Senate Votes Tax Extension Except on Transportation

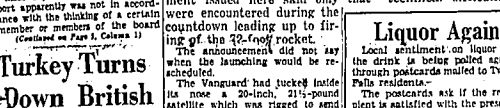
WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—The senate today passed a bill to ease present transportation taxes but to continue for another year other major excise taxes and the 52 percent corporate tax rate. The measure, passed by the House June 5, now goes back there because of the senate's unexpected adoption of amendments to repeal two amendments, the senate backed up the Eisenhower administration and Republican and Democratic congressional leaders in resisting any anti-tax legislation.

The house either can accept the senate amendment wiping out the transportation tax or send the measure to a senate-house conference committee to resolve the issue.

Boise Airport Isn't Fearful Of Collisions

BOISE, June 20 (AP)—Air traffic in the Boise area is increasing but the Boise airport is not fearful of collisions because of its modern facilities, according to a spokesman for the civil aeronautics administration.

State Orders Highway Site Hearings Set

BOISE, June 20 (AP)—Public hearings were ordered yesterday on the location of the interstate highway through Idaho's most thickly populated areas, the Boise valley. The spokesman for the cities of Caldwell, Nampa, Meridian and Boise endorsed—with some reservations—the compromise route proposed to the state highway board by state highway engineer G. Bryner. The board's chairman, Thomas C. Rich, said the board "looks with a great deal of favor" on the compromise route and instructed the state highway department to arrange for public hearings as soon as possible. Such hearings are required before bureau of public road approval can be given interstate routing.

The compromise route differs only slightly from one endorsed earlier in Boise as the present route. It runs quite closely to the present route of U. S. Highway 30 but bypasses the business district of Caldwell, Nampa and Meridian.

Some 31 miles would be built on the proposed route split, with one section bypassing the city near its southern outskirts and the second section near the business district. The reservations on the endorsement of the route concern Caldwell, Nampa and Meridian all urged that the Boise bypass be included in the interstate route.

Not Wanted in City
Harold T. Jona, a Boise city councilman, said that any interstate route which would penetrate the city, extending at least to the city limits, would "blight" on the community.

Rich, Bennett and Leonard of the Boise city council, Caldwell, Nampa and Meridian, all agreed that the highway department is interested only in a location that would be a service for residents of a community as well as for the traveling public. They indicated that the route should not be determined without further study, which they said will be made separately by the city, county and state.

The next July 30 meeting of the board is scheduled for July 30, after meeting with a delegation from the cities of Caldwell, Nampa and Meridian and other southwestern Idaho lumbermen.

Bert Schneider, chairman of the Boise three county commission, headed the north Idaho group which discussed means of obtaining additional federal aid for the construction of roads for the Lewiston orchards road.

J. M. McCrann, one of the owners of lumber mills in the area, pleaded with the board a right-of-way trespass dispute. It involves the mill located adjacent to the road and which, he said, it felt court action will be needed to clarify the situation.

Damage to Bone Marrow Reported in Atomic Mishap

OKA RIDGE, Tenn., June 20 (AP)—Five of the eight men exposed to deadly atomic radiation Monday received minor bone marrow damage, the atomic energy commission said yesterday.

A medical bulletin issued by a team of specialists said studies are continuing in expectation of possible bone marrow damage in 50 per cent of the men.

The AEC said the victims received doses ranging from 30 RAD to as high as about 300 RAD.

RAD is a unit of measurement of atomic radiation.

The AEC has estimated that 400 to 600 RAD would produce a lethal dose of radiation in 50 per cent of cases.

The commission said five of the men suffered significant amounts of radiation. Three others were exposed to lesser amounts. All are in a hospital undergoing studies and treatment.

His daughter, Phyllis Mary de Rachewil, said Pound had booked passage on the liner Cristoforo Colombo. It is due in Genoa July 1.

Pound retired from a Washington mental hospital earlier this year after the U. S. government dropped charges against him that he committed treason in wartime broadcasts from Italy.

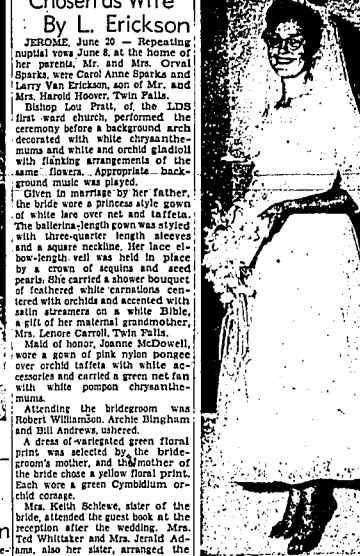

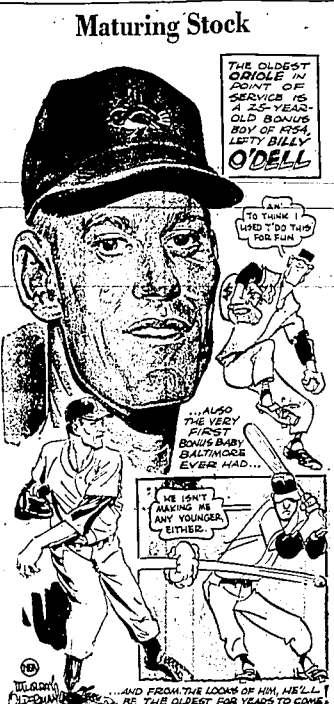

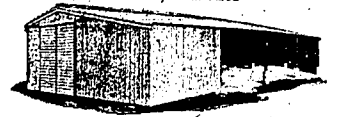
Legislature Will Receive Plans of Highway Office

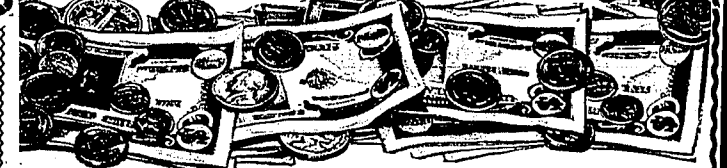
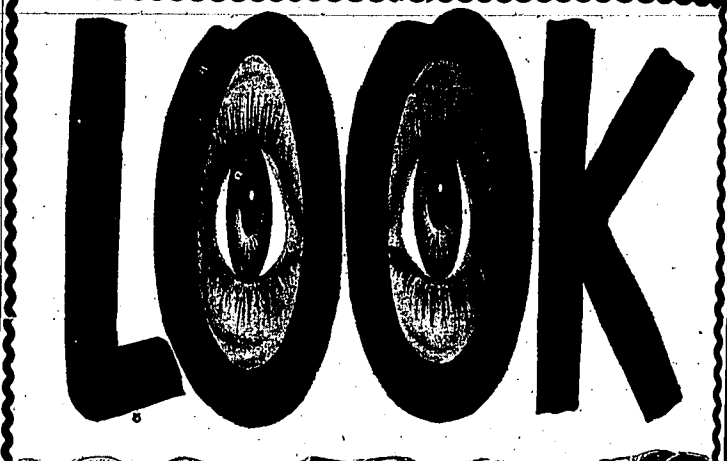
