DELAYS IN JUSTICE

Freedom and justice are inseparable. The protection of the individual in the exercise of his rights, in the use of his property, is of the very essence of liberty.

To have ideals of justice, however, is not enough. Justice must be a tangible, something. Citizens of all walks must know that they can seek it and get it.

In the United States today, this is not really possible. The courts of this country, both federal and state, are so heavily congested that many delays of some months or longer stand in the way of countless just solutions.

Delay, of course, can be the equivalent of a denial of justice in many, many cases. If action does not come fast, the opportunity for a just answer may vanish.

Chief Justice Earl Warren recently described this danger when he said that court delays are so chronic that they are "compromising the quantity and quality of justice available to the individual. Justice is hurting this country's worldwide reputation in this vital area of our democratic life."

Back in 1941, some 38,000 civil cases were filed in the federal courts, an equal number disposed of, and 29,000 left unheard at year's end.

The total filed annually today is 62,000, and the backlog has grown to 66,000. Yet there are only 50 more federal judges now than the 200 which handled the 1941 caseload.

Do you know many of those 60,000 unheard cases? Is justice being denied by inaction?

Warren long has campaigned for additional judges to handle the mounting burden. No new judgehips have been authorized for more than four years. Furthermore, there are 10 current vacancies crying to be filled on the federal bench.

Multiply the story by the equally dismal picture at the state and local level, and we can condition seriously damaging to our freedom.

Is there justice in the United States? On paper, yes. In practice, yes for certain lucky citizens whose cases are handled with fair dispatch. No for those to whom time is vital, and "eventually" for some to whom delay is perhaps costly and annoying but not finally defeating.

HALTING GRANT TRAINS

Sen. John Williams has asked proof that the voters of Delaware made a profitable political investment when they elected him to congress in 1946 and again in 1952.

Senator Williams led a movement to sidetrack, for the present, a plan to increase retirement pensions of nationalistic and congressional employees. Details of the bill are not available but the Chicago Tribune said persons would be higher than salaries currently paid there.

Man Says He Was Father's Day Founder

CHICAGO, June 5 (UPI)—Harry C. Meek said today he founded Father's Day and a woman has no right to claim the honor.

"It's just like a woman," he said. "A man starts something and gets all the credit."

Meek said he began Father's Day in 1910 and it marked his birthday. Others, however, said the day was started by a Spokane, Wash., resident, Mrs. Anne M. Starnes.

Meek's claim is backed by visits to former President Warren G. Harding and Calvin Coolidge.

Given Wash.

He has a gold watch from the Lions Club of America, inscribed, "To Harry C. Meek, originator of Father's Day, June 20, 1920."

Meek is the head of a Chicago Lions club, was named at the 1922 convention to represent the club before the House of Representatives and has visited President Harding.

The Lions made Father's Day the third Sunday in June because it was the nearest and most significant day—June 20, Meek said.

He said the idea for Father's Day first came to him on Mother's day, 1915, while he was his boyhood home in Warren, Ky.

"There were seven of us kids and we always return home Saturday," he said. "It's the only thing that Mother's day, somebody says, 'do something about a father's day.'"

Worked With Lions

So I started looking it up around the time Meek had a gold watch. I had started up a petition for the national convention.

Meek has spent almost 20 years promoting the day but never would endorse a product.

Meek said he was motivated any other claim to founding father's day because "I didn't think it was worth fighting over."

Martin Maps Fight for Ike Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UPI)—Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts, the house Republican leader, has set the stage for a fight with President Eisenhower's defense reorganization plan.

Martin announced yesterday that when the bill comes to the floor, perhaps late next week, he will offer amendments to reverse it. He will offer amendments to reverse it more in line with Eisenhower's doctrine. The President got most of what he wanted in the measure drawn up by the house services committee but has objected vigorously because of three provisions he didn't get in the form he wanted.

The committee, of which Martin is not a member, approved the bill unanimously. Senior Republicans of the committee have been reported trying to persuade Eisenhower and his advisers to avoid a house fight over it to make any attempt at amendments in the senate.

It is reported that Martin has appeared in the face of opposition from most Democratic leaders and key GOP members.

The bill would give Eisenhower authority to increase the number of troops in combat, increase the powers of the secretary of defense and limit chiefs of staff and reduce the authority of the service chiefs and secretaries.

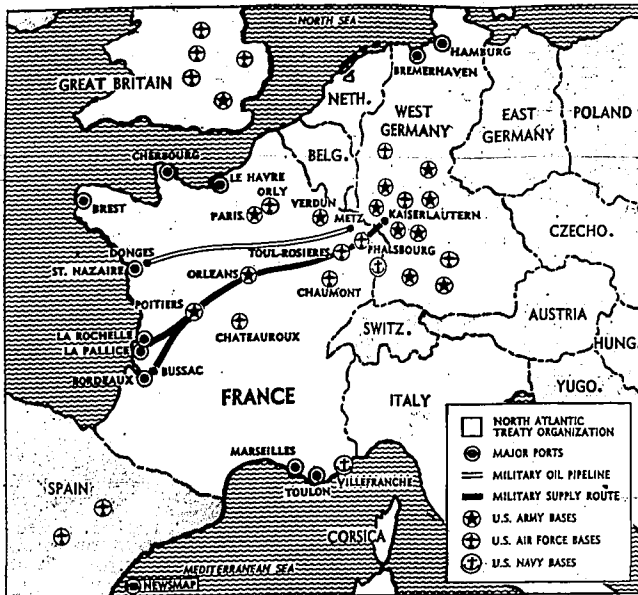

U. S. Has Stakein French Crisis



The political crisis in France has focused attention on that nation's vital geographical position in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. As shown above, France is the major port of entry to the continent. Across her run the main supply routes, with their attendant warehouses, depots and repair shops for U.S. troops in West Germany, flow Europe's fine lines of defense. The United States has invested 1.5 billion dollars and eight years in building up a huge military and supply complex within France, containing material worth another billion.

The 571-mile pipeline was built at a cost of \$8 million dollars. Of French soil are 53,000 American troops and 40 air base sites used by NATO nations, besides numerous U.S. military installations. There are 200,000-plus troops in West Germany. Should France pull out of NATO, not only would French troops, ports and bases be lost, but Kaiserlautern, the main U.S. base in Germany, would be cut off. The German ports of Bremerhaven and Hamburg are too close to red territory to be relied on.

Senator's Wife Defends Her Right to Wear Bathing Suit

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UPI)—Maurine Neuberger, wife of Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, D. Ore., cited common sense department statistics yesterday in defense of her right to wear a bathing suit.

California Primary Vote Could Have 'Sputnik' Impact on GOP

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UPI)—The country's Democratic and Republican campaign chairmen agreed on one thing today—California's primary election results could have a "sputnik" impact on the underdog GOP.

Senate GOP Leader William F. Knowland, whose total popular vote in the gubernatorial race lagged well behind that of California Democratic Attorney General Edmund G. Brown, also allowed he has a "sputnik" impact on the underdog GOP.

Sen. Andrew P. Schoepel, R. Kans., the GOP campaign chairman, said in an interview he is "not discouraged" by Knowland's showing in winning the Republican nomination for governor. He said "many of the senator's friends will be spurred to greater activity by this."

Sen. George A. Smathers, D. Fla., the Democratic campaign chief, said the California results showed "what we have felt all along—that a strong tide is running in the Democratic everywhere." But warning against over-confidence, Smathers added:

"Some key Republicans admitted privately they were jolted by the margin of Brown's plurality in combined party votes over Knowland."

They saw the same trend in Democrat Engel's greater total vote for Knowland's senate seat which GOP Gov. Goodwin J. Knight also is seeking. Engel did not run as far ahead of Knight in total votes as Brown did ahead of Knowland.

Assistant senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.), who won his own re-election in Tuesday's primary, said in a separate interview that if the "tide" indicated in California and other states continues until November the Democrats should gain "five or six senate seats, and 20 to 30 in the house."

But Mansfield also warned against "complacency."

Senate GOP policy committee chairman Byrnes Bridge, R. N. H., viewed the California outcome as about as far to be expected in view of the Democratic registration majority. Like other Republicans who greatly

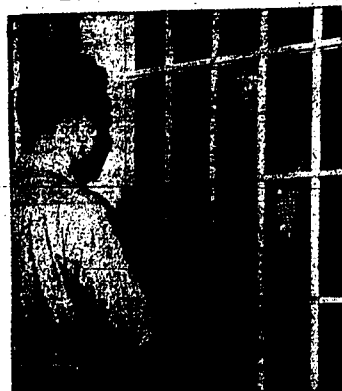

Ike's Crackdown on Gasoline Imports May Help Trade Bill

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UPI)—President Eisenhower's "voluntary" crackdown on gasoline imports may have helped chances of his embattled reciprocal trade bill. Whether it will do much for U.S. oil producers was more uncertain.

The President yesterday ordered existing "voluntary" quotas on crude oil imports extended to cover unfinished gasoline and other unfinished oil products. He ostensibly took the move to prevent the voluntary quotas from being nullified by increased imports of gasoline. Unfinished gasoline requires further processing before it is used as a motor fuel. Little finished gasoline enters the country because of an extremely high tariff.

Informed sources said primary cause of the action was to help support of congressmen from oil-producing states for the administration's reciprocal trade bill now before congress. Independent oil producers have complained the previous curbs were being circumvented by increased imports of gasoline.

The sources said a similar proposal to curb imports of unfinished gasoline and oil was turned down by the administration in March. Assistant Commerce Secretary Frederick H. Muller denied intent of the order was to win support for the trade bill.

An oil industry source told United Press International that estimates were that about 80,000 barrels per day of unfinished gasoline and oil would be affected by the new order.

The interior department estimated only about 20,000 to 30,000 barrels of unfinished products enter.

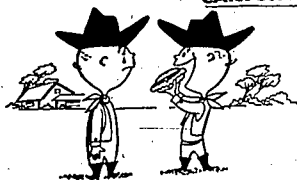

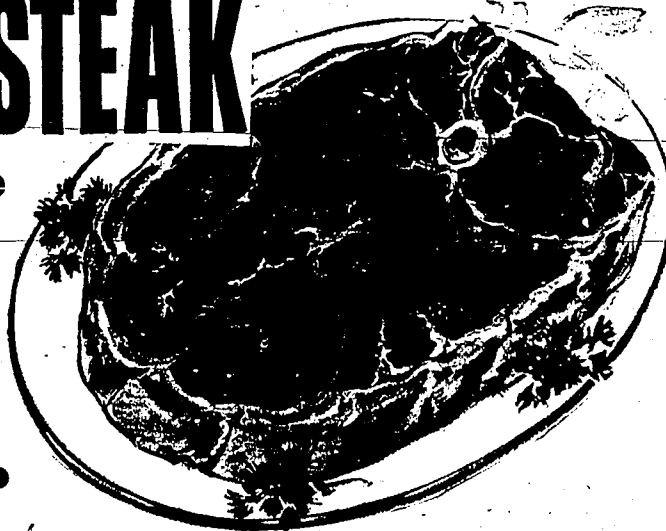

New Aide Credited With Ike's Increased Exposure to Public

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UPI)—Till among the so-called palace guardmen is Thomas E. Stephens of New York, recently returned to the White House for his third tour as appointments secretary.

Stephens has been described as an old political pro and utility lifer for the Republican national committee. To Stephens is being attributed much responsibility for President Eisenhower's sudden increase in public exposure.

The President is getting around, talking to a lot more groups than was the case some months ago. There even is talk around the White House that Eisenhower might forgo his customary long vacation in the late summer and early autumn to remain close to Gettysburg and Washington. That means the President is thinking of doing himself a big hand in this year's congressional campaign.

During the middle and late winter, the President was rejecting many, even most, invitations to appear away from the White House. He reduced notably his office and rose garden meetings with visiting delegations. The White House call list was limited for the most part to top government officials and to the absolutely imperative diplomatic encounters.

This restricted schedule was not imposed by the medical men who keep constant tabs on the President's pulse and blood pressure. The decisions to wave off many out-of-town delegations largely were made by the White House staff. Old pro Stephens made a fast change in that.

There was underway what developed into the longest consecutive string of White House press conferences in four years—ask in a row, O. Hagerly, of course, gets a lot of credit for that. Then, there was the stiff question of protocol when Vice President Richard M. Nixon Russell Adams, Mrs. J. D. Crogo is returned from his South American swing.

Should the President meet the Nixons at the airport? Undersecretary of State Christian A. Herter, speaking from the protocol book said: "No!" The President was there, however, and his appearance is viewed in hindsight as good politics both for himself and for Nixon.

Eisenhower is seeing more groups at the White House now than in recent months. The net effect appears to be that his feet for what is going on in the White House are being kept more informed. He and his staff have secured a bit sensitive to suggestions that the President was being kept remote from the facts of life.

To the widely goosiped story in Washington that Eisenhower won't read newspapers, Hagerly replied over the week-end with a statement that the President regularly reads half a dozen or so newspapers published in the East and as far west as Chicago.

On the basis of his present activities, Eisenhower is behaving in much more now than previously like a man who is ready to go out and battle for his party. He definitely is considering invitations for several farm belt appearances next October. They would be of the type which could be billed as non-political, perhaps to solve problems connected with free TV time in which an answer could be made.

October would be an appropriate month for the best men in both parties to stand up boldly and discuss the facts of life. October 1958 will be the 100th anniversary of the Lincoln-Douglas debates.

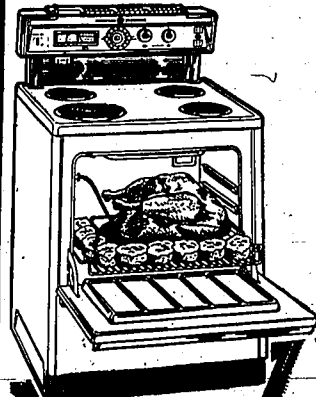

Utah Broker Faces Stocks Deal Inquiry

NEW YORK, June 5 (U.P.)—State Atty. Gen. Louis J. Lefkowitz today announced he has obtained from the state supreme court authority to question a Utah stock broker in connection with an alleged stock fraud involving more than \$100,000.

The broker, Jack Leland Cayias, of Salt Lake City, has been identified in testimony as the man who furnished information upon which literature was issued to boost sales of American Ductite Oil and Metals corporation.

An affidavit by Special Deputy Atty. Gen. David Clurman said that false and fraudulent literature was issued in 1935 and 1936 by Monroe E. Lepow, president of Lepow Securities corporation, Manhattan.

The attorney general's announcement noted that Lepow testified under investigation that Cayias furnished the information upon which Lepow based the literature and inducements to his securities investments.

Supreme Court Justice Irving H. Saypol signed the order directing Cayias to appear here July 23. Cayias, described as former president of the brokerage firm of Cayias, Landon, Glasser, Emery, Inc., was directed to produce records and submit to examination on the securities transactions.

The brokerage firm was located in Manhattan, in 1935. The last known address of the oil and metals firm was the Newhouse hotel, Salt Lake City.

The stock literature allegedly listed the value of tungsten properties of the oil and metals firm in excess of seven million dollars, and said a contract had been signed to deliver thousands of tons of the ore monthly to the Union Carbide and Carbon corporation. The affidavits in the case said no such contract was made.

He is the son of the late William R. Howard and Esther Howard, longtime residents of Twin Falls. He was born February 22, 1863, at Barre, Ark.

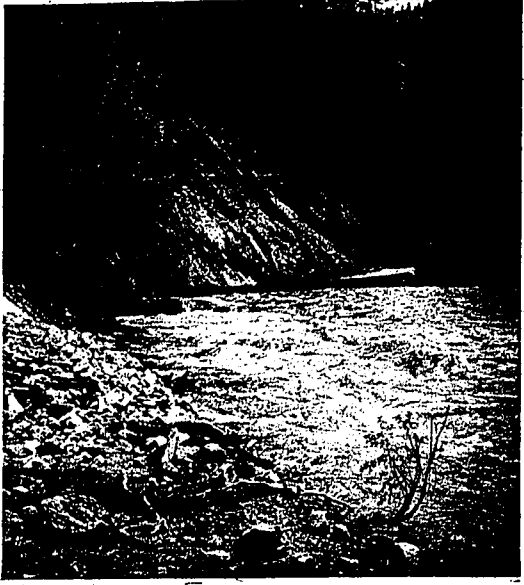
Mr. Howard made his home in Kansas City, Mo., and had been ill for the past two years. He was a veteran of World War I.

Two Military Heroes; Petain, De Gaulle, Have Ruled France

PARIS, June 5 (UPI)—Two of France's greatest military heroes—Marshal Philippe Petain and Gen. Charles de Gaulle—were today becoming power in the past 20 years than any civilian in this republic.

Petaim, now is the symbol of defeat, de Gaulle of victory. At one time they were good friends. De Gaulle even asked Petaim to be godfather to one of his sons.

Then came the collapse of 1940 and the split of France and Frenchmen into two violently opposed camps: Vichy and Petaim, the hero of Vichy, and free France under de Gaulle.

In 1940, as now, parliament turned to a military man as leader. Then, as now, it gave a non-parliamentarian full powers. The difference was that Petaim became a dictator.

On June 16, 1940, relying under the onslaught of Germany and the collapse of France, parliament passed the following law by a vote of 509 to 80:

"The national assembly gives all powers to the government of the republic under the authority and signature of Marshal Petain to promulgate in one or more acts a new constitution of the French state. This constitution shall safeguard the rights of the family and the country."

That same day, basing himself on this paragraph, Petaim signed three constitutional acts which abolished once and for all the third republic. He first appointed himself head of state and implicitly abolished the function of the president of the republic. The second fixed the powers of the head of state, and the third dissolved parliament.

De Gaulle in 1958 is not mentioned by name in the "full powers" act passed by the national assembly on Monday, and he has powers to act only for six months.

The terms of the bill provide that for the duration of six months dating from the promulgation of this law, the government of the republic will take through decrees the legislative measures necessary for the recovery of the nation. These decrees must respect basic liberties. Except in a state of emergency that has been specifically declared, they will be taken in the cabinet after consultation with the council of state. They will enter into force after their publication in the official journals.

The question being asked on the far left was: Would de Gaulle use these powers as Petaim did?

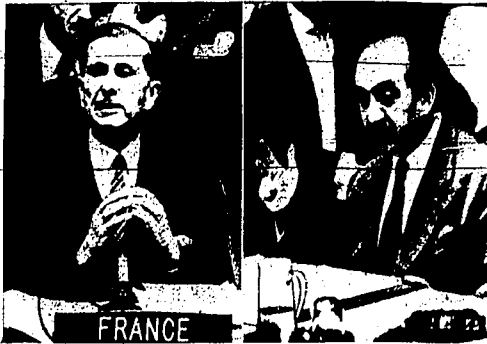

It is reported also that Chinese Premier Mao Tse-tun has lost a considerable degree of party loyalty to the Soviet chief theoretician for years has been regarded as a real No. 2 man. The reports are accurate, it is said, that Khrushchev is setting the penalty for the party to be liberalized, and that this is making the shipping boy.

As of now, Khrushchev has long been aware that he went too far in his denunciation of Josef Stalin's policies. 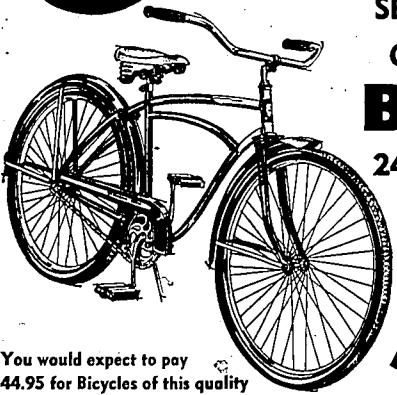

The reason for this is that the Chinese Red believes their chance of big-scale economic aid from the U.S. will be increased if Russia's alliance with the U.S. is improved. Because of this, it is reported, the Chinese are strongly opposed to the idea of a "summit" conference of the heads of government of the U.S., Great Britain, France, and other nations.

It is noted that Khrushchev, in making the main point at a recent Chinese Communist party congress, said Stalin was wrong when he tried to crush Tito.

Khrushchev, who apologized for his attitude, has now been committed to his own defense to build up. He said at a Bulgarian Communist congress in Sofia on Tuesday that Stalin was "basically correct."

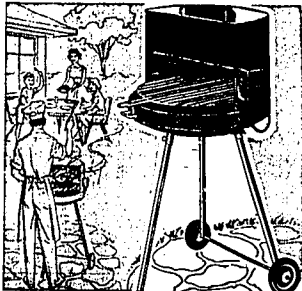

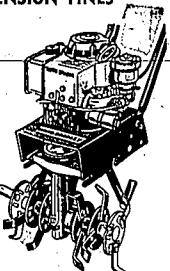

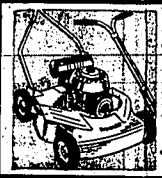

Filer Fisherman Pulls 12 1/2-Pound Trout Out of Clear Lakes Stream

Bob Farmer, Filer, a fisherman for almost half his young life, may just as well give the sport up because he'll never top the catch he made Wednesday. Farmer's catch, a 12 1/2-pound trout, marked the high point for Magic Valley fishermen, who turned out early to welcome in the 1958 general season. Farmer, an 18-year-old who lives on route 2, Filer, made the catch about 8 p.m. Wednesday at Clear Lakes. Fishing from the footbridge at the stream entrance to the big lake, Farmer was using No. 10 "gold" hook baited with a single salmon egg when the hunter took it. The hold reeled for 45 minutes, Farmer employing careful tactics to keep the trout from snapping his four-pound test line.

During the battle, Farmer remembers, his fishing companion, Jerry Kaufman, "didn't say much" but about 50 kibitzers, drawn to the scene, offered all sorts of contradicting advice. Measurements showed the fish was 29 1/2 inches long and was 19 inches in girth. Frank Stewart, Clear Lakes manager, reports it is the largest fish ever taken out of the lake. Farmer, an eight-year fishing veteran, plans to spend the rest of the season beating his first-day catch about 50 kibitzers, drawn to the scene.
