OTTAWA, June 17 (AP)—The government estimated today it ran a record deficit of \$1.1 billion in the first five months of the fiscal year ending next March 31. The previous record was \$900 million in 1955-56.

### What Causes Stock Prices To Advance?

NEW YORK, June 17 (AP)—What's causing stock prices to advance when many observers doubt the slump has hit bottom yet?

Stock prices have been rising pretty steadily since the middle of May and late the popular indexes of stock averages have been climbing into high ground for the year.

They have done this in the face of a growing number of reports that they are overvalued and therefore have increased their short selling of stocks.

The bulls have been reaching in spite of generally poor earnings statements for the first three months of the year and indications that the current three months may follow the same pattern.

The bulls are still high because stock prices ahead also are disregarding the greatest potential of companies omitting dividends or cutting them.

The drop in industrial output, the high rate of unemployment, the dip in national income and a slight slip in consumer spending hasn't fazed the bulls or the bear.

What do they think justifies buying up stock prices now?

Some fully believe that the slump is at or near bottom and that the only way for business to now get up. It asks for earnings should rise for many companies. Profits fall faster and further than sales in a recession and could rise faster in a rebound of sales and production.

The bulls are another kind of money in the market buying stocks in big pools in investment funds. Expansion funds keep right on buying and selling in northern Idaho to work somewhere.

### 19 Lives Lost When Plane Rams in Tree

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 17 (AP)—A twin-engine Brazilian Convair airplane crashed into a tree while landing at Curitiba airport yesterday. The airline said 19 of the 27 persons aboard were killed.

Among the dead were former President Nereu Ramos, Santa Catarina state Gov. Jorge Lacerda and Congressman Leopoldo Lasi.

The eight survivors included another congressman, Jose Leite Rodrigues, who was reported in a brave condition.

None of those aboard was believed to be from North America. The plane belonged to the domestic airline Convair do Sul-Southern Cross. The line said it was on a scheduled flight from Porto Alegre to Curitiba, capital of Parana state. Curitiba is about 400 miles southwest of Rio de Janeiro.

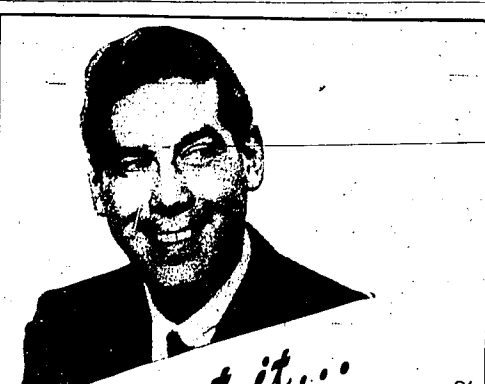

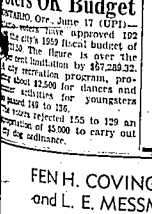

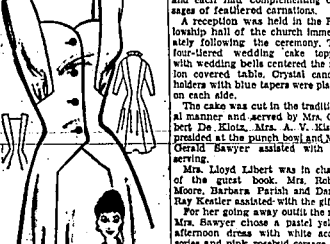

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### Gracie Pfozt Files Papers For Election

BOISE, June 17 (AP)—Rep. Gracie Pfozt filed Democratic nominating petitions yesterday to launch her campaign for election to a fourth term as representative from Idaho's first district.

The filing came prior to her formal announcement, which she had planned for later in the week. Only women to represent Idaho in congress, Mrs. Pfozt first was elected in 1952 and was reelected in 1954.

Also filing nominating petitions Monday was Blaine Ben. W. E. Director of Oregon, who is the first to file for congress.

A. B. Curtis of Oregon has announced he will seek reelection. In the second district, Rep. Homer H. Buden, Republican, has announced he will seek reelection. Announced Democratic candidates are Ralph A. Linton, Ed. Wilson, Fred Dyer, Blackfoot, and Tim Brennan, Pocatello.

In a statement, Mrs. Pfozt said she would seek reelection on my record and added: "I think most of the people know pretty well how I stand on the issues of greatest importance to them."

**Outline Program**  
"I am for full development of our natural resources as the best way to improve Idaho's economic health," she said. "For increased farm price supports, for tax reductions for food and middle-income individuals as soon as our economy permits and immediate tax relief for small business; for increased social security benefits and for the allocation of surplus agricultural commodities to public assistance and unemployment recipients."

She said she has "worked and voted for measures to accelerate ready-to-go public works projects to provide more jobs, for grants for hospital construction, and expansion of highway and housing programs."

"I have fought the administration's 'back door' policy, which at least has not seemed softened, still has not saved credit sufficiently to stimulate enough home building to help Idaho's hard-hit lumber industry," she said.
