WASHINGTON, N.Y., Aug. 11 (UPI)—A passenger train derailed and derailed on two occasions today when the emergency brakes failed, killing five people and injuring 25. War Threatening to Win U.N. Support

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Aug. 11 (UPI)—The United States and Russia worked swiftly behind the scenes today to win support for their rival positions. The main aim of the Soviets at the emergency session of the United Nations general assembly was to get U.S. and British troops out of the area immediately. Moscow's delegates underscored possibilities of a new war to win support from uncommitted U.N. members to the Soviet position.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge were meeting today with some of the uncommitted members today and tomorrow to seek support for their rival plans before Wednesday's general meeting of the U.N. general assembly.

Gromyko flew in yesterday from Moscow with warning that the threat of war in the Middle East was "still very acute" and the determination to make a treaty of Anglo-American troops in Jordan and Lebanon the exception for the present Middle East.

The Soviet position was clear: The Middle East policy of the U.N. action will be simply that the American and British troops out of the Middle East. Khrushchev said Russia would force the U.S. to do so to accomplish this.

If Men Were Mice, Then Peril Of Radiation Would Be Lesser

BULLINGTON, Vt., Aug. 11. (UPI)—If men were mice the peril of radiation in the atomic-space age would loom less large.

Scientists attending history's first international congress of radiation reported dramatic progress today in the search for protection against the invisible and potentially deadly rays which swarm in space and stream from the split atoms of nuclear weapons and power plants.

Since man is not a laboratory animal, the discoveries to date have been made with the help of the mouse, which is a laboratory animal.

These discoveries include: 1. The bone marrow is the most sensitive organ to radiation. It contains a powerful antioxidant to radiation injury.

2. A new treatment including administration of the wonder drug streptomycin and injections of bone marrow cells saved the lives of more than 85 per cent of irradiated mice who otherwise would have died horribly.

But mice aren't men. Would the same things that protect them from atomic rays save men?

Dr. Alexander Hollaender of the Ridge national laboratory, who is serving as chairman of this unique meeting, has a rather grim answer. "No, damn it," he said.

Because the mouse's lifespan is brief, the necessary exhaustive experiments on radiation versus lifespan can be conducted and conclusions reached in a period of, say, 10 years.

The same research with man—because he cannot be treated as an expendable bit of laboratory equipment—would have to be done indirectly and would take, say, two centuries and a half.

So, since the atomic-space age is all of a sudden here, the chance must be taken that what is good for mice also will be good for man.

Scientists here must be good for that. If a man gets an overdose of radiation from bomb fallout or

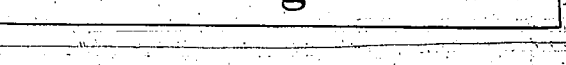

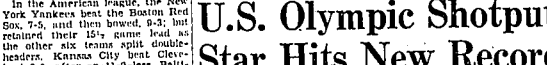

Branch Bill Gooding, and Charles Beavitt, Fairfield, are seeking the fourth district judge's post which is non-partisan.

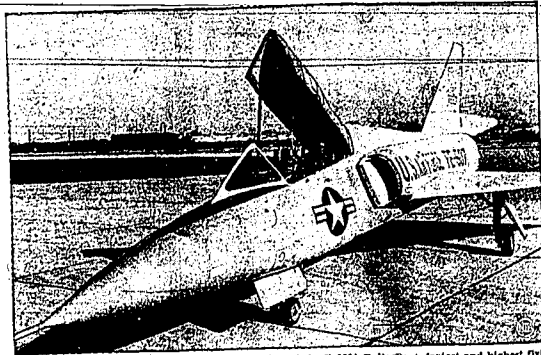
