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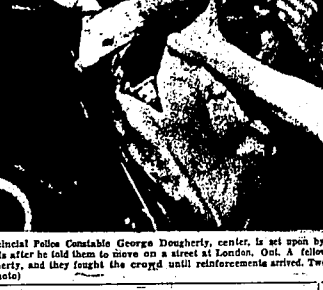

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Probate Judges Ask Strong Juvenile Act

MCCALL, June 12 (AP)—Idaho's probate judges asked yesterday for a bigger attack to ward against juvenile delinquents. In resolutions at their annual convention here, they proposed a series of amendments to the youth rehabilitation act. They asked that they be permitted to jail youthful offenders for as long as 30 days, provided the youths are not locked up together with adult criminals. They proposed that prosecuting attorneys be allowed, subject to approval of the court, to prosecute minors under the law for adults whether their offenses are felonies or misdemeanors.

Dip Reported In Vegetable, Fruits Prices

By The Associated Press

Increasing supplies of fresh fruits and vegetables will ease the price of food shoppers' purchases, according to a report by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The report, which is based on a survey of prices in the South and West, says that supplies of most fruits and vegetables are expected to be above normal this year.

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Crack in Price

Some stores are apparently slighting that they hope is a tiny crack in beef prices, after ribs and steaks had been so many slacks to tank. But for as many slacks to tank, ham, frankfurters, sausage, luncheon meats, and other items are being offered at lower prices.

A wide variety of seafood—mackerel, salmon, scallops, oysters, and the ubiquitous frozen fish sticks—also are advertised as being at lower prices.

More Lettuce Used

Lettuce is far and away the best vegetable to produce in Idaho, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Figures show that per capita consumption of lettuce has risen steadily since 1920, rising from 8 1/2 pounds a year to 16 1/2 pounds a year.

Letting has brought about a change in the way lettuce is raised in Idaho. It used to be raised in rows, but now it is raised in beds.

Several varieties are available, such as Boston, romaine, with its elongated leaves, and iceberg lettuce, which is raised in heads.

Shoshone C. of C. Assured Ice Caves to Be Put on State Map

SHOSHONE, June 12—Leaving the Shoshone Ice Caves off the new state highway maps was a mistake, according to Wayne Summers, public relations chairman for the state highway commission, who visited the local Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

According to Summers, the map was left off the map on the impression from rumors that the caves were a tourist attraction. He said he will use all his influence to get the attraction placed on the maps for next year.

Summers had made a tour of the Ice Caves this week and visited the chamber following that visit.

At the last Chamber of Commerce meeting, the group had discussed the fact that the Ice Caves were off the new highway department maps and protested. Letters were mailed to officials.

The group toured the Ice Caves and a report on condition of the caves was given by Lloyd Smith, Ralph Smith and Frank Carothers. They said ice on the floor of the cave is building up at the rate of about six inches a year and with the well-lighted area and discoloration there, it is well worth the time and expense from an educational standpoint.

Leader Urges Reduced Rail Freight Rates

PORTLAND, June 12—A reduction in rail freight rates would permit railroads to better compete with growing competition from trucks, the president of the national association of shippers and utilities commissioners said here yesterday.

Edward Thornton of New Hampshire said that rail shipments have climbed somewhat as rail rates have shot up 100 per cent in the past 10 years.

Thornton said, however, that the shipments of truck lines have increased at a much higher rate.

He made the remarks in a speech before the public utilities conference of public utilities commissioners.

Railroads, he said, now must produce rates or lose business to trucks. Rate increases, though, cannot be made in the face of public utility charges in the labor field of railroads.

It is his belief that public utility commissioners act in den with representatives of railroads and labor and work out a solution to the problem," he said.

Another speaker yesterday was E. Louis, director of the utilities for the Idaho public utilities commission.

U.S. Treasury Elated; Some Are Unhappy

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—The U.S. Treasury's elation over the success of this week in stretching out the maturity of the federal debt is shared by all in the financial community.

The policy is being watched closely by corporate treasurers, school and city fathers who may be expected to fund the investment market. Already they are making plans to break volume of new securities this year. Now Uncle Sam is becoming a bigger competitor in this market.

Wins Fraile
The treasury's aim, however, wins the praise of many on the sidelines for its long term good effects on the money market.

What the treasury wants to do and what it succeeded in doing is to get more of the federal debt into long term bonds so that it won't have to pay a premium to buy on time or a mortgage when there is money available in the market.

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Expert Says Space Ships Plan Drawn

LOS ANGELES, June 12 (UPI)—The fictional space ship that carried Buck Rogers into his comic strip universe is now on the draftsmen's drawing boards in preparation for actual production, it was reported yesterday.

Kraft Ehrliche, rocket expert of the Convair division of General Dynamics Corp., said the government was interested in the proposed space ship his company has been designing.

Ehrliche refused to elaborate on plans for the ship in a speech to the American Rocket society.

But he predicted that with nuclear power the United States could set up a research instrument station on the moon "within 10 to 15 years."

He said he had developed a method to launch instruments on the moon by enclosing them in inflatable rubber containers which could be dropped on any part of the moon surface like a "bouncing rubber ball."

The containers would be carried aloft in a lunar satellite, inflated and dropped toward the moon.



Odds Said Against Immediate Solution to Plane Collisions

BOISE, June 12 (UP)—The odds are against immediate elimination of midair collisions, a regional official of the Air Force association said yesterday.

"Several years of neglect in always modernization cannot be corrected in a hurry," said James M. Trail, Boise, regional vice president, in a statement here.

Trail said air traffic control has lagged behind development of the airline. Though money won't solve the problem alone, he said, great conservative expenditures in the past would have lessened today's problems.

Trail discounted what he called a public illusion that a single agency is to blame for midair collisions.

Both military and civil air operations fly under the same airway traffic systems, he said, although visual flight rules are stricter for the military than for civil flights.

Plans filed under the visual rules are uncontrolled whereas those under instrument rules are controlled by the civil aeronautics administration.

"But the control system can handle only 20,000 movements day out of an average daily volume of 200,000 movements," he said.

New Disease Of Lungs Is Investigated

NEW YORK, June 12 (UPI)—A brand new disease has popped up. It is so distinctive and its manifestation is so uniform from victim to victim that the scientific discoverers suspect something has been added to the environment we live in which causes it.

Inoculated, for instance? They asked. Or perhaps, detergents? It might be something new in plastics or antibiotics. "In other words," they continued, "the new disease comes to us generally for the convenience of modern living."

Whatever it might be, it is isolated because the new disease is in one of the lungs. Whatever it is, science must find it and identify it because it can be—and has been—fatal, they said.

Widely spread
The ailment has been identified to all parts of the country, and its first appearance was five years ago and the appearance of the new disease is on an increasing rate within recent months.

The reporting scientists were top men in the identification—Dr. Samuel H. Rosen, of the armed forces institute of pathology; Dr. William C. Cawthon, clinical professor pathology at Harvard; Dr. Averill A. Liebow, professor of pathology at Yale.

So far these scientists have identified positively and studied minutely 100 cases. The ailment is in the air cells of the lungs, in a material which is high in protein and in fat. This material evidently is produced by the cells of the lung's lining. What causes these cells to behave that way is the \$64,000 question.

Case Death
If enough of the air cells are killed, death is the result, perhaps directly caused by a super-imposed bacterial or fungal infection. But the disease can be long-drawn-out and stationary, or it can eventually disappear on its own.

The doctors made a full-scale scientific report on their 27 cases in the New England journal, *British Medical Journal*, in order to stimulate both the identification of further cases and the research which must follow. One trouble about identification is the conditions can be mistaken for a type of metastatic infection of the lungs.

Most Victims Adults
The 27 cases cited were mostly adults, between 20 and 60 and included six women. There was a boy, two years old, and a girl, 11 years old. Eight of the 27 cases proved fatal, and in 16 the disease proved incurable. In the remaining 11 cases, the scientists sought clues to the cause in the occupations of the victims.

They found some of the occupations of possible interest. Four of the 21 men were in lumber yards. One was exposed to the smoke produced by oil and kerosene in contact with hot metal. He worked in a cannon shell factory. Another was an electrician who had been exposed to the gases which course when a fluorescent light tube is broken. Still another had been exposed to silica flour in a toothpaste factory.

WACO, Tex., June 12 (AP)——A woman Bible that belonged to a Texas soldier killed in action 15 years ago on his way to his mother by a strange route that probably never will be explained.

The mystery: Who carried 750 Bibles to Germany? The Bible for all months before it was found by a German housewife.

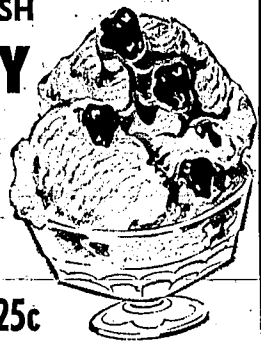

Mac Gives Money Advice for Those Planning to Go Abroad

By HENRY McLENORE
 A few of my readers, who are planning European vacations this year, have written me about how much to take, what kind to take, when to spend it, how to spend it, and how to get the most out of it. They couldn't get a better man, for I have spent over 20 years in the world to find out what to do. It's not a hobby. For instance: What would I do besides nothing. If I had all the money I could get, I'd take a grand tour in a corner of the Pacific.



In answer to the question as to how much money to take, I'd say take all you can lay your hands on. If it's a first trip, take one to three, and fourth trips to Europe it is all right to travel by bicycle, sleep under the trees, and have a tent, but on the first trip, no. Of course, if your budget allows for nothing more comfortable than a tent, a three-sided bed and a jacked-up mattress, go anyway! There's enough to see and do to keep you from forgetting your audience.

State Officials Not Ready to 'Ignore' Polio

BOISE, June 12 (UPI)—Although Idaho apparently has managed to get through the first five months of 1958 without a recorded case of polio, state health authorities aren't ready to concede that the epidemic is completely wiped out.

In fact, the odds are stacked precariously against the state weathering the critical summer months with a perfect record.

Not Enough Shots
 State health administrator Terrill O. Carver said today that while polio vaccine shots have certainly been an important factor in stemming Idaho's seasonal outbreaks of the disease, they haven't been administered to enough people to rule out all possibilities of isolated cases.

The summer months when the disease is most prevalent still lie ahead of us," cautioned Dr. Carver. "But even if a case is recorded later, state health officials see little likelihood that an epidemic such as that of 1949 when 510 cases were reported could ever be repeated. In 1949, the toll was reduced to 110 and with the advent of polio inoculation, it dropped to a comparative trickle. Only 21 cases were reported in 1957.

Ready for Anything
 In any case, the state health department, which has been studying past epidemics, is sure that it can handle the situation.

Two staff members, Dr. Harry Henderson and Ralph Carpenter, have been put in charge of investigating suspected cases reported by family physicians in order to get detailed histories on past contacts and medical histories. From that information, the department can trace down the source of the infection.

So far they haven't had any suspicion of "overage" and have directed their efforts to other phases of the general health problem in the state.

There is also the little matter of smuggling in foreign money. Some countries limit the amount of their dough which you can bring with you. Back in the forties, when Spain was tougher than a boot on currency control, I bought some postals in Portugal and aged ten years before I cleared customs. It also didn't do my chances of getting to Heaven any good.

As to how to best spend money in Europe, my advice would be to buy one good thing in each country visited, and to buy the transportation to buy a rail or bus ticket, of which there is an oversupply. The airplanes won't take the little or no money, and like midway articles at a fair, cost more than they are worth.

I'll admit I'm a great one to be giving this advice, being as I have bought more ridiculous questions and a bonfire in a week. But it's true. One final bit of advice, even if you don't go, get everything set, take out half the clothes and leave them at home. You'll be glad you did. Luggage is the only drawback to travel.

Chiffon Fruit Salad

(Makes about 8 servings)
1/2 cup well-drained peach slices 1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup hot peach syrup (or peach syrup and water) 1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk
1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk (see recipe below)

Line bottom of 1 1/2 quart mold with peach slices for garnish. Chop remaining slices. Mix hot peach syrup and gelatin to dissolve gelatin. Chill till thickened. Add celery, nuts, mayonnaise and remaining chopped peaches. Blend. Mix with WHIPPED Carnation Instant Spoon into salad mold. Chill until firm (about 2 hours). Unmold on lettuce.
