City Okays Move For Improvement of Water Supply

Authorization to negotiate with the Twin Falls Canal company to expand the two wells in South Park and dig a third in the vicinity of Harrison street and Fifth avenue was voted by Twin Falls city commissioners Monday night. City Manager Joseph H. Lohmeyer said that if enlarged the two wells in South Park could produce a million gallons per day, at an estimated cost of \$7,100. This figure would include connecting the wells with the present water mains and mixing water from them with the water from the filter plant.

That "he feels" the city has passed the most critical point in the water supply problem, Lohmeyer said. He said that unless there is an extended period of drought, he does not anticipate a water shortage for the rest of the season.

Commissioners expressed the hope of getting the third well to be located in the vicinity of Harrison street and Fifth avenue, and operation before time for next year's peak water usage.

It is estimated that water can be reached at a depth of approximately 150 feet and total cost is estimated at \$10,000. This will include drilling, casing, pump, motor, installations of water meter and pump house. President Eisenhower To Britain Over Summit Confab

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—President Eisenhower yielded to British insistence today and agreed to go along with a summit meeting of the United Nations security council, which is generally desired by the western powers and Russia. A White House announcement in this effect shortly after noon today apparently ended a dispute with Britain over whether the western Big Three should move openly and directly toward a U.N. summit.

Reds Protest Mideast Action

About an hour earlier, British Premier Minister, Lord Lloyd, told the house of commons in London that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan would lead a special meeting of the security council.

The purpose of the meeting, Lloyd said, would be to discuss the Middle East crisis but it would not act on any resolution unless there was general agreement that such action should be taken.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerly said at the White House: "A United Nations security council meeting of the character suggested by Foreign Minister Lloyd is clearly within the contemplation of the U.N. charter."

Such a meeting was generally desired, the United States would join in following this orderly procedure.

Meanwhile, it was learned, Secretary of State Dulles had revised a proposed United States note to Soviet Premier Khrushchev to bring it more into line with Britain's insistence that the western powers should open the way directly and not mistakenly for heads of government to attend an extraordinary session of the security council.

Khrushchev proposed on Saturday a five-power emergency summit conference at Geneva composed of the government chiefs of the three western powers, plus himself and Prime Minister Nehru of India. He also asked the attendance of U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld.

France objected to the hostile tone of the Khrushchev note sent to the United States and the western powers, and generally favored conditional acceptance.

Marine Slain in Lebanon Blasts Heard in Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon, July 22 (UPI)—A U.S. marine was shot and killed today by one of his own buddies—the second American to die in Lebanon since U.S. troops landed last Tuesday to try to save the country's threatened independence. The name of the marine was withheld. He had left his own lines to lay trip flare wires around his company perimeter near the Beirut international airport seven miles from the city and was killed by a sentry when he failed to answer three shots.

Kimberly Girl Hurt Critically in Mishap

A 10-year-old Kimberly girl was unconscious and in critical condition at 2 p. m. today from injuries incurred at 9:30 a. m. when she rode her bicycle down the hillside of a residential street in the city of Twin Falls. Witnesses said the girl, Christine Brooks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Brooks, Kimberly, apparently did not see the loaded garbage truck as it approached the intersection.

The driver of the truck, Frank E. Mallette, 41, Twin Falls, swerved the truck in an effort to avoid the girl on the bicycle. Deputy Sheriff Wayne Hendricks said the girl's bicycle hit the left rear wheel of the truck and she was thrown to the pavement. The girl was taken to Magic Valley Memorial hospital by ambulance.

Mallette says the truck was traveling north on a paved county road. The girl was riding her bicycle east on a gravel road. Mallette said he saw the girl's bicycle and swerved his truck away to avoid a collision.

The accident occurred within half a mile of the Brooks farm. J. D. Dean, route 2, Kimberly, was in a vehicle following the truck and witnessed the accident.

Travel Movie Founder Dies At His Home

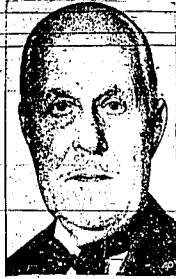

Syria, Egypt Reported Caught In Squeeze on Jordan Moves

By WILLIAM BYAN

AMMAN, Jordan, July 22 (AP)—Developments in the past 24 hours have left observers with the impression the Syrians and Egyptians are caught in a difficult squeeze of their own regarding their intentions toward Jordan.

As of this moment the governments seem to have the situation fairly under control. There is no reason to believe aggressive forces intend to remain inactive for long, but the squeeze has developed in this way:

The Syrians and Egyptians do not want to fuel U. S. military intervention here. Already there are 2,000 British parachute troops on hand. Any really violent manifestation here might immediately invite the Americans to come in. King Hussein has stated he expects American help.

At the same time, the Egyptians and Syrians are in danger of losing the momentum of the movement generated by the revolution in Iraq. They may think it prudent to stand still with regard to this country.

Thinking people appear to realize the world war potentialities in the Middle East but the trouble there is that those responsible for violence are not given to thinking.

The aim of Amman is not often broken. When it is, efficient government forces know what to do about it.

But the impression persists that the Syrians and Egyptians are marking time, waiting for the Iraqi situation to jell and be cleared. This may give this little country sufficient breathing space to prepare for the next attempt on its sovereignty.

streets in the original townsite were surfaced with only a penetration and seal coat, which requires annual maintenance and replacement.
Two of the items under maintenance and seal supplies in the original budget—road oil and cutback and crushed gravel—have been increased substantially for the coming year, and will provide for resurfacing of many of the streets in the original townsite.
City Manager Joseph H. Lattimore also explained that the intermunicipal city council has paid the city \$40,000 for purchasing and placing of gravel in the alley which were torn up when the pipe line was laid. Since there was no item to cover this in last year's budget, the gravel had not yet been purchased, but will be paid this fiscal year.

Questions Are Noted in Ike's Mideast Move

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—At the moment President Eisenhower's move to send American troops to Lebanon has raised questions which may seem unpleasant to think about but which nevertheless must be faced.

For example: Now that we're in Lebanon, when do we get out and how?

The President's action—widely supported in this country but far less so in Lebanon—has raised questions which may seem unpleasant to think about but which nevertheless must be faced.

The quick landing of marines July 15 may have prevented the feared overthrow of Chamoun, but it also antagonized the Arab world and provided Russia the anti-American propaganda.

And the United States may wind up in a truly embarrassing position in the first place.

In the first place, the 66-member Lebanese parliament is scheduled to meet Thursday. Chamoun's term does not officially expire until Sept. 22.

If the election is held, Chamoun probably will serve out his term. So long as he is in office, there will be an excuse for the presence of American troops in Lebanon.

But if his successor is chosen in July and shortly thereafter, Thursday, and asks the United States to withdraw, this country will find itself in an almost untenable position, and would have little choice but to withdraw.

Chamoun stepped down in the second place. If the question of American troops in Lebanon goes before the United Nations, the Arab and Asian nations may in effect repudiate the American position.

But on top of all these problems is this crowning one: True, the United States forces in Lebanon—where Chamoun is pro-American—may have prevented a bloody ouster and for the time being may have frustrated the hopes of Egyptian President Nasser to bring Lebanon under his wing.

But the tide of Arab nationalism in the Middle East is at crest now. And what happens when the American troops are withdrawn? There's a good chance Lebanon will join the Nasser camp and all this action will have been for naught in the long-run except for this possible effect:

That it did show that the United States, when pushed hard enough, would act in defiance of Moscow or any revolutionary force to back its friends.

The questions applying to the United States position in the Middle East now apply equally to the Delta, whose troops have gone into Jordan at the request of King Hussein to save his government from violent overthrow.

The British can hardly hope to stay there indefinitely. Hussein has now openly broken with Nasser. But what happens to Hussein when the British withdraw, next week, next month, next year?

"City People" Get Blame on Farm Trouble

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—The National Grange says misinformed city folk—rather than sharp differences of opinion among farm groups—are a major stumbling block to what it calls improved federal farm programs.

In 40 analyses of a recent defense of an omnibus farm bill in the house, the national farm organization said it is true that disunity hampers farm leaders.

"More important than differences between any of these farm groups, however, is a general change in public opinion—a new public opinion representing the collective thinking of a population which is now 88 percent non-farm," it said.

"Unfortunately, millions of Americans have been provided no opportunity to consider all facts about farm programs. Instead they have been fed distorted facts and outright misinformation which has turned them against farm aid in any form—and yes, even against farmers themselves."

The Grange said farmers and their organizations need to do a better job to "counteract the efforts of those who would turn public thinking against all farm programs and against farm people themselves."

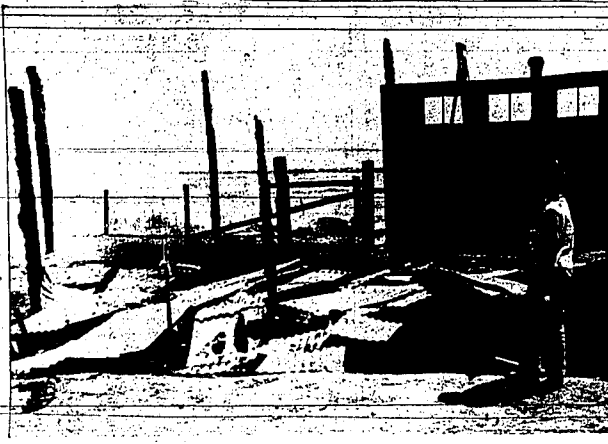

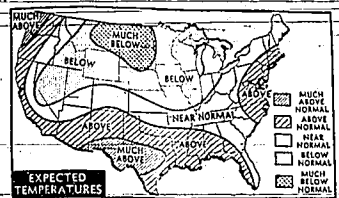

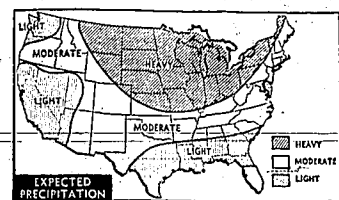

Other Danger Points Shown In East Areas

By United Press International
The Middle East is stuffed with hot spots that could inflame the present crisis.
Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq, of course, are the chief danger points. But there are sensitive situations in such seldom-mentioned places as Kuwait, Yemen, Libya and the Sudan.
In addition, there is great tension along the frontier between Turkey on the one side and Syria and Iraq on the other.
Great Britain has been alarmed by the disclosure that Sheikh Abdulrahman al-Fadhli, ruler of its little protectorate of Kuwait, has conferred twice with President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic.

Kuwait, on the Persian gulf, is the greatest strategic link in the Middle East, and one of the richest in the world.
It has long been known that there is a strong pro-Nasser element in Kuwait and as a precaution Britain is reinforcing its troops in the neighboring sheikhdom of Bahrain.

Kuwait's oil is vitally important to Britain. A British consultant, discussing a possible blow-up, there, has said "that Kuwait is more important to Britain economically than Gibraltar, Malta and Cyprus put together."
Cairo dispatches say that Yemen, the belligerent little kingdom at the tip of the Arabian peninsula, has informed Arab League headquarters in Cairo that Britain is massing troops on its border "in preparation for aggression."

Yemen also has given this notification to the high command of the United Arab Republic, with which it is now affiliated.

Yemen has been attacking Britain's protectorate of Aden sporadically for several years, and openly hopes to take it over.

The situation of British troop movements might be a build-up for new raids across the Yemen frontier at this time.

It was made known during the week-end that Britain has reinforced its troops in Libya, adjoining Egypt on the west.

Egyptian agents have been stirring up trouble in Libya ever since Nasser seized power in an attempt to undermine King Idris.

Britain alerted reinforcing its troops when it received intelligence reports of a plot to overthrow Idris. Relations are bad also between Egypt and the Sudan, adjoining it on the south. Nasser has tried vainly to lure the Sudan into his orbit.

On Saturday, the Sudanese government expelled the consul of the Egyptian embassy in Khartoum, the capital, on the ground that he had started circulating leaflets with subversive elements as soon as he arrived there four days previously.

In addition to these situations, Syria has sent strong military forces to the Lebanese frontier in an obvious attempt to encourage the rebels there.
And Turkey has put its forces on the alert along its frontier with both Syria and Iraq.

"Open Door"

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 22 (UPI)—Four cows broke open the gate of their truck yesterday and fled into the First Presbyterian church to escape the madcap traffic whir.

Policemen rushed up and removed the animals from the educational building of the church. "This is a church with an open door," commented the pastor, the Rev. Merle O. Patterson, "but this was not our kind."

U.S. Taking Steps to Avert Gasoline Crisis as Result of Mideast's Trouble

WASHINGTON, July 22 (UPI)—The nation's 75 million motorists need not worry about possible gasoline rationing as a result of the Middle East explosion.
Even if war with Russia broke out, we would be in for better shape for oil supplies than in World War II when careful rationing had to be invoked.

Responsible government officials gave those assurances today through United Press International.

They said in event all the Middle East oil—75 per cent. of the world's supply—were cut off the United States would have more than enough gasoline, fuel oil and other hydrocarbons to fill both domestic and western European needs.

In case of war with Russia the eastern seaboard would be first with shortages. It is almost entirely dependent on ocean-going tankers to keep its pipelines filled. Tankers are vulnerable to submarine attack as aptly demonstrated by U-boats in World War II. But the government has an ace in the hole.

It could pre-empt from present owners the Big and Little Inch pipelines running parallel from Texas to Pennsylvania to help keep the eastern seaboard supplied.

These lines have a combined daily capacity of 435,000 barrels of crude oil. They were built during World War II to ease the eastern supply crisis.

The rationing lesson learned in World War II also has paid dividends in other areas. The Midwest, for example, is now fed by pipelines from Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Wyoming. None of these existed in the early 1940s.

The West Coast has its own supplies and has nothing to worry about.

There is more than enough refinery capacity from coast to coast and from Canada to Mexico to meet all emergency gasoline needs. In addition domestic oil production, cut

back sharply by increase of foreign imports, could be stepped up quickly. This was illustrated by the 1950-51 winter crisis which forced western Europe to get 90 per cent of its oil supplies from the United States.
The jet warplane age also has altered the gasoline supply picture for the better. In World War II there were 10 jets and military demands for gasoline were tremendous. Now the military uses jet fuel—ordinary kerosene—almost exclusively.
Gasoline must be extracted before the fuel becomes kerosene. Hence every gallon of jet fuel produced means more gasoline for other use, storage tanks currently are bursting with it.

There also is an ample supply of high octane aviation gasoline. The military uses this in its transports and other conventional planes but now it would prove only a small drag on civilian supplies in an emergency.

Domestic crude oil output is now about 2,500,000 barrels a day. Full
