Smylie to Battle Legalizing Local Option Gambling

BOISE, June 30 (UPI)—Republican Gov. Robert E. Smylie today turned his guns on a Democratic gubernatorial candidate in a proposal to restore legalized gambling in Idaho. "It's morally wrong," said the governor, who is unopposed for re-election, "and if it's morally wrong it can't be economically sound." The backing for "casino-type" gambling came from State Sen. A. M. Derr, Clark Park, and the four Democratic candidates who will battle it out for the party's gubernatorial nomination in the Aug. 12 primaries. Derr said that it would help solve some of the state's financial and economic problems of a tourist attraction. Former Idaho Democratic Chairman George Derr today denounced Derr's plan as "not a legitimate issue in a gubernatorial or legislative election. It is a political issue and it is unconstitutional."

U.S. Diplomat Asks Ruse to Free 9 Fliers

MOSCOW, June 30 (UPI)—U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn E. Thompson today asked the Soviet government for the immediate release of nine American airmen forced down inside Soviet territory. Thompson's request was ordered from Washington to transmit his government's demand of the airmen's release. The airmen were captured by the Soviet air force and held in a camp near the town of Krasnodar. Thompson said that the airmen were flying over a route in the Black Sea area and were shot down by Soviet fighters. Highest Court Voids NAACP Alabama Fine

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UPI)—The supreme court ruled unanimously today that the state of Alabama cannot exclude membership lists of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The tribunal held that the state is immune from state scrutiny under the 14th Amendment. It did so in setting aside a \$100,000 fine imposed by an Alabama circuit judge who had issued a temporary ban on NAACP activity in the state after the organization took an active part in the Negro bus boycott in Montgomery and the Auburn City case. The state had sought NAACP's ouster around the organization was conducting extensive business in the state without registering under a law requiring corporations. Russia Allows Its Newspapers To Publish Only 'Good' News

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—This gives you a pretty good idea of Russia, especially in the area of news. What follows is taken from a talk on Havana by Andrew H. Berding, assistant secretary of state for public affairs. Crime and statistics on crime and on the prison population are closely guarded secrets. Most newsworthy arrests are not reported. Trials in progress are generally not printed. Disasters and accidents are not reported unless they involve casualties, and no information is published on the occasions of the Communist party congresses, even the fact a meeting has been held. Meetings of the central committee of the Communist party are announced only after they have been held, and no information is published on their deliberations. Information on the reasons for major personnel appointments or dismissals is often not released. The dismissal of the head of the Soviet government, Premier Bulganin, was announced simply with the statement that Nikita Khrushchev had taken over. No meaningful statistics on the breakdown of the Soviet population by social groups and nationalities have been published for 19 years. Civil disorders, such as those at the Yarkutsk labor camp and at Norilsk in 1953 and at Tiflis in 1946 are never reported. Other expressions of dissatisfaction by the populace are generally not reported. On the military side, the Soviets have made only 12 announcements of nuclear tests, although we know they have conducted many more. The Soviets . . . release no data on their armed forces. Comprehensive figures on the personal income and consumption patterns of the Soviet populace have not been released for years. The Soviet republic publishes no absolute figures for grain and most other agricultural products. They publish no statistics on production. Wholesale industrial prices, agricultural procurement prices, and comprehensive figures on retail prices are not published. On the international side major statements by Western governments and political leaders are often ignored or distorted. Accounts of United Nations proceedings are warped beyond recognition. Censorship of dispatches by Americans and other foreign correspondents stationed in Moscow is constant and extensive. In recent weeks Soviet censorship of foreign correspondents' dispatches from Moscow has become increasingly severe.

Traffic Deaths Drop in May For Ninth Consecutive Month

CHICAGO, June 30 (UPI)—The National Safety council said today traffic deaths declined 7 per cent during May for the ninth straight month in which a decrease was reported.

In addition, the council said, May was the 17th month in the last 17 to show fewer highway fatalities. The only month in that period to show an increase was last August.

"But the real test is just ahead," the council warned. "The fourth of July week-end will bring the biggest traffic jam of the year so far."

"There could be no better way to celebrate the holiday than for everyone to get back home safe and sound."

The May toll was 2,910 deaths as compared with 3,090 for May, 1957, the council said. The May traffic deaths raised the toll for the first five months of this year to 13,240, or 7 per cent below the 14,200 total for the corresponding period last year.

"Twenty-six states chalked up fewer traffic deaths in May, one reported no change and 21 reported an increase," the council said. At the end of the five-month period, 33 states had better records than for the same period last year and 15 showed decreases for the five-month period were Vermont, West Virginia, Arkansas, Connecticut, South Carolina, Delaware, Nevada, New Hampshire, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Maine, New Jersey, Georgia, Kansas, New Mexico, Alabama, Iowa, Montana, Ohio, Missouri, Utah, Pennsylvania, Texas, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Oregon, California, Maryland, Oklahoma, Kentucky, Rhode Island and Virginia.

July Reports Are Difficult To Interpret

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP) — You can't tell the business picture in July with a scoreboard. If you accept the news on face value you could run up a lot of errors.

It's a tricky month as far as the statistics go. This year there are some added confusions.

Persons anxious to believe the recession is over and recovery underway and those fearful that the cheerful news of late is a flash in the pan signifying little could be fooled by July.

"Things to Consider

Here are some of the things likely to happen that the wary should take as cause neither for panic nor over evaluation:

The rise in steel production is one of the chief factors cited by those thinking the recession is over. But steel production is sliding again and the weekly figures in July may seem odd.

Longer Shutdowns
The growing custom of plant shutdowns for vacations in industries using steel may be more widespread and last longer this year than usual. The burst of steel orders for June delivery to beat any price rise may have borrowed quite a bit of what would have been normal July ordering.

So a cutback in steel output in July, even if more than usual, shouldn't lead you to the conclusion that the general economy is turning down again. Watch August and September orders before making up your mind.

Confusing Factors
In the allied metals of copper, zinc and aluminum, price and output confusion could last well into July. Political odds much of the uncertainty as various proposals to aid the industries are kicked around in congress.

But there is also a labor factor. Aluminum wages go up automatically Aug. 1, just as steel's do tomorrow. And copper and steel users will be taking plant vacations, so July statistics on orders may give little clue to the fall outlook.

Index May Drop
The industrial index, which looks a comforting rise as a result of the flurry in steel, may be off more than usual this July.

Earlier changeover to auto factories along with slack production of 1936 models while dealers wrestle with stocks could make the index drop more than usual in July.

Also, this would be reflecting past troubles more than it would be forecasting fall events.
