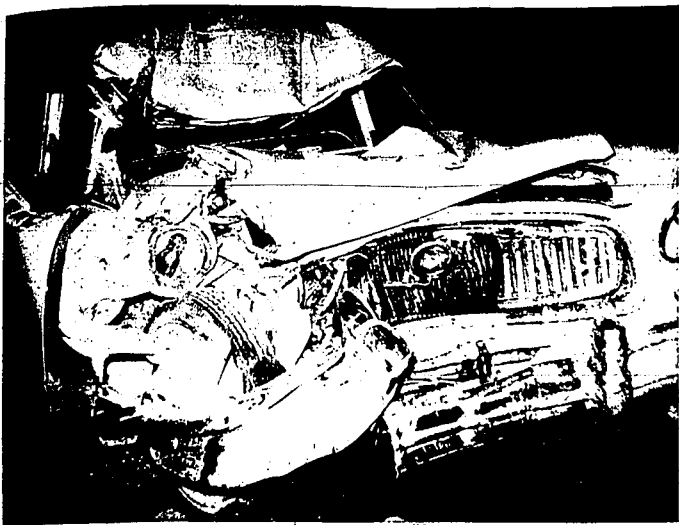

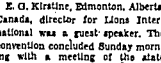

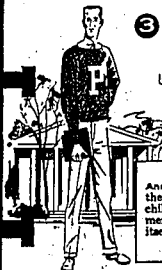

## Science Figures Fancy Way To Test Ancient Atmosphere

NEW YORK, June 2 (UPI)—and known rate. Atmosphere contains carbon dioxide.

Science has worked out a really fancy way of going back to 20,000 years or so and finding out what the atmosphere was like then. If you can find out what the atmosphere contained chemically at any given time, you'll get a good idea of what the climate was like at that time, what life was like.

It would seem impossible to do for the remote past for which there are no scientific records and where no scientists and people, as they were, lived in caves. It was impossible until a scientific method was made up of two American geologists and two Norwegian scientists, looking into the chemical possibilities of ancient ice caps and glaciers such as those that crown the North and South Poles and such places as Greenland.

The atmosphere, that is, the air we breathe today, is a collection of gases. Those gases dissolve in water. But when water freezes, the gases are squeezed out and become gases again.

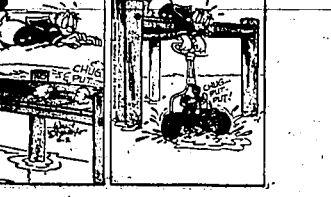

### Warmth Used By Infra-Red Gadgets Now

NEW YORK, June 2 (UPI)—A little bit of warmth goes a long way when infra-red equipment is on the job.

Development of new infra-red measuring devices is rapidly building into an important—and fascinating—"science" industry after years in military uniform.

Infra-red measuring systems can sense the slight amount of infrared radiation, or heat waves, given off by any object, animal, vegetable or mineral. Humans usually can feel these waves if they are intense enough, but only infra-red equipment can "see" them regardless of intensity.

**Used by Soldiers**

During World War II, American snipers made use of a telescopic sight that could spot enemy soldiers by picking out infra-red radiations at 200 feet. These infra-red sunlights enabled many a sharpshooter to hit a target without actually seeing it.

This was one of the first military applications of an infra-red device. Earlier "consumer" applications were found in heating and baking lamps. And when the first cave man started a fire to warm his humble abode, he was making use of infra-red radiation, whether he realized it or not.

**Boomed After War**

After World War II, researchers went into the infra-red field on a broader scale. Today, there are no less than 25 firms specializing in various fields of infra-red application. One firm, the Servo corporation, is credited in all aspects of the field, ranging from military to industrial applications. The work is so specialized that this firm does a million-dollar annual business with the military, although it is not as well known as giants such as RCA, General Electric, Westinghouse or Eastman Kodak.

Some of the civilian applications of infra-red detectors include: Hot box detectors. Civilian railroads are counting on this infra-red system to eliminate the "hot box," or overheated journal, which is a major cause of rail accidents and late trains. This system involves two small metal boxes stationed on each side of a track, ready to scan the undercarriage of passing trains through an infra-red lens. If the heat from any journal is above a certain level, monitors are alerted and the train is stopped. No such bearings can be inspected.

**Assembly Line Use**

Assembly lines. Infra-red devices warn if machine tools get too hot. They help control processes which require heating. In hot mills, they measure hot strip steel. Henry Blackstone, president of Servo and an infra-red pioneer, believes modern industry will be valuable assets one day in the glass industry, in manufacturing of synthetic fabrics, plastics, copper, aluminum, and in measuring fuel burning rates.

Medicine. Infra-red helps locate infections, abscesses, ulcers and blood poisoning. Forecasting. Infra-red helps chart weather balloons with uncanny accuracy, eliminating erroneous forecasts by not knowing where the balloon was when it went back to its signals.

**Exploration Army**

Explorers. Infra-red helps in polar regions can spot cracks in the ice by means of an infra-red detector that shows up as white streaks on the surface.

"I can't believe that a program that is economically sound and fair as ours is could ever be a political liability," Benson said.

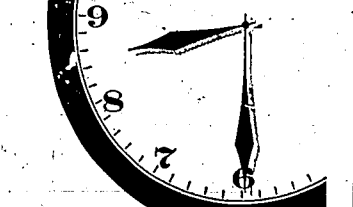
Benson, here to address a luncheon meeting of the United Republican fund of Illinois, held a news conference before the meeting got under way.
