Middle East's Units of U. S. Small Portion

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UPI)—The 7,000 U. S. marines in the Middle East comprise a relatively small fraction of America's combat forces. Backing them up and ready to move quickly in case of need, are formidable ground, sea and air units based in western Europe, the United States and the Pacific.

The Pentagon has clamped a tight lid of secrecy on the strength and disposition of U. S. combat units since the Iraq-Lebanon crisis. American forces on a global alert, the following facts were known before the lid went on: It can be assumed they are still essentially as last year:

The United States has about 2,000,000 men in its armed forces. The breakdown is: army, 900,000; air force, 815,000; navy, 615,000; marines, 100,000.

The army has 14 combat divisions. Three are stationed in western Europe. Many within easy air transport range of the Middle East. It was one of these that, although sent to the Middle East last year, was not used.

These ground forces are equipped with atomic cannons, Redstone missiles (with a 200-mile range) and other modern weapons, which are far more accurate, direct-acting, than World War II divisions.

The United States has 10 crack airborne divisions, the 82nd and the 101st. The navy has four carrier battle groups, the sixth stationed in the Mediterranean and which is now supporting the marine landing.

The second, based on the west coast and now somewhere in the eastern Atlantic, is ready to move to the Pacific.

The size and strength of each unit is subject to constant review. The navy is not giving out details at the moment. It is known, however, that the fleet includes 60,000-ton aircraft carriers, the 33,000-ton missile cruiser Boston and the cruiser Des Moines, and at least 10 destroyers.

The second fleet in the Atlantic is at least as powerful as the sixth. It includes the two Pacific fleet carriers, which are substantially larger.

The air force has 117 operational squadrons with 2,000 B-29 bombers. The 15th air force in the whole free world is the strategic command and control (SAC) which has 44 wings of B-47 and B-52 bombers capable of atomic nuclear weapons. SAC is not to be alerted when the Middle East crisis arises. Its bases, scattered in the Pacific, from Alaska to Okla., are always on alert.

The 15th air force closest to the Middle East trouble center is the 13th air force, based in Europe. It has 13 combat wings which hold more than 500 jet fighters capable of flying faster than the speed of sound and dropping atomic bombs. They are stationed at bases in Britain, western Europe and North Africa.

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 17 (UPI)—Gov. Mike Schemm yesterday set Aug. 26 as the date for a referendum vote on statehood for Alaska and for Alaska's first primary election as the 49th state in the union.

The statehood act passed by Congress June 30 specified that Alaska must approve in a referendum vote, three propositions before statehood becomes a reality.

Those propositions are that Alaska approve (1) immediate statehood, (2) the state boundaries outlined in the statehood act and (3) all other provisions of the act.

Supporters—ins—expressed their approval of all three propositions is certain.

Wage-Price Hike Continues Despite Bids for Moderation

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UPI)—Wages and prices are continuing to climb upward despite the President's lower call for moderation.

Government data shows that business and labor are making little or no attempt to curb the price rise for raw materials, both prices and wages climb to record levels.

The government itself is largely ignoring its own advice. Pay raises of 10 to 15 percent are being granted in a year—have recently been paid for almost a year.

There is some hope that the wage-price inflationary spiral may be slowing down. Consumer prices hit one peak in May, the latest report out the rise from April was only one-tenth of one per cent, the smallest monthly increase in 18 months.

New government and private surveys on wage trends for the first half of 1958 show in general that labor unions are negotiating pay gains at the same amount upward to higher levels.

The labor department, in a report on first quarter wage settlements, said "there was no evidence of any general reduction in the rate of wage increases as compared with corresponding quarters of the past few years."

Experts of the department's bureau of labor statistics said while second quarter 1958 wage gains results still are being tabulated, they seem to be running about the same, with some cases of increases slightly less than last year.

Price benefits gains, such as vacation, health-care and pension improvements are coming along a bit under the 1957 clip.

Most new negotiated wage settlements are running around the 10-cent per hour raises of last year. There has been some "decline" in wage gains in manufacturing.

Warm Weather Affecting Crops

BOISE, July 17 (UPI)—Although warm weather was conducive to growth of most crops around Idaho, the U. S. department of agriculture reported yesterday that it was having ill effects on dryland areas.

In its weekly crop and weather bulletin, the department said that some dry-farmed and inadequately irrigated areas are showing the effects of the dry, hot weather. "The department said main activities in the state during the week ended Saturday were harvesting of fruit and second crop alfalfa. Hay, green peas, cherries, irrigation, cultivation, spraying of crops and summer fallowing.

In southern Idaho crops in some dry-farmed and inadequately irrigated areas are in need of additional moisture. Progress of field work was good. Harvesting of first crop alfalfa is virtually completed while harvesting the second crop is just beginning in some lower elevations. Winter grains range from heading in higher areas to nearly ripe in lower elevations. Potatoes range from early to late bloom.

Hike in Postal Rate of Books Hit at Session

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17 (U.S.)—Liberators say a proposed increase in international postal rates for books, periodicals and newspapers would be another curb on the free flow of information.

The 330 delegates to the American Library Association convention passed a resolution to that effect yesterday.

Rate Hikes
Recent legislation passed by congress raised domestic postal rates and authorized the postmaster general to "negotiate" an international rate increase of up to 25 per cent generally and 50 per cent to Latin America.

Proposed increases "are a direct contradiction of an established policy of the United States," the resolution said.

Asks Decrease
The association called instead for a 50 per cent decrease in the rate for educational and cultural materials. It said that was permissible under the universal postal convention, which has been adopted by several major nations. It did not name the nations.

The resolution said proposed rates would hinder libraries abroad which are trying to get more materials from the United States.

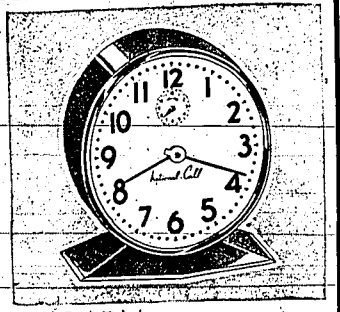

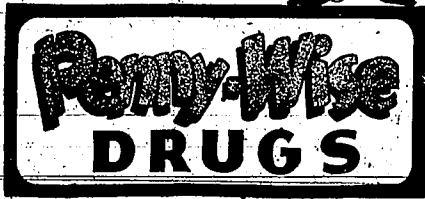

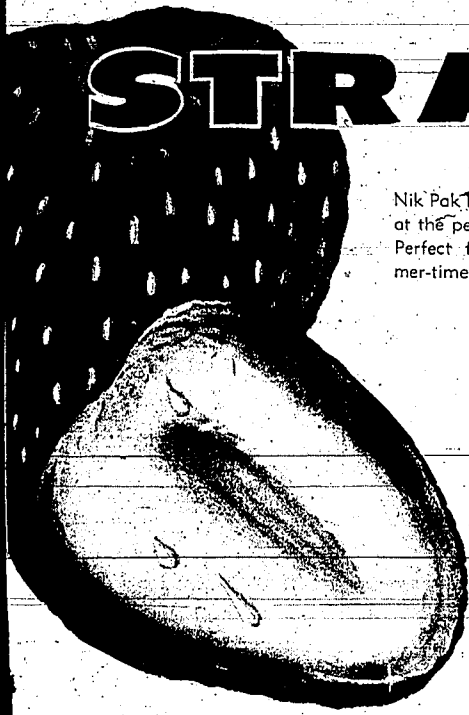

Major league teams are now seen across the country every Saturday and Sunday on television. Frick said that minor league towns are being wrecked because they are being played and are being broadcasted, but minor league officials contend this is ineffective. Frick supported a house-passed bill to provide broad antitrust law exemptions for pro baseball. Football, basketball and hockey are exempted, but minor league officials should write down for congress the specific practices they want congress to prohibit.

Sen. John A. Carroll, D. Colo., said baseball "ought to clean its own house" and that the industry is strictly within seeking a complete free hand.

Frick also said he thought some big league clubs "have gone completely broke" and that he would like to see them merged with promising youngsters.

He estimated the major league clubs are losing about \$10 million dollars this year for boys just out of high school and college. "Major league clubs are losing money because they are not being played and are not being broadcasted," Frick said.

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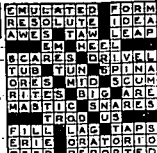
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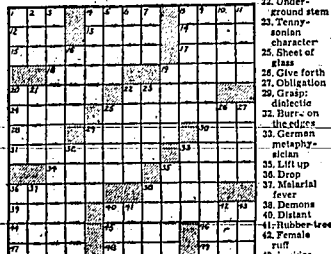

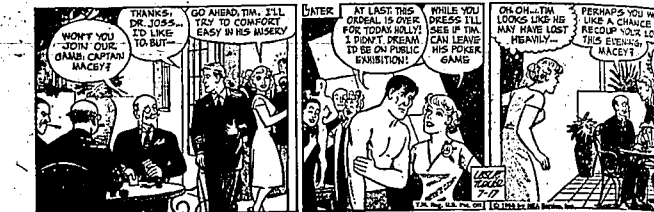
