TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The Adams-Goldfine affair will have a profound effect on 1954-1955 politics and elections, which involve a selection of the Senate and the President of the United States. In the opinion of veteran observers at Washington, it will force a major revision of the basic strategy of both major parties. It will lead the harassed administration to an aggressive in advocating more liberal legislation on the social and economic fronts.

White House politicians realize they must best themselves to hold the reins of power. The Adams episode might have lost. Another necessary administration move is to achieve a measure of the depression and a viable economic upturn.

SECRETARY FOLSOM SPRINGS SURPRISE—Marion B. Folsom struck this recovery note when, to the amazement of many news committee members, he testified in favor of a cost-of-living increase in social security benefits. Until the appearance of the secretary for health, education and welfare, increased public aid to the administration was opposed to any expansion.

It is considered significant that, coincident with the appearance of the secretary, the Republican spokesmen abandoned their earlier caution, and began to forecast a definite economic improvement by early 1954. This forecast was made by the president and Labor Secretary Mitchell pounced on every indication, left reflected even the slightest gain in business conditions.

TOP WENT OUT IN EVEN DARKER DAYS—All through the political scene may look dark to the Republicans and the Democrats have a precedent for optimism. Things appeared even gloomier at this same time of the year in 1954, when scandalous accusations from the House of Representatives removed the worst states, in June of 1954 it was predicted that the Republican nomination would not be worth a campaign. The party then split as Madison Square Garden.

INDICATORS FROM SOME SOUTHERN STATES—Southern elements, including their most prominent spokesmen, are now being heard in the House of Representatives. Governor Harrison of New York, Governor Williams of Michigan or even Adlai E. Stevenson.

As a few southern states have indicated, Dixie may repudiate the "loyalty oath," which binds them to the party. This may mean a realignment of the party for a favorite son or figurehead, such as to throw the election into the house. With each state casting a single ballot, there is a better opportunity for "deals."

NORTHERN AND SOUTHERN STATES LESS BELLICOSE—Now, however, and the Adams-Goldfine affair may be partially responsible, Democratic strategy will be to nominate a moderate southern Democrat. At the same time, the party will try to repeat the fatal blunders of that year. Their specific strategy remains fairly obvious. Instead of nominating a moderate southern Democrat, as Harriman, Williams or Stevenson, a more likely choice would be a moderate such as Sen. John F. Stennis.

Washington's defection is just to coddle its pride and ambition. It classifies itself as the Northwest. Time though its athletic record doesn't confirm its self-radiance.

The break-up stems from the discipline inflicted on the party by the recent conference. The conference rules in the recruiting and keeping of athletes. They were guilty, and got stiff jobs by way of punishment. Chipped by the conference writers of their hometown papers they worked themselves into a lather and tried to pressure the conference into releasing them. The California schools picked up their dolls and walked out.

The root of the whole business is the commercialization of college sport, particularly football. It isn't a sport but a business. Not quite as openly commercialized as football, but the same business principle nonetheless. The Southern California schools in particular griped because they had to play the Northerners in the conference when they might have played other and bigger schools and drawn much bigger gates. It was a box office proposition with them. This greed for gate receipts, and the desire for bigger stakes, has led to the practice of buying athletic talent, often with some exercise of subterfuge. When they were caught they tried to get away with it and tried to build their way through to escape penalties.

The whole business is a disgrace to institutions which are supposed to be educational. The athletic side was to be a clean, healthy sport in conjunction with the education of the youth who are made partners in the game. The commercialization of the sport has led to lasting reforms it would be welcomed. Actually, the reforms are being worked out in the conference and college athletics, and the time commercial character.—Salem Statesman.

LABOR REFORM PROBLEMS The senate by a vote of 81 to 32 rejected an amendment to the labor reform bill designed to curb use of union dues to help elect candidates to office. The action was not all surprising. In the first place this is an election year and the senators who are getting union financial support in their campaigns are particularly those on the Democratic side. They have a close association with organized labor and are usually reluctant to support any labor reform which labor opposes. This is the basic reason why labor reform is a difficult bill to obtain passage. 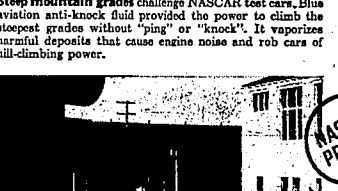

Child's Heart Operation Is Shown on TV

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24 (UPI)—The doctors stepped from a small amphitheater at Stanford hospital today, weary but proud of the job they did before a vast television audience on a young boy's heart.

Because of them, Tommy Hunter, 11, may live out his normal span of years. Had the delicate and dangerous operation not been performed, the hole in Tommy's heart probably would have caused his early death last year.

Dr. Frank Gerbode performed the operation. Dr. John Osborne's heart machine kept young Hunter alive.

The two doctors, both associate professors at the Stanford medical school, said they were not in the least nervous at performing an operation on a live television show. Though it was only the second time such surgery has been performed, Gerbode and Osborne said they thought of nothing but their work inside the operating room.

Head Hole in Heart

Their work consisted of cutting through the outer wall of Tommy's heart to his center where a hole two inches "long" had been forcing the way to his nearly eight-year-old blood a minute more than was necessary.

The result was that Tommy was smaller than others his age, lived easily and was expected to live only half a normal life span.

Using a fine silk thread, similar to flyfishing tackle, Gerbode sewed the hole with a needle and thread which was used.

Wound Misplaced

Osborne said the operation was complicated by the fact two large vessels entered the right instead of the left side of Tommy's heart.

Those he moved to their correct positions.

The show was televised for an hour and a half, although from beginning to end the operation took two and a half hours.

The great advantage to Osborne's machine was that Tommy's blood passed his heart, was pumped and returned to his system while Gerbode and his assistants worked in a dry field. In cases of emergency the heart can be stopped with no ill effects while the machine continues to pump life into the patient.

"Despite vigorous attempts," Polvin said, "we were unable to get the bill out of the Republican-dominated banking, utility and insurance committee in the house."

In a speech yesterday at Weiser, Max Hanson, Fairfield, also a Democratic candidate for governor, questioned O'Connell's right to serve as insurance commissioner. He noted that a Boise insurance agency carries O'Connell's name and Hanson said state law prohibits the insurance commissioner from having any interest in an insurance company.

O'Connell said he sold the agency bearing his name when he became insurance commissioner in 1950 and had had no interest in it since.

"The people who purchased it prefer to keep my name there," O'Connell said, adding that he also canceled his license as an insurance agent when he accepted appointment to the state post.
