### New Hospital Survey Asked For Mindoka

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### House Reluctant To Hike Debt Lid

Koehler noted the advantage of the new card issued to drivers, and to record permanently such information as driving restrictions on a license.

The present card is paper covered by plastic. The new all-plastic card has essential information such as name, age, address, and license number actually stamped or imprinted into the material, which is waterproof and flexible.

Machines now in the state law enforcement department will produce 500 cards an hour, Koehler said. Budget limitations require that issuance of the new version be confined to drivers under 21 for the present.

# U.S. Program for Mideast Is Not Clear As Problem Now Heads Into Assembly

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Does the Eisenhower administration really have a broad Mideast program to offer the United Nations general assembly or is it just playing by ear?

That becomes a primary question as the United States and its allies meet in the assembly hall today.

State Department officials here said they are not sure what the administration's Mideast program is, but they are sure it will be a broad stabilization program for the Mideast.

They said the administration wants to deal with at least three major problems there: Arab nationalism, economic development, and refugees displaced by the Arab-Israeli war of 1948.

But when the reporter sought to pin down his informants—for instance, by asking specifically what would be proposed for the future—

he was told the details have not been worked out.

Yet, since those refugees have been a blistering sore in the Mideast for 10 years, it might seem Dulles' state department planners by this time would be pretty clear on what should be done.

Only a week ago at his news conference Dulles was not talking in terms of a broad program at all; that was still talk of a summit meeting.

He outlined this country's two main goals at such a meeting: to defend this country against Russian charges of aggression and to pin indirect aggression on the Russians.

Until these points were dropped

of, he said, "we do not have an environment or a condition which permits you to proceed usefully" with other problems. He added:

"There is no use getting into the details of economic projects and the like if the Mideast governments are going to live under a constant threat of indirect aggression, assassination and the like."

Two days later—Aug. 2—the Washington Post accused him of a narrow view in an editorial called "The Same Old Rut." It said Dulles was in a rut and added:

"Certainly it is right for this country to seek means of dealing with the indirect aggression which has been and is a very real threat in the Near East. But to make this the be-all and end-all... as Dulles seems to want, would be to get nowhere."

A few hours after the editorial appeared the administration changed its line. Acting suddenly,

preparing to, as we agree with each of the countries, if we can, to help wherever we can."

This might seem to mean he was thinking of working out arrangements with individual countries separately. Later in his conference he talked of working through the U. N. but he was never specific on what he had in mind.

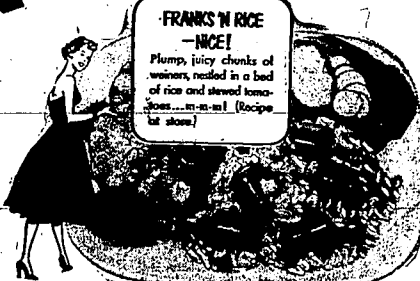

One who has attended average and related students, Dingle said, "The class cannot be held to the level of the student, yet it cannot be given to the exceptional student."

Another student at Harvard University, rated his high school education "in the bottom of the class" because he had to take examinations at Harvard.

However, he softened his criticism by saying that the average high school student "must be learned to study, think and learn."

Alworth was strong in his praise of the eastern school. "Harvard offers everything for a person to become an education," he said.

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### Survey Shows Idaho Not Yet in Recession Hit

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—Information obtained in a U. S. department of commerce survey was the basis for saying today that Idaho is not yet in a recession but is showing signs of one.

John C. Dvorzhak, R., Idaho, said the recession has not been felt in Idaho business operations.

He said the survey, which is made by the department of commerce, shows that Idaho has expanded in the past year.

For the first half of 1958, he said, Idaho farm income is up more than 15 per cent. Total farm income was \$27,400,000 compared with \$23,275,000 last year.

He said reports show that construction, federal building and highway expenditures all have increased. Nonresidential building and remodeling is down slightly.

The economic outlook for Idaho, Dvorzhak said, "is for continued growth. The fact we are fortunate in having a diversified state economy, which can balance out in one industry with firmness and give in others."

Dvorzhak said the survey, made by the department of commerce at his request, showed that Idaho's description of mining and lumbering industries have expanded in the past year.

### Strange Shipyard at Brownlee Dam Is Constructing Vessels to Pick-up Fish

BROWNLEE, Idaho-Oregon, Aug. 7.—Stranger as it seems, a shipyard has been flourishing at Brownlee dam—where the sea is some 600 miles away as the gull flies and rugged mountain peaks down in Jantocedon majesty on the windows. Snake river, this is no ordinary shipyard.

Welders have fitted steel plate to steel plate, making three of the oddest craft ever to take to water. Nearly 80 feet long and weighing 100 tons each, these are the ingenious floating "skimmers" or traps, that are intended to scoop salmon and steelhead fingerlings from the water as part of the unique and costly downstream-migrant fish facilities Idaho Power company is installing in Brownlee's reservoir.

The strange, 30-foot-wide craft now virtually completed, will be loaded with electric pumps, motors and masses of piping instead of cargo from ports half a world away. First of their kind ever built, they will be attached to a vast net woven with steel cables and plastic and wire mesh and stretching 2,800 feet across the new hydro project's reservoir. Pump-created artificial currents will attract fingerlings into V-shaped troughs in the front of the skimmers, after which the fish will be sorted by size into holding tanks.

There, as long-boomed cranes lifted the massive sections into position, welders fastened them together like pieces of a jigsaw puzzle into the three skimmers. Even while welding torches still flared under the scorching summer sun, other workers were outfitting the craft and blanketing them with protective coats of yellow paint. The skimmers will be launched without the traditional champagne-and-roses ceremonies that ordinarily attend ships sliding down heavily greased ways. In fact there are no ways at Brownlee, for its shipyard workers have efficiently fashioned their craft on stout timber cribbing below the reservoir's eventual high-water mark. Thus, as the man-made lake climbs toward its maximum level in preparation for the start of power production by September, the skimmers will simply float off the cribbing and be water-borne. They then will be towed into position, attached to the net and carefully trimmed by means of their sand-and-water ballast tanks and an intricate network of pipes and pumps.

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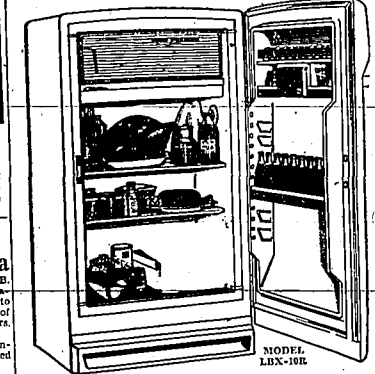

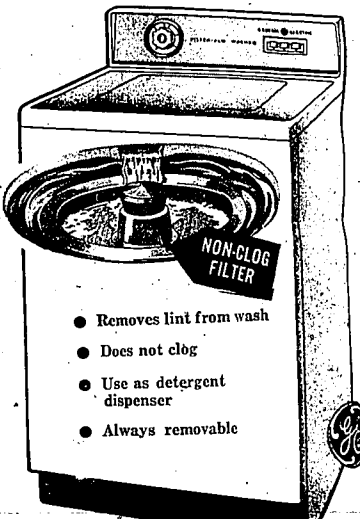

LONDON, Aug. 7 (UPI)—The cost of covering war and crisis is an expensive business today. A 600-mile taxi ride across the desert... a telephone call at \$3.40 a minute... \$100 "urgent press" rate cables they all add up.

photographer normally based in Frankfurt, were ordered from Beirut to Baghdad. The problem was how to get there? There was no Beirut-Baghdad air mail or ship service. They had to take a taxi. The cabbie took them from Beirut to the Lebanese-Syrian border and then quit. They hitched a ride on a potato truck to Damascus. In the Syrian capital they found another cabbie who was willing to risk the ride over the desert where

only roads are cow paths and the bleached bones of animals remind one of the price of failure. The cabbie demanded and got \$100—each. The correspondents bought water. They filled them with lemonade and juice. By the time they reached Baghdad, the 600-mile trip cost them a total of \$725. Then there was the problem of getting the story and pictures of the revolt out of Baghdad un-

scared. Routine dispatches were filed under strict censorship and were delayed from 24 to 36 hours. While Gilmore worked for two days reconstructing the story of the revolution and Hepp's correspondents bought pictures, UPI correspondents Anthony J. Cavendish and Larry Green were working to tie their relay points for news bound for the United States, were jammed with stories about the Lebanese revolt. So in the interests of speed, Gil-

more's dispatches and Hepp's pictures were air freighted to Rome on the first available commercial airliner. From Rome, the news stories were sent to London by the UPI European teletype network and from London by radio teletype to New York at 60 words a minute. Hepp's pictures were radioed from Rome to London and New York. This, from the time Gilmore left Rome and Hepp left Frankfurt until their stories and pictures moved on wires in the United States, it had cost \$764 for their transportation, \$800 for the plane charter, \$9 for air freight charges, \$120 to radio one picture to New York and London and \$123 for five days at hotel rooms. That brought the total to \$1,800.20 not counting their salaries, incidental expenses and special insurance taken out by UPI. A 500-word dispatch from Beirut to London at the regular "press" rate cost \$35—seven cents a word.

Mrs. Fuller will direct the Nancy Taylor charge course, which will be included in the fall curriculum. The charge operates on a year-around basis. Four quarters of instruction are given each year. The summer term which began on June 9 will end Aug. 25.

Employment talks during the year have out-numbered graduates of the college, according to Mrs. Larson, office secretary.

The college is approved under the standards of practice of the National Association and Council of Business Schools, by the veterans administration, and by the state vocational rehabilitation service.

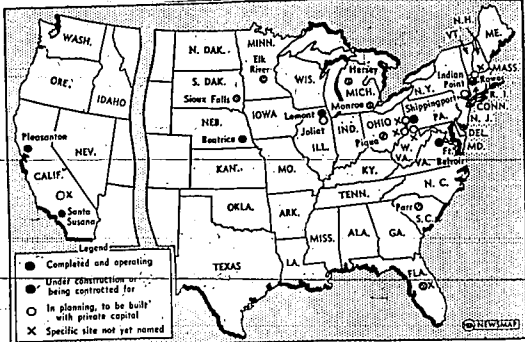
