SHOSHONE, Aug. 2—Four young men, one of them the son of a Union Pacific railroad executive, were battered to death when their speeding car smashed through boulders and berron pits as it zig-zagged out of control along highway 93 one mile south of Thomas W. Conner, piecing together details of the crash that killed the four young summer employees of the resort at Sun Valley.

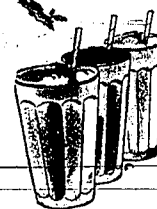

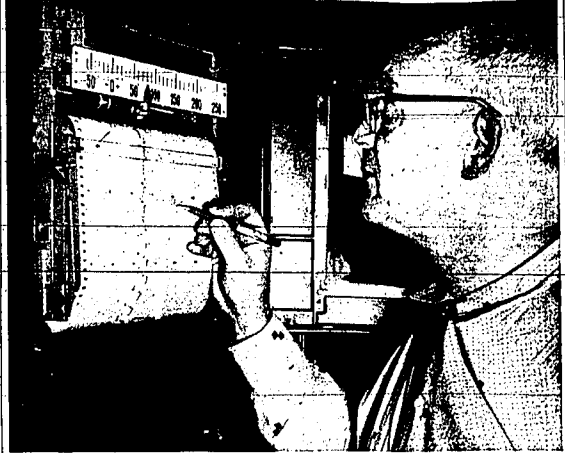

### Heat Loss Study Is Starting In Old House at University

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Aug. 2.—How much money are you losing in your home through heat loss? A University of Idaho study may help you find out.

An old house on the Idaho campus has been turned into a laboratory to record temperatures from the outside, roof-to-the basement floor.

"Materials tests of this type are usually done in a special room in a laboratory," said Professor Norman Hindle, head of the mechanical engineering department. "By gathering temperature data from throughout the house we may be able to help builders and home owners in the state with our findings."

Builders will be able to use the information in heating and ventilating work. Equipment is set up in the home heating research unit house at the rear of the engineering building. Electronic devices automatically record dew point in the house. Other equipment is fed by thermocouples, which record temperature data everywhere they are attached.

There are times when one must bear patiently with the demonstrations of a child's rage or growls and let him crash through it as when about the ages of 2 to 3, he proceeds to build up and break down with resulting noise and clutter. At this stage he must be allowed to pull down what he learns to build up and the noise and mess are exterior matters. Grief and bear it.

There are times when children annoy us with what seems downright silliness. They get into things, a succession of syllables without meaning to us but that have rhythmic measure and intrinsic sound for them. We again, permit a child's exercise of his motor linguistic mechanism because he is learning to use it and learning techniques of speech.

Children of all ages get themselves dirty, hands, face, clothes all smeared with mud, later with paints, still later with grease and oil or chemicals. Again we sigh and hope this too will pass but we allow ourselves a faint protest and a step more careful in the inquiring, and quacking mind. They must be.

Because parents are responsible for what happens to their children there does come a time when an emergency arises to interfere with such evidences of child-growth, and the parent has to use the voice of authority in tones that command instinctive obedience. 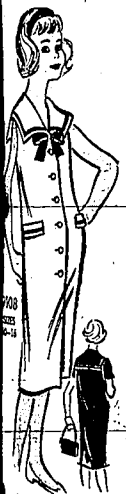

Novel Carpets in Home Are Made by Resident of Filer

Most everybody likes to take their shoes off when they visit the home of Dr. and Mrs. Ivan Anderson, Filer. The luxurious feel of Mrs. Anderson's handmade rugs invites relaxation and many guests do just that.

Two reasons prompted her to make the rugs for their combination living and dining room floor. She said her "scratch" nature when it came to buying the kind of handmade carpeting she wanted and disliking to cover up beautiful hardwood flooring led her to making her own.

The rugs, two oval ones 9 by 12 feet, a round one eight and one-half feet in diameter and one oval one by nine feet and four smaller throw rugs, are strips of wool crocheted together with a medium weight yarn. The rugs of first choice give an all-over pattern effect of the green. They are approximately three-quarters of an inch thick and are placed over sponge rubber padding.

Several years ago when Dr. and Mrs. Anderson remodeled their home at 888 Yakima street, the floors already being hardwood, Mrs. Anderson said she wasn't willing to cover them completely nor able to find exactly what she wanted in the rug size variety, so she decided to make her own.

Woolen-lace-atte-appeal-ment with various types of handmade rugs, she finally decided her own method and pattern. Braided rugs she found too heavy to work with and they took too long to do. Ordinary cotton-scrub crocheted ones weren't thick enough, wouldn't lay flat and didn't fit in with her decorating scheme. To these samples she added a white fringe for use elsewhere in her home. Other types of commercial patterns also were tried and discarded.

The only thing bordering on a commercial idea was a chart she ran across in a needlework shop giving her some idea of how to gauge the size for the beginning.

The rugs are made from strips of wool approximately three inches wide. By the trial and error method she found the strips worked up better when cut on the straight of the material rather than the bias in the usual way. Eventually she could tell exactly how wide to cut the strips by the feel of the weight of the material. Wool from old coats worked the best. Trouser or dress weight wool she found too thin and when used were lined with scraps so it would match the weight of the others. This also utilized all the material. After the material was cut into strips it was folded with the raw edges inside into approximately a three-quarter inch top or roll. The ends were cut at an angle and sewn together as they went along. While there is no scheme to the colors, Mrs. Anderson noted she did try to match the colors from one side to the other to a certain extent.

She added the secret in obtaining a flat rug that holds to the floor is pulling it on the floor from there. Her method of starting, the usual way being to crochet down one side, turn and crochet back up, is a little different and she thinks makes for a flatter start. Her crochets down the first row, ties off the yarn, doubles the roll back and starts around from there.

She used a large wooden crochet hook with cotton and rayon rug yarn and matching carpet warp for sliding strength to join the strips of wool. She used about three stitches to two inches. By having it on the floor she said it was easier, too, to tell when the rug was done.

### "Testimonial" to Idaho Spuds Growing On 90 Acres on Minidoka-Jerome Line

A testimonial to Idaho's world-famous potatoes is growing in a 90-acre field along the Minidoka-Jerome county line.

About three miles east of Hazelton and about one mile south of highway 26 on the county line road is located one of the best looking potato fields in that area. The plants are almost waist high to a six-foot man.

The 90-acre plot is farmed by W. Marlon Hammond, Twin Falls, who has been growing potatoes for over 25 years. Each day he drives to and from the field.

Hammond isn't too sure just why the plants grow so large this year. He says the large tops are an indication of how big the spud will be when harvested. This field was planted to late potatoes about the first of June. Already some plants have 10 to 12 ounce potatoes.

Hammond won't harvest the crop until about Oct. 1. He figures the yield will total about 350 hundred-pound sacks per acre. Last year the land produced 100 sacks per acre.

What amazes Hammond about the yield is the land was cleared 15 months ago. This crop will be the second one.

The land is part of land given to veterans whose homestead land was had in Wyoming. Hammond leases the 90 acres from Mrs. Vernon Day, Riverton, Wyo.

Hammond didn't fertilize any more than usual, having put 135 units of anhydrous ammonia and 150 units of phosphate on the plot.

"It's surprising what can be grown if a person appreciates the land and farms using good methods," Hammond observed. "There's lots of potential because the land has been

Community Water Supplies Vary, but Local Drinking Water Is Rated Better Than Most

Some communities don't have sufficient water for human consumption. Others have an ample supply, but the water is so poor as to be unfit for drinking. There are four distinct steps which must be taken before water reaches the consumer. In the first place, there are several other operations necessary before crystal-clear water enters the main line. After the water is filtered through sand, it enters a 36-inch pipe and flows into the plant. Immediately it is chlorinated to the ratio of five parts chlorine to one million parts liquid. The city owns four chlorinators for the plant. One is presently used at the Harrison park swimming pool. Three are in operation at the filter plant during the summer months. Chlorine comes in steel cylinders which hold 2,000 pounds of liquid chlorine. The cylinders are level-free from the chlorine machines which are connected to the source by rubber tubing. When the liquid chlorine is released from the cylinders, it becomes a pungent gas. The gas is forced through the tubing into an enclosed mixing device which combines the water and the gas. The tubes are made from silver because chlorine reacts with other metals, but won't with silver. Only one inch of water receives direct chlorine treatment. Then that water flows into the 36-inch pipe and mixes. A cylinder last about four or five days with 400 pounds of chlorine used daily. This produces about 11 million gallons of water in 24 hours. That total is 10 per cent over the rated capacity for the plant. Chlorine is regulated each day for changes in bacterial content in the water. Should water from the lowline canal, the source for most of the city's water, be higher in impurities on a certain day, more chlorine is added until the daily tests show it safe to drink. A test for chlorine content is made every two hours at the plant. The pungent gas kills algae which collects upon surfaces touching the water. Because processing the water requires chlorine content, when water leaves the plant the content is down to two parts chlorine per million parts of water. Furthermore, if the water reaches the city's reservoir during the summer months, the sun and air will continue to take some chlorine out of the water. So normally when a person opens the tap in the city, the chlorine content by then is about two-tenths to three-tenths parts chlorine to a million parts of water. This is still slightly higher than some water supplies. City Manager Joseph H. Lattimore says the higher percentage of chlorine is necessary because the open reservoir is subject to dust and other contamination that might come into the water. The second main step in preparing water for consumption is filtering. (Continued on Page 19, Column 1)

The steel ladder which goes to the bottom of the 20-foot reservoir has 20 steps at one-foot intervals. The water in the 20-foot diameter concrete structure is crystal-clear. The bottom is always visible. Ten feet of the reservoir is above ground, and 10 feet is below the surface. The reservoir was built in 1923 and has a capacity of five million gallons. On week-ends the reservoir is usually full, but by late Monday morning, the water has dropped several feet. Primary Election Registration to Close Aug. 9; Voter Check Urged

With the tempo of Republican and Democratic campaign drives in Idaho, voters planning to vote in the Aug. 12 primary election have until 9 p. m. Aug. 9 to register. Voters who registered in the 1936 general election are qualified to vote in the primary election without re-registering. Those having any doubts regarding their qualifications as voters should check their names on the primary election rolls. County Clerk T. W. Silvers notes that registering for the 1936 presidential election, but failing to vote in the election, does not qualify a voter for the Aug. 12 election. To vote in the primary election a person must be a citizen of the United States, 21 years old, who has actually resided in Idaho for six months and in the county where he or she votes for 30 days preceding the day of election. In addition, the voter must be properly registered. Any qualified voter who is temporarily absent from his precinct may register by mail provided he applies properly and during a time when registration is open. Exchange Teacher From England Sheds Tears as She Leaves Valley

Wednesday evening one of Magic Valley's most ardent admirers left partial British accent. Miss Margaret Munro, an exchange teacher who has spent the last 11 months in Twin Falls, Idaho, shed tears as she left for her home in Guilford, England. Mrs. Munro came to her eyes as she bid goodbyes to friends met during her stay here. Mrs. Munro was on a roundabout trip to New York where she sells Aug. 13. Her desire is to see more of a nation she has come to enjoy. She left by bus for Denver, Amalio, Dallas, Memphis, Atlanta, Washington, D. C., and New York. She leaves the States on the Queen Elizabeth and arrives in Southampton, England, Aug. 18 in time to spend three days with Billie Justice, Hagerman, who was the exchange teacher for Miss Munro in Great Britain.

Miss Munro's life here was her first visit to the U. S. Looking back to when she first arrived in New York, Aug. 19, 1935, she mentions she always wanted to visit America and have been interested in the country.

She can't recall her first impressions because "so much has happened." Yet she notes Americans are "extremely friendly people" and looked forward to the visit out West. The charming school teacher wasn't surprised about certain things she found in this country because she had read many magazines from the States.

However, since residing here a year, Miss Munro notes many peculiarities. Besides these differences, Miss Munro prides certain American traditions and activities not found in her native land. One difference she speaks about is greater opportunity for individuals to receive higher education. The English system is much more academic than what most American students go through. Miss Munro says the States have a "broader field" of learning in schools.

The reason for this difference stems from a matriculation examination given to all students in England at the age of 16. Similar to exams in most European countries, the test is extremely difficult and a good number of non-academically inclined persons are "weeded" out of the system.

If a certain person isn't attained after the diploma is given in England before coming to the States. She received a diploma from a teachers training school in England for two years. In England that training allows her to teach both primary and secondary in the school systems. (Secondary modern is a lower classification than secondary grammar school by definition.) The exchange teacher system sponsored by the English speaking union in Britain and by the division of international education of the department of health, education and welfare in the U. S. is to help partial British accent. Miss Munro was assisted much by Miss Munro who has spent the last 11 months in Twin Falls, Idaho.

She was staggered to see the cars at the high school. The recall "I couldn't see how all could be so fully cars." In England students don't drive until 17 years old, and usually not then. "The big reason is they can't afford automobiles when going to school. They ride bicycles or walk." The difference in word usage and implied meaning caused Miss Munro some difficulty when she first arrived. Whenever she heard the word "hall" she automatically went into the auditorium. In England a hall is an auditorium, while correct in the word for halls of a building.

In Great Britain the "boot" is the trunk of a car. Hood is the "bonnet" to an auto in England. "The wings" are the fenders. Because she was around automobiles a greater majority of times here than she had ever been at home, these word differences bothered her for a while. Miss Munro observes how casual Americans are about traveling. Both after arrival in Twin Falls she learned she drove with some friends to Salt Lake City just to shop. The auto she had was "amazing" at great numbers of people traveling. She notes "good roads are good ones" but "the roads are in the general condition of most roads. She did enjoy construction on highways she traveled upon in California. The trip to California was another roundabout one. Miss Munro went to Yellowstone park, Glacier park, Banff and then down the west coast to Los Angeles and Yosemite park. "This gave me more of an idea of distance and vastness in this country," she mentions. "The whole trip was wonderful." She recalls the mud pots and geysers at Yellowstone "uncanny" and recalls bragging about Idaho's climate and scenery while visiting in Los Angeles.

All things being equal, Miss Munro says she would like to live in Twin Falls and many friends with tears in her eyes. Miss Munro calls Magic Valley residents "extremely friendly people" and says she'll feel homesick for the case "I've come to look upon it (Magic Valley) as home." (Staff photo-engraving)

When the mine shut down during the summer he started out to find good farming ground, leaving his wife and children in Washington. He was working for Frank Gooding clearing sagebrush from the Gooding-Jackson, when he hitch-hiked to Camas prairie on a freight wagon.

When he saw the prairie he knew that this was what he was looking for. "Pop" bought a team and borrowed a hack from Bert Phillips, owner of Phillips hotel, and took his family to Camas prairie, traveling the main road, which at that time wound through the CITY OF

Some of the oldtimers who were neighbors were, Charles Mouser, Fred Francis, Charlie Anderson, Arthur Hamford and Frank Hostetter. "Pop" states that in order to get groceries at that time he had to haul his grain by wagon to GLENNS FERRY and trade it for supplies, as no money was available. Each year in the fall he would take a load of grain and bring back the winter's supply of food.

One form of entertainment was for four or five families to gather at one home for Sunday dinner with each family bringing their own food. The homesteaders were fortunate on Camas prairie to have two doctors, Dr. Ayer-Higgs and Dr. DeWitt, doctors.

"Pop," who was 43 last March, is still active and makes his home west of Gooding near a daughter, Mrs. Max Miller.

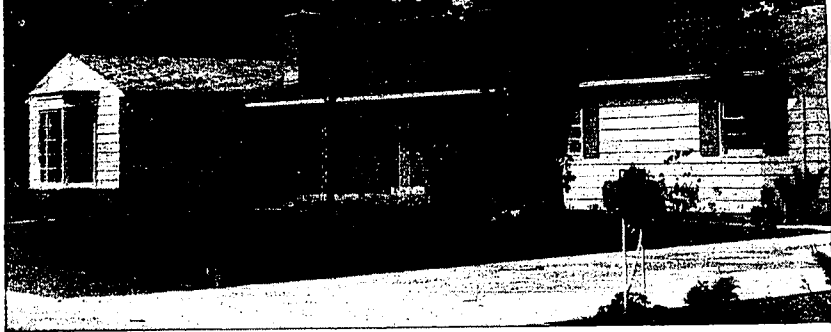

weather to put new drain-troughs and down spouts along the eaves of the high school. At the same time, roofs of many of the school buildings were patched and recrated with tar.

Another job which must be done each year is refitting the gymnasium floors at the high school and junior high school. Stripes on the floors are repainted and then sealed every summer.

Another project that sees much attention each summer is washing and waxing all floors in every building in the district. All furniture removed so a good job is possible.

### Greater Interest in Swimming Noted Here This Year; Two Pools Kept Busy

There is greater interest in swimming in Twin Falls this summer than ever before, and the city recreation department is providing opportunities for interested persons to learn.

Since the first part of June, swimming classes have been under way at the two municipal pools, Harmon park pool and Harry Barr park pool. Besides persons attending the classes in swimming, lifeguarding and diving, hundreds of people swim for recreational value every day.

Harmon park pool is the largest. In the past, measuring 62 by 150 feet, it holds 3,000,000 gallons of water. Both pools have their own water filtering plants, including a chlorinator at each.

Water in the pools is heated to 80 degrees and provides enjoyable swimming because it isn't as cold as some pools.

Harmon park pool was built 10 years ago. Harry Barr pool has been in operation two years and was purchased by the city a few months ago.

Swimming classes range from 9 years old and under to an adult class. All of the student-age classes are divided into—beginner, intermediate and advanced—with varying abilities. Besides the swimming classes, at 8:30 each morning a class of 10 learns lifesaving.

The clinic division includes little beginners, little advanced beginners, little intermediate, little advanced and intermediate, big beginners afraid of water, big low beginners, big advanced beginners, big intermediate, big advanced intermediate, swimmers, junior lifesaving and senior lifesaving.

The "big" classification includes all youngsters 9 years old and under. The "big" category includes the person is over 9 years of age. No students are younger than first grade.

Besides these classes, there is an adult class for older non-swimmers. There are about 30 to 40 women in this class in this section. The class has met for the past two weeks from 5:30 to 6:30 p. m. at Harmon park pool.

Classes for the younger set have run for two months with a student receiving guidance for two-to-three periods. They will continue until Aug. 22, according to City Recreation Director Ernest C. Clark.

Thus far, 155 individuals have been instructed at the smaller pool, and 200 have received training at Harmon park. Starting Monday, Kimberly, Hansen, Murphree and other students will receive instruction for two weeks.

The important principle taught in the beginner-afraid-of-water class is physical and mental adjustment to water. After that, the student advances to low beginners and learns front and back floating.

As the student climbs the ladder to swimmer, he must perfect the proper principles and more abilities in each of the elementary back and beginning crawl and be able to jump and swim out of the deep end. After a student learns the status, a student finds many tests to pass before he can continue up the ladder. "Little" and "big" intermediate—must be able to do stroke and be working on it.

Here a student is introduced into the principles of diving.

All advanced students must accomplish a score of fundamentals. Some of the requirements are three upper leg and arm strokes, 50 yards of elementary back stroke, turning in closed course in the pool rather than open water; floating for one minute, swimming under water for at least 10 feet, front and back, at least five minutes of continuous swimming.

Among the principles swimmers must accomplish are 100 yards of breaststroke, sidestroke, back crawl, crawl or trudgen crawl; 50 yards back swim, and 50 yards of the front crawl; running front dive and 10 minutes of continuous swimming.

If an individual can pass all the requirements for the three upper leg and arm strokes, the student receives at least 15 hours of classes before they can pass on to senior lifesaving.
