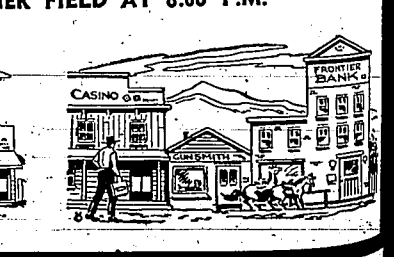

Car Accident Damages Suit Is Filed Here

Verne E. Bishop, Lela Bishop and Gary Bishop filed a \$10,000 civil action Wednesday in Twin Falls district court against Farmers Insurance Exchange seeking payment for injuries received by Gary Bishop in an automobile accident April 14, 1957, on the Buhl-Castelford road.

Bishop states his son, Gary, is 19 years old and was living with him at the time of the accident. He claims he had a contract with the insurance company with an endorsement entitled "Family Protection against Uninsured Motorists."

The complaint continues that Gary Bishop was a passenger in a car driven by Gary Heide. Heide's car collided head-on with another vehicle driven by Fred Parks. The vehicle driven by Fred Parks was driving with its headlights turned off. Parks had no bodily injury insurance.

As a result of the collision, Gary Bishop was seriously injured. The complaint states his mental process, straight and physical coordination, hearing and vision, and other senses were damaged. Furthermore, his right foot has required, and will continue to require, constant attention which will cost \$10,000, Bishop said.

General damage claimed in the complaint is \$10,000. Bishop claims the insurance company has refused to perform its contract and pay \$10,000 as he has damaged his eyes in three different causes of action. The Bishops seek \$5,000 each and \$1,000 attorney fees for each.

The Bishops are represented by Payton and Payton, Twin Falls, law firm.

BOISE, July 10 (UPI)—The bureau of reclamation wants to be sure the land will be available for final development of the proposed Burns creek dam and reservoir on Snake river near Pinedale.

It has announced that the agency has filed an application with the bureau of land management to acquire 26 acres for the project. The land is located on Snake river about 10 miles east of Pinedale in Bonneville county.

The acreage would be withdrawn from all forms of appropriation. Anyone objecting will be given 30 days in which to file opposition to the withdrawal. If no protests are received, the land will be set aside automatically.

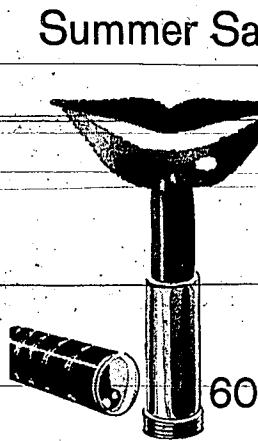

Bids Told for New Highway Jobs in State

BOISE, July 10—The Idaho highway department has opened bids on another million-dollar segment of the federal-interstate highway program.

The project includes construction of a four-lane divided highway with a 4-foot crushed gravel base, a 2 1/2-inch concrete underpass and two concrete overpasses on 5.85 miles of U. S. highway 91-19.

The stretch includes the section from Chubbuck to the Main Line and the project also calls for maintaining crushed gravel in stockpiles in Blaine county.

Of the 12 bidders, the apparent low offer of \$89,852.25 was submitted by Chert Brothers, Inc., and Salsbery Contractors, Inc., both of Salisbury, Wash., the highway department said.

Bids were taken yesterday on two surfacing projects and a roadway, all in southern Idaho.

Western Construction company, Postville, was named apparent low bidder for building a road-drainage structure and blading a road surface on about 14 miles of state highway 22 from Reno Point to High Hot Springs in Clark and Jefferson counties.

Nelson and Deppe company, Boise, named the lowest bidder for both of the other two projects.

The base firm was the only bidder at \$44,000 for construction of a permanent bituminous surface on 6.6 miles of state highway 66, from Boise west to Blaine county.

The firm was low of two bidders on its offer of \$43,500 to construct a surface on about five miles of state highway 51 from Brunau to the Snake river.

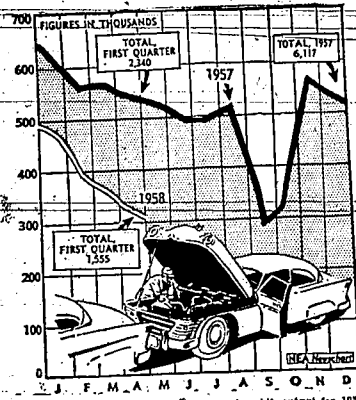

Highway Agency Preparing Extensive "Question, Answer Period" for Idaho

BOISE, July 10 (UPI)—The next time you're stumped to a stop along some Idaho highway and a young-looking man starts asking questions, better think twice before reading him the riot act. The man's job is to give you a definite answer to the highway will be built.

All through the state this summer motorists will be asked the same questions in the Idaho highway department's summer study.

Although the program has gotten underway again, short-tempered travelers have begun their fuming over the one minute stop required to tell researchers where they've been, where they're going and what stops they've made or plan to be taken.

Ed Equiva, the man who runs the annual poll-taking as planned, today explained the reason for these traffic delays.

Equiva said the three-month survey this year will be one of the most widespread ever undertaken by the department. Reasons for this is that a number of inter-state rates are now being considered and personal contact is the only reliable method of determining just how heavily any section of a road is used.

The program was started back in 1946 when the first big steps were taken to improve highways for transportation and defense purposes. Since then they've been held each year.

A team of 10 men, some to be reduced to eight, is in charge of the polls and works an average of four days in any one place. During that time, they talk to up to 2500 drivers in eight hours and gather more or vital information which is forwarded to department headquarters in Boise.

So far, surveys have been completed in Shoshone, Boise, Milder and Cambridge. Others planned for the next two months will be planned at randa near Payette, McCall, Grangeville, Moscow, Lewiston, Wallace and Post Falls.

After the statistics from a given area are complete, the whole mass of figures is recorded on punched cards for tabulation by computers. From that information, engineers can pretty well figure where highways need to be improved or re-routed. Important also is the constant controversy in local areas over whether a highway should or should not run through a town. Roadways are invaluable aids there, too.

Strangely enough, few motorists seem to object to the momentary delay. Most of them, in fact, try to be helpful, according to Equiva.

"Once in a while the boys get a 'bad egg' who gives them a real tongue-lashing," he said. "When that happens, they're under standing orders to just say 'thank you, sir' and let the driver go on. That almost never fails to cool off the angry ones."

Youngsters May Give Science Answer to Hemophilia Secret

NEW YORK, July 10 (UPI)—World-wide scientific interest has been focused suddenly upon an 11-year-old boy, according to a report in the medical journal "The Royal Society," which has hemophilia, "the royal disease," which, according to the report, occurs in females although women are the "carriers."

Dr. Armand J. Quick, professor of biochemistry, Marquette university, Milwaukee, reported the child case to world science through the international technical journal.

The boy, who was born in Pittsburgh, N. D. She wasn't otherwise identified, because of medical ethics.

The blood chemistry of her mother and father is normal. There is no history of "bleeders" in either family. The child has two brothers and neither is a "bleeder." Therefore, you have to reason that a gene changed or mutated in the cumulative reproductive chemistry which created the child.

Some Beef Is Found in Ads As "Specials"

By The Associated Press
A few cuts of beef are finding their way into the headlines of the supermarket and neighborhood grocery advertisements this week. Most of these specials are chuck cuts, but some are brisket, ground beef and round steaks. Some grocers are making a pitch for round steaks and steaks, which rank high on the beef's social scale. Beef steaks and roasts are expected to be less expensive this summer.

Beef prices normally rise in price in July and August, but grocers are crowding the market to result in heavier markets of grain-fattened cattle. Movement of steers from ranges to feed lots during May leaped 35 per cent over the 1957 rate. Choice grade beef in Chicago already is off considerably from April highs.

Supermarket meat men report little change at wholesale levels this week. Pork chops are 6 to 10 cents higher in the stores in some areas, a cent lower in others. Lard of lamb is 1 to 4 cents a pound more in a few places and eggs a shade higher in scattered sections.

Plenty of Bargains
Once again, however, the shopper can get plenty of bargains in the produce and vegetable departments. Produce men note an unusual situation this year, in which the seasons for many types of produce have overlapped because of poor weather in normal winter growing areas.

This has meant more fruits and vegetables being shipped from big growing areas, now plus abundant supplies from local fields and orchards.

Fruit Bins Full
Fruit bins are overflowing with peaches, apricots, watermelons, plums and cherries. The best and cheapest are in areas where they just in from nearby growers. Peaches are especially attractive in price, due to the biggest crop in more than 10 years. By the time the last peach is picked this fall, the entire crop will reach the market. The 1958 crop is nearly 10 million bushels, a gain of nearly 20 per cent over last year.

Grape, lemon, lime and cantaloupe also are good buys for this time of year, while fairly good buys include plums, peaches, apricots and such specialties as currants, raspberries and gooseberries. Raspberry melons are no better than regular in price.

Stengel, Baseball Players Support Major League Plan Before Senate Subcommittee

WASHINGTON, July 10 (UPI)—Casey Stengel, sideways-talking manager of the New York Yankees, gave congress a disjointed defense of professional baseball today. "I wouldn't be in it 48 years if it wasn't all right," the crinkly-faced Casey confided to the senate anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee. As to pending bills designed to protect baseball and other professional team sports from anti-trust laws, Stengel adopted a hands-off policy.

"I didn't ask for the legislation," Stengel said after explaining that he had seen the excellence of his league-leading Yankees, Tuesday's all-star game and the high quality of Yankee cast-offs and the excellence of baseball in general.

But three of the games brought the bill and warmly defended the controversial reserve clause. They are Mickey Mantle of the Yankees, Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox, and Stan (The Man) Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals. All three said they felt the bill was necessary to let baseball continue operating as it has.

Stengel's testimony was offered before a standing-room audience in the Senate chamber. His comments—and his antics—kept the floor in constant turmoil.

A line of small youngsters queued up at the witness seats behind the players. They held up photographs of Mickey Williams, Mantle, Musial, and other "baseball greats" as they took their turn in the witness chair.

One subcommittee member, Sen. Joseph P. Cotton, said he would not vote that bill until it is completely sailing for the sports commission and the players who have joined as its co-sponsors.
