Bridge Set Afire
Ship Collides
With Oil Tanker

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—A Swedish freighter rammed a gasoline tanker on the darkness-shrouded East river early today, sparking a fire that leapt to the Manhattan bridge high above. Two men were missing and 37 injured. The sinking Empire Bay also spewed dangerous un-ignited fuel into the river and caused its busy shipping artery to be closed for several hours. Although a wide area of the stream was turned into an open fire, it was extinguished only after the collision, many crewmen plunged into the water screaming for help. Puffs of red smoke drifted out of the ship's funnels. A New York city fireboat was disabled in the tank.

The East river, which separates Manhattan from the city's boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens on Long Island, is about half a mile wide at a point where the smash occurred at midnight at 12:25 a.m. Several hours, thousands of motorists were attracted to the river banks to watch the spectacular drama unfolding in the stream. For several hours after the tanker sank and the flames subsided, the two of the funnels exploded or fire from the waterborne fuel led authorities to halt travel by other boats. The fire spread in a river from Hell Gate south to the Brooklyn bridge.

Huge crowds of Russians Protest At U.S. Embassy
Voters Reject Plans for Water, Sewer Project by Lopsided 1,662-934 Tally

MOSCOW, June 25 (AP)—A crowd of more than 1,000 Russians, some angrily shaking their fists and shouting the Russian equivalent of "dirty SOB," demonstrated today at the U. S. Embassy. About 150 Soviet policemen kept the crowd under control. One screaming Russian hurled a stone through an open window, but there was no damage. U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson told reporters he planned no protest because "under our system of government we do not object to peaceful assembly and demonstrations."

The embassy had prepared for Russian retaliation against demonstrators by Thursday night. A 40 per cent increase in filter tips more than offset a 10 per cent decline in nonfilters, but also accounted for a drop in quantity of tobacco utilized — 100 million pounds less than 1952. Per capita consumption (number of cigarettes made divided by total population 15 years old and over) was slightly below the 1952 high.

## State Pays \$11,024,729 to 12,809 on Valley Jobless Rolls in First Quarter

A total of \$11,024,729 was paid throughout Magic Valley during the first quarter of 1958 to 12,809 non-farm workers covered by the Idaho employment security law.

Information released Wednesday by the state employment security agency shows that \$6,073,332 were paid in Twin Falls county alone to 6,231 workers.

The agency's figures also classify the workers in the area according to seven basic employment categories: mining, construction, manufacturing and retail trade; finance, insurance and real estate; and wholesale and retail trade; communication and utilities.

A total of 9,044 workers were listed as employed in the nine Magic Valley counties in the wholesale and retail trade category.

This total represented nearly three times the number of workers employed in the next largest category, manufacturing, where 2,243 workers were listed.

Employment across Magic Valley for the other categories are services and miscellaneous, 1,713; transportation, communication and utilities, 1,300; construction, 892; finance, insurance and real estate, 538, and mining, 75.

In addition to the \$6,073,332 paid in Twin Falls county to non-farm workers during the year's first quarter, other Magic Valley figures are: Jerome, \$1,287,022; Minidoka, \$938,333; 1,331,308; Lincoln, \$102,571; and Camas, \$44,504.

Camas county reported no employment in two categories, manufacturing and finance, insurance and real estate. Three counties—Cassia, Gooding and Jerome, reported no employment in mining.

County-by-county figures follow showing the total number employed, and the employment by category, Twin Falls, 6,631; wholesale and retail trade, 3,023; manufacturing, 1,201; services and miscellaneous, 883; transportation, communication and

### Church Asks Fund for Study Of Pleasant Valley Dam Site

WASHINGTON, June 25 (UPI)—Idaho Sen. Frank Church revealed today that he has called on the senate appropriations committee to re-examine a \$196,000 house-deleted appropriation to investigate Pleasant valley as a federal multi-purpose dam site.

The funds were eliminated from the interior department appropriation committee.

Church said he had written senate appropriations committee chairman Carl Hayden, D. Ariz., requesting his support for the investigation of the site on the Snake river above the confluence of the Salmon and Snake rivers.

Previously, the senator told the house committee that some work already had been undertaken on the

investigation when it was halted "as the result of opposition expressed by the house public works committee last year."

The Idaho Democrat said if the investigation revealed the Pleasant valley site feasible for a high multi-purpose dam, it would be preferable to the Nez Perce site, owing to the fish problem. The Nez Perce site would be below the mouth of the Salmon river, a major spawning stream for salmon.
