

Bride Chosen For Japanese Crown Prince

TOKYO, June 18 (UPI)—A bride has been chosen for Japanese Crown Prince Akihito but unlike his forebears in the world's oldest ruling dynasty he may have had a part in picking her, reliable sources said today.

The sources told United Press International that the engagement would be announced Sunday.

A score of names have figured prominently in speculation about the woman who would become the next empress of Japan but runner favored pretty Itatoku Kitashirakawa, 18, and a former imperial princess.

Although the great granddaughter of the Emperor Meiji, she has been a commoner since the end of the war when all titles of nobility, except for the immediate royal family, were abolished.

Imperial household officials expressed surprise about the engagement report and a spokesman for the Kitashirakawa household declared, "The whole thing is new to us."

No one in a position to know would say how the sportsman-prince, 24, felt about the women considered eligible to be his bride. But it was said that his wishes have been taken into consideration.

In this case the price support required majority, there will be no marketing quotas or acreage allotments. But E. E. Lyman, chairman of Utah's agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, said acreage allotments would remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support.

Farmers Vote Set Friday on Wheat Quota

A last-minute reminder to eligible growers about the vote Friday on 1938 crop wheat marketing quotas was issued Wednesday by Ted Scott, chairman of the Twin Falls county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

Local polling places will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday. Eligible growers are those farmers who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest on grain in 1938. Since growers with 15 acres or less of wheat and those in the feed wheat program are not eligible to cast ballots on 1938 wheat marketing quotas, the county chairman notes.

Scott points out that the vote is on marketing quotas for the 1939 wheat crop, not acreage allotments. Whether or not quotas are approved, wheat acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining the individual grower's eligibility for price support.

The level of the available wheat support will vary, however, according to the outcome of the vote, Scott explains. If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas, support will be available on the 1939 wheat crop at an average of not less than \$1.81 per bushel, or 75 per cent of parity.

If quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voters, support for the crop will be available at \$1.20 per bushel, or 50 per cent of parity.

Scott says that if marketing quotas are in effect, there will be penalties on "excess" wheat produced on acreage exceeding farm acreage allotments. The penalty will be 45 per cent of the wheat parity price as of May 1, 1938.

Growers who have any question about the wheat program or local voting place are urged to get in touch with the county AGO office, 110 Third street, east, Twin Falls.

BOISE, June 18 (UPI)—Most crops and areas in Idaho are doing considerably from recent rains even though field work was temporarily interrupted by heavy rain. Crop-weather bulletins reported today.

Some areas of eastern Idaho were still suffering from dry winds and considerable cut alfalfa hay was damaged, said the bulletin, covering the week ended June 18.

"An appreciable amount of winter grain lodged due to rank growth, wind-blown rain," the bulletin continued. "Some grass alfalfa was harvested. Other farm activities included haying, cultivation of row crops, thinning and hoeing of beets, hoeing of onions and irrigation."

"Planting of beans and potatoes was virtually completed in the western area. Winter grains are headed over most of the state and spring grains are heading in low elevations. Range feed is generally good."

REA Assessment Problems Viewed

BOISE, June 18 (AP)—Representatives of half a dozen rural electrification administration utilities from around Idaho discussed their assessment problems informally yesterday with the state tax commission.

The commission this year, for the first time, invited utilities to present the status of their companies before the commission set a tentative value for their properties in August, said Harold D. Johnson, executive secretary of the commission.

Several of the spokesmen asked the commission to ease a 2 per cent tax on their gross receipts. Johnson said, "This poses a legal question," he said, "because the statutes call for an ad valorem tax based on the value of the property."

Burns Kill Man

ONTARIO, Ore., June 18 (UPI)—Earl Burgess, 38, Huntington high school junior, died at Holy Rosary hospital last night of burns received in a paint dust explosion at the school June 2.

He was the second fatality in the blast. Desaire Sultz, 46, cook at the school, died of burns on June 11. The two men were scrubbing paint when the explosion occurred.
