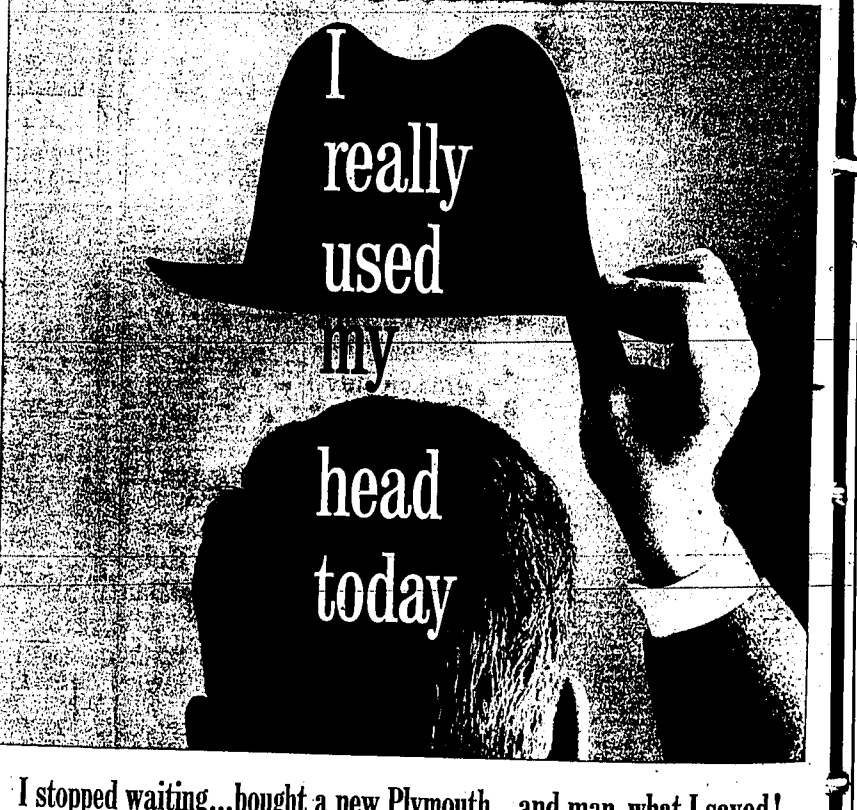

"Thespian" Is Found Adrift In China Sea

TOKYO, June 26 (UPI)—A Japanese coast guard vessel found the missing Los Angeles yacht "Thespian" drifting helplessly in the east China sea off Korea today and began towing her to southwestern Japan.

Coast guard headquarters at Moll said the "Thespian," with effector-median John Conner and four other persons aboard, should reach Saitama port by noon tomorrow.

Missing Since Friday
The sleek, white, 112-foot yacht was feared missing since last Friday, June 20, when it failed to show up at Hakata. There was even speculation that it had been seized by Chinese communists after it set out from Keelung on northeastern Formosa ten days ago.

The Japanese patrol boat Isumi sighted the "Thespian" in the east China sea about 20 miles off Cheifu island near Koetra's southeastern coast.

Motor Was Dead
The Isumi flashed word to coast guard headquarters at Moll, northern Kyushu, that the "Thespian" motor had gone dead and that the yacht was stuck in the absence of any wind.

The patrol boat was told to tow the yacht about 100 miles, to waters west of Nagasaki. Another coast guard vessel, the "Thespian," was towed to the port of Moll. The "Thespian" the last 60 miles into Hakata, just outside Osaka.

Wife Very Happy
In Tokyo Calver's wife, screen actress Ann Cornell, said she was so happy at news of the yacht's safety. "I will chill on top of my child's."

Mrs. Calvert had flown to Tokyo ahead of her husband to put her ailing three-week old son in a hospital. The infant was suffering from Formosa's heat. Mrs. Calvert said, and was "reluctantly dehydrated."

Dallas Board Blocks Order To Integrate
DALLAS, June 26 (AP)—The Dallas school board last night ordered its public schools to remain segregated for the school year beginning in September.

It said it was doing so because of an apparent conflict between the U. S. supreme court's school integration laws and Texas school integration laws.

The U. S. fifth circuit court of appeals on July 23, 1957 ordered the Dallas school integrated but did not set a deadline.

The Dallas school board contends it cannot comply with the decree without violating a law passed by the 1956 Texas legislature.

The state law provides that a school district that integrates without gaining approval in a local option election, called by 20 per cent of its voters, shall lose some state school funds and that authorities shall be fined. No such election has been requested in Dallas.

University Born
KATHMANDU, Nepal, June 26 (UPI)—Nepal has begun work on its first university, to be located six miles outside of Kathmandu, it was announced today.

Buildings for the university, designed by American architects, will cost two million dollars and will be erected in memory of the late King Tribhuvan.

O'Connell is Idaho's state insurance commissioner. Hanson is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor.

"Mr. O'Connell's public statement name when he became insurance commissioner in 1950 and has had no interest in it since, still bears no explanation why he has allowed his name and personal telephone number to be listed for several years under the agency name," said Hanson in a prepared statement.

In Boise, where he was reached for comment, O'Connell said, "I guess the telephone company has not bothered to change the listing."

Viet Nam Has Denied Claim Of Invasions

SIAM: South Viet Nam, June 26 (UPI)—The government of South Viet Nam today denied the charges that its troops had invaded the neighboring Indochinese kingdom of Cambodia.

A statement of secretary of state for foreign affairs said the charges were "entirely imaginary."

Reports from Phnom Penh, Cambodia, said that Cambodian army units were fanning through the jungle-covered border province of Stung Treng, bordering the area of the Cambodian Premier Bin Var called an "invasion" of U.S.-trained Cambodian troops.

According to Cambodian officials, Viet Nam troops had crossed the ill-defined frontier and searched themselves in the Cambodian village of Srae Chh.

They said units of the royal army (Cambodian) army were going up into the area to meet the Viet Nam "invaders."

The statement issued by the Viet Nam government, however, denied that its troops had occupied any Cambodian territory. It said Viet Nam forces in the area consisted of a few hundred civil guards who are stationed about 10 miles from the frontier.

Counter Charge Made

The official government news agency denied the charges that the Cambodians themselves have violated the border 40 times during a six-month period.

The agency said the Cambodian government had played into the hands of Viet Nam propaganda in presenting Cambodia as the victim of so-called Viet Nam-Thai operations.

(Communist) North Viet Nam had allowed up the charges by saying that only four times during the past four months last Sunday in the demilitarized zone separating north and south Viet Nam.

The Viet Nam-Cambodian border was flared into the open yesterday when Bin Var denounced the "invasion" in a nationwide broadcast and called on the 1,500,000 Cambodians to rally behind King Sihanouk to beat back the Viet Nam forces.

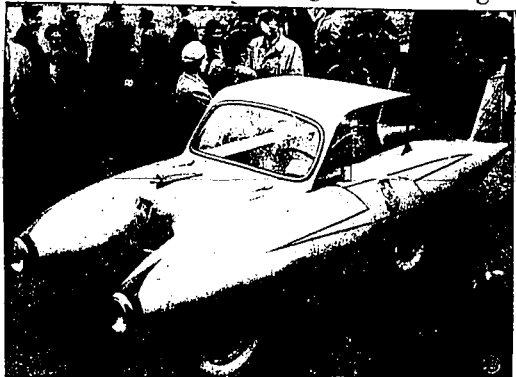

Idaho's Crop Outlook Said Mostly Good

BOISE, June 26 (UPI)—The federal crop reporting service said today that with the exception of some dryland areas in the south central and east, Idaho's crops look generally good.

In its report for the week ending June 21, the agency said that weather was conducive to good growth of most crops and lack of rains permitted fields were to progress.

Harvesting of first cutting alfalfa, green peas, sweet cherries and apples is well advanced. Progress on irrigation, cultivation of row crops, hickory of beets and onions, summer fallow, and the cutting of crops for weeds and insects, the report added.

It said that some dryland grains in the southern area showed severe damage from lack of moisture.

"Winter grains are generally heading or headed," the report continued. "A small amount of winter grain in the early areas is turning. Spring grains are in the boot to headed in low elevations and some are turning in the southwest. Potatoes in the southwest and seed and dry peas in some parts of the north are in bloom. Livestock are in good condition generally. Range feed is good in most areas—some drying in the east."

Hoffa Charges Big Business Is Trying to Destroy Unions

SEATTLE, June 26 (UPI)—James R. Hoffa, president of the giant Teamsters union, warned that big business is making one last big effort "to destroy the labor movement" during his policy-making speech to western Teamsters yesterday.

However, the Teamsters president declared that the effort by big business "will fail and labor will continue to thrive."

Hoffa, who left for the east following the speech, made the statement to 700 delegates to the western conference of Teamsters convention.

Hoffa, who was acquitted of wire-tapping charges Monday, told the Teamsters he appreciated the way the membership was able to "take the headlines and editorials and how you have believed what I said in Miami was true—that I was not guilty of charges placed against me. The union leader said the acquittal was a victory for the entire Teamsters movement."

Commenting on Teamster difficulties with the AFL-CIO, Hoffa said the Teamsters union continues to be the most powerful union in the world, "in or out of the AFL-CIO." He cautioned against using their power unwise with the possibility "of pricing ourselves right out of a job." He pointed out that the trucking industry is not the only means of transportation in the world.

Alaska, Which May Become 49th State Means 'Great Land' in Aleut Language

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—The Alaska had a word for it. They called it Alakshak, or "the Great Land." Alekshak never became a popular word, fortunately, and the Great Land now is known as Alaska.

No one here seems to know the Aleut term for "49th state," which is too bad. For the senate is back debating whether to admit Alaska to the union, and the word, or words, might come in handy. The house has voted to make Alaska a state. Possibly the most surprising thing about Alaska is its vast size. It's so big it could even, but undoubtedly won't, humble a Texan. Why, pardon me, you could cut the two Texas out of Alaska, and have enough left-overs left over for a couple of dozen Delawareas.

Pop Alaska over the United States proper, and you'll fill most of the Mississippi valley. The right hand half of Alaska, the part that stretches along Canada's western border, would reach to the Atlantic. The left hand half of Alaska would reach to the Pacific.

Alaska has had a hard time living down the legend that it's exclusively a land of ice and snow. It gets cold up there, all right, but it can get hot, too. In Fairbanks it has been as hot as 99 and as cold as 66 below.

Loyal Alaskans maintain, though, that anyone who can live through a rugged New England winter will have no trouble in Alaska. The main problem, they say, is getting used to these long summer days and those seemingly longer winter nights.

Modern history began in Alaska at 4 a.m. March 30, 1867. Even then, it seems, the Russians were great ones for doing business in the dead of the night. Baron de Sieckoff of Russia and William Seaward of the United States signed the paper that completed a fantastic real estate deal. The whole place, 375,280,000 acres, had been bought for \$7,200,000. At that time Alaska had a population of 30,000. Eskimos, Aleuts who are closely akin to the Eskimos and assorted Indians.

The Tlingit Indians had a curious custom. They didn't want to get in the chips—or, more specifically, in the blankets—to hold a potlatch and give them all away.

Clever people, these Tlingits. For those who received the potlatch's gifts had, to come to his aid when he was in need. This may have been one of the earliest social security systems.

Oddity: After all these years, the native population still is reckoned at 20,000.

Living in Alaska is no bargain. Ninety per cent of all perishable produce is imported, and transportation costs on all goods are high. Potatoes grow well there, but the season is too short for corn or tomatoes.

Boyd was pinned against the ropes in the eighth and appeared likely to survive the round. In the ninth, Calhoun's right floored Boyd, but it was mainly a blow from the crook of Calhoun's right arm that sent him to a mandatory eight count.

New Engine Will Be Able to Fire 10-Ton Satellite

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., June 26 (UPI)—A half-million to a million-pound thrust rocket engine which could launch satellites in the atmosphere of 10 tons is being developed by the General Electric company, it was announced here today.

The engine was described as "a very light weight and radical new design, in comparison to conventional rocket engines."

A GE official said the engine will weigh approximately 4,000 pounds and will use the same type of fuel used in the GE engine that powers the first stage of the navy Vanguard missile rocket.

The Vanguard first stage engine uses kerosene fuel and liquid oxygen as the oxidizer.

"This rocket engine will be capable of launching a satellite, either manned or unmanned, in the weight category of 10 tons," the announcement said.

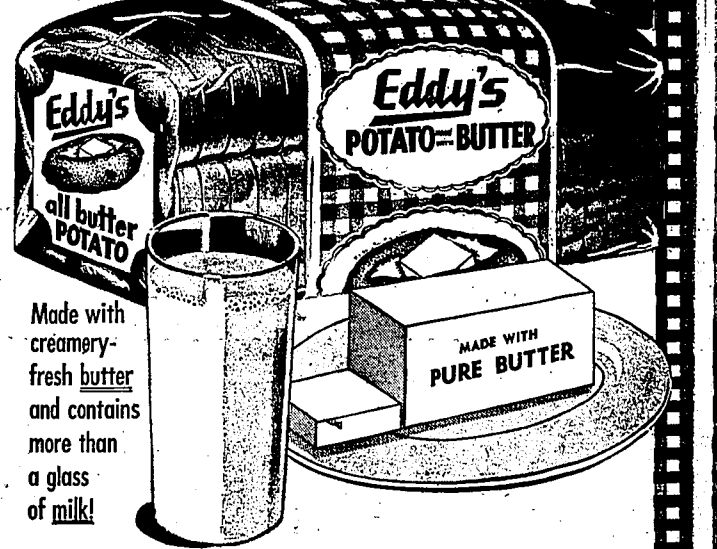

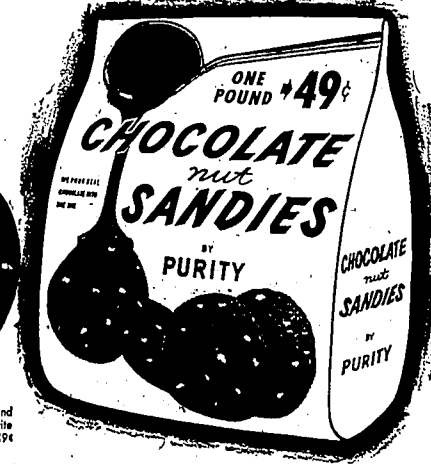

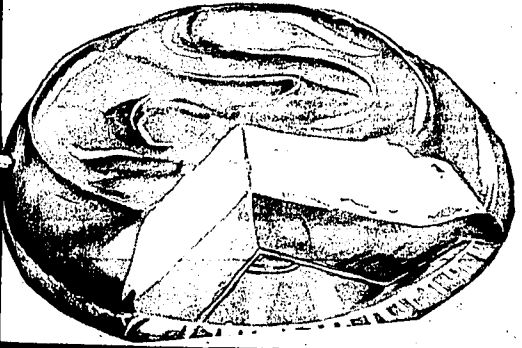

U.S. and Russian Ham Radio Operators Form Friendships

STAMPFORD, Conn. June 25 (AP)—The two countries seem more united than ever by air than on the ground. At least radio amateurs of the United States and Soviet Russia find it simpler to communicate with each other on a person-to-person level than do political leaders of the great rival powers. Ham radio operators in the two countries strike up either warm friendships freely, apparently with no governmental objection from either side. Perhaps a typical example of these new adventures in international understanding is the relationship between Frank Enge and Leo Shukin. Enge is a supervisor of research and development for the American Machine and Foundry company's electronics laboratory here. Shukin is an electrical engineer in Moscow, U.S.S.R. He started amateur radio in 1950, when they first made contact via ham radio. Leo Shukin lost his license after that they quickly became pen pals. Leo asked Frank for copies of American radio journals and sent him copies of Russian radio journals—also some Russian classical phonograph records for Frank's wife. Frank consulted Leo on the Russian scientific achievement when the U.S.S.R. reported to him when the U.S. sent up Explorer 1, adding: "Let our states be together on the earth as our radio-mikes are in the sky."

That was the nearest the Russian ever came to a political statement, Enge said. Shortly after their initial and unobtrusive contact, Leo Shukin lost his amateur license "for infractions of the rules," but he wrote Frank: "My absence from the air has no relations to our mailing." However, he never did explain the precise nature of the relations that did cost him his license. Leo wrote that he made about 1200 rubles a month, but this is officially pegged at 25 cents. He also said that he only had to pay 50 rubles a month rent. Enge recalled, "but he had to share a communal apartment with four other families. The apartment had only one bathroom, one kitchen and one telephone. He had to have a fourth of his salary—300 rubles a month—in income taxes, and that a suit cost him from 200 to 300 rubles. He said an old car would cost him 8000 rubles, a new one 60,000 rubles." Frank wrote back that his own income was about \$1000 a month, that he had a room and bath apartment and owned two cars. "This comparison may have made Leo unhappy, but so far he hasn't said so," remarked Enge smiling. Enge estimated that perhaps 12,000 of some 15,000 American radio amateurs have made contact with Russian amateurs. He estimated the number of Russian hams at 2,000. Leo Shukin has been contacted by radio amateurs in 15 of the Soviet republics.

91 Scarlet Fever Cases Disclosed

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—Ninety-one cases of scarlet fever were reported in Idaho during the past week, the health department announced today, increasing the year's total to 1,403. The number compares with 1,207 cases reported last year during the corresponding period of 1947. New measles cases numbered 132, increasing the year's total to 3,708 compared with 2,718 last year.

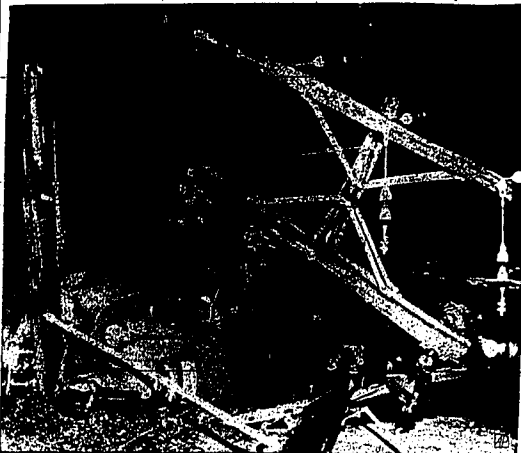
