# De Gaulle Turns To Algeria After Winning Powers

PARIS, June 3 (AP)—Premier Charles de Gaulle, armed with all the broad-powers demanded of parliament, turned attention today to Algeria. De Gaulle summoned Gen. Paul Salan, the French troop commander, from Algiers for consultation. Salan has been ruling Algeria openly in the name of the deposed French president. After thus asserting his authority over the army, de Gaulle called in Robert Schuman, resident minister in Algeria who has a big following among the rebellious French colonialists there. De Gaulle will go to Algeria tomorrow.

De Gaulle installed himself in the Hotel Matignon, official residence of French premiers, within minutes after the senate early Tuesday morning gave de Gaulle the powers of legislation on bills granting de Gaulle accepting powers.

De Gaulle will measure, authorizing de Gaulle to write a new constitution strengthening the executive, to be drafted by the senate early Tuesday morning. De Gaulle will also write a new constitution in consultation with a parliamentary committee and submit it to the people.

The senate vote completed action within 48 hours on the three-part program of power demanded by de Gaulle at this point. It was the last of a series of moves in his hour of crisis.

Shortly thereafter, the national assembly by unanimous consent voted to adjourn until Oct. 7 to allow de Gaulle to take legislative action on his program. Not even the constitution's deputies, bitter foes of the general, broke the tie.

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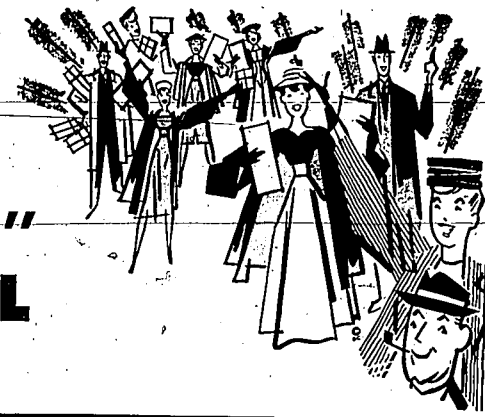

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### Parma Leader Regrets Hells Canyon Votes

PARMA, June 3 (UPI)—The death of federal Hells Canyon legislation at the hands of the House Interior committee was a "sad mistake," said today as a "sad mistake" by the member and past official of the Idaho-Washington-Oregon Hells Canyon association.

Sam Petrich, Parma, former president of the group and former Democratic chairman, said that the future will prove what "sad mistake" really is.

"Major reasons developed only by the reclamation bureau," he said, "are subject to the control of private agency that develops water projects."

The defeat of the legislation, however, brought approval from many Idahoans, reclamation officials and advocates of private power.

Those who supported the committee included:

### Boys' Plot to Blast School Is Reported

WASHINGTON, Pa., June 3 (UPI) — For more than a month the 65 pupils at the grade school in the coal mining village of Westland got over enough dynamite to blow up the school and the town as well. The school last week and no one knew about it but the four "school hating" boys pupils who put the 35 sticks of dynamite and four dynamite caps underneath the three-room schoolhouse.

The four boys, ranging in age from 10 to 14, stole the explosives from the Clark Coal company on April 21. Their purpose: Blow up the schoolhouse.

They placed the explosives in a space below the schoolhouse and attempted to set it off by starting a fire. They hid behind a pillar at the schoolhouse and waited to be unharmed by an explosion.

Had the dynamite exploded the boys would have been killed and the school and the town as well would have been blown up, a state trooper said.

When their attempt failed, the boys left the dynamite and caps under the schoolhouse and continued going to classes with the other children.

On Memorial day a pupil found one of the caps near the schoolhouse and showed it to a former coal miner. The man, who had lost three fingers in a blasting accident, informed constable Robert Orpheim that the two checked and found the explosives under the schoolhouse.

Three of the boys who stole the dynamite were turned over to juvenile authorities yesterday. The fourth was in a hospital recovering from an illness.

### Group Used Pressure for TV Licenses

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The chief counsel of a house subcommittee investigating federal regulatory agencies says the evidence indicates a pattern of pressure to influence television licenses.

Robert W. Latham expressed the view "yesterday" in summing up a study on nine contested television cases handled by the federal communications commission.

Latham told the subcommittee privately several instances of TV cases studied showed evidence of a pattern of ex parte pressure and record manipulation aimed at FCC members. In laymen's language, this means such things as a word put in a number of copies or a friend of a commissioner.

Findings Reported Latham reported on his staff's findings after subcommittee Chairman Owen Harris, D. Ark., said the FCC hopes to submit recommendations for remedial legislation to the house before congress adjourns this summer.

In line with a scheduled speed-up of hearings, the subcommittee will go to Boston Tuesday to break a deadlock on records it says it needs to start an investigation of federal license commission and securities exchange commission.

Centered on FCC So far, the subcommittee has concentrated on the FCC, which among other things licenses and regulates the television industry.

One purpose of the Boston hearings, expected to last two days, will be to study the FCC's award of television channel 5 to WHDH, Inc. That company, a wholly owned subsidiary of Boston Herald-Traveler corporation, received the award contrary to an examiner's findings.

### Missile Expert Warns Against Closing Strategic Metal Mines

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The army's top missile man has been quoted as saying it would be a dangerous strategy to close the nation's strategic metal mines and rely on foreign supplies.

Robert P. Redwine, minerals specialist on the senate interior committee staff, said the warning was sounded by Dr. Werner Von Braun, director of the army ballistic missile agency's development operations division.

Redwine said Von Braun told him in a recent interview that Germany's defeat in World War II was hastened by shortages of mineral materials. The interview was at the Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

The German-born scientist was quoted as saying the German experience shows it is dangerous to rely on foreign mineral sources.

In a memorandum prepared for Sen. James E. Murray, D. Mont., interior committee chairman, Redwine said he had asked Von Braun: "Modern war-making technologies have developed to such a point that in this country ready-made supplies of an enemy's submarine fleet could knock out all South American, European and African ports through the use of nuclear weapons, could it not?"

Von Braun reportedly replied "Yes—that is definitely the case. The United States should have a stockpile of foreign supplies of basic minerals. The scientist reportedly said it would be a tragedy in the event of national defense to shut down strategic mines."

Even in the case of the domestic iron ore, Redwine said, the competitive price of iron ore from Brazil is a good idea and that a domestic mining operation in this country ready-made supplies of an enemy's submarine fleet could knock out all South American, European and African ports through the use of nuclear weapons, could it not?"

### FBI Captures Utah Fugitive Despite Ruses

LOS ANGELES, June 3 (UP)—One of the FBI's most-wanted fugitives fell off the list despite such precautions as two loaded automatics, a false mustache and a cleverly faked identification card.

Quay Clon Kilburn, 41, was arrested yesterday at his Los Angeles apartment by agents acting on a tip from a man who saw his picture in a postoffice.

Kilburn, a convicted bank robber and embezzler, had been hunted since he fled from Utah state prison by using his "press card" as editor of the prison paper. He got out by saying he was going to interview prisoners on an honor farm.

Recently he picked up a hitchhiker who later saw his picture as a wanted man.

The rider was able to tell FBI men the general area where Kilburn lived.

Yesterday D. K. Brown, special agent in charge of the Los Angeles FBI office, met Kilburn when he returned to his apartment. He informed Kilburn he was under arrest. Kilburn looked around and said Brown was backed by several agents.

"All right," he said. He made no resistance. Agents plunked a loaded pistol from his waistband and found another in the apartment. In his pocket they found a false mustache and what Brown termed a "fine-looking ID card."

Agents also printed a picture of Kilburn on a card and a space for thumb prints. They were the prints of his left and right big toes," said Brown.

Kilburn has spent 14 of his 24 years in prison. He has been convicted of bank robbery in four states, embezzlement, lousing back checks and, while in the army, selling GI clothing.

### Unsolvable Case of Missing Professor May Be Discussed

WASHINGTON, June 3 (UPI)—Rep. Charles O. Porter, D. Ore., says the unsolved disappearance of Prof. Jean de Galindere two years ago may be taken up by a senate subcommittee which it opens hearings on in 10 days in Latin America.

De Galindere, a 40-year-old Basque exile and former Columbia university professor, was an outspoken critic of Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo. He disappeared March 12, 1956.

Porter repeated his demand for a congressional investigation of the disappearance and branded as "fantasy" a report clearing Trujillo of any part in the matter.

Porter said the report, financed by Trujillo and approved by New York lawyer Morris L. Ernst, was written "from a very biased point of view and was a 'hodgepodge of supposition.'"

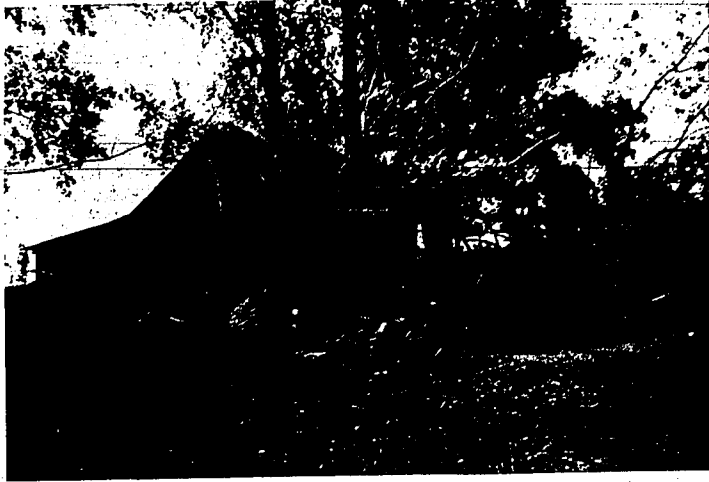
The Ernst report, released Sunday, rejected suggestions that Galindere was kidnapped and killed by Dominican agents. The report was written after an 11-month, \$150,000 investigation.

### New Probe Over Deported Citizen May Be Opening

WASHINGTON, June 3 (UPI)—A highly placed congressional source said today the justice department is investigating serious new charges against Finnish-born William Heikkila who was returned to this country after his heavy deportation caused a national uproar.

This source, who asked to remain anonymous, said the department is investigating allegations that Heikkila made one or two trips to Moscow under extremely questionable circumstances. This source added he understands Heikkila attended a "school" in Russia.

The justice department declined to confirm or deny any such inquiry is going on. An immigration official said however it is not to assume "every facet of the Heikkila case is being examined."

### France Faces Task in Weak Money-System

**NEW YORK, June 3 (UPI)**—One of Gen. de Gaulle's first tasks will be to try to bolster the shaky franc. French officials say that to insure national payments to settle foreign trade, France is near bankruptcy. The franc's participation in the European Payments Union is a problem with five other nations at stake.

At home, France's problem is not so familiar one—the rising cost of living which steadily grows.

The U.S. dollar doesn't buy much now as in 1947 is no news. The franc's depreciation has been such that the appreciation of money has been a study of what's happened in 10 years to the buying power of the currency of 24 countries.

The First National City bank of New York measures the depreciation of money by the rise in the official cost of living or consumer price index.

The rate of depreciation varies year by year but the economy has compounded them and sends them out to give an annual value of the franc's market value at an arbitrary 100 in 1947. It was found that by the end of 1957 it was worth 56, or a decline of 44 percent.

By comparison, the U.S. dollar dropped at 100 in 1947, had dropped to 60 in an annual decline of 40 percent.

### West Cheered By Approach Over Tunisia

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 3 (UPI)**—Western diplomats were cheered today by French Premier de Gaulle's direct approach to Tunisia to solve their dispute outside the United Nations.

The French approach bolstered reports that de Gaulle might ask Tunisia and Morocco to help find a way out of the three-year-old Algerian war.

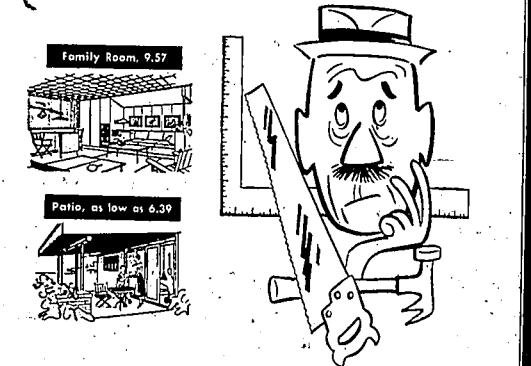

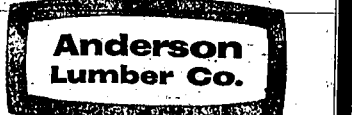

### Army of Cuba Opens All-Out Drive in Fight

**HAVANA, June 3 (UPI)**—The army has launched an all-out drive against the rebels entrenched in the Sierra Maestra mountains, seeking to drive them into the sea. It was reported that some 8,000 troops attacked Sunday along the 80-mile front between Manzanillo and Sagua. They reported fierce fighting and said casualties have been heavy on both sides.

Loyal Cuban troops, some from the 1st and 2nd Divisions, and 3rd and 4th Divisions, the sources said, are being used to block rebel attempts to escape by sea, the sources said.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, June 3 (AP)—A South African of 17 years and St. Andrews Old Course of 600 years Monday wrecked the comeback of the venerable American Harold B. Ridgley in the British amateur golf championship. The local-born American World War II gunner from Los Angeles, who played down 4 and 8 in the first round before young Bobby Verwey. Dr. Jones was one of these. Another was Louis du Long, 34, a former professional from Danvers, Mass., who gained an easy 4 and 3 victory over George Morgan and a 2 and 1 over Reid Jack.

Leading British players, paced by Jack, a slim 34-year-old stocky, were Harold Ridgley in last year's final, impressed just about as much as the Australian kid.

The 46-year-old former U. S. public health champion, who is making his third try for the British title, defeated Dr. J. H. Hastings of Scotland, 1 and 2, and Reid Jack, 1 and 1, at least, tied a record in doing it.

Andrew played what the Scots call "a wee bit golf" when he shot the "loop" at St. Andrews in 3-2, and Reid Jack, who had been the seventh through the eighth, runs 4-3-4-4-2.

"No golfer could do better than Reid Jack," said a Scottish observer as Andrew finished the run. "It's significant his name is upon the course."

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### Union Seeks Big Vote for Wheat Curbs

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The National Farmers Union wants to make an upcoming referendum on wheat production controls and farmer views on future farm policies.

The farm organization has set up a special committee to get out a heavy "yes" vote for continuance of federal marketing quotas on the 1959 wheat crop at a 24-state referendum June 20.

The heavy yes turnout—60% per cent is needed for approval—can thus help all farmers gain an effective farm policy on all crops, it says.

Not satisfied The farm organization is not happy with the \$1.81 a bushel price supports Agriculture Secretary Benson has announced for the 1959 crop if quotas are approved.

The \$1.81 support price is 75 per cent of parity—low by any standard except Benson's, but better than the open market and disaster relief.

If farmers vote no, they vote for unlimited surplus production and disaster. Consistent also have a real stake in this vote, because defeat of the referendum would pull farm purchasing power down still further, adding to the recession and unemployment.

See Bad Results The farm organization estimates that rejection of quotas—with consequent lower wheat and farm buying power \$90 million dollars.

Farm law allows supports for wheat to be set between 75 and 90 per cent of parity, depending on the size of supplies.

Benson has made no recommendations on how farmers should vote. He has taken the position that it is not for him to advise them. Quotas have been approved by sizable margins in recent years.

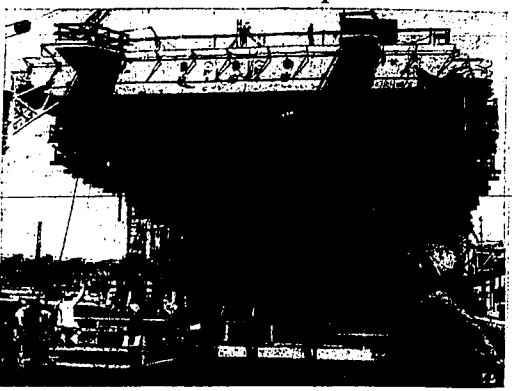
Benson, however, has recommended legislation to authorize lower supports and greater freedom to grow wheat and other controlled crops.

### Business Leaders Tell Ways To Avoid Boom, Bust Cycles

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Fourteen top business leaders proposed a variety of means yesterday to help the country avoid the costly economic dips of boom and bust cycles.

Their chief suggestion was for the government to keep a steady hand at the throttle and to maintain monetary and fiscal policies that encourage growth in production, demand and employment.

"The economic policies of the United States must stress growth above everything," said W. W. Keener, president of the E. P. Goodrich company.

1. Maintaining an independent federal reserve system free of political ties.
2. Avoidance by the government of heavy deficit financing, except in emergency periods.
3. Overhauling the tax structure and giving the President the power to veto individual appropriation items.

Resisting the power of unions and trying to prevent wages from outstripping the rise in productivity.

F. W. Ecker, president of the Metropolitan Mutual Life Insurance Co., suggested writing into the 1948 federal employment act a statement that the government has a responsibility to avoid inflation as well as to keep up employment.

### Redstone Missile Launched Inland

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The defense department announced yesterday the first successful inland launching of the Redstone missile from desert proving grounds in New Mexico.

A brief announcement from the Pentagon said the missile, whose range is 200 to 250 miles, left the ground at 11:50 p.m. MDT.

The missile has previously been launched successfully from Cape Canaveral, Fla. This was the second time tactical troops were used in a launching.

### 175 Rebels Killed

ALGERIA, June 3 (UPI)—Supreme French commander in Algeria Gen. Raoul Salan announced last night that 175 Moslem rebels had been killed and 159 taken prisoner by French troops during the week ending Sunday.

The French fight against the Moslem nationalists has been continuing without let-up despite the French crisis and Gaullist approval which started here May 13.

### Nuclear Tests Ban Talk May Be Held Soon

It looks as if negotiations with Soviet Russia for a possible ban on nuclear weapons tests may be started before this month is over.

A letter from Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev to President Eisenhower seems to leave the way clear for the opening of such negotiations.

At the same time, negotiations for a summit conference of heads of governments on cold war issues are proceeding secretly in Moscow.

Eisenhower told Khrushchev on May 21 that he was ready to start nuclear talks on the test ban within three weeks after receiving word that the Soviet government was agreeable.

The Suggests Experts

The president suggested that the experts who would conduct the talks make a progress report within 30 days after the start of their meeting and make a final report within 60 days or as soon thereafter as possible.

Khrushchev replied Saturday that he was ready to start the talks within three weeks, as Eisenhower suggested. But he suggested that the final report be made within 60 or 400 weeks instead of within 60 days.

As regards details of the talks, Eisenhower suggested that they be held in Geneva, Switzerland, and that representatives of the United States, Great Britain, France and possibly other countries which have means of detecting nuclear weapons tests be included.

Khrushchev said that Geneva would be a suitable meeting place but that he preferred Moscow.

He said he would like Poland and Czechoslovakia, and India and possibly some other countries, to be represented.

May Propose Japan

This is what Eisenhower had expected. He is most likely to propose that Japan, which has been active in the middle between Russian tests in Siberia and American tests in the Pacific, be included.

Presently, the next step may be for Eisenhower to suggest a firm date for the start of the meeting and either to accept Moscow as the meeting place or to ask again that it be Geneva.

There is no guarantee that expert talks will result in an agreement to end the nuclear weapons tests. For one thing, some leading American scientists want to do a lot more testing before any ban is imposed. For a second, the United States will insist that any ban be accompanied by an inspection plan to prevent cheating. That will be the most important point for negotiation.

Conference Held

As regards the summit conference negotiations, the United States, British and French ambassadors in Moscow have conferred separately with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko on this question within the last week.

There is no indication of the progress being made, if any, in these talks. The United States insists that before it agrees to a summit conference it must receive some assurance that agreement on the big issues to be discussed can be expected.

At least the negotiations, at least, are being conducted secretly, without any Russian propaganda bias to complicate things. And any success attained in nuclear weapons tests would almost certainly bring a summit conference nearer.

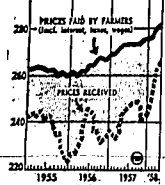

### Still Difficult Neighborhood



### Huge St. Lawrence Seaway and Power Project to Be Blasted Closer on July 1

MASSENA, N. Y., June 3 (UPI)—The \$1.5-billion St. Lawrence seaway and power project will be blasted a step closer to completion on July 1.

The dam will be blasted at about 8 a. m. and the waters of the St. Lawrence will churn across the 40,000 acres of land from which whole towns and villages were literally uprooted and relocated.

The Canadian rehabilitation was more difficult. Residents of five hamlets, the town of Iroquois and its 250 homes, camps and outposts along the river were gathered into three new townships — Iroquois, Long Sault and Inoué.

sewer facilities, schools, churches, four mammoth dams — Barnhart Island dam, 10 miles east of Massena, Iroquois dam, 20 miles to the west, The Barnhart dam, full operation, will produce 1,800,000 kilowatts of electric power. Three miles upstream is the Long Sault spillway dam which serves as control for the power pool and diverts the river around Barnhart Island to the power dam.

The width of the new lake will reach 100 miles in places. The dam will be blasted at about 8 a. m. and the waters of the St. Lawrence will churn across the 40,000 acres of land from which whole towns and villages were literally uprooted and relocated.
